The battle cry of the sales tax lobby in Texas has long been that just a little general sales tax, say one percent, would solve the state's tax problem.

This same reasoning has been successfully used in many other states which now have such a sales tax. Let's look at what happened in some of those states this year, however. Arizona's general tax was increased from two to three percent; Washington's from 3.3 to four percent; Illinois from 2 1/2 percent to 3 percent, and Pennsylvania from three to four percent.

The old saying about getting the foot in the door should be remembered by those who are saying "... it's the only way." There are other ways, and economy and more local government looms as two of the most noticeable. We think that Texans are looking to Austin for too much. Folks who keep yelling about state rights better start looking at local rights.

## Eastland County Pecan Tour Set For Sept. 29

Those attending the fourth annual tour of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association on Sept. 29 will see five orchards on the all day affair according to Oscar Schaefer, Cook, president of the sponsoring organization.

Plans for the tour call for those attending to leave from the rock market building at Rising Star at 9 a.m. with the first stop to be at the C. E. Smith orchard just a short distance southwest of that city. Smith serves as a director in both the county organization as well as in the Texas Pecan Growers Association.

Near Gorman the orchards of D. J. Jobe and Charley Underwood will be inspected just prior to lunch and a business session at the Brown Jug Cafe there.

In the afternoon the orchards of J. B. Williams on Nash Creek, between Staff and Gorman as well as the orchard and nursery of B. B. Freeman in the Cheney Community, 10 miles south of Ranger will be visited. Freeman is secretary-treasurer of the County group.

According to County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper other officers and directors of the sponsoring group who helped to plan the affair at a recent meeting in Cisco included the following, besides those mentioned above: Pete Dunning, Cisco, vice-president; C. T. Barton, Pioneer; Wayne Thomas, Cisco; and Frank Hightower of Eastland.

Cooper said that all of the orchards except one was on deep sandy soil.

## Commissioners In Favor of Highway 206 Extension

Eastland County Commissioners Monday passed a resolution throwing their support behind a group of Cisco, Coleman and Cross Plains citizens who are attempting to get Highway 206 extended from Burkett to Cisco.

Here is the resolution passed by the Court at the request of Bill Wright, Cisco attorney:

Be it resolved by the County Commissioner's Court of Eastland County, Texas, that the County Commissioner's Court of Eastland County, Texas, does by these presents urge and recommend that the State Highway Commission of State of Texas construct an extension of State Highway 206 from its present terminus north of Burkett, Coleman County, Texas to Cross Plains and thence on directly to Cisco, Eastland County, realizing that this is a vital and needed area for highway service.

Be it further resolved that the Commissioners Court of Eastland County, Texas, by this resolution, indicates its willingness to cooperate in securing the needed right-of-way, subject to the availability of money when the actual plans have been prepared.

## Moss Control To Be Studied At County Meet

Edwin H. Cooper, specialist in wildlife conservation of the A&M College extension Service, will discuss moss control and management of tanks and ponds for better home fishing at two different meetings scheduled for Eastland County, Sept. 28, according to Agent J. M. Cooper.

The afternoon meeting is for 2:30 at the clubhouse at Nimrod and is being sponsored by the Nimrod Neighbors Progressive Club with Herman Schaefer as program chairman. The meeting is open not only to the farmers and ranchers in that part of the county but to the general public interested in better fishing for their home tanks.

Incidentally the annual barbecue of the Nimrod Club will begin at 6 p.m. on that date according to those in charge of the affair.

The Upper Leon Game Preserve Association will sponsor the second meeting at 7:30 p.m. at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce according to Harold Courtney, Eastland, president of the group. Roy Brickman, also of Eastland, is program chairman for the night meeting open also not only to the members of the newly organized game preserve association but also to the general public.

The A & M specialists will discuss weed and moss control in detail at the meeting as well as stocking rates of fish, fertilization and other management practices.

## Airport Grand Opening Celebration Thursday

Eastland will take the wraps off the new City airport Thursday, and a number of important flying business and industrial leaders will be here for the occasion.

Some 40 Texans whose names read like who's who have indicated they will fly here to congratulate the City on improvements at the municipal field. A paved landing strip has just been completed and the field is now lighted at night.

A luncheon will be held at the Lone Cedar Country Club at 1 p.m. Persons flying into the airport will be met at the airport and motored to the new country club. Official greeters will be Mayor Cyrus Frost, City Commissioner Tom Wilson and Chamber of Commerce manager H. J. Tanner.

Improvements at the airport were paid for by donation secured by the Chamber of Commerce's airport committee, and City equipment was used to do the work. The airport can accommodate planes as large as DC-3's, and Tanner pointed out that most business and industrial executives fly much smaller planes.

The hard surfaced runway is 60 feet wide and 3,600 feet long. The airport is located less than a mile north of the city limits.

## School Traffic Safety Week Set by Governor

Texas School Traffic Safety Week will be observed in thousands of Texas school classrooms during the week of Sept. 20-26 in response to an invitation extended to the State's school teachers by Governor Price Daniel.

The Governor has proclaimed that week because "Texas now faces a critical emergency on its streets and highways as the result of increased traffic deaths this year and because it is imperative that all Texans be brought to full realization of the immediate threat to their well-being."

The special week was recommended by the Governor at the annual Texas Safety Conference in Houston last March. Almost immediately representatives of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Public Safety, aided by the Texas Safety Association, veteran citizen-support group for public safety in Texas, began making necessary arrangements.

Governor Daniel said Texas school superintendents, principals and teachers had rallied to the project by the thousands during August, following announcement of plans for the observance.

In his proclamation, the Governor asked the school officials and teachers to make plans for special traffic safety programs and studies in every classroom in Texas. A school traffic safety kit was prepared by the sponsoring agencies entitled, "Learn To Live." It outlines plans and programs for every school age child in Texas and includes teaching ideas and aids on traffic safety.

During the week of Sept. 20-26, emphasis is suggested for each day: Monday, Sept. 20, The Pedestrian; Tuesday, State and City Traffic Laws; Wednesday, Vehicles of School Transportation; Thursday, The Automobile and The Driver; and Friday, The President's Highway Safety Action Program. All material provided can be used at other times during the year, since traffic safety is a continuing program in Texas.

## Gray Matter

With the fall season approaching, with footballs filling the air each afternoon after school, with football games being played each Friday night, and with harvesting at hand, one can rest assured that there is a change of season in the air.

School has started and fall's here. This is the season when the foliage changes its color from the summertime greenery we've gotten used to all summer and takes on all colors of the rainbow before blowing out in the face of winter's blasts.

Some people prefer summer as a favorite season. Others like the wintertime. Others say spring is the most beautiful time. But there is one thing about it, when fall gets into full swing, the landscape is a pretty scene indeed.

A generation or so ago, baseball was the favorite past time and most popular game played by our youth. I doubt if this is true. It would appear that to youth take to football. Football is a hot weather game. Good pitchers prefer the hot weather to limber their arms and keep them limber for a hot, long afternoon of pitching. But football, on the other hand, is a cold or cool-weather sport. By its very nature it heats a fellow up to put in good game of football. It certainly is not hot summertime afternoon sport.

So it happens that all high schools play football if there are enough boys in school to field a team. If there aren't that many boys, most of the smaller school play six-man football. Football is a game that stimulates civic and school pride perhaps as no other single sport can. A lot of people can get wrought up over a football game.

Football is the only sport I know of that can get a larger crowd out for a game than the total population of the town the game is

being played in. This happens quite frequently in some of the West Texas hotbeds of football during games for the local high school.

There have been several times in the past years when more people have attended football games at one time or another in Ranger, Cisco and Eastland that exceeded the population of the town the game was being played in. Eastland has been very fortunate in the past years of having some of the finest high school football teams ever to field a kickoff. Ranger and Cisco both went just about as high as high school could at one time or other back in the days of the old "A" and "B" classification of high school football teams.

The year Buster Mills played for Ranger the Bulldogs would have won the state in Class "A" if it hadn't been for Dallas' Oak Cliff High School knocking them out of the running. Oak Cliff at that time had three or four times the enrollment Ranger had.

Cisco went a long way in Class "A" competition a time or two. If I remember right Cleburne knocked the Lobos out of the running one year with the magnificent punting of a fellow by the name of Paul McFadden who went on to become one of the finest punters in the Southwest Conference.

Ranger's Buster Mills I mentioned a paragraph or two back did well in college too. He was one of the earlier Texans who traveled to Oklahoma to fight the football wars of the warhooping Sooners and singlehanded won the East-West Shrine Game in San Francisco for the West his senior year in Oklahoma. He kicked a field goal from about the 40 or 45-yard line. That's a fair piece of kicking. Mills was one of the best all-round athletes, with the possible exception of Eastland's own Ed T. Cox, that I ever saw.

He went to the big league as a baseball player and stayed there a long time, first as a player then as a coach and scout. The last time I saw anything in print about Mills I noticed he was one of the famous of baseball who attended Tris Speaker's funeral in Mt. (Continued on Page Four)

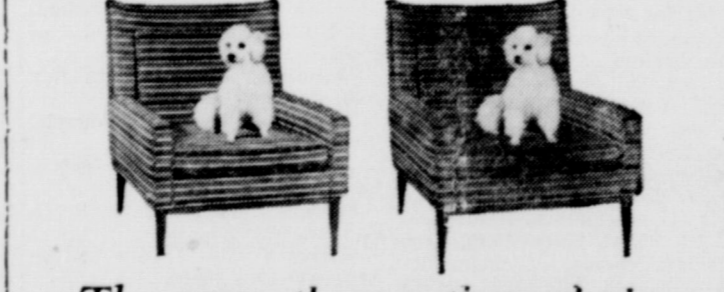



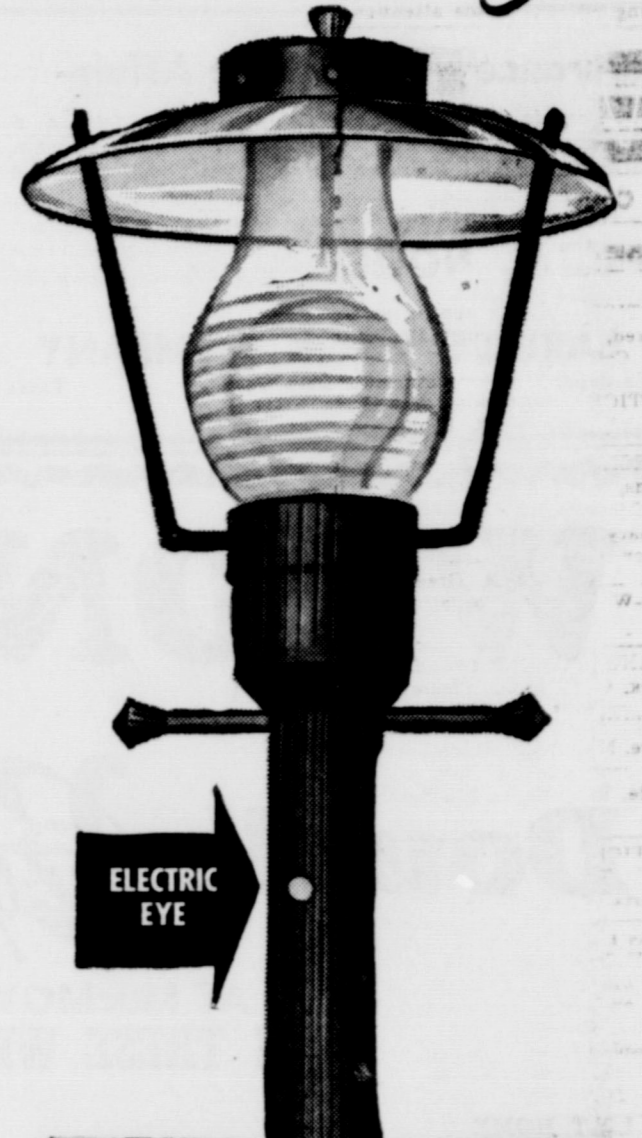

The annual report of the DPS showed that 4 percent of all the car drivers who died in Texas traffic in 1958 were between 15 and 24 years of age; 29 percent of all passengers killed in Texas traffic last year were in this same age-group; and while only 18 percent of all the licensed drivers were between the ages of 15 and 24; 29 percent of all drivers involved in highway crashes were in this age-group.
