Guard Units Again Accepting Men After Two Month Fund Curtailment

Congress recently appropriated additional funds to the Army National Guard which will enable the Cisco unit to accept additional men for the six months Active Duty Training Program which is in much demand by young men all over the country.

Curtailment of funds for May and June caused a virtual stop to the acceptance of non-prior service people since March 1, when the total authorized members for the local unit in Cisco was established at 67 officers and men.

With the additional funds the unit can now accept new men, both with and without prior service. The initial allocation for the 6 months Training Program for the Cisco unit is 8 slots. The individuals will begin training in June. Under present law a young man under 18 1/2 years of age may enlist in the Army National Guard, take 6 months Active Duty Training with the Army, then return to his home town National Guard unit and participate in training for the years. He is then transferred to the

Standby Reserve, which requires no active participation.

An individual between 18 1/2 and 26, if he has not received an order to report for pre-inducted physical examination, may enlist in the National Guard, take six months training, then return to the local Guard unit for 5 1/2 years training.

The Cisco unit has at the present time training vacancies in the following fields: Radio and wire communications, survey, supply, motor vehicle maintenance (including both wheel and track vehicles) artillery maintenance, clerical and general artillery.

The Cisco National Guard unit was recently redesignated from Btry A, 648th AFA Bn to Battery C, 4th Field Artillery Battalion, 645th Combat Arms Regiment. It is still a part of the 49th Armored Division.

Along with its redesignation, it will change primary weapons. The 155mm self-propelled howitzers now assigned will be replaced with 8-inch self-propelled howitzers. The new equipment is a great deal larger and will be the biggest artillery piece in the Division. The Cisco battery is the only unit in the Division armed with the 8-inch howitzer.

The 1st of the new weapons which weighs nearly 48 tons, is scheduled to arrive in Cisco about May 21st.

Individuals who may be interested in the 6 months training program and subsequent National Guard service, or any other phase of the military service and obligations, may contact Lt Charles Layton, Lt Bennett Ragsdale, or PFC Jon Tate in Eastland. CWO James Hendrick, administrator for the Cisco unit, is available daily at the Armory, located on the Cisco Lake Road.

James R. Williams, superintendent, will be speaker for the service. Commencement exercises will be held Thursday.

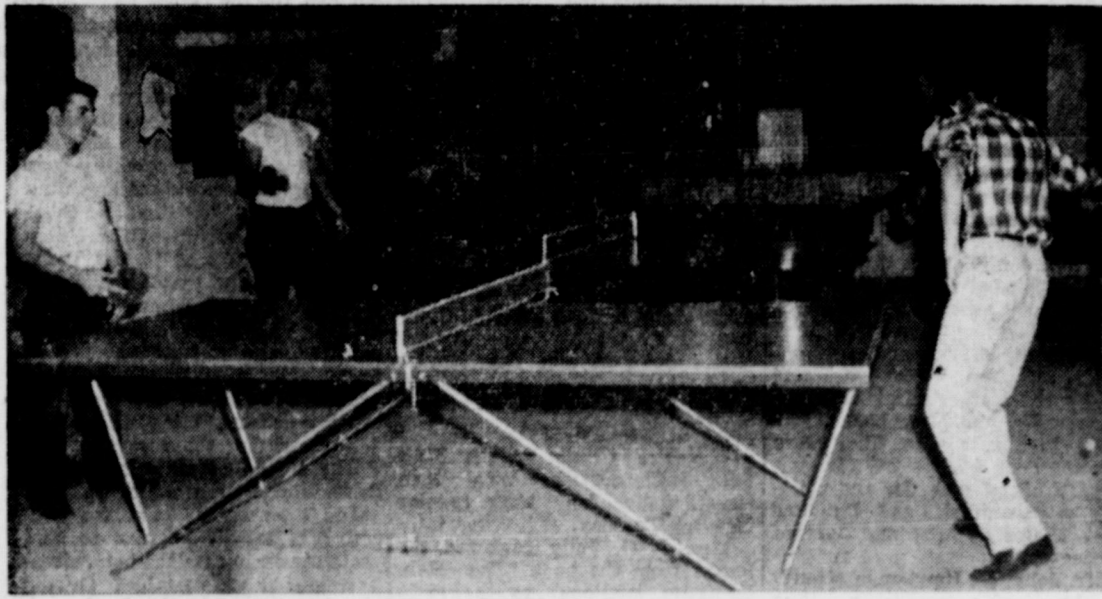

Plans for Two Summer 'Y' Day Camps Revealed

Plans were announced today for Eastland's YMCA Day Camp. Two camps will be held again this year under the direction of Mrs. Milton Day.

Carbon, Olden and Ranger children have been issued a special invitation this year to attend the summer camps. Hubert Jones, "Y" president, said, "We want these towns to consider our camp as the 'Y' town. They will be welcome to participate."

Swimming, handicrafts, archery, baseball, volleyball, tennis, trampolines, air riflery for juniors, nature study, group singing and story telling is again planned.

All water activity will be under the supervision of a qualified swimming and water safety man. Accident insurance is carried on each camper.

On the occasion of my visit to the grave of Sam Bass, the old-time outlaw, some years ago, J. H. Kavanaugh, then the editor of the Round Rock Leader, contributed an intriguing "might-have-been" to the lore in our conversation.

Sam had planned the holdup of the Round Rock bank (which was to have been executed the day after the unexpected battle took place, in which Bass was mortally wounded), and this bank holdup was to have been his final exploit in Texas. (This is in the books.) With the funds the bandits hoped to obtain, they planned to go to Mexico and live in ease.

The day chosen for the bank holdup — (and now we come to the lore contributed by Mr. Kavanaugh) — on that same day, there was another event scheduled; the arrival in Round Rock of the railroad pay train with a big

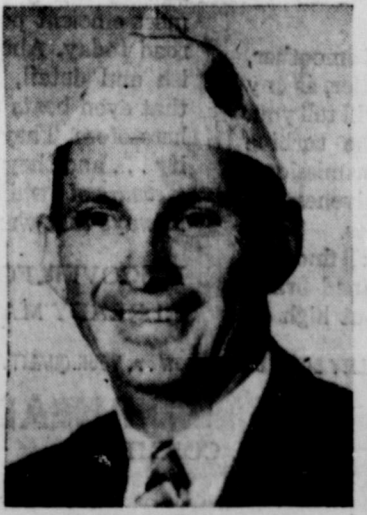
Baccalaureate services at Olden will be held Sunday at 11 a.m. in the High School gymnasium.

Rev. Jackie Heath, who teaches at OHS, will deliver the sermon. Special music will be provided by Janice Crabtree of Eastland.

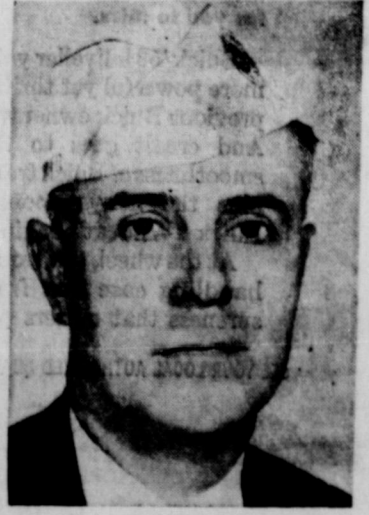

amount aboard, the money being not just for the rather large force employed in that town but for the workers at the points all along the line.

Bass had never held up a bank but he was thoroughly experienced at holding up trains; in fact, he and his men had stuck up four trains in a matter of weeks within a short radius of Dallas and there was also the holdup of the Union Pacific train (prior to the Texas robberies), in which Sam had participated. In the Union Pacific holdup, \$68,000 in gold had been obtained and it was these gold pieces that Bass spent so freely and with which he had built his reputation for aiding the needy.

So much for the background. The Round Rock editor posed these interesting questions: Did Bass know about the pay-train? If so, did he plan to hold up the train in case the bank situation looked unfavorable? 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Fort Worth Stockyards Are Important to Area

COLLEGE STATION — The Fort Worth Stockyards is the most important single livestock market in Texas and one of the major livestock markets in the U. S. Of the 60 public stockyards reported by the USDA in 1957, Fort Worth ranked eleventh in salable receipts of cattle, sixth in calves, second in sheep and lambs and twenty-seventh in hogs.

"Fort Worth Stockyards—Operating Procedures and Problems" is the title of a miscellaneous publication released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station which thoroughly discusses the stockyards.

Responsibility for handling and selling livestock on the market is divided between the Fort Worth Stockyards and a number of independent commission firms.

Twenty-nine commission firms operated at Fort Worth in 1957. The stockyards furnishes facilities and personnel to handle livestock, with the commission firms doing some

handling and being responsible for selling the livestock.

The Fort Worth Stockyards faces a number of major problems. Among the most important are a decline in salable receipts, variations in daily receipts, seasonality of receipts and customer attitudes.

A survey of current shippers was made to obtain some knowledge of customer opinion and some of the opinions are expressed in the publication. Many suggestions were carried out and stockyards were made. Some suggestions were carried out and others are receiving further consideration.

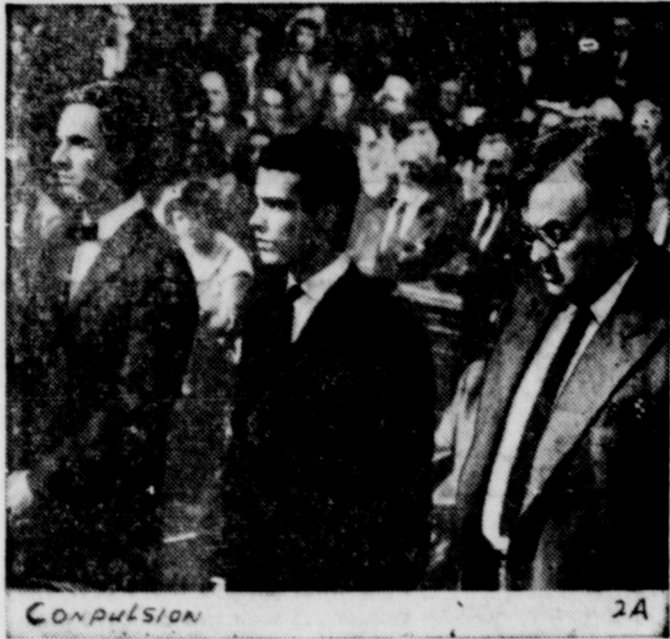

MARTHA'S MOVIE MEMOS

The smooth cheese filling can be chilled until firm in a baked pastry shell or in a graham cracker crumb crust.

Strawberry Cottage Cheese Pie

| 1 envelope unflavored gelatine | 2 cups (16 ounces) creamed cottage cheese |
| 1/2 cup sugar | 1/2 teaspoon salt |
| 1 cup milk | 1 tablespoon lemon juice |
| 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind | 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped |
| | 1 9-inch baked pie shell |
- Fresh strawberries

Mix together gelatine and sugar in top of double boiler. Stir in milk. Place over boiling water, stirring occasionally, until gelatine is dissolved, about 8 minutes. Remove from heat; add lemon rind; cool. Sieve cottage cheese into large mixing bowl, or beat with electric mixer until smooth. Stir in cooled gelatine mixture, salt and lemon juice. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon. Fold in whipped cream. Turn into prepared shell. Chill until firm. Garnish with serve with strawberry sauce.

Yield: 1 9-inch pie.
