But I think J. O.'s got the right idea in getting the women to mow the lawn. We never could do that in our house. It seems to me that I grew up on the business end of a lawn mower.

Even the dogs out in this neighborhood seemed to think the men folks of the neighborhood ought to do the grass cutting. The old saying about a dog's life being hard isn't true. I learned that from watching our old dog, Midge, and his neighbor friend, Doc, who belonged to the Perkins household. Midge and Doc loved to watch me cut the grass. I think they must have enjoyed it as much as I disliked it. It did them good to sit out in the shade and watch me pushing, huffing and puffing, on a lawnmower while they lay in the cool shade under a cool oak tree. Then about the time I'd mow up to where they were resting they would politely move to some other place in the yard to give me room to mow.

Puffing behind the ignorant end of a lawnmower convinced me that this old business about a dog's life being so bad was all wrong. I didn't know anything better than the life of a well-fed, well-looked-after, well-kept, well-kept and well-loved dog. That's the best life I ever saw. Few humans, if any, enjoy the life of a well-kept dog.

I sometimes think Midge and Doc knew how lucky they were as far as dogs go. They sure did join their efforts together to see that no one who was not supposed to be in the neighborhood was not in it. They ganged up against other dogs and they also spent a lot of time seeing that strange cats stayed up the nearest tree, although they left the Perkins' family cat strictly alone. 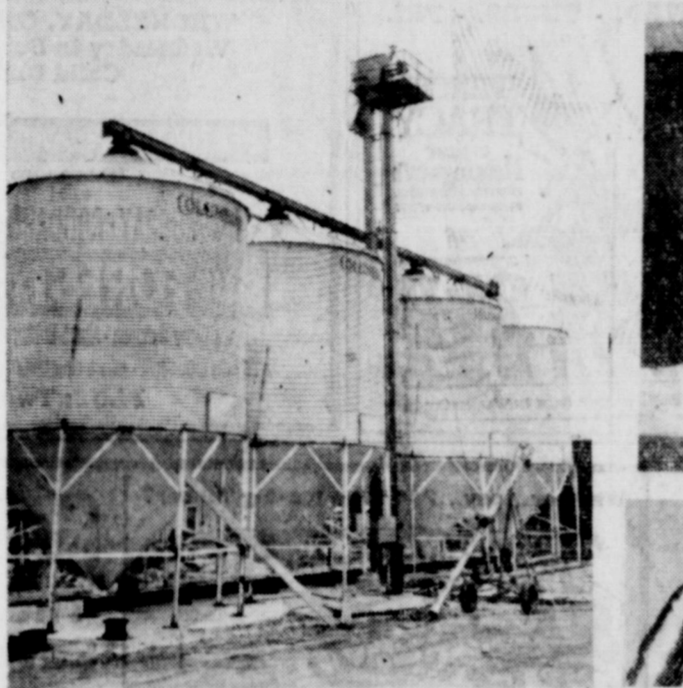
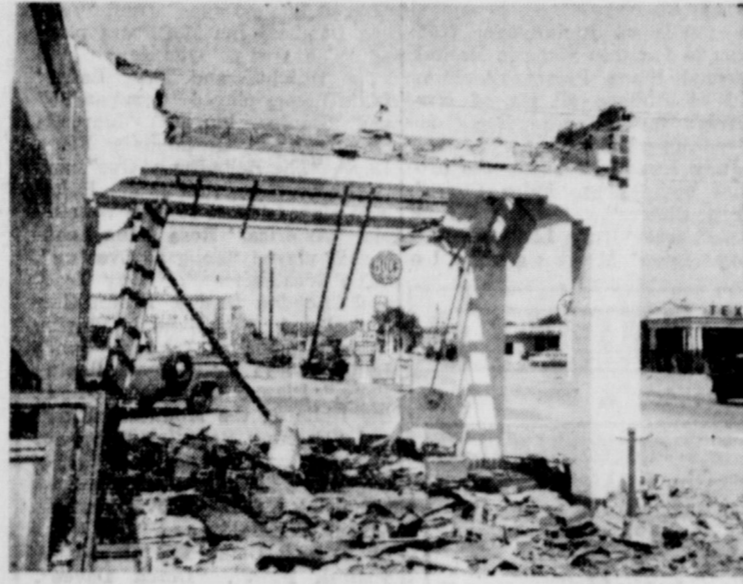
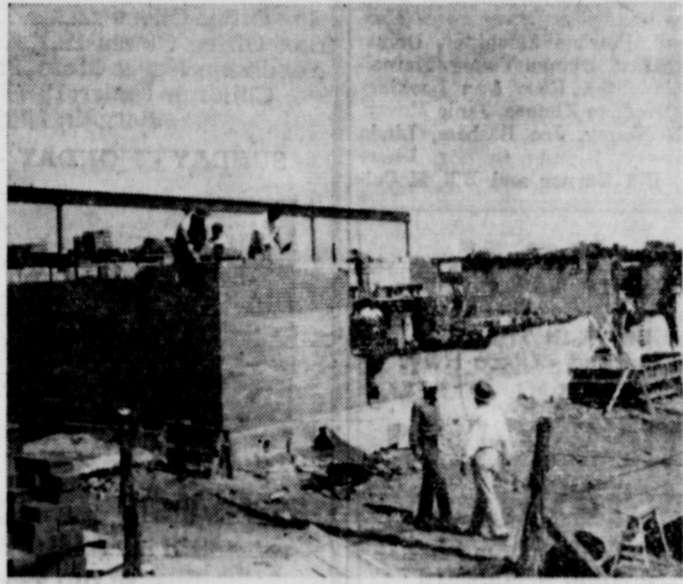

## Russian Attache Claims His Nation Wants Peace

A high ranking Soviet official, who holds the nation's highest military decoration, described his native land as a just waking industrial giant when he spoke before a joint meeting of the Eastland Rotary and Lions clubs in Eastland Monday.

Z. S. Alkhinov, commercial and trade attache for the Soviet embassy in Washington, D. C., called for a better understanding "between our two great countries."

Speaking in the White Elephant restaurant before an overflow crowd, the holder of the Lenin Medal, the equal of the United States' Congressional Medal of Honor, used soft words to tell his listeners that the United States knew nothing of war. He said his own country had nothing but war for 40 years while "your country enjoyed peace."

Alkhinov said that the Russian people want peace, and pointed out that it was against the law in Russia to write of war. He said that stories such as the ones run in American newspapers about the possibility of destroying Russia or the United States in an atomic war do not run in Soviet papers.

The Russian visitor used a big smile through his talk. He seemed to enjoy a question and answer period despite the fact some of the questions were pointed. Most of his "answers" were in the form of rebuttal questions.

"We (Russia and the U. S.) have never been enemies," he declared. "We have never had a war."

Alkhinov said he finds that both the U. S. and Russian people want cooperation. He spoke of the recent visit to Russia of Texas' Van Cliborn, saying that the Russian people greatly respect the Texan pianist. He said Russian people reasoned that, "If they have such a good boy they are not so bad. It is possible to deal with them."

Speaking of Russia's seven year plan, which began this year, the guest speaker said his country is "... in a great period of growth."

He described Russia today as in about the same position the United States was 40 years ago.

In the next seven years Russia hopes to increase production 80 percent. He said it would be no treat to America if Russians lived as good or better than Americans.

Alkhinov, who looked much like television's George Gobel, pointed to the plan between Russia and the United States to exchange trade expositions as a step forward to better understanding. He said great countries cannot live without foreign trade, and complained that the United States was the only major country with which Russia does not have a trade agreement.

The youthful Russian, who said he spent his time behind a plow until he was 16 years old, predicted that soon there will be more "peaceful trade" between Russia and the U. S.

Alkhinov didn't back up to any questions which were thrown at him from the floor. His statement that the U. S. had had 40 years of peace drew a caustic comment from Cyrus Frost. Frost said that every man in the room had helped to keep Germany from defeating Russia in World War II, and added that, "we aren't sure we did the right thing now."

The Russian denied his nation wants to destroy the U. S. He told one questioner that the U. S. had no business sending planes close to the Russian border (he had been asked about the shooting down of American planes) and suggested that the U. S. spends as much on war production as does Russia when asked about the Soviet military buildup.

## Tax Attorney Given His Walking Papers

Eastland City Commissioners fired a tax attorney, voted to try vapor lighting on Seaman Street and called for a war against stray dogs at their regular monthly meeting last night.

Commissioners unanimously voted to "relieve from duty" Fred Harmon, DeLeon attorney who has been in charge of filing City delinquent tax suits. Harmon was to meet with the City Monday night, having assured the Commission, according to Mayor Cyrus Frost, that he would have filed all suits by the May meeting.

Harmon was employed more than a year ago. Commissioners expressed the opinion that more speed is needed in efforts to collect back taxes.

Frank Sayre, district manager of Texas Electric Service Co., met with the Commission to discuss vapor lighting on Seaman Street. Commissioners said they had received a number of complaints that lighting on the street was not sufficient.

After discussing putting up nine new mercury vapor lamps, the City Dads decided to have Texas Electric install one at the corner of Conner and Seaman for trial purposes. Texas Electric installs the vapor lights at their own expense. The City, however, will face a slightly increased electrical bill.
