



Tulley pointed out that persons who-have been totally disabled for 6 months or longer, and whoworked in jobs covered by the social security law for as many as years out of the 10 years before they were disabled-should get further information about this new provision in the Social Security Act. By applying to have their social security earnings records frozen while they are disabled, they may prevent loss or reduction of future benefits.

Some people now receiving oldage insurance payments were dis abled for long periods before they reached age 65 and are still disabled. They, too, can benefit from

the new law if they had the re quired amount of work under the

law before they became disabled. Tulley emphasized that the law protects the social security rights of a person who is suffering from a prolonged total disability, but


