Walters Is Praised For Hospital Work

Last week at The Eastland Memorial Hospital, Bill Walters, of the S. W. Bell Telephone Co. completed a difficult task. He has been one of the star volunteer workers during the construction of the new hospital wing. He served all of his spare day time hours and at night he was the last worker to leave the hospital.

In order to install the Edwards hospital signaling system, aud o, visual and audible, it was necessary that his work keep ahead of the construction. This modern

signals which indicates to a nurse that assistance is required at a specific location—should the nurse need help she can also signal to the nurses switch board—without leaving the patient. Pat can talk to other patients in the hospital and if they care for music, live or recorded, this too the switchboard operator can arrange. The newly installed switchboard is more modern than the one in the old hospital, hence the original rooms have been tied into the present system and operates as one unit.

In the hospital work, Bill Walters is really playing a return engagement since he was one of this community's most enthusiastic volunteer workers in 1952 during the construction of the original hospital.

It was Bill who was able to survive the power driven jack-hammer, as it drilled through rock beds and boulders, building the hospital foundation. He also installed all the telephone connections which included telephone service to each room, as well as the complex wiring of the nurse call system. Since 1952 he has served without charge, all the trouble calls, day or night and only \$7.48 was charged to the hospital for supplies. "Self confidence is the first requisite for great undertakings"—Bill graduated from Eastland High School and later John Tarleton College. He has worked hard and learned well at the telephone company and after 17 years of service no one doubts his ability or loyalty.

Mr. and Mrs. Walters reside at 813 W. Valley St. and their charming daughter, Gaila, will graduate this week at the Eastland High School.


J. O. Musick, TSA's general manager, points out, the theme, "Can YOU Stop in Time," emphasizes four basic causes of every accident.

"A mechanically unsafe vehicle, a roadway hazardous in design or size, a driver inadequately equipped for his task or a driver whose mental and emotional attitude (often caused by traffic jams, drinking, fatigue, etc.) is such that it causes him to forget his normal safe driving habits."

4-H'ers Have Canning Projects This Summer

Pantry shelves in Texas 4-H homes will literally groan under the weight of all kinds of canned foods when club members complete their 4-H canning projects this summer.

Not only does the entire family benefit as young cooks perfect their canning skills, but club members themselves stand to gain substantially, contends the Extension Service which directs this work.

Along with learning the basic steps of food preservation, the 4-H'ers have opportunities to demonstrate, to exhibit best products at fairs, and last but not least, to compete for a variety of awards.

For the past 31 years, canning awards have been provided by Kerr Glass Manufacturing Corporation, Sand Springs, Oklahoma. Perhaps the most exciting award is the expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress held at the Conrad Hilton hotel in Chicago.

There more than 1,300 champion boys and girls from every state have a chance to compare notes during the week-long event.

Up to four winners in each county will be in line for a handsome gold-filled canning medal, while the top award in national competition is a \$400 college scholarship. Winners are determined by the Extension staff.

The congress trip last year went to Miss Janice Hott, 17, of Weatherford, who completed a six-year canning project by winning top state honors. By actual count she had preserved 1,276 quarts of fruits, pickles, jams and jellies.

She serves as a junior leader of the County-Wide 4-H Club.

Use of Plastic Reduces Cost Of Greenhouses

COLEGE STATION — The use of plastic as a substitute for glass in greenhouse construction has reduced the cost of such structures to the point that backyard operations may be encouraged. Clyde Singletary, extension horticulturist, says the smaller, intensive operators who grow vegetable transplants and produce tomatoes out-of-season are particularly interested in the development.

The relative low cost of a plastic greenhouse can make a profitable enterprise for those interested in producing vegetables out-of-season. This is particularly true, says Singletary, because such vegetables usually find a ready market and move at satisfactory prices. He recommends that a small structure be used until the know-how for handling volume production is acquired.

Because of the unusual number of requests for information on the plastic structures, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has just made available a new publication, MP-341, "Plastic Greenhouses for Growing Vegetables." Copies are available at the offices of local county agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

The publication covers such items as construction, including size, framing and the plastic cover, and heating and cooling systems. Drawing and photographs are used to illustrate the important construction items. Singletary believes that plastic greenhouses can be used very successfully in Texas and that operators with the required managerial know how can develop a profitable enterprise on a small acreage and with a minimum investment. He emphasizes, however, the need for a person to acquire the needed managerial ability before getting into greenhouse production of vegetables on a big scale.

Grasshoppers Cause Severe Crop Damages

COLLEGE STATION — Every year grasshoppers destroy crops in some parts of the State. During severe outbreaks the losses run into millions of dollars.

About five million acres of rangeland was infested with grasshoppers in the Panhandle area of Texas in 1958. Of the infested rangeland only about one million acres was sprayed...

grass. Most of the grass could have been saved at a nominal average cost of about sixty cents per acre by spraying at the proper time.

As an aid to farmers and ranchmen, entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service have prepared a leaflet titled "Grasshoppers Common to Texas."

The leaflet discusses the different species of grasshoppers found in Texas and their identifying characteristics. Also included is a discussion of the life cycle of grasshoppers from the time the females lay the eggs to maturity.

This leaflet can be obtained from your local county agent along with information on best control measures, or by writing the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for L-429.

Here's How to Get Rid of Ticks And Chiggers

COLLEGE STATION — The chiggers in your lawn and the ticks that your pets bring into the yard need be tolerated no longer, says Extension Entomologist James H. Hawkins.

Most homeowners have at least one of these problems at some time during the year. Both pests create a problem in recreational areas, especially where wild animals are present to serve as hosts for the ticks, he said.

One application of a practical and safe insecticidal control is now available for use in controlling them. For ticks use 10 percent DDT, 10 percent chlordane or two percent dieldrin dust at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds, or 20 percent toxaphene dust at the rate of 10 to 15 pounds per acre where vegetation is sparse...

For chiggers apply dusts or sprays of chlordane, toxaphene or lindane to grass and ground litter where chiggers are present. An emulsion spray usually gives the

best results. Follow manufacturer's directions for mixing sprays. For small areas, use a compressed-air or knapsack sprayer and apply two and one-half to three quarts per 1,000 square feet. If dusts are used, apply five percent chlordane at 40 to 50 pounds per acre or 20 percent toxaphene at 10 to 15...
