Olden Seniors Return From Senior Trip

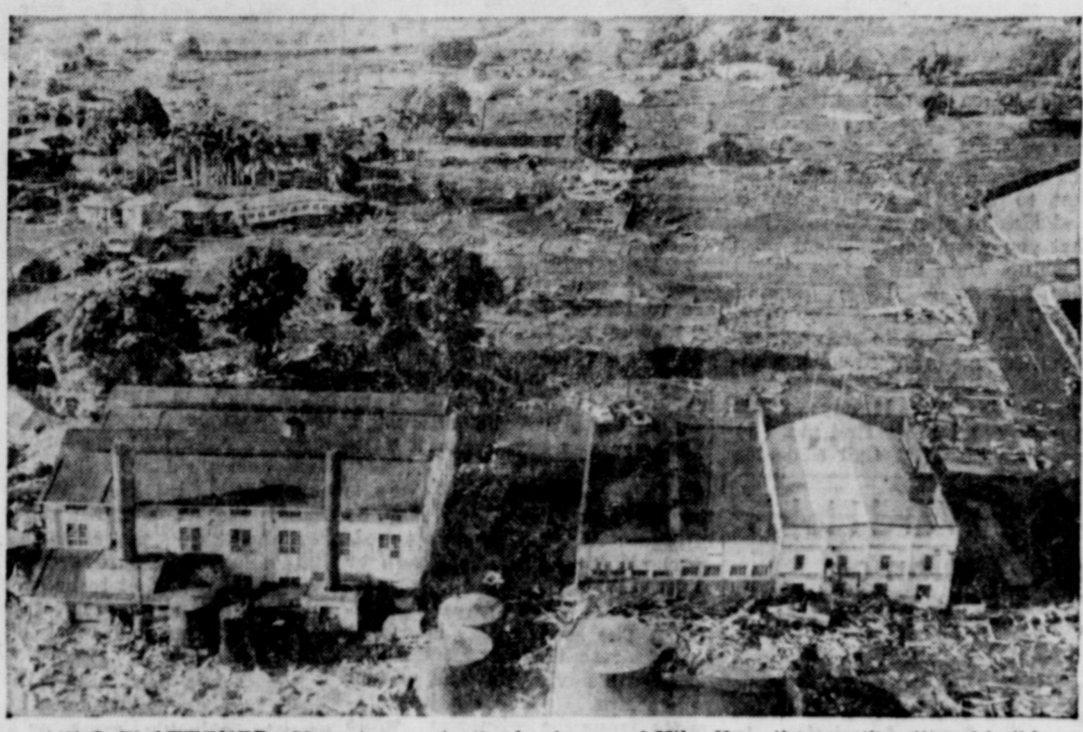
Olden High graduates returned from their annual senior trip last week.

Army Seeks to Add 18 Months To Guard Time

The Army wants to add 18 months to the drill requirements of future six-months plan enlistees in the National Guard and Reserve for the 17-18 1/2 age group.

At the present time those enlisting between 17-18 1/2 take six months active duty training followed by three years drill service in the local units. The change will make it 4 1/2 years drill service.

No change is expected for individuals enlisting between the ages 18 1/2-25. On enlistment in the National Guard they will continue to take 6 months active duty training followed by 5 1/2 years in the Ready Reserve drilling with local units.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

Many of us think of a legend as a story handed down from a long ago past; something that our fathers heard from their fathers.

Newspaper instinct told me that there was a story but that instinct also told me to handle the line with care. So in an equally casual tone, I replied, "No—but then I'm comparatively new in West Texas and don't know all the traditions. Why?" His answer was, "We'll soon know whether it's true or not."

Old Rip was one of those fantastic, fearsome-looking but harmless creatures which scientists say are lizards; but any small boy in West Texas knows better than that: they are horned frogs.

The hero of this tale was no different in appearance from any of the unnumbered thousands which swarm over numerous Texas counties each spring and summer. A little, bright-eyed creature that you could hold in the palm of your hand—yet he gained worldwide renown and he has become a part of the lore and legend of Texas.

In the winter of 1927-28, this chronicler was editor of Eastland's daily newspaper. A group sat in the office of the district clerk in the old brick courthouse, which had been built in 1897 and was soon to be torn down. It was almost closing time. In the group was Ernest Wood, former county clerk and later justice of the peace. He was a plump, middle-aged man with mild blue eyes and a quiet way of speaking.

That night, (after our conversation) I wrote a short news article, keeping the carbon for use in the Eastland paper and sending the original to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, of which I was the local correspondent. Letters came to Eastland from many sections. Visitors asked about the matter and townspeople traveling to other areas were showered with inquiries: Was it really true that a live frog had been sealed in the cornerstone? When would the stone be opened? The seekers for information who dwelt in more distant regions wanted to know if there actually were frogs with horns. The young editor was amazed at the wide interest which had been aroused.

It was not long until destruction of the courthouse began. County Judge E. S. Pritchard promised to learn from the contractors the exact day and an estimate of the hour that the cornerstone would be reached. So on a Friday morning, the editor was informed that probably in the middle of the afternoon of the next day, the corner stone would be opened. Through the Associated Press, millions were informed of this.

On Saturday, February 18, 1928 shortly after noon, people began to gather and the crowd grew steadily larger. The frog was the only topic of conversation: Would he be found—and, if so, would he be alive? There was one member of the crowd who was sure that nothing would be discovered, not even a shriveled mummy or a pinch of dust that could be identified. This individual was the brash young editor who had started all the speculation. (To be concluded next week.)

was the first mayor of Ranger, and was instrumental in making Ranger what it is today.  
Mrs. Hagaman was the first president of the 1929 Club and helped with its organization, and served two other times as its president, and was the last charter member of the club. This outstanding club woman, whose farsighted vision brought about the 1929 Club's establishment, has also been active in State club work, serving as chairman of many departments and as vice president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, and was a life-time member of the Board of Directors of this organization.  
She was also a member of the New Era Club, The Daughters of

American Revolution, a past regent of Texas Womens University, member of the Society of Christian Service. Mrs. Hagaman was a graduate of Peabody College in Nashville, Tennessee. She was a member of the First Methodist Church of Ranger.  
Funeral services are pending from the First Methodist Church, with the Rev. Lively Brown, pastor, to officiate. Interment will be in the Evergreen Cemetery.
