

the National Guard in Cisco. Little Congressional opposition s expected and the change will probably be effective July 1 Those enlisting before that date will not be affected.

At the present time those en listing between 17-18 1/2 take six months active duty training followed by three years drill ser vice in the local units. The change vill make it, 4 1/2 years drill ser-

No change is expected for individuals enlisting between the ages 18 1/2-25. On enlistment in the National Guard they will con tinue to take 6 months active duty training followed by 5 1/2 years in the Ready Reserve drilling with

Under the same law those men who are drafted serve two years in the Ready Reserve following their two years active duty. No change will be made.






