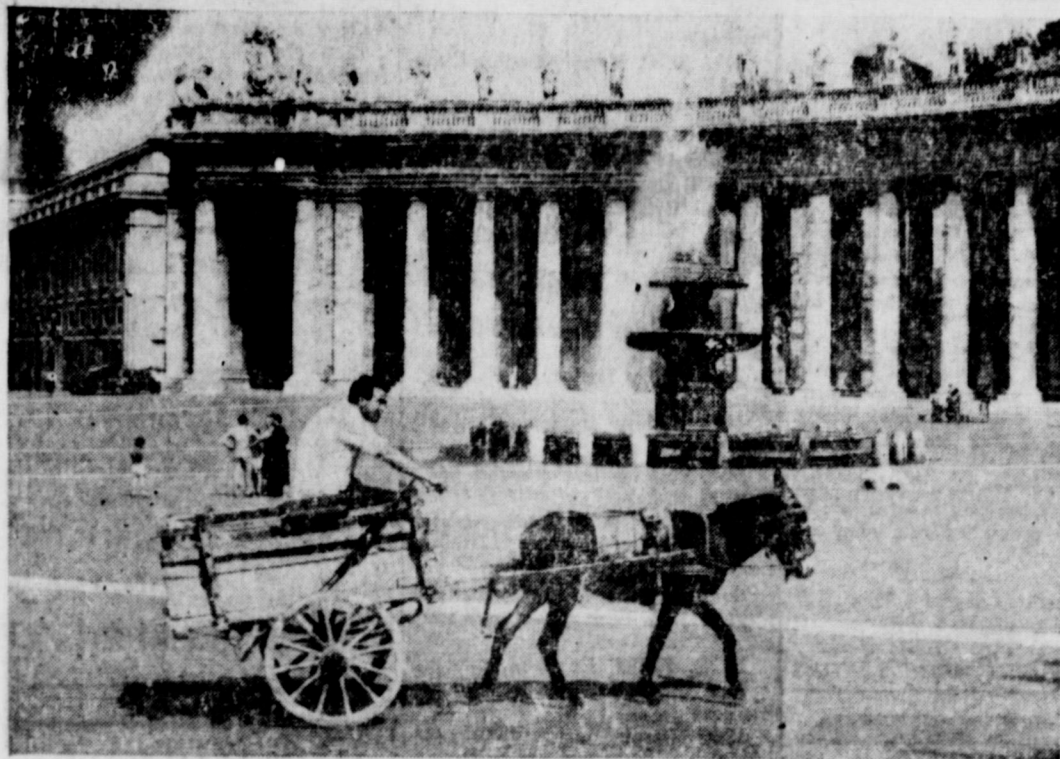
Poage Says Peanut Growers Snubbed

Registration for First Graders Must Be Made

Parents who have a child entering the first grade in the Eastland Public Schools this September should make sure that they have the necessary credentials in order to avoid delay in enrollment.

A child entering for the first time must be six years of age before Sept. 1, and be officially registered at the business office in the high school building. In order to register, parents must submit birth certificates and proof of smallpox vaccination by Aug. 19.

If birth certificates are not already in the possession of the parent, immediate steps should be taken to secure one as no child will be registered who do not present one, a school spokesman said.

Four Amendments Will Face Voters In Texas November General Election

Texas voters should look to the month of November 1960, as another time of decision, for it is in this month which a General Election will be held.

At this time a new President and Vice President will be elected. All other elective offices, both National and State, will likewise be voted upon.

Korean Vets Urged to Apply Now for Training

Veterans planning to train under the Korean GI Bill this coming fall were urged today by the Veterans Administration to get their applications in now, rather than wait until the last minute.

This same advice holds true for young men and women who intend to start school in the fall under the War Orphans Education program, Stanley M. Cowan, acting manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas, said.

By filing an application now, early in the summer, all processing can be completed long before classes start, he pointed out. Any snags or special problems can be ironed out with time to spare. But waiting until the last minute—when VA regional offices may be swamped with applications—may risk delay.

Applications for Korean GI Bill training or for War Orphans Education may be obtained at any VA office.
