New Wheat Variety Released

Seed from Tascosa, a new hard red winter wheat variety which produces excellent yields of outstanding quality, will be available from producers of certified seed after the 1960 harvest.

Tascosa was developed by the Small Grains Section of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in cooperation with the USDA. It was named for Tascosa, the early Panhandle settlement west of Amarillo.

Tests on the Rolling Plains show Tascosa ranking first in yield. In regional trials in 61 station-year tests, Tascosa averaged 33.7 bushels per acre over a 4-year period compared with 33.3 for Concho and 31.4 for Comanche. The new variety has not yielded as well as Crockett in North Central or Central Texas tests, and because of this and its susceptibility to certain diseases, it is not recommended for these areas.

Tascosa differs considerably from the present commercial varieties grown in Texas. The plants are shorter in stature and the straw is strong, which aid in resisting lodging. The variety resists shattering and may require special setting of the concaves for threshing because the kernels are held tightly by the glumes.

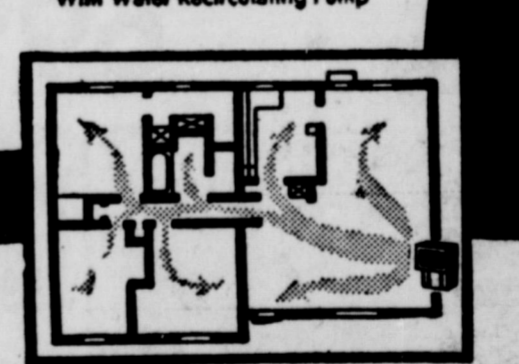

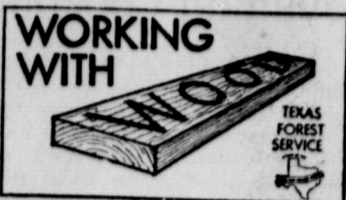
Gum Popper Can Be Annoying

Lumber grading rules generally degrade a piece of lumber if it has stain. This is done to protect the consumer, since the higher grades of lumber are often used with transparent finishes. Stained lumber, coated with a transparent finish, reveals the stain and scolor through the finish. This is often objectionable.

If lumber is to be painted, the use of stained lumber is no problem. Such lumber is equivalent in strength to clear lumber and can be employed for similar uses.

There are numerous kinds of stains possible in and on wood of both hardwood and softwood species. However, all stains result either from chemical action or by the attack of fungi. The fungi do not cause decay. However, their presence indicates that a condition suitable for decay fungi also exists. Consequently, stain may provide a visual warning.

Chemical stain is usually restricted to the surface layers of sapwood. It is brought about by the oxidation of organic compounds in the wood during hot humid weather. These superficial stains often can be removed by planing the lumber. Prevention may be accomplished by dipping the freshly cut lumber in an anti-stain solution.

Sap stain, or blue stain, as it is most generally known, is prob-

ably the most widely known lumber stain caused by fungi. Lumber manufacturers utilize specialized drying equipment and certain stain control solutions to produce stain-free lumber. Kiln drying also protects the lumber against both stain and decay fungi, and dries it to a suitable condition for use.

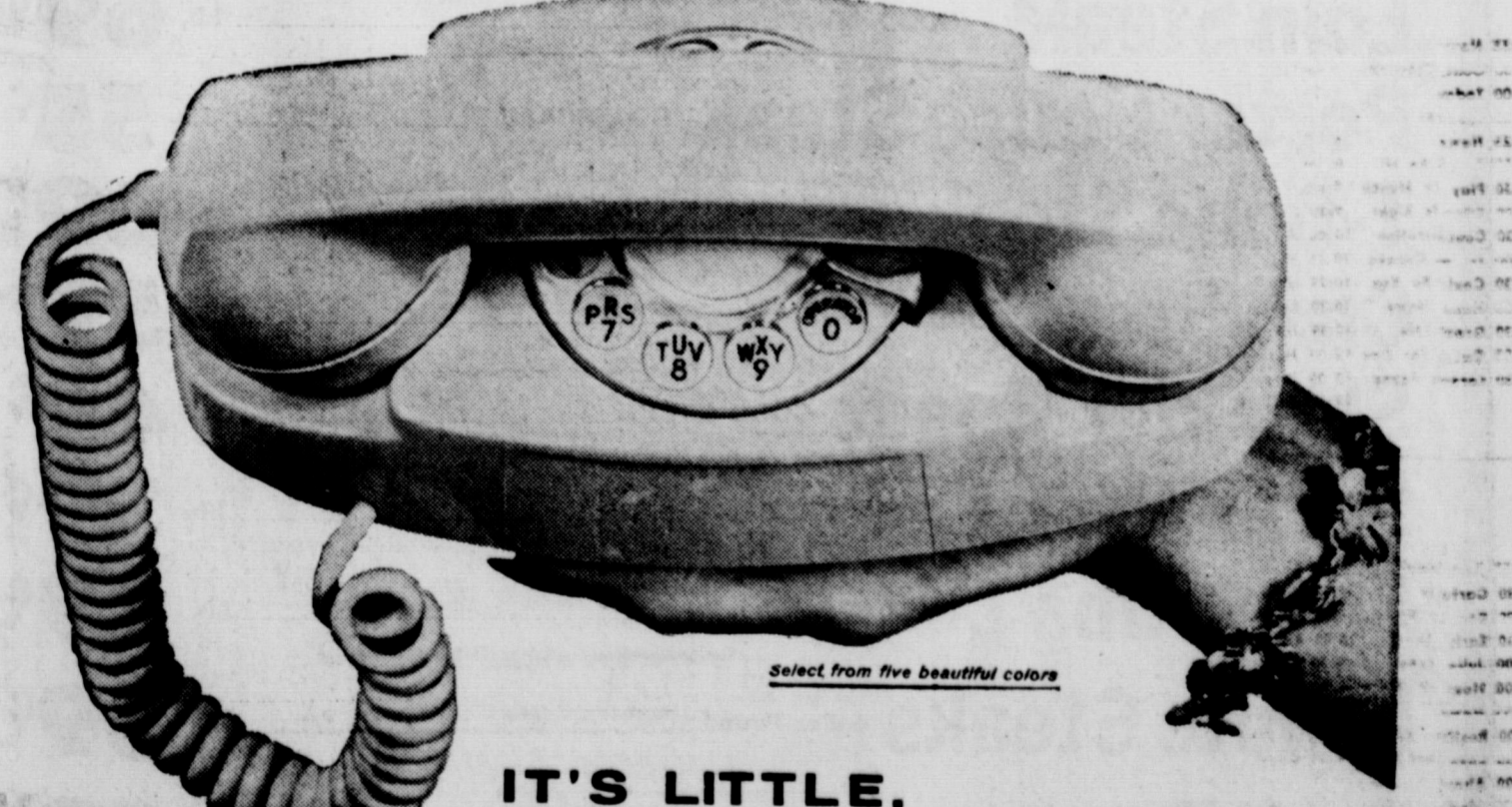

Reminders for Summer Cookouts

Planning an outdoor party this summer? Any affair, from a picnic to a formal garden wedding, can come off professionally if certain pitfalls are avoided this time. Here are a few suggestions for an enjoyable time.

1. Write down everything you'll need, from garnishings to guests. This is your basic checklist.
2. Arrange your placement of chairs, table and grill. Guests enjoy the smell of cooking meat, but seem to lose their enthusiasm when overcome with smoke.
3. Double check your list the day before the party. Make sure you have everything—extra salt and pepper, enough glasses, charcoal, the main course, etc.
4. Be sure the utensils provided suit the fare offered. Ever try to test the steak with the edge of a wooden fork?
5. Be sure guests will be protected from spillage. Provide plenty of napkins.
6. Decorate appropriately. Don't let the area look like a deserted Boy Scout camp.
7. Keep a water pistol near the grill in case fatty meat catches fire. (Also effective when children get out of hand.)
8. Provide enough receptacles for rubbish.
9. Make provisions in your timing for greetings, light conversation and the amateur photographers among your guests.
10. Try to get things to break up B. L. S. or B. J. P. (Before late show or Before Jack Parr.) Your guests and neighbors will appreciate it.

Summer Recipes For Breakfast

Summer vacation time really sets people traveling. Each summer we look forward to seeing friends and relatives separated by too many miles to permit visits during the rest of the year.

When entertaining house guests one tries to make them feel as much at home as possible. You can create this feeling every morning at breakfast just by having on hand a supply of their favorite ready-to-eat cereals. They have the same good flavor and crispness anywhere, coast to coast.

Children will be especially pleased to see such well-liked pre-sweetened cereals as sugared corn flakes, sugar coated puffed corn and cocoa sweetened toasted rice cereal.

Of course, one also likes to take a little extra effort for company. So follow the cereal with a good hot bread. Corn griddle cakes, made easily from corn muffin mix to which ready-to-eat high protein cereal, eggs, currants and milk have been added, are a good choice. On nice days when there's plenty of time, these may be baked on an outdoor griddle. Serve them with warm syrup or golden honey.

There's a zesty touch in muffins, Mexican style, that will delight a breakfast time. It's a combination of colorful corn, green pepper and pimiento bits. These muffins combine well with fluffy scrambled eggs and a breakfast meat.

Corn Griddle Cakes

- 1 12-ounce package corn muffin mix
 - 1 cup ready-to-eat high protein cereal
 - 2 eggs, slightly beaten
 - 2 tablespoons dried currants*
 - 1 1/4 cups milk
 - 2 tablespoons shortening, melted
- Combine corn muffin mix with ready-to-eat high protein cereal. Add eggs, currants and milk, stirring only until combined. Stir in cooled, melted shortening. Bake on preheated griddle until browned on both sides turning only once. Serve hot with syrup, jelly or honey.

Yield: 9 griddle cakes, about 5 inches in diameter

* Optional Muffins, Mexican Style

- 2 cups corn flakes or 1/2 cup packaged corn flake crumbs
 - 1 cup sifted flour
 - 3 tablespoons baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1 egg, slightly beaten
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1/4 cup shortening, melted
 - 1/2 cup cooked, drained whole kernel corn
 - 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
 - 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento
- If using corn flakes, crush slightly. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar into mixing bowl. Combine egg, milk, shortening, corn, green pepper and pimiento. Add to sifted dry ingredients, stirring only until combin-

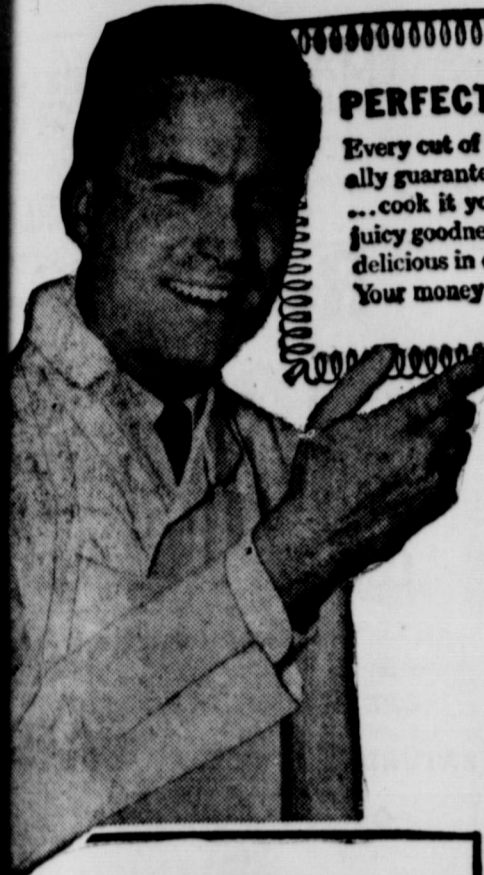

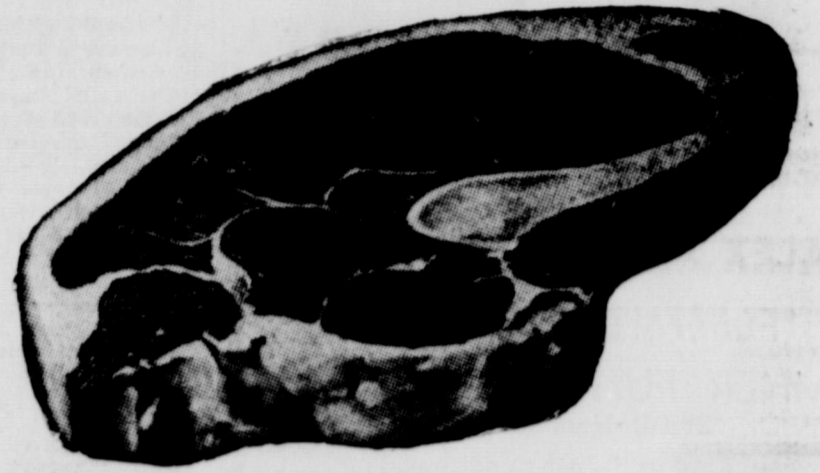

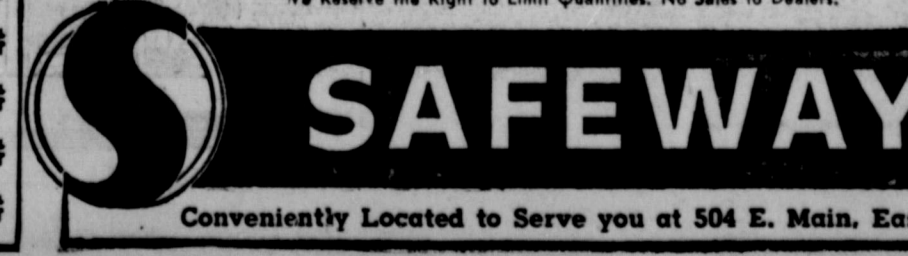

IT'S THE LAW in Texas
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

What do we mean when we say that in the United States we have a "government of law" and not a "government of men?" Basically we mean that we have certain individual rights, guaranteed by our federal and state constitutions and laws, which may not be denied by any governing body.

The early American colonists had their fill of government by men, and the Declaration of Independence, signed 184 years ago, set out their complaints against that type of government and revealed their belief in a principle which we now accept as basic to our American way of life.

The indictments set out in the document against King George III of Great Britain charged him with numerous violations of that principle. Among the complaints enumerated are the following:
"He has dissolved Representative

Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people."
"He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent for laws for establishing judiciary powers."
"He has made judges dependent upon his will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries."
"He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good."
"He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation: . . . For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury; For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offences; . . . For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments; . . . For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever."

Our forefathers who subscribed to the principles of the Declaration of Independence were willing to fight for their beliefs. The Revolutionary War followed, dragging through weary years of suffering and suspense. Each of us takes pride in their eventual triumph over gigantic obstacles.

In 1787, when the framers of our Constitution met at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the Declaration of Independence had been signed 11 years previously, they set to work to create a system of checks and balance in government which was to perpetuate the fundamental theory mentioned in the preamble of the earlier document:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

"That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; . . ."

Some 5 years later, the first ten amendments to our Constitution were adopted at one time, specifically detailing various basic civil rights stemming from underlying theory of the Declaration of Independence.

Our courts day by day guard these rights for us.

Wood for Fuel

Almost everyone enjoys the cozy heat of a fireplace in winter and each of us prefers a certain kind of fuelwood for his fire. General preferences of long standing frequently lead to misconceptions regarding wood, such as the notion that oak than other heavy hardwoods have a higher fuel value than pine. Such is not the case. In fact, pound for pound, the wood of pine and other similar resinous species will generate more heat than the hardwoods. However, the heat from resinous woods produces a hot, quick fire which also consumes the wood and releases the heat quickly. As a result, it is difficult to maintain a uniform temperature when burning resinous woods, because the best is intense at first and then quickly cools.

The denser hardwoods take longer to ignite and when burning, release their heat more slowly than pine. Long experience has taught us to start our fires with pine and maintain them with hickory, oak, or similar hardwood species.
