



# 'Equal' Animals

The theory of Communism, as laid down by Marx and enlarged upon by his followers and disciples, holds that all agencies of production shall be commonly owned by the ecople; that goods and services shall be equitably divided, and each shall produce according to his ability and consume according to his need. In other words, the living standards of a janitor shall be as high, or nearly so, as those of the manager who is responsible for the operation of a great factory. There can be little doubt that the early Communist leaders, notably Lenin, believed this in all sincerity.

But, as history often proves, theories are one thing, while practice can be enormously different. So it has been with Communist doctrine. Under the long reign of Stalin the social and economic gap between the masses of people and the relatively small number at the upper end steadily widened. Authority after authority has described this trend in innumerable books and articles. Instead of creating a classless society, Communism resulted in class distinctions to a far greater extent than is known in most of the non-Communist world.

Now, with Stalin dead and Malenkov and his associates in power, it looks as if the gap between the many and the few is to be widened even more.

This may seem surprising to those who have read recent Kremlin pronouncements concerning big increases in the supply of consumer goods, along with lower prices. But there is another side to this picture, and it is given in Newsweek by Leon Volkov, who is one of the magazine's contributing editors.

Mr. Valkov's article carries the title, "But Who Can Buy Luxuries?" The average Soviet worker earns \$175 a month. According to the Volkov account, Moscow lewelry stores are displaying rings and necklaces costing as much as \$11,000. Gold — which a person must buy and take to the dentist if he wants it for a filling is offered at \$700 a fine ounce. A 12-inch TV set costs \$563, a refrigerator \$500. The government has bought a huge stock of oranges from Israel for 21/2 cents each, and has priced them at 471/2 cents each at retail. And so far as production is concerned, Mr. Volkov says that the output of high-priced products is being raised 70 per cent and that of low-cost items only 5 per cent

Who gets the luxuries then? Mr. Volkov answers: "Only the new aristocracy that is developing in the theoretical ly Communist state." It includes top government and party officials, high-ranking military men, big-time executives and artists. They are extremely well-paid, and have lavish expense and vacation allowances. Mr. Yolkov writes: "It is clear, in my opinion, that Malenkov is deliberately giving this class a vested interest in his government's future . . . In return, he expects the loyalty of the chosen few who benefit from his generosity. Thus the Malenkov regime is paving less attention to Communist ideology than to self-preservation."

Mr. Volkov's last paragraph gets to the point memorably - "George Orwell was never more penetrating than when he wrote in 'Animal Farm' his satire on the Communist state: 'All animals are equal but some are more equal than others."

# Time Lag Bill

Suppose wages or other costs you must meet in operating your business rose so sharply that the prices you charged for your products were no longer adequate. And then suppose that, under the law, you weren't allowed to increase those prices for many months. You'll admit that it would be mighty rough going, and that you were being treated with gross unfairness.

That, in all essentials, is the position railroads and other common carriers are in now, and long have been. Under the present system, they must petition the Interstate Commerce Commission for permission to increase rates when rising costs make that necessary. The ICC must then make an intensive investigation, and hear all sides — which takes close to a year in many instances. And during all that time the carriers must operate at their old rates while paying the new and higher costs.

The cure lies in a Bill now in Congress. Known as the Time-Lag Bill, it would instruct the ICC to authorize, within 60 days, interim increases in rates sufficient in its opinion to meet increased costs and assure adequate service. Then the Commission would complete its investigation. If the final increases allowed should be less than the interim increases, the carriers would be required, on demand to refund the difference. Thus, both shippers and carriers would be protected - the one against excessive increases, and the other against the heavy losses which now occur.

Can Schools Based On Aggression Advocate Government Stopping All Internal Aggression?

This question is not important unless tax-supported schools are based on aggression. If they are, then the question should be an-

Now, what is aggression? Aggression is simply taking up the sword or initiating force. That is, being the first to start interference with the joy that comes from managing one's own life and no one else's.

Of course, there might be aggression without even taking up the sword or initiating force. Aggression does not require an overt act. It can be accomplished by simply announcing that if support is not voluntarily given to conditions prescribed then force will be initiated to make people comply. In fact, the making of such rules or laws is inevitably the forerunner of aggression. It would indeed be foolish to waste engergy by being an aggressor to get an advantage if results could be had by threats or by passing man-made laws that result in men being sub-

Now, if one does not believe that public schools are based on aggression, let him try to educate his own child without having the consent of the state. He will find in most states, as has Mrs. Mary Turner, that he will be arrested and fined and if his policy is con-thued, his child will be taken from him, as was the case with Mrs. Frank DeFebio in Manteo, North Carolina because she insisted on having the right to educate her own children.

Or let an individual refuse to pay taxes to support public schools and he will find that the state will start aggression against him to make him pay for what he does not want to use and what he believes will only result in more and more people believing in aggression. So from these tests, we teachers who believe in collective

If the above be true, then the question at the head of this column is important since it is difficult to think of anything more important than educating our children to believe that aggression or initiating force or taking up the sword, individually or collectively, is not right or good or just or ethical. That is; that aggression violates the Golden Rule; that the results cannot produce just i c.e, good will, peace and friendships. It denies the age old axioms 'Whatsoever a man (or group) soweth, that shall he also reap'

might produce "information of tremendous importance" from a mystery witness. But he indicated Tuesday there may be a delay while he tries to line up some

Carr, ex-FBI agent and subcom-Carr, ex-FBI agent and subcommittee staff director, has been accused along with McCarthy and his chief counsel Roy M. Cohn of applying improper pressure on the Army to get favored treatment for a drafted side, Pvt. G. David Schine.

Stevens was pressed hard under cross-examination late Monday to cite specific cases, based on his

cite specific cases, based on his personal knowledge, in which Carr allegedly sought favors for Schine. The secretary said Carr was present when McCrathy and Coan made such overtures and "could have stepped up and stopped' some of them. But he said he personally could not recall having-heard Carr himself making any

appeals.

'Flied By the Army'

Stevens testified, however, that
the charges were filed by the Army—not by him alone—and that the testimony of later Army wit-nesses might be stronger than his

on Carr.
Mundt told Stevens he owed it Mundt told Stevens he owed it to the subcommittee to "absolve" Carr, as far as he is concerned, or "specify the way and time in which he was improper." And as the afternoon session ended, Mundt added: "You are going to search your mind concerning Mr. Carr and in the morning either particularize the charge or withdraw it."

The formal Army charges seldom singled out Carr. They usually lumped him together with Cohn or McCarthy as among those that sought favors for Schine on various occasions from October, 1953.







# Jump To No Trump **Was Clever Play**


Written for NEA Service Perhaps you're not fond South's jump to two-no-trump today's hand. Such a bid sho show at least one sure stopper in the unbid suit, and South's four hearts headed by the ten-nine hard-ly constituted a sure stopper. Nevertheless South's bid of two no-trump was the best available bid. If North had a singleton heart he would probably rebid some suit, and if North had two or more nearts, the suit was unlikely to be

dangerous.

When West opened the six of hearts, South had to decide for or hearts. The "normal" play of the experienced declarer at no-trump is to hold up an ace of an otherwise unstopped suit, In this case, however, South very properly put up dummy's ace of hearts at

that West had only one or two of the missing high hearts. (If West had all three he would have opened the king rather than a small card.)
If the hearts were divided fourthree, the suit was no threat, since the opponents could take only three hearts and the ace of clubs. If the suit were 5-2, however, it was vital to take the ace at once in order to block the suit. When South knocked out the ace

of clubs at the second trick, West
