WASHINGTON, May 26 - UP - Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy walked out of the Army-McCarthy hearings briefly Wednesday in protest against what he called "drivel" and "irrelevant testimony" by Pvt. G. David Schine's former company commander at Fort Dix, N. J.

However, the captain was still on the stand when McCarthy returned in about 15 minutes unceremoniously and seated himself again beside his aides.

Sen. Henry C. Dworshak (R-Idaho) said he is sure the American people now realize the hearings are holding up "vital committee work" and urged a "sincere and diligent effort to set a target date."

New Auditor Appointed In Duval

SAN DIEGO, Tex., May 26.—District Judge A. S. Broadfoot Wednesday appointed Donato Fortna, executive secretary of the anti-Parr Freedom party, as Duval county auditor.
Fortna will be the fourth Duval county auditor in less than three months. C. T. Stansell, a target of charges from state officials, resigned on March 17.
W. M. Benson, political boss George Parr's former personal accountant, was appointed by Judge C. Woodrow Laughlin just before Laughlin was thrown out by the State Supreme Court for official misconduct.
Benson resigned, and Broadfoot Laughlin's successor, named John Arthur Thomason of Brownwood, Tex., as auditor.
But the Duval county commissioners court voted to abolish the post of county auditor. Thomason resigned. He said he did not have time to fight with Duval officials.
Serna, 43, operator of a San Diego drug store for six years, said he has taken correspondence school courses in accounting and has done bookkeeping work for several San Diego businesses.
County Judge Dan Tobin said the commissioners court will not be able to take any action on Serna's appointment until they meet on June 14.
Broadfoot said he appointed Serna after considering "eight or 10 possible appointments." He said a three persons asked for the job, but Serna was the best of them.
County auditors in Texas are appointed by the presiding judge of the judicial district within which the county lies.

to turn former friends into enemies. Communists in Guatemala could not have had a better break than the harsh criticism from Washington of the Red arms shipment to a Guatemalan port.
Under such protest pressure from Washington, Guatemalan patriotism was likely to and did rise above principle so that many citizens who may not have relished Communist-sparked government were ready to join with Communists in denouncing what they conceive to be "Yankee imperialism" or interference.
The Senate Foreign Relations committee may want to ask the State Department why the Guatemalan situation was permitted to reach its current aggravated state.
The State Department was busy elsewhere with what looked like more important matters.
Events will demonstrate whether the department underestimated the dangers of Communist influence in Guatemala. If the movement spreads in Central America, the department probably will be checked for a most serious blunder in failing to move earlier and effectively. That would be true even if the Red menace failed to overrun Panama and the zone of the canal.

Insurance Executives To Testify

AUSTIN, May 26.—UP—Two officers of a defunct insurance company, Paul and Leslie Lowry of Beaumont, were "invited" to appear Wednesday before a Travis county grand jury looking into alleged irregularities in the insurance business in Texas.
The Lowrys were officials of Texas Mutual Insurance Co., a firm which was the subject of a scathing opinion by the Third Court of Civil Appeals earlier this month. The opinion said Texas Mutual's operations were a "gigantic fraud" and said there had been "gross if not criminal laxness" in enforcement of insurance laws.
D. H. O'Neil, Beaumont attorney, also was scheduled to appear before the jury Wednesday, and a subpoena was issued for the appearance Thursday of Paul L. Key, Southwest National Bank, El Paso, Spencer S. Treharns, El Paso, the head of two insurance companies that deal almost exclusively with servicemen's insurance, was invited to appear Thursday also.
State Sen. William T. Moore, Bryan; J. W. Blanchard of the State Insurance Commission, and Virgil C. Thompson, a former state insurance examiner, all went before the jury Tuesday.
Moore was named in the appellate decision as having received more than \$13,000 from Texas Mutual for legal services over a four-year period.

Mud Slows Area Work Projects

There still was a remote possibility Tuesday that Pampa would be included as a conditional stop for the eastbound San Francisco Chief, a new train of the Santa Fe railroad which makes its inaugural run June 7.
The Pampa Chamber of Commerce was informed Monday that the city might not be included as a stop on the eastbound run of the train, but that the Chief would stop here conditionally, despite the fact that the chamber had been led to believe the city would be scheduled as a conditional stop both ways.
However, in response to a telegram sent by Chamber President Clinton Evans, the chamber received an answer Tuesday afternoon by wire from Fred G. Gurley, Santa Fe president in Chicago, that the city would be included as a conditional stop, but that the chamber president would be notified as to results soon.
A group of city and chamber officials met in the chamber office Tuesday to discuss the problem, at which all attending were urged to send telegrams to Gurley and to officials in the Amarillo office of the railroad.
Evans' telegram said: "Until today our people have not believed that Pampa was to be included for conditional stops, both east and west on the new San Francisco Chief.
"Today, we received unofficial information that Pampa is being scheduled for only one conditional stop, that being west for points north of Barstow, Calif., and no stops east.
"We are very disappointed and trust this is not correct. We believe there will be a lot of traffic

Mrs. Virginia LaScala is the first woman ever named secretary of the New Orleans Stock Exchange and possibly the only woman holding such a position in the United States. But she owns no stock—yet.
Promptly at 9:15 a.m. Mrs. LaScala walks into the center of the stock exchange ring. Exactly at 9:15 a.m. she grasps the gavel in a well-manicured hand and calls the exchange to order.
In Kitchens Early
Actually, the part 28-year-old brunette's day begins much earlier. She gets up at 6:30 a.m. in time to prepare breakfast for husband, Joseph, a packing company salesman, and their three children.
Once she has banged the gavel, she calls the names of each stock listed on the New Orleans board. The brokers who surround the ring give their bids.
The secretary first records these. After she has completed the call of stocks, she corrects bids from the previous day. The changing of bids on the board throughout the day as they are reported is a major task.
She replaces Man
A relative newcomer to the New Orleans financial district, Mrs. LaScala had worked for a year as a teletype operator for a brokerage house at the New Orleans Cotton Exchange.
When the stock exchange secretary's elderly man who was ill—was out for several weeks, Mrs. LaScala was hired temporarily. A short time later the secretary was persuaded and Mrs. LaScala became the first woman to hold the job.
She's the only woman in the office.
"It's not at all bad," Mrs. LaScala confided. "I really find men much easier to run for than women. They don't gossip behind your back."

Romania Is Latest To Purge Jewish Refugees

By CHARLES M. McCANN United Press Foreign Analyst Communist Romania is conducting a mass purge of Jewish refugees.

Prominent Jews are being tried in secret in Bucharest, the capital, and in the provinces. It is reported that more than 100 Jewish leaders, some of them held in prison for four years or longer, have been sentenced recently or are about to be tried.

Persistent reports are being circulated in European capitals that the former Romanian Foreign Minister Ana Pauker, a Jew, is to be the chief defendant in a show trial now being prepared.

Few Details Known Few details of the Romanian purge have leaked through the iron curtain. But there is no doubt that it is under way. There hardly can be any doubt that the purge is being conducted with the approval of the Soviet Russian government, if not by its direction.

The purge is causing alarm to Jewish organizations in the United States and other countries. Forty-five former Romanian Jewish leaders started a 100-hour hunger strike in Tel Aviv, Israel, Sunday night in protest against it. Prime Minister Moche Sharet of Israel said in a speech to the Israeli parliament Monday that he was shocked by the purge.

Unemployment Insurance Under Study By Legislators

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Sniping at the Eisenhower administration on the unemployment situation goes on constantly. This is in spite of optimistic predictions by Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell and other leaders.

Both American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations have held unemployment conferences in Washington. Their basic complaint is the rise in unemployment from a census last October to 3.5 million in April.

It doesn't help the additional two million out of work much to brush this aside with statistics about the 60 million plus who are employed and prospects for a roster future next fall.

To those actually unemployed there must now be added another 10 million not fully employed workers whose noses are now being officially counted in sample surveys made for the newly combined Department of Labor-Department of Commerce monthly report.

This report includes over eight million who are employed less than 35 hours a week and two million classified as having jobs but absent from work for temporary layoff, illness of any other reason.

Another half million or more new workers will come into the labor market at the end of the school year. Agricultural employment has not risen as much as usually does in this season. The coal industry is really sick. There is still much genuine concern on the employment outlook. In the background are several related factors.

One is a build-up of hoops as the United Steelworkers, CIO, go into their bargaining demands for a guaranteed annual wage. This is the trail balloon on similar demands for the big labor unions. It is being vigorously resisted by major employers. The general public will be subjected to heavy propaganda from both sides in coming months.

Plane Flies New Route To Far East

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, May 25—UP—A Scandinavian Airlines DC-8B airliner with 30 crewmen and 40 passengers aboard, was to leave here Tuesday morning on the second leg of a trail-blazing commercial flight to Tokyo.

The big plane winged across the frozen Arctic wastes Monday and landed here 14 hours and 17 minutes after leaving Bodoe, Norway.

The plane is carrying members of a Norwegian army field hospital unit which will replace a unit currently serving with United Nations forces in the Far East.

Three airline captains were aboard the plane. They are Gunnar Lind of Sweden; Måkal Aschim of Norway, plane commander, and Aage Hedall-Hansen of Denmark.

Hansen said the plane flew at 5,000 feet over the Polar region and rose to 14,000 feet after it reached the Alaska coast. A flare bearing the SAS company flag was released over the geographical North Pole.

A similar flight was made last year from Norway to Anchorage, Alaska. However, the current flight is the first regular passenger flight direct from Europe to Alaska. On last year's flight, the SAS airliner stopped at Thule, Greenland, en route to Alaska.

The plane was scheduled to land at Shemya in the Aleutian Islands Tuesday before leaving on the last leg of the flight to Tokyo. On its return, the four-engine airliner will return to Europe via the North Pole route with stops at Shemya and Anchorage.

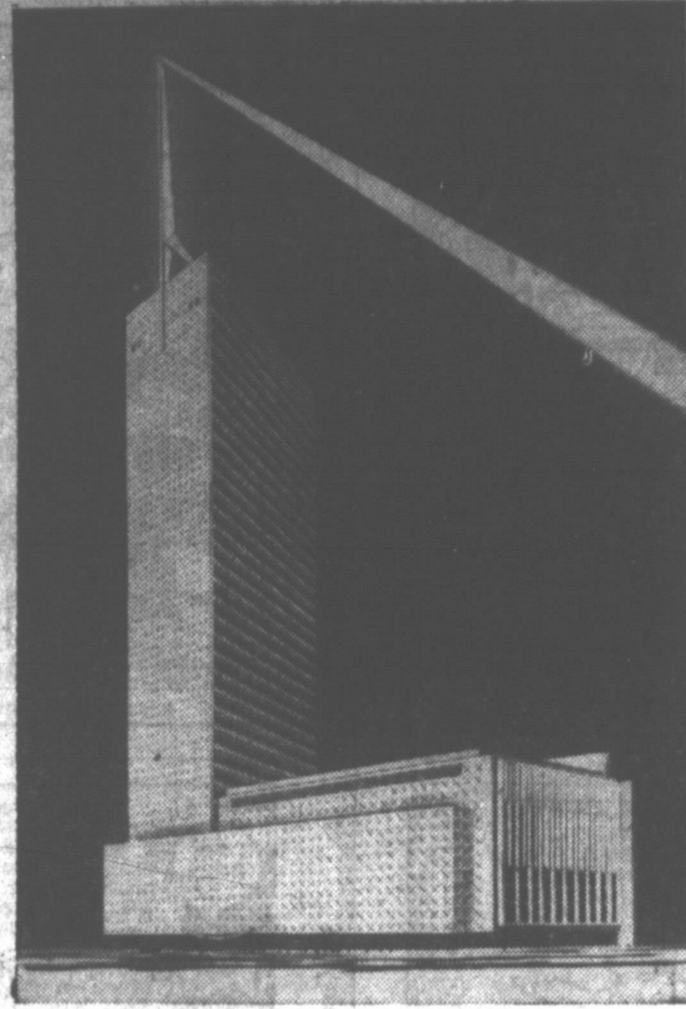

"It can be uncomfortable and strange at first. Learning to go down stairs and get in and out of cars was difficult. You have to learn to control it. I actually have three artificial legs, for different heel heights."

Her first role since her tragedy is of a girl who thinks her legs are paralyzed and is confined to a wheelchair. But Long, who plays the doctor in the story, emphasized his bride got the part because "she's a good actress."

"It has nothing to do with her personal problems," he said.

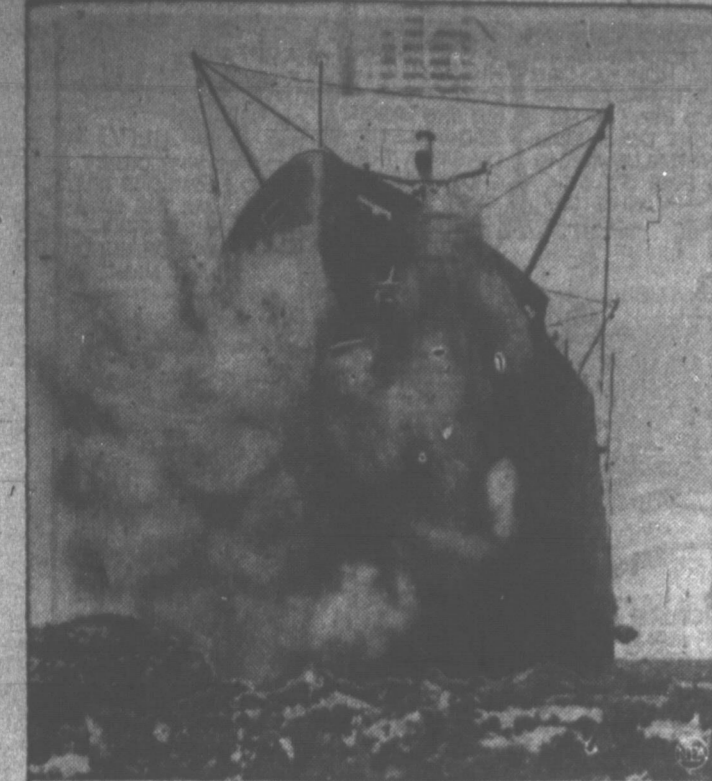
"We've received wonderful letters from people all over the world," said Suzan, who was curled up on a couch.

The last time I left San Francisco for the South Pacific a charming seagull shook me out of my bunk at Hamilton Field at some weird hour in the morning. I swished down some coffee and doughnuts, walked what seemed ten miles with my duffel bag breaking my back, took a bucket seat in a converted Liberator bomber, and headed for I didn't know where.

This time it was a little bit different, and as much as I like roughing it and all that sort of thing, it was a bit more pleasant and relaxing. I saw the sun go down from the Top of the Mark, dined at Fisherman's Wharf, had a good night's sleep at the St. Francis Hotel, and then boarded a Qantas Empire Airways super-constellation plane for Sydney, via Honolulu and the Fiji Islands.

I am writing this high over the Pacific as we barrel along toward Diamond Head, and I must say that traveling as a private citizen has its advantages over traveling as a private soldier. That old Lib got me there-back in the early 1940's, but I still have to buy a bottle of liniment when I recall that ride.

This Qantas Connie, which is making its first run from San Francisco to the Land Down Under, makes you wonder why Columbus and his men ever put up with crossing the ocean in the "Pinta," the "Niña," and the "Santa Maria." It is that luxurious, wall-to-wall carpeting, lovely paintings, paneled walls, food that not even Mother could cook, and a "lasy" speed of around 350 miles per hour.

This visit to Australia will be quite a different one from the one I had in the 1940's. Then I landed in Brisbane after a flight from Bougainville, and was billeted in a building that must have been there long before Captain Cook first reached Botany Bay.

I never have been able to figure out what the building was constructed for in the first place. It was a grand, sat on top of a hill, and trembled. My roommates, who numbered close to a hundred, including soldiers, sailors, and marines, didn't help the trembling any. Directly over my bunk, which was a mattress on a floor, was a giant chandelier which swung back and forth like a pendulum.

I am naturally a stay-at-home, and would have liked to have spent my four-hour in Brisbane curled up on my mattress reading a good book—because good books were scarce in Bougainville—but the combination of the trembling building and the swinging chandelier kept me out until all hours.

This time it appears as if Australia will be an entirely different country. We newspapermen who are making the inaugural flight with Qantas are going to have luncheon with Lord Mayor of Sydney as soon as we arrive. And after that, for almost three weeks, we will be shown Australia with the hospitality that Australians have in common with Americans.

I am not sure what I will wear to the Lord Mayor's luncheon, nor is Mary, who is with me, for it will mark our first collision so to speak, with a Lord Mayor. I'll probably settle for my best seersucker suit and a high collar. No, not that, because it is coming on to winter in the Land Down Under. But I'll worry about that later.

The captain has just announced that we are only half an hour away from Honolulu, so I'd better stick my country head out the window and take a look at the scenery.

Can't blame me, can you?

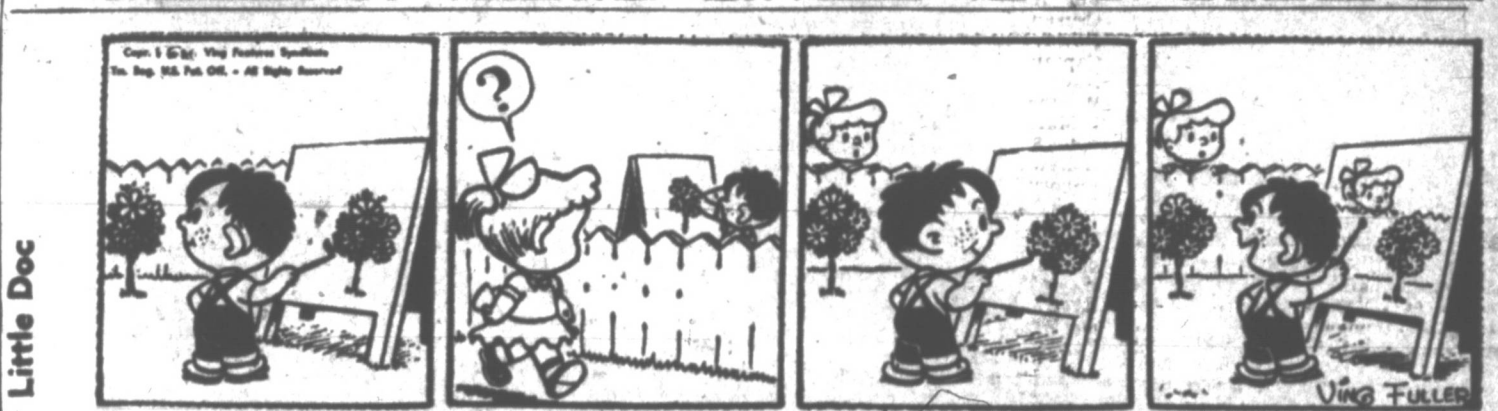

Editor's note: The battle for control of the New York Central railroad involved more than 40,000 stockholders. But it was fought as a personal duel between two railroaders, Robert H. Young and William White.

Hopes to create first transcontinental railroad, once wrote: "A hog can cross the country without changing trains, but you can't." Believes new equipment, better service will mean more profit for railroads.

Stands five-foot six-inches tall, known as "Rebel" in railroad industry, "hopes to break 'banker control' of railroads with backing of Midwest and Southwest capital. Owns elaborate estates at Newport, R. I., and Palm Beach, Fla., frequent host to Duke and Duchess of Windsor, often breaks 90 at golf, writes poetry.

Allies in Battle Young's allies in the battle for the Central include: Allan P. Kirby, 61, president of Allegheny Corp., heir to F. W. Woolworth fortune, associate of Young since earlier railroad ventures, careful spender, urges associates write him letters rather than spend money on long distance phone calls.

Clint W. Murchison, 61, Texas oil man, made \$600 million in oil real estate, book publishing and movie theaters, good friend of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, put up \$10 million to buy 400,000 shares of Central stock.

Sid W. Richardson, 63, match and Murchison's \$10 million Central investment, original Eisenhower supporter, said to be great favorite at White House, bachelor, averages to interviews, once shocked White House secretary, who invited him to dine with President, by asking: "What are they going to have?"

Despite Soaking Rains Drouth Is Not 'Broken'

DALLAS, May 26 — UP — Late spring rains have punched big dents in the great Southwestern drouth. But they have not broken it.

This is the consensus in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. New Mexico has gotten a little less rain; experts consider the New Mexican drouth "bent a little."

But farmers are more cheerful than they have been in the last three or four years. Prospects are good for heavy wheat, corn and cotton crops.

Range Is Improving The range is improving. The rain has stopped the dust storms that were looking like the "black dusters" of the early 1930s.

Hundreds of farmers who, in past years, complained about the drouth are now complaining that the wet weather is keeping them out of their fields, where they would like to be planting their crops.

Some areas have had cloudbursts and floods. Points in southwestern Texas have reported nine inch rains. Heavy rain in the southeast corner of New Mexico drove 100 families out of their homes in Lovington and Roswell.

Forecasters don't like to talk about weather cycles, but a forecaster in Dallas said, "dry years don't usually start like this one."

What he meant was that the rain is continuing. The five-day forecast, issued Tuesday, calls for rain in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado and New Mexico.

The results of the rain have not always been to the good. "Hail same along with it in many places and beat thousands of acres of young cotton into the ground."

State-by-state, this is the situation:

Johnson Opponent Spends Lavishly On Campaign Trail

AUSTIN, May 25 — UP — Dudley T. Dougherty, Beeville rancher running for the U. S. Senate seat held by Lyndon B. Johnson, spent more money in the first month of his campaign than all candidates for the top three offices in the Democratic primary combined.

Dougherty listed contributions of \$13,417 and expenditure of \$56,288.47 in his first monthly report Tuesday. Johnson said he had received no contributions and had spent \$3,289.66.

Gubernatorial candidates Ralph Yarborough of Austin and Gov. Allan Shivers were the only other candidates who reported receiving contributions. Yarborough said he received \$10,078 and spent \$3,013.82, while Shivers received \$1,285 and spent only \$600 for his filing fee.

A third candidate for governor, J. J. Holmes of Austin, showed expenditures of \$600 for his filing fee, and no report was received from the fourth, Harlan B. (Cyclone) Davis of Dallas.

C. T. Johnson of Austin led the candidates for lieutenant governor in spending at \$2,320.33. George T. Hinson of Mineola spent \$1,816.32, while L. G. Ben Ramsey was third with \$1,265.66.

More Rain Expected

The wheat crop is a week ahead of what it was last year. Rains have been generally widespread over the state, though rainfall is still below normal.

In some areas, streams and ponds are full. Cool weather that came along with the rain retarded the crop. All of Kansas should get more rain before the end of the week.

OKLAHOMA Sectors of Oklahoma have been getting too much rain; rivers and creeks in the western part of the state have flooded and bridges and roads have been washed out. Some northwest areas could use more rain.

The Oklahoma grain crop will range from "about normal" to "poor to fair" in the western part of the state. Municipal water supplies are greatly improved. Oklahoma City, with the biggest water problem in the state, is storing water faster than at any time in the last two years.

This week ended Wednesday was the fourth in which rainfall in Oklahoma has been above normal. Pastures and ranges for cattle are improving. There is plenty of water for stock.

TEXAS Rain this month has been fairly general, if light, on the worst-drouth areas, the eastern side, bordering Oklahoma and Texas. Cattle growers and farm bureau officials agree the rain has helped the range.

The rain tripled the flow of the Rio Grande last week and prospects for irrigation in the valley are looking up. May and June are the rainiest months of the year in New Mexico.

Mattie left home in 1894 and was widowed twice. She homesteaded in North Dakota and lived in a dozen other states before joining her sister in California.

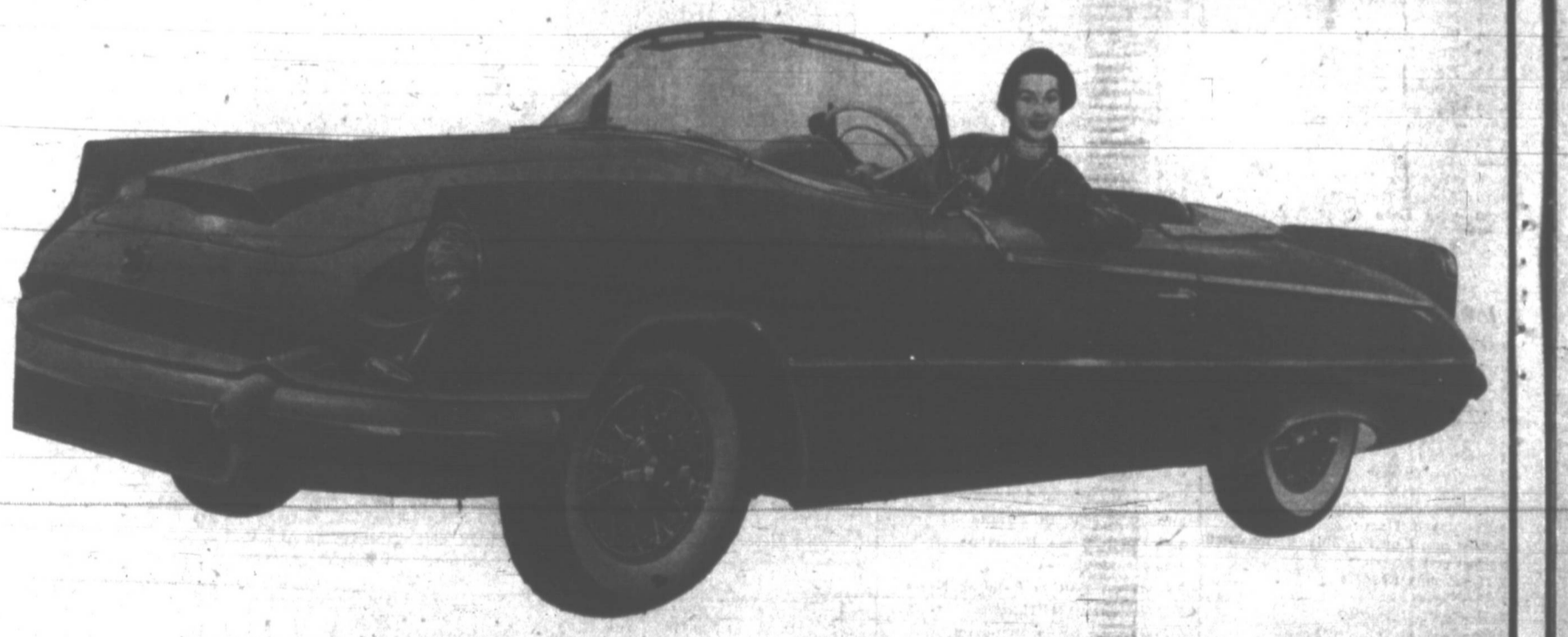
