



Silly Seaway

Taconite, a magic word in the steel industry, is this country's assurance of always having its own iron ore supply. Why spend money on a St. Lawrence waterway, at a time when we're trying to balance the budget and not raise the debt ceiling, to help develop Canada's ore when we have an inexhaustible supply in our own back yard, which as yet is relatively untouched — enough for a thousand years? It is a matter of record that, so far, better than \$500 million has been invested in the development of the taconite ore fields and that an additional \$500 million or more will be invested in the very near future. This huge investment, incidentally, is PRI-VATE CAPITAL, and not government funds. If private companies spend money on this scale you can bet your boots that there are billions of tons of ore available. The investment in taconite is already more than twice as large as that in Canadian ore, and a "waterway" is not

If we are so distrustful of Canada that we cannot allow her to build the waterway alone, when she is anxious to do so, certainly it would not be a good policy to depend on her for ore in time of emergency.

Certainly it would benefit the Mid-west more to develop its own ores than to have a piece of waterway that

We do not, however, subscribe to the propaganda that builds up our ore problems far beyond credence. According to Republic Steel Carporation's Chief Metallurgist Earle C. Smith, speaking before the Cleveland Society of Security Analysts, the American steel industry could operate 500 years on domestic ores, ore lying within 3,000 feet of the surface, of a quality superior to those commonly used in England and most European

Remember when it is said that we need the waterway for defense, it is simply meant that six steel companies that have invested in Labrador ore, want the waterway to bring in their own particular ore from Canada, at a better competitive advantage. Defense, indeed! They have said they will bring in the ore whether the waterway is built or not - and certainly if Canada builds the waterway it will be there for their use.

To put the Labrador are in proper perspective, it is planned to produce 10 million tons annually by 1957 or 1958, as compared with the some 120 million tons we now use annually

The answer would thus plainly seem to be, not Canadian ore via the St. Lawrence iceway, but taconite for the steel furnaces of America.

Nuclear Power

The Atomic Energy Commission has announced that it is negotiating an agreement for the construction and operation of the nation's first full-scale central station nuclear power plant. Two phases of the matter are of exceptional public interest.

First, the agreement is being made with a taxpaying business-managed power company. Its proposal, the AEC stated, was the most economical from the standpoint of the government — which means, of course, from the standpoint of the taxpayers. The company will furnish the site and build and run the plant at no cost to the government. AEC Chairman Strauss estimated that the company's proposal would save the Treasury \$30,000,-000 over a five year period

Second, AEC wisely warned the country not to anticipate that the atom will soon be the biggest factor in electric power production. Its release said: "It is not expected that this first plant will produce electric power at costs competitive with power from conventional fuels. The project has been undertaken in order to gain more design and technological experience than could be obtained otherwise."

In other words, commercial power production from nuclear sources probably lies far ahead. But, meanwhile, the financial and scientific resources of private enterprise will be used to solve them. This is something that all of us should approve without reservation. For that is the way to obtain the greatest progress at the smallest cost in both time and money.

Counter Sales

A Real Statesman In Congress

If you want a little encouragement in the belief that there are still statesmen in Congress, get vesterday's paper and read the first part of Congressman Ralph W. Gwinn's speech before the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons last October at their Chicago Session.

Here is the remainder of his speech:

"S e the government can have no rights except those delegated to it by individuals, it

must, in the very nature of things, be limited in its rightful, natural power and function.

"It certainly can ha, no higher or greater right to use coercion or orce against another person than the individual himself has. So the proposition is clear; that if the individual is limited in the use of coercion and force, the government can have, must have, the same limitations - that is, a limtation on its use of force to defensive acts - to the protection of life, property.

"This was our concept of government until very recently. Strangely enough, we have continued as a people to limit our municipal, county, and state governments to this natural Constitutional defensive function for the protection of all. What's more, we have continued to limit, by and large, their power to tax and spend to about 21/2 per cent of the value of our real property. A few cases have levied on income to a very limited extent. So that, after the Council or the Legislatures, or Supervisors of the counties, have spent all they can collect for the legitimate, protective services of government, like the Police, Courts, Streets, Sanitation, etc., they go home. They can't go Socialist or Communist for the very good reason that they are automatically stopped by the pulling of the old purse strings.

"If they weren't stopped by such limitation and had unlimited power to tax and spend, what do you suppose the City Council of Chicago or of New York would do? There would be infiltration of Communists in our local governments, too. They are now confired to Washington, for that's the only place where they can thrive. on the illegal, immoral use of

Limitation Of Government "And so, in the Federal governnent, we're breeding Communists faster than McCarthy and Jenner and the Un-American Activities Committee can drive them out. Of course, if we operate a communalizing or socialist economy, it MUST be operated to some extent by Communists. If we build houses for half rent at public expense, exempt from Municipal taxes, how do you expect to keep idea of Comn spreading? And, what's more, how do you expect to keep Communists from breeding in the very place where Communists are supposed to live? If you approve of taking a man's house to accomodate two tenants for a single rent, how can you object to the government's taking your medical skill under compulsion to treat two patients for the price of one?

"Fourth - So, the result of the violation of the first three propositions - that the immoral taking by political force of private property or personal talents for the benefit and favor of special groups - breeds ev'i favoritism, special privileges, factionalism, disorder, and a general breakdown of law and order itself.

Group Power "Indeed, the general scramble between the smaller organized groups, bent on getting THEIR fair share of what the others produce, inevitably results in the stronger, more powerful groups taking the law into their own hands. A single organized group, as we have seen in certain types or racketeer labor wganizations, becomes the law, themselves. The Teamster's Union, for example, is now organizing on a national basis to stop all workers in their line from working unless they pay



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


