San Antonio Publishers Buy KGBS

NEW YORK, April 8—UP—An-
 nouncement of agreement for the
 \$3.5 million sale of radio and tele-
 vision stations KGBS and KGBS-
 TV at San Antonio, Tex., to the
 Express Publishing Company of
 San Antonio was made here joint-
 ly Tuesday night by the purchaser
 and the seller, Storer Broadcasting
 Co., of Miami Beach, Fla.
 The transfer is subject to ap-
 proval of the Federal Communi-
 cations Commission.
 Announcement was made by
 George B. Storer, president of the
 broadcasting company, and Frank
 G. Huntress Jr., executive vice
 president and general manager of
 the publishing firm, which pub-
 lishes the San Antonio Express
 and Evening News and is owner
 also of San Antonio radio station
 KTSA.
 Storer said he was disposing of
 the San Antonio station to permit
 consummation of his \$3.5 million
 purchase of the holdings of the
 Empire Coal Co., including televi-
 sion stations WXEL-TV, at Clevel-
 and, and KFTV at Portland, Ore.
 FCC regulations permit only five
 television stations under single
 ownership. The Portland station is
 not counted under this require-
 ment because it uses an ultra high
 frequency channel.
 Storer's other TV stations are at
 Birmingham, Ala., Toledo, Ohio,
 Atlanta and Detroit.

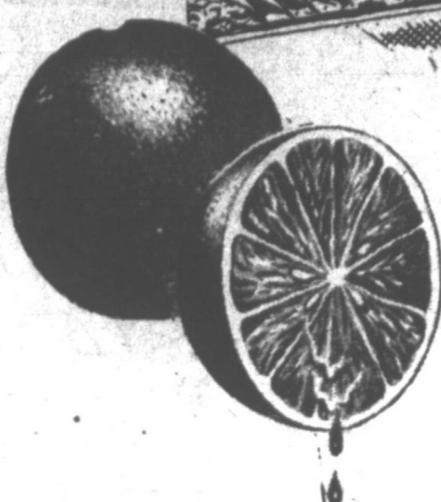

Railroader Testifies In Case Of Ex-Wife's Husband's Death

PORT WORTH, April 8 —UP— An unemployed Cleburne railroad man told Wednesday of a nine-hour whirlwind romance that ended in marriage — and divorce only three weeks ago — to the missing wife of a man who killed two women in-laws and then himself.

An inquest verdict held that James John Long, 38-year-old laborer, shot to death his mother-in-law and sister-in-law at their north side Fort Worth home Tuesday.

The women were Mrs. Ella Spears, 62, Long's mother-in-law, and Mrs. Dorothy Perez, 26, his sister-in-law.

Long's wife, Barbara, has been missing from home about two months. Relatives said Long and Barbara had been married less than a year.

D. F. Lea, the unemployed railroad man, said he met Barbara in a Port Worth tavern while he was on furlough after 18 months in Korea. That was Nov. 22, 1951, he said.

When his furlough was up and he had to return to the West Coast, Lea said, Barbara declined to go with him. He requested a divorce in 1953, but it failed to go through.

Another divorce action was begun by Lea this year, he said. Court records show it was granted March 17, 1954, in Cleburne.

Lea said some of his friends had told him they had seen Barbara in Fort Worth within the past two weeks.

Relatives, however, said she has been missing from home for two months, and that Long apparently went to the Spears home Tuesday in the belief the family knew of her whereabouts.

Georgians Crash Victims

TERRELL, Tex., April 8.—UP—An Atlanta, Ga., couple and one of their children were killed early Wednesday in a traffic crash east of Terrell. Three other persons were hurt in the two-car accident.

The dead were identified by the highway patrol as Ralph Lopez, 40, his wife, Ruby, 27, and a son, Robert L., 4. Two other children of the Lopez family, Ralph, 7, and Joan, 8, suffered broken legs and possible internal injuries.

Patrolmen C. R. Brock and J. E. Miller, who investigated, said the Lopez car struck a bridge and that a car going in the opposite direction and driven by Mrs. G. C. Callens of Olney, Tex., struck the wreckage.

Mrs. Callens was not hurt nor was her son, but another passenger in her car, Mrs. Bill Ray Campbell, was injured.

The investigators said the Lopez family was headed for Atlanta and that papers on Lopez's body indicated he had only recently been discharged from the Army.

Police Find Unidentified Charred Body

SAN ANTONIO, April 8.—UP—A scrap of brown cloth found near the charred remains of a man found in ruins of a burned barn is part of a suit tailor-made for a missing vacuum cleaner salesman, a tailor said Wednesday.

A statewide pickup order was broadcast, meanwhile, for the man last seen with the missing salesman and the FBI was asked to check his identification through blood type and service records.

Jose Garza of Garza Tailors told police he not only recognized his workmanship in the lining of the scrap of material, but the suit made for salesman R. L. Rotter, 40, was the "only suit I've made with this cloth."

The suit was delivered to Rotter last Friday. Rotter has been missing since Saturday night. The charred remains of a man were found Sunday morning in the ruins of a barn on the Jack Capps ranch near Wimberly. The barn burned Saturday night. Rotter's blood-stained station wagon was found abandoned on a downtown lot Monday.

Officers said earlier Wednesday there was "considerable" evidence the charred remains found in the barn ruins was Rotter. If it were, officers suspected he was shot critically or fatally before the barn burned, because of the blood stains on the station wagon and a discharged .32 shell found under a seat.

The salesman last was seen driving with Mariano Palomera, 36, a business associate, to a Saturday night party in San Marcos, 12 miles southeast of the barn fire.

Hays County Sheriff Jack Gary, Texas Ranger C. E. Miller and San Antonio homicide detectives said mud-calcie similar to that near the barn, was found on the underside of Rotter's station wagon. Tire tracks also were similar, officials said.

State Of U. S. Preparedness Defense Plants, Military Bases Removed From Target Areas

Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of four dispatches on the country's preparations to meet an H-bomb attack. This report tells of the dispersal of new defense plants and military installations.

 WASHINGTON, April 8—UP—New U.S. defense plants and military installations are being dispersed to sites at least 10 miles from so-called target areas to reduce probable damage from an atomic or hydrogen bomb attack.

An estimated 250 sizeable new defense plants have been built or started by private companies at such dispersed sites in the past 18 months under provisions giving the companies tax benefits. Others may have been built in accordance with the dispersal program but without the tax benefit.

At least one major military installation has been put underground. This is the so-called second Pentagon, an extensive alternate command and communications center built inside the Catoctin Mountains 65 miles north of here.

The Armed Services are dispersing all their new installations, both military and production facilities, such as ordnance plants.

Indications also are that some atomic plants have been put underground. And atomic weapons presumably are stored in caves or other underground places.

Some Relocated
 Some military installations have been relocated. For instance, the Strategic Air Command headquarters some years ago was moved deep inland to Omaha, Neb.

No serious consideration has been given to putting defense factories underground or to relocating existing ones, with a few exceptions.

Thus, large part of the nation's defense production capacity will be left in highly concentrated industrial areas and very vulnerable to mass destruction by H-bombs.

The 10-mile limitation was prescribed in the government's plant dispersal program with the scientifically-calculated expectation that at that distance a well-built factory would be knocked out of operation for only a short time if at all in the event of even an H-bomb attack on the nearest major target area.

Unless there have been overriding factors, the government has this standard for eligibility for a fast tax-writoff on the costs of new private plants since August, 1952.

Distance Still 10 Miles
 The 10-mile distance was set about two years ago but the defense mobilization office said it still is adequate despite the terrible destructiveness of the recent H-bomb test blasts in the Pacific.

Scientists considered the theoretical effects of an H-bomb attack in their original calculations. And, after a review last month they reaffirmed their belief that such dispersal distance is "adequate...for reducing vulnerability of industrial resources" to attack with present atomic or H-bombs.

But the dispersal distance is being kept under almost continual review and will be lengthened if developments in atomic weapons warrant it, an ODM spokesman said. However, he said such action is not contemplated now.

Informed sources estimated that a 10 megaton H-bomb—the equivalent of 10 million tons of TNT—would destroy factories within four miles, severely damage and knock out those within four to eight miles, and moderately damage those with in 8-13 miles. Estimates were that the latter could be repaired fairly quickly.

Informed sources have estimated that H-bombs exploded in the current Pacific tests have been around 12-14 megatons.

The biggest inducement the government offers to put new defense plants at least 10 miles outside a target area is the privilege of writing off from 60 to 100 per cent of construction costs in five years instead of the usual 20. This makes the company's taxes lower.

Also for Others
 Defense procurement officials also try to induce private industry to observe such limitations in building new production facilities even if advantage is not taken of the fast tax writoffs.

Defense officials said they also will try to persuade a "relatively few particularly sensitive" industries to move far from urban target areas in a small-scale relocation program. Identities of the in-

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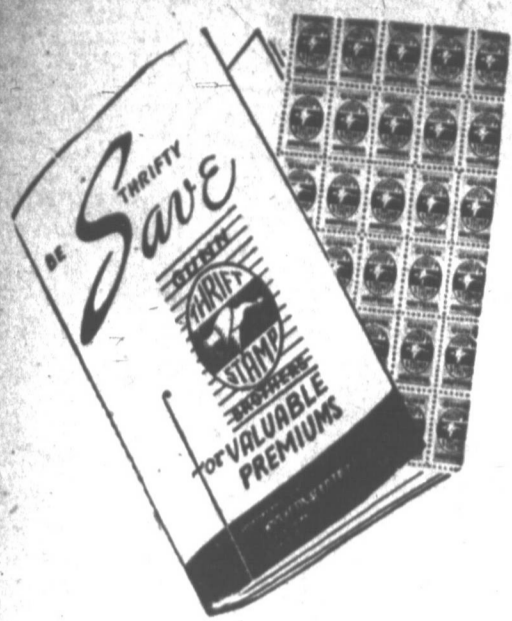

"When we work," Scott told me, "we guides make something like \$1.00 an hour. That's pretty good, and the season is short—but what we have to put up with! Wowie!"

"We drive 'em up to the big place at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. and they ask us: 'Who lives there?' Some of 'em, that is. And after they are escorted in, they ask us a lot of other questions like: 'Who lives in the east room?'"

McCarthy To Keep Houston Speaking Date

HOUSTON, April 8 —UP—The sponsor for Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's scheduled April 21 patriotic speech in Houston expects the Wisconsin Republican to keep the date although televised hearings in the McCarthy - Army dispute were set for the same date.

 Earlier this week, when Cullen rejected a petition signed by 1,871 students at the University of Texas asking that his invitation to McCarthy be withdrawn, Cullen said he had asked McCarthy to make "such a patriotic and non-political speech that even his severest enemies would have difficulty finding fault with it."
 The speech will be the principal one at ceremonies commemorating the 118th anniversary of the Battle of San Jacinto.
 "The last time I talked to Senator McCarthy he said he would be here if he was alive," Cullen said. "I haven't heard from him recently so I am still expecting him."
 Cullen invited McCarthy on behalf of the Sons of the Republic of Texas, sponsors of the ceremonies.

Vice Case Figure Ill

HOUSTON, April 8 —UP—District Attorney William H. Scott is suffering from "nervous exhaustion, post-spinal headaches" and a circulatory ailment, his doctor said here Wednesday.
 A short time later, Dr. C. A. Dwyer, county psychiatrist, said he would probably join the physician in recommending Scott's trial on a bawdy-house charge be postponed "at this time."
 Dr. John E. Skogland, a neurologist and psychiatrist, submitted his report to Dr. Dwyer soon after Scott's son had told the court his father would be "totally unable" to stand the trial, set for next Monday.

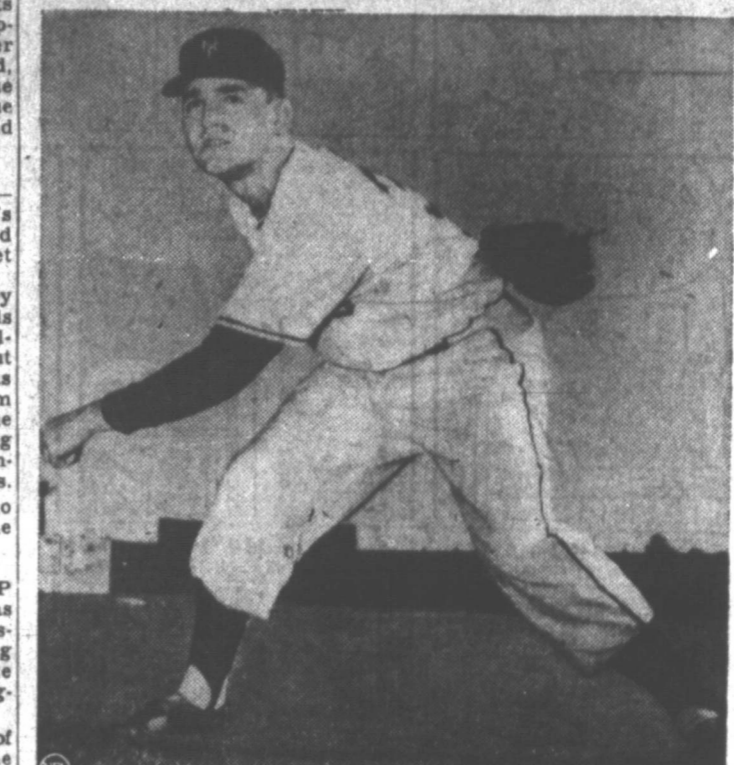

One of the other suspects, Guy Payne, 33, of Sallisaw, Okla., surrendered March 3 and is free on \$5,000 bond. The third man has not been named by officers.

Fugua and his wife had their 18-month-old daughter with them when they were arrested. The Marshall man refused to answer reporters' questions and used the little girl to shield his face from a photographer.

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Declaration On Communism Contains Risks For Signers

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles is seeking a firm declaration by seven free nations that they will not let communism overrun southeast Asia.

Signatories would be the United States, Great Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines and Thailand.

The immediate intent of the declaration would be to warn Red China against any further intervention in Indo-China. In the long run it would be a restatement of the 1950 declaration issued after the Korean armistice warning Communist China against further aggression in Asia.

from Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines and Thailand was slow in coming.

Australian External Affairs Minister Richard G. Casey said in Canberra Wednesday that he welcomed United States and a bitter anti-Communist. He might elect to go along with Dulles. Thailand's Prime Minister Luang Phibun Somgram is bitterly anti-Communist and has aligned his country with the West. His policy on the Dulles declaration might be tempered by the fact that Thailand borders on Indo-China and would be pretty intimately involved in any extension of the war there.

Feelings in the six countries asked to join the United States in the new declaration are mixed. For one thing the governments of the countries concerned see clearly the risks it would involve. The revelation of the awful power of the H-bomb plays a big part in their hesitation to take action that might bring a third world war.

Dulles hoped to get the declaration signed before the Far Eastern conference on Korea and Indo-China meets in Geneva April 26. But the first reaction from Allied countries is: Let's wait and see. France and Great Britain, especially, want to wait until the Russians and the Red Chinese show their hands at Geneva.

Some reaction from the capitals concerned is:

London—Britain would like to wait, hoping that something good may come of the Geneva conference, before it commits itself to anything that carries the threat of war.

Paris—the cabinet agreed to take no action before Geneva that might antagonize either Red China or Russia. France wants to negotiate an Indo-China peace agreement at Geneva and wants the conference to start under the best possible conditions.

President Eisenhower implicitly answered the "let's wait and see" attitude at his news conference Wednesday. He said the United States will go as far as prudence will allow in seeking a negotiated agreement with the Communists in Asia. But it will not accept mere words at the Geneva conference, he said.

Dwindling Fuel Supply Calls For Atom Energy Conversion

KANSAS CITY, April 8—UP—A Westinghouse executive said Wednesday the nation's swiftly diminishing fuel resources make a must of rapid conversion of atomic energy to commercial power uses to avoid return to "caveman" era.

David W. R. Morgan, a Westinghouse vice president in the company's industrial products headquarters, said there has been much talk about the likelihood of atomic weapons throwing the human race backward into a new caveman era.

"But," he added, "it is seldom pointed-out that accelerating depletion of our conventional energy reserves, combined with almost explosive population growth, contain the self-same threat."

The nation can sink into "primitivism" through exhaustion of power sources as well as through

war, Morgan said.

Morgan said solar energy and atomic power offer the best hopes of meeting the "phenomenal drain" on conventional power fuels. Solar power, he added, still is not an early prospect, but atomic power is.

Westinghouse is building an atomic reactor for the nation's first atomic power plant, to be operated by the Duquesne Light Company at Pittsburgh.
