Baltimore On Guard Near Schools

BALTIMORE, Oct. 4—UP—Mayor Thomas R. C'Alesandro ordered squads of police thrown around schools in southern Baltimore Monday to guard against any new violence over a recent regulation mingling white and Negro students.

The action came as Dr. John H. Fischer, superintendent of public schools, revealed he is "impressed" by reports that "subversives" may be secretly sponsoring an all-out anti-integration campaign.

Trouble began brewing last Thursday when parents picketed public school No. 34 where 12 Negroes had been enrolled in kindergarten. It flared into something bigger Friday when nine schools were picketed and a crowd of 800 white adults and students chased Negroes. Six men were arrested for streetfighting.

Fischer said it is possible the trouble — particularly at Southern High School — stemmed from "young hoodlums who didn't care one way or another about segregation but just wanted an opportunity for a vacation and a little hell raising."

But he said he couldn't help but be "impressed" by the theory that the "troublemakers" actually were "subversives" bent on wrecking the desegregation program.

"The strange thing is," he said, "that the protests began at school No. 34, an elementary school with only 12 Negro students, all in the kindergarten. That doesn't seem like the place for protests against desegregation to start."

Fischer said he has no proof of outside influences. But he said the school system has been desegregated once and for all and that it is going to stay that way.

'New' Justice Begins Sweep Of Phenix City

PHENIX CITY, Ala., Oct. 4—UP—A wide-eyed little gambler went on trial for murder here Monday, the first to be prosecuted under a new kind of justice for this one-time citadel of crime on the Chattahoochee.

Earl L. (Red) Cook, charged with a 1950 "wholesale shooting" murder, was No. 1 in line among scores who will be tried by a judicial system that rolled into authority on a tidal wave of public revision.

Indications are that this will be quite a series of trials. A prominent criminal lawyer represents some of the defendants. His firm has subpoenaed a host of witnesses, even including the 18 grand jurors who handed down the indictments.

Phenix City, a town of 9,000 population that is connected by two bridges over the muddy Chattahoochee River with massive Ft. Benning, Ga., and Columbus, Ga., was a wide open town for years.

No Exception
 This election year in Alabama was no exception.
 The dice rattled, the liquor flowed and busy nights, according to present day authorities, as many as 500 love-for-pay girls were on hand. No one bothered to add up the bounty, but it was roughly estimated to be \$100,000 a week.

Onto this scene stepped Albert W. Patterson, a Phenix City lawyer. He ran for the office of attorney general of Alabama and won out on a single campaign pledge — to clean up his home town.
 On June 14, two weeks after he was nominated, Patterson spoke to a ladies' society and dropped the remark that he feared he would never hold the job. Four nights later, he stepped from a car at his downtown office and was shot dead by an assassin presumably still at large.
Troops Swarm In
 The next day Phenix City swarmed with state troopers and national Guardsmen. Gamblers and mobsters, like old men pulling topcoats about their necks in the winter, shivered and settled down to wait out the storm. They had none if before.
 But this time apparently it was going to be different.
 Gov. Gordon Persons pledged he would make Phenix City a model for decency. He backed it up by sending the town under martial law July 22.
 An rapid fire order, the governor and the state Supreme Court ousted practically every judicial and police officer of any authority. Many commissioners were stripped of their offices and jury boxes were abolished under rigid supervision.
