Most business establishments are as cooperative as possible about this annul American pastime, but before getting into any arguments with a reluctant clerk or manager, better take a look at the legal situation in-volved. You may find that per-suasion is more in order than de-

Department stores are under no legal obligation to take back a purchase and refund your money or deliver other goods in exchange just because you changed your mind. Most stores do make refunds and exchanges, but that is because it is their policy to do so - not because they are required to. However, a promise to refund or exchange merchandise made by the store or the salesman should be honored. Similarly, if a store misrepresents the quality of certain goods or if the goods are defective, you are justified in expecting a satisfactory adjustment. But you have no more legal right to expect a store to refund or exchange because you change your mind about a purchase than the store has to ask you to give back the goods that were sold to you because it didn't want to sell them after all. Suppose you buy a coat in one store and find that another company has it on sale for five dollars less. Must the store where you bought it take back the coat and give you a refund, or refund the difference in price? The seller is under no obligation to refund the difference, any more than he could make you pay the difference if he discovered that a competitor offered the same coat at a higher

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The Good Old Days

In any group of people gathered for any occasion, where conversation is unlimited, somebody is always bound to bring up the "good old days." The question is, how far back are the good old days? That depends on the age of the speaker.

For us the good old days are way back there, beginning about the time T. R. became president and ending with the great "bust" of 1929, or more precisely, with our entrance into World War I.

The decade just prior to the "Great War" was a happy, peaceful and prosperous period. We were worried little if at all about the "state of the union," and the federal government was something we never thought of except every fourth year when we elected a new president or honored the incumbent by returning him for

But the Great War brought great disillusionment. We learned that our statesmen were not infallible, that our Constitution could be bypassed, that sloganeers could influence the masses with hollow phrases, and that the peace could be lost after the war was won.

During the twenties, though, our nation got back into its stride. We were still respected as a peaceful and peace loving nation — the world was willing to forgive us one breach of etiquette, our involvement in the wor which Europe considered a family affair. The government was still conspicuous in our offairs only by its absence, and though Wilson had popularized the word "democracy," we were still a constitutional Republic. We had no TV, but we had radio and prohibition, which afforded us great amusement at Uncle Sam's expense.

In all, the decade after our first attempt at internationalism was quite as happy and prosperous as the one before — we even accepted the depression, at first, as our just come uppance for living too high on the hog, until the New Dealers invented the "common man" (or forgotten man) and shed copious alligator tears in his

Those were, indeed, the days. But it all ended in 1933 when Franklin D. Roosevelt took office. All that has happened since has been, to us, a frightful nightmare. It certainly could not have happened if a large percentage of the populace hadn't been lulled to sleep by the honeyed words of a false prophet. We keep hoping for the "great awakening."

No Barking In Library

Prodded by its humane instincts, the New York Public Library has altered a long standing rule. It has decided that dogs may hereafter be admitted to its sacred precincts. Up to now, they have been parked outside, even on the coldest days.

The library isn't giving the dogs free reign, though Their masters have to keep them on leash.

Of course the arrangement will be nicer for the dogs. Maybe the library figures it will be better for their masters, too. Pretty homey setup for reading with the dog at your feet. It wouldn't be surprising to see some of the hounds trotting in with their masters' slippers between their teeth.

They seek one another's aid, no by threatening injury, but by of-fering some inducement — money, goods, gratitude or a good conscience. More and more they tend to accumulate wealth, or capital, because they can keep it, enjoy it, or use it for the benefit of those they love. But more and more they use it in mutual aid, partly because they and their loved ones

"As they recognize the advantages of helping one another, they become concerned about one another's welfare. They develop fellow-feeling and sympathy. They become willing and eager to help one another in mutual defense against aggression as well as in producing the necessaries and com-forts of life. They become brave and loyal, industrious and generous. So they prosper and grow strong as they practice living by the Golden Rule, which is the essence of Moral Law.

Force Destroys Moral Bases "Not that everyone in freedom mmediately becomes perfect. Far from it. Freedom provides only an opportunity for those who seek to good for themselves and others. And as some foolishly do not work or save, so some do not cooperate, but remain churlish and "But attempts to compel men to





This was discovered last night when the proposed Pampa Oiler Community Baseball Association held its deadline meeting for raising the necessary funds to "Save

Only \$2,440 of the needed \$4,600 to save baseball here had been turned in last night.

Another discouraging factor of the "interest" in baseball in Pampa was the fact that only about a dozen fellows showed up for last night's "crucial" meeting.

Of this group, only six were members of the original Pampa Oilers Community Baseball Association which numbered 40 men.

Those attending the meeting last night voted to "toss in the towel."

But the group did leave it open for someone who might want to make a big donation to save baseball here to do so. It is believed that a thousand dollar donation would save the Oilers since members of the association attending last night's meeting could virtually account for the other thousand that is needed.

The money that has already been contributed to the baseball fund will be kept in the bank for the next few days pending some miracle that might happen to save the

If and when the final decision is made to "toss in the towel," all money that has been contributed will be returned to the contributors.

It was the opinion of those attending the meeting lastnight that the proposed season ticket sale would go over

The proposed season ticket sale plan called for selling the season ducats at \$20 per ticket which would be good for 70 home games. That would average out at 28 cents per game, far below the single game admission price of

But the ticket sale can't be launched until the \$4,600 escrow money has been accounted for. Unless the aforementioned miracle happens, it looks

like the end of professional baseball in Pampa.



France Grants States Freedom

PARIS, Dec. 30 -UP- France granted full economic independence Wednesday to the three Associated

States of Indo-China. The move followed a fact-finding tour by Admiral Arthur W. Rad-ford, chairman of the U. S. Joint Chiefs of Staff to determine how the three states could be strengthened against Communist infiltration from the north.

Representatives of France, Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia signed a treaty which revoked a monetary, economic and customs union established in 1950.

The treaty gives each of the three countries the right to mint and issue its own currency, establish its own commercial treaties with other nations and handle its own banking and customs problems.

Less Fear Now ROME, Dec. 30-UP-U.E. Ambassador Clare Boothe Luce, who 15 feared a year ago that Italy might go Communist, said Wednesday the past year has brought marked improvement and "the outlook for the future is very hopeful."
