The March Of Crime

J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, points out the following trends in the semiannual Uniform Crime Reports for the first six months

An estimated 1,136,140 major crimes were committed during the first six months of 1954. This represents an increase of 88,850, or 8.5 per cent, over a similar period last year. If this trend continues, major crimes will reach an all-time high during 1954.

A major crime was committed every 13.8 seconds.

Each day during the first six months of 1954, it is estimated that an average of 35 people were felaniously slain and 252 other felonious rapes were committed; 608 cars were stolen; 197 robberies and 1,454 burglaries were

It is estimated that during the period from January to June, 1954, a crime of murder, manslaughter, criminal assault, or assault to kill was committed every 4.3 min-

The timetable for crime during the first half of 1954 is as follows: I murder or negligent manslaughter every 40.9 minutes, 1 criminal assault every 29.8 minutes, 1 robbery every 7.3 minutes, 1 aggravated assault every 5.7 minutes, 1 burglary every 59 seconds, 1 larceny every 23.5 seconds, 1 outo theft every 2.4 minutes.

Robbery jumped 20.4 per cent while burglaries rose 13.2 per cent and larceny 9 per cent during the first six months of 1954.

Estimated murder figures rose 0.9 per cent and aggravated assaults showed no change. Criminal assault offenses declined 1.2 per cent and auto theft and negligent manslaughter were down 2.3 and 3.9 per cent, re-

Urban crime rose 7.2 per cent. Urban robberies increased by 22.6 per cent, while burglaries and larcenies in urban areas increase by 11.8 and 7.1 per cent, respectivly. Urban murders decreased 2.1 per cent, and negligent manslaughter declined 6.4 per cent. Auto thefts in the cities decreased 2.7 per cent, while aggravated assaults in urban areas declined by only 0.5 per cent. Urban criminal assault increased 0.6 per cent.

Rural crime increased 11.9 per cent in the period from January to June, 1954. Burglaries and larcenies in rural areas increased 16.7 per cent and 13.6 per cent, respectively. Robberies were up by 10.8 per cent in the rural areas, while murders increased 5.8 per cent. Rural aggravated assaults increased 1.8 per cent, but criminal assault declined 3.5 per cent. Both negligent manslaughter and auto thefts showed declines of 0.6 per cent and 0.8 per cent, respectively, in rural areas.

Although a decrease is noted over the first six months of 1954, auto theft continues as a major criminal problem in the United States. During the first six months of 1954, an estimated 110,060 cars were stolen as compared with 112,600 in the same period last year.

Victims or killers in the United States totaled 6,380, while more than 54,000 other individuals were feloniously assaulted by potential killers. Robbers jeopardizd the lives of 35,650 victims.

These are startling statistics. The odds in the first half of this year that you wouldn't be directly affected by a criminal act were only 150 to one — a long shot in a horse race, perhaps, but not a very comfortable margin in trying to live a peaceful life.

The answer doesn't particularly lie in increased police protection. It lies in the hearts and minds of people. A civilization where respect for life and property is declining cannot long endure.

We need in this country a revival of personal integrity and individual morality. A people who believe in God. who hold to the principle of a Divine Order of reward or punishment in observance of the Ten Commandments will not need a policeman at every street corner.

Bigger And Bigger Government I want to quote further from the pamphlet "The Lengthening Shadow of Government," issued by The Foundation for Economic Education, Inc. It is written by Rev. Edmund A. Opitz.

Under the heading of "A Velvet Glove" he explains how most people do not realize that government is force. He explains it in this

"Neither is the word violence used in any vague sense when it is said that all political action or government intervention is violent. The violence in government is always implicit, only rarely explicit and overt; the mailed fist usually wears a velvet glove.

"What is more, the mailed fist of government seems to be our own clenched hand. When the political structure is republican in form; it is only natural for us to assume the innocence of political action. After all, is not political ourselves; and can we be accused of violating ourselves?

"In a country occupied by a foreign power, it takes little discern-ment on the part of the conquered the part of the conquered people to know what political action really is. Its violent nature is unabashedly linked to the sword. And under a monarchy or an oligarchy, the ruling body is set off from the main body of citizens, so that the 'lower' orders have little difficulty in recognizing the political burden they carry around on their backs.

Political Action Concealed

"But when the personnel of officialdom is drawn indifferently from the rank and file of the citizenry, and is chosen by this citizenry to represent it, then the true nature of political action is concealed by a thick disguise. The government is ours, and it is given the sanction which each of us is so skillful in inventing to justify any line of conduct he feels inclined to engage in. Our adeptness at rationalization is put into the

service of the government. A Rationalization

"The first form taken by the rationalization is that which says: 'We are the government.' Even if this statement corresponded to the facts, it would not speak on either side of the contention that all political action is implicitly violent. If 'we' are the government, then it follows that political action has no ethical sanction for actions that would be ethically wrong when performed by 'us' as individuals. It is generally regarded as wrong for any of us to injure any other of us - whether the injury be directed at body, mind, or estate — unless the injury be the mon unavoidable result of legitimate lay. self-defense.
