Housewives Helping Drop Java Prices

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 —UP— The head of the New York coffee and sugar exchange told Senate investigators Tuesday a housewives' boycott is helping to bring coffee prices down. But the witness, Gustavo Lobo Jr., refused to predict whether the cost of coffee will rise or fall in the future. He said that depends on supply and demand. Lobo told a Senate banking subcommittee investigating coffee prices that as the cost of coffee climbed this year more people stopped drinking it. High prices also spurred production of coffee, he said, increasing the supply. The result, he said, was a drop in the price of green coffee from about 75 cents a pound in February to about 63 Tuesday. Lobo said, however, that he guessed most coffee roasters have not brought their prices down a corresponding amount because they have high-priced inventories. Subcommittee Chairman J. Glenn Beall (R-Md.) said there is no evidence of a coffee shortage today or this year to justify price increases which he said cost Americans \$293 million in the first eight months of 1954. Lobo insisted that a shortage, caused by a 1953 frost in Brazil, was responsible for the price boost. Lobo said there was very little speculation in the coffee exchange.

Overseas Christmas Parcels Should Be Mailed By Nov. 15

The time for mailing Christmas parcels to servicemen overseas is again with us. The period Oct. 15 to Nov. 15 has been designated for the acceptance of Christmas parcels for members of our armed forces serving outside the continental United States," O. K. Gaylor, Pampa postmaster announced. "It is absolutely necessary that these dates be kept in mind to insure delivery by Christmas day," Gaylor emphasized. Airmail Users Cautioned Parcel post overseas to APO and FPO points is limited to 50 pounds, and not to exceed 100 inches in length and girth. Air parcel post, other than official matter, is limited in size to 30 inches in length or girth and no more than two pounds in weight. Those using airmail, Gaylor cautioned, "should not delay the dispatching of parcels until December. Timely delivery is not assured through the use of air mail." "All parcels destined for delivery in Japan, Korea and the islands of the Pacific should be sent preferably, not later than Nov. 1, in view of the distance involved. Air mail weighing no more than 8 ounces is chargeable at the rate of six cents per ounce or fraction thereof. Those parcels weighing over eight ounces are charged at the rate of 80 cents per pound or fraction thereof," Gaylor advised. Mailing Restrictions Matches and lighter fluid may not be mailed. Many APOs and FPOs prohibit the mailing of coffee, cigars and other tobacco products. In addition, many overseas post offices require custom declarations. Gaylor emphasized the necessity of complying with these restrictions. "Check with us here at the post office and we will be happy to give you all the details on the mailing of your overseas parcels." "Parcels containing foodstuff subject to spoilage and breakage usually reach their overseas destination unit for use," Gaylor said, military personnel, as we all know, are well supplied with food, so it might be wise to keep food dispatches at a minimum.

OCT. 15 MAIL OFFICE CLOSURE NOV. 15. Complete and legible name, rank and address of serviceman and sender should be printed directly on outside of parcel. Surface transported packages may measure 100" length plus girth and weigh 50 lbs. Tie with 4 separate cords. Overseas air parcel post is limited to 30" length and girth combined and 2 pounds weight. Matches and lighter fluid are prohibited. Contents of all parcels should be cushioned and tightly packed. Overseas greeting cards must be sealed and prepaid first class. Coffee and tobacco products may not be sent to certain areas.

Accused Government Employee Freed On Bond Over Protest

ALEXANDRIA, Va., Oct. 13 —UP— Joseph Sidney Petersen Jr., 40-year-old former government employe accused of stealing military secrets from the hush-hush National Security Agency, was freed on \$10,000 bond Tuesday over the vigorous protests of Justice Department attorneys. The bond was posted in cash a short time after Federal Judge Albert V. Bryan reduced the amount from \$25,000. Justice Department attorney John F. Reilly had opposed the lower bond, arguing that the accusation against Petersen is "just one step short of treason in its seriousness." Petersen declined to talk to reporters after he was freed from the Alexandria city jail where he had been held since his arrest by FBI agents Saturday. He did not enter a plea at his arraignment held before a United States commissioner a short time after the arrest. His attorney told the court Petersen had less than \$1,000 in a savings account, to show for his 13 years in government service. But he said other members of the family helped to raise the \$10,000. The government again stopped short of any disclosure of the exact nature of the offense attributed to Petersen. Lifts Lift SYRACUSE, N.Y. —UP— A burglar had a tough time here recently. Soviets Give Aid To Allies

TOKYO, Oct. 13 —UP— Soviet Russia has given North Korea \$75 million in reconstruction materials since the armistice, while Communist China had donated approximately \$127 million, Radio Peking said in a broadcast heard here Tuesday. The Russian contribution included machine tools, electric goods, building materials, ships, vehicles, fertilizers. Red China sent railroad vehicles, food, coal, foodstuffs and munitions. Quoting a North Korean news agency, the radio report said 121 railway bridges, 470 stations, 345 schools and 26 hospitals had been constructed since the end of the war.

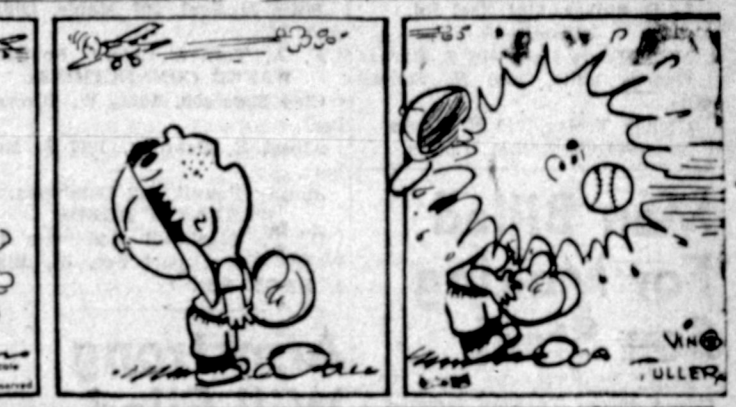
