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New Orthodoxy

There is considerable impassioned bleating these days about the danger of rampant conservatism. The entrenched left, haisting its pennant of shocking pink, thumps its chest agorously and declares that it is the last vestige of free thought. It wails that those who favor the old fashioned virtues of honor, integrity, individualism, self-control, and the absense of statism are in fact, reactionaries who are opposed to free thought. Those who favor the taste of crimson in their political diet even go so far as to state that orthodoxy, per se, is evil.

This last statement is dependent, of course, on the peculiarly twisted lexicon which is the hall-mark of the collective. They say that if a man is suspected of being a Communist . . . this suspicion is orthodoxy. That if a man believes in God, this belief is orthodoxy. That if a sex-pervert, a liar, and a traitor, all rolled into a single person, is dismissed from government employ, then this dismissal, too, is the ugly head of orthodoxy rearing itself upon a stiff-neck over a terrified populace. Never did the myth-makers create a more fabulous dragon.

The truth of the matter is simply that socialism has become the new orthodoxy. Those who favor it look with horror upon any person with freedom of thought and speech who would challenge its right to immorality. According to them we must protect the Communist, merely because he should be free to wreck this country. We must protect the Atheist, because we must be docile to his pragmatic ravings that there are no fixed values and certainly no God, and finally, no matter what evil a person does, we must condone it, because to interfere with his freedom to be evil would place us in that uncomfortable category of defending the status-quo. All of this emphasis on personal liberty would be intriguing were it not that the whole thing is a sham, spouting up out of the artesian wells of hate, belonging to all those who wish to make the world over in the image of the proletariat.

The falsity of this claim to liberalism is apparent. when we learn that those of us who do not like Communists must not be left free to say so. The Communist must be free, but the anti-Communist is a danger to freedom. McCarthy, screams the left, is a menace, but only because he threatens the left. If McCarthy opposed the conservative right, he would quickly be forgiven and adored. We must protect the atheist because he believes in nothing . . . and therefore is the very symbol of free thought. But those who exercise free thought to point where they believe in fixed values, among them the Divine Source, they must be scourged from our midst, since it is conceivable that the belief in God is the new heresy to the new orthodoxy. And, finally, those who proctice perversion, dishonesty and treason are exercising their natural prerogatives to be free men. Those who oppose this flagrant abuse of nature and trust, are not to be condoned for a minute.

It seems to us that the time has come to delineate the difference between Liberty and License, for it is opparent that wide confusion exists. Liberty, of course, consists of three things; License, only two. Where Liberty pertains, a person is free to choose and to act upon his choice. But also, he must, of necessity accept the responsibility for his choices and actions. Where responsibility is self-imposed, there is no danger to Liberty. In fact this becomes the essence of the Golden Rule. But where license abounds, freedom of choice will still remain. So also, freedom to act upon one's choice. But responsibility has vanished. The politically aggressive Left, equates liberty with license, and seeks to relegate responsibility for all choices and actions to the state. This by large acceptance has become orthodox. But the Libertarian, daring to be free, and daring to believe in man's fundamental goodness, practices freedom of thought, for which he is branded as an orthodox, an enemy of the

Educational Brain-Washing

I want to quote from a chap-ter in Mortimer Smith's new book "The Diminished Mind" under the

heading of "Educational Brain-washing, Democratic Style." Mr. Smith names such outstanding leaders in pragmatism in the public schools as Harold Rugg, John L. Childs, Goodwin Watson, Jesse H. Newlon, and to a lesser extent, William H. Kilpatrick. He quotes Kilpatrick as saying:

"A fundamental remaking of our economic system seems necessary so that men shall no longer be compelled to work against each other but may rather be permitted and encouraged — and if a recalcitrant minority requires it, be compelled - to cooperate for the common good."

These "educators" are trying to change our way of living by way of the children in the public

Smith states: "Social reconstruction in educa-tion is still with us. It is considerably less fashionable than it used to be and its advocates are no longer inclined to indulge in frank evangelizing in the open marketplace, but it is far from

being moribund."
Then he discusses two books which are widely used in teacher training institutions. One of these is the combined labor of three professors of education, B. Othanel Smith, William O. Stanley, and J. Harlan Shores — all of the University of Illinois. It is entitled "Fundamentals of Curri-culum Development." The other by Theodore Brameld, professor of educational philosophy at New York University, is called "Patterns of Educational Philosophy.' The first book is about the same as the second, but since I do not have space to quote from both, I want to quote from "Patterns of Educational Philosophy" Brameld. Smith remarks that Professor Brameld is not one to leave ideas unarticulated or dangling in a vague fashion, but he tells us what are some of the rules which will be deemed necessary in our reconstructed society. 
