Yugoslavia, Italy End Long Feud

LONDON, Oct. 5 -- UP --Italy and Yugoslavia, after nine years of disputing the possession of Trieste, signed an Anglo - American sponsored agreement Tuesday which partitioned the strate-

The two countries approved formally an agreement worked out through Anglo-American diplomacy just one year after the two southern European nations stormily rejected an Anglo-American settlement by decree.

The accord splitting the strip of Adriatic coast between Italy and Yugoslavia closed a troublesome gap in western defenses. It also permits the withdrawal of 4,000 American and 3,000 British troops from the area ending a nine-year ccupation.

No UN Critics

It is evident from news accounts that criticism of the United Nations is highly unpopular either in the National Broadcasting Company or in the governmental agencies that have influence with NBC and its president, David

The indication was given in the summary firing of NBC commentator George H. Todt, who, after 13 months on the air, was booted out two days after he made a scathing criticism of the United Nations.

Certainly the excuses offered by NBC for firing Todt sound as though they were made up out of whole cloth and were nothing more than excuses. Here is a man who has been on the air over an NBC-owned telecasting station for 13 months and they just found out that he is not under contract to NBC. Moreover, they can't put him under contract, the excuses continue, because he has not been connected with NBC for 10 years or more although they didn't find out in 13 months whether he was an able commentator or not.

Just where the responsibility should lie might be a matter for conjecture but it is certain that ultimately it lies with David Sarnoff, president of NBC, head of Radio Corporation of America and a brigadier general appointed by Franklin D. Roosevelt.

It could have been that it was not just criticism of the United Nations that was responsible alone, for Todt went further than most critics of the UN — he proposed an alternate suggestion that would take the wind out of the Internationalists and leave them high and dry. Todt suggested that if there had to be a united order of nations that it ought to be based upon the Christian Constituion of the United States basis, ratier than on the basis of the United Nations Charter which was in part at least inspired and written by Alger Hiss. Todt's plan, however, would have meant that other nations in the world would have to meet the traditional American view-point of a capitalist system and qualify themselves for alliance with the United States.

This proposal, Todt holds, would meet the approval of the people of the United States.

The American people do not wish to be hurled irrevocably into the company of many Marxist gangster nations." Todt declared. He added that we can expect to be outvoted at every turn in the future when the chips

"Are we expected to yield up this lone remaining citadel of capitalism to the greedy have-nots of the world jungle?" he asked.

Naturally the first impression any reasonable person might be expected to have who resents such a highhanded manner on the part of NBC is to place the blame right in the lap of Gen. Sarnoff. Yet, it may be that Gen. Sarnoff was subjected to pressure himself, for it is well known in the industry that the very life of any radio or television concern depends upon "keeping in good" with the Federal Communications Commission which licenses such agencies.

There are a thousand and one ways in which the FCC can make life for any company, almost unbearable, add to operating costs and, ultimately, take the license away. This is fully recognized by all segments of the industry and certainly Gen. Sarnoff is no exception? There may be grave question concerning Gen. Sarnoff himself, for he is a Russian-born citizen and the technicalities of becoming a citizen of the United States always leave the gate open for "investigation" by various governmental

In this instance, Gen. Sarnoff has an opportunity to speak clearly. Either Todt was fired for his attack upon the United Nations or he was not. Gen. Sarnoff has an opportunity to speak for those who defend American sovereignty by re-instating Todt or make clear exactly the reasons why he was fired.

It should be kept in mind that in approximately six months or less the United States will be forced to take an official position in regards to the United Nations. Unless there is some official action taken by this country, we shall have passed the time when we can (even if we want to at a later date) get out of the United Nations. Today that is still possible . . . but the time is running

That the proponents have something to fear from such commentary as was made by Todt is evidenced by the speed with which he was bounced from his job. It would appear that the group of Internationalists who are determined to lead this country down the road to a oneworld totalitarian system were considerably frightened by having such a broadcast made and acted quickly to see that no more of such are made.

How long such exposures must continue before the rank and file of Americans learn that they have been swindled in the sales talk for the United Nations we can't say. But we do know that unless there is some sort of immediate and general voicing of disapproval the opportunity to get out of the United Nations will have gone. Then it will be too late.

It is practically impossible to have a student expelled from school now, because the administrators argue that no matter how vicious a young person is, it is better for him to be in school than on the streets. (The question of his harm to other young people is passed over.) The maladjusted students nave found out that they will be passed along regardless of achievement or conduct. Consequently, these young people take greater and greater liberties each year. In instances like these; high schools are substituting for reform schools, and normal wellbehaved children must be neglected because of the time-consuming struggle to keep under control these insolent and for and young people."

Evading Truth




