Commies Release Ohioan

'Full Redress' Due Hermann H. Field

LONDON, Oct. 25 -- UP --The Communist radio said Monday Hermann H. Field, Ohioan jailed five years ago in Red Poland, has been "released and rehabilitated" because the charges against him proved "baseless."

Warsaw broadcast said other unidentified "persons accused without foundation have been released" -- a possible reference to Field's brother Noel, his sister-in-law Herta and their foster daughter Erika, all of whom disappeared at about the time he was arrested.

The broadcast, based on dispatches of the official agency PAP; said Hermann Field will receive "full redress" and promised "necessary steps will be taken against persons found guilty of exercising insufficient supervision" in his case.

The whereabouts of the reportedly released prisoner, whose home is in Cleveland, could not be determined immediately. A spokesman for the U.S. embassy in Warsaw said he had no information beyond the Red broadcast.

Efforts to Make Contact "We are making every effort to get in touch with him. . ." the embassy spokesman said. "Naturally, we will do everything in our power to help him get home,





A building which covers 12 acres of ground had to be erected to house this huge machine and another, 35,000-ton one. The entire project will cost \$40,000,000.



The Psychology Of Inflation By Elihu Root

Since the United States is going through the greatest inflation in its history as a result of the Federal Reserve System and since very few people seem to understand the end results of inflation. Root in the Senate of the United States in 1913 when the Federal Reserve System was established. This speech was quoted in the October 4 bulletin of the American Institute for Economic Research.

Here is what the Senator said: "The psychology of inflation is interesting, and it is well understood, No phenomenon exhibited by human nature has been the subject of more chorough, careful, and earnest study than that presented by the great multitude of individuals making up the business world in any country in the process of gradual inflation. It is as constant as the fundamental qualities of humanity, and it differs in different countries only in degree, according to the hopefulness and optimism or the natural conservatism and caution of the

"If the people of the United States have not wholly changed their nature from the nature which has been exhibited in all the financial history of England, from which many of us came; in all the financial history of France, from which many of us came; in all the financial history of Germany, from which many of us came; of Austria, of Italy; unless our human nature has been changed, we may confidently expect that under this proffer of easy money from a paternal Government, available for every one of us, available to send the lifeblood into the enterprise of every quarter of our vast country, available to enable all the young and hopeful and energetic Americans, East and West and North and South, to embark in business ventures which will lift them up from the hard conditions of daily toil, we may confidently expect that the same process will occur that has occurred time and time and time again in other countries.

"That process is this: Little by little the merchant, the manufacturer, the young man starting out for himself and with a good character, enough to give him a little credit; the man with visions of great fortunes to be won; the man with ideals to be realized; the inventor, the organizer, the producer; little by little, with easy money, they get capital to begin business and to enlarge business. As the business enlarges sales increase, and prosperity lead to the desire for growth, They all have before them specsmall beginnings to wonder success - the Wanamakers, the adults. Marshal Fields, the great manufacturers, the Fords, I could

enumerate a thousand whose example, whose phenomenal success today inspire young Americans with boundless hope. Little by litthe business is enlarged with easy money. With the exhaustless reservoir of the Government of the United States furnishing easy businesses enlarge, more new enterprises are started, the spirit of optimism pervades the commu-

"Bankers are not free from it. They are human. The members of the Federal Reserve Board will not be free from it. They are human. Regional bankers will not be free from it. They are human, All the world moves along upon a growing tide of optimism. Every one is making money. Every one is growing rich. It goes up and up, the margin between cost and sales continually growing smaller as a result of the operation of inevitable laws, until finally someone whose judgement was bad, someone whose capacity was small, breaks; and as he falls he hits the next brick in the row, and then another, and then another, and down comes the whole


