

Play Depends On Your Objective

Written for NEA Service

How do you play today's hand at a contract of four hearts? Before you can answer this question, you must first find out whether you are playing for total points or for match points,

The difference is all-important In ordinary rubber bridge or in a team contest scored in total points, you must play to assure the contract. In a match point contest, however, you must play for maximum even if you must risk the contract for the sake of trying for an extra trick.

In a match point game, for example, you would put up the queen of spades at the first trick. When East covers with the king, you



must win with the ace. You now cash the two top hearts and begin on the clubs, hoping that the player who has the last trump also has at least two clubs.

There is no danger if two rounds of clubs get by. On the third club you can discard a spade, and even If this is ruffed you still lose only one other spade trick and the ace of diamonds, If three rounds of clubs get by, you are sure to make 11 tricks by this line of play.

As the cards lie, of course, the second round of clubs gets ruffed, and the defenders can then take two spade tricks and the ace of diamonds to defeat the contract.

At rubber bridge, an expert would see that this line of play risks the contract. The best way to sure the game contract is either duck the first trick, or to win a first trick with the ace of sees and immediately lead a low

Compared with other states, the governor of Texas doesn't fare too well financially. A total of 24 states pay a larger salary, topped by New Jersey with an annual wage of \$30,000. Seven states. Alabama, Delaware, Georgia, Iowa, New Hampshire, South Carolina and Tennessee pay the same as

Texas. Maryland ranks lowest on the gubernatorial pay scale with an annual salary of \$4,500.

However, included among states topping Texas in this division are California, New York, Illinois and Pennsylvania, \$25,000; Michigan, \$22,500; Ohio, \$20,000; Louisiana, \$18,000, and Virginia, \$17,500.

Would Increase Terms A second amendment, included among the 11 on the ballot, also will concern elected officials.





He is "head" of a department where Truman-Acheson personnel continue their patchwork on what they would have us believe is a "policy"; really a blanket directive under which all nations outside the iron curtain must do what they say or lose this year's billion.

In the line of duty he must leave policy-making to this internationalist - interventionist crowd and buzz like a small gad-fly from capital to capital to persuade, wheedle, exhort and cajole reluctant Europeans into the notion they are in "dire peril" unless they accept the "leadership" of the nation who having seized leadership by force-at-arms, insists it was "thrust upon U.S."

During recent months, idealists on the left who made 'policy" in the first place seem a breath or two petu-"Free Nations" which were slated to accept our leadership stall, palaver, promise, then do a whoaback. Would it be rude to ask Washington just this once please, to tilt the slats in the blinds and try to see what must be so obvious, in every European capital?

"Dire Peril" is what every generation of Europeans have lived in from that remote date when Julius Caesar moved up against Vercingetorix and found all Gaul divided into partes tres i.e. not unified against "aggression." Aggressors have been on almost continuous parade across European soil - Mongols, Huns, Goths, Vandals, Vikings, Saracens . . . plus all those who rose up within to aggress Normans, Spaniards, Venetians, Austrians, Frenchmen of the Napoleonic stripe, Germans. And England-of-the-Royal Navy was always scanning the fracas for the probable winner.

And the books have it that, after each "aggression," each aggressor has sat down, softened up, become fat-cat by the fires and have thus been absorbed into the "cultures" which have all been more or less militaristic.

That was the old order of things until a certain brash young Republic went across to change it. Just like it

Europe has watched the U. S. try and try-try again: They can hardly forget 1917-18 "making the world safe for democracy." (Safe!)

In Joseph Wood Krutch's book "The Measure of Man", he reports the findings of the army as published in the "Publication of the Modern Language Association." Here is what he sasy:

"If the median scores made by college graduates on the Army General Classification Test are a reliable criterion our best brains go into the physical sciences, including engineering; our second best into law; and our third best into English, Students of psychology and economics not only rank below the students of English, but also below the students of the forelgn languages. The social sciences (exclusive of history and economics) come still further down-below biology, fine arts, nursing, history, agriculture and business. At the very bottom are, in this order, education, home economics and physical education, Moreover, of the group composed of students whose grades fell within the range of the lowest twenty per cent of all graduate students tested, nearly one half were studying-educa-

"Champions of the humanities are priviledged to doubt the ac-curacy of mental tests. But such tests can hardly be challenged by those who are responsible both for making them and for advocating that we should rely on the answers they provide. How then can they explain the fact that more of the superior minds (as measured by scientific methods) devote themselves to the study of literature more under the control of a group surpassed in intelligence by every other group except the two devoting themselves respectively home economics and physical edu-



At this time of year, landlords and tenants alike are thinking about farm rental arrangements for 1954. While many operate from year to year on the basis of verbal agreements regulated largely local customs, written leases are better and may save disagreement and hard feelings between the parties.

Farming is a business and sho be conducted in a business-like manner for best success. Rental contracts involve a full year's work by the tenant and possibly thousands of dollars for both parties. A few dollars spent on a properly drawn agreement is good busi-

ness economy. A farm lease is not a simple paper, Printed lease forms often turn out to be traps if not understood, or if not properly executed A farmer-tenant contract is intricate and of such importance to both parties concerned that ama-

teur Araftsmanship is risky. Fixing of cash rent or designat ing the length of term are relative ly simple. Yet, even in these mat ters, ambiguity or incompleteness can cause bitter disputes and expensive lawsuits.

A loosely drawn property descrip tion may have consequences en tirely unintended by either landlord or tenant. Where rent is to be based on acreage, an accurate description is doubly important. In addition, there are legal rules

to substitute for some omissions in written leases. For example, the enant who holds over beyond his term may automatically renew the contract if the lease is silent on the subject. It is as important to know the results of omissions as to know the courts' interpretation of the language used.

There are many matters which should be covered by a properly drawn lease. For instance, if a tenant is to farm on a share basis, care should be taken to define what expenses are to be paid by the parties as well as what shares are to be taken out. A lease should cover such things as who is to make repairs, what land is to be cropped, whether the tenant can cut timber, whether loss of a frees the tenant, or whether the andlord must accept a sub-ten-

One great cause of difficulty with leases is blind faith on the part of the persons involved that all differences of opinion can be worked out. Poor memories as to verbal agreement can cause dispute

between persons even though they are both honest and generous.
