# Commies School 'Strikers' 2 Yanks

### Nabbed In Korea After Armistice

PANMUNJOM, Korea Oct. 6 -UP- The Communists Wednesday released an American Marine lieutenant colonel and an Army private who were captured by the Reds after the Korean arm-

Eighth Army headquarters identified the men as Marine pilot Lt. Col. Herbert A. Peters, Seattle, Wash., who was assigned to the First Marine Air Wing in Korea, and Pfc. Charles Julius, Orlando, Fla., member of A Battery, 196th Field Artillery Battalion,

The marine pilot was captured when he landed on a North Korean airstrip last Feb. 5 after "losing his bearings." the Communists said. He was flying a L-19 liaison plane which also was returned

The soldier stepped on a land mine May 25 near the demilitarized zone and was picked up by Red troops.

Both men appeared to be in good physical condition when they walked to freedom in this historic truce village at 2:30 p.m.

They were wearing the same style blue Communist uniforms that American war prisoners wore when they were freed by the Reds during "Operation Big Switch" immediately after the armistice.

The soldier apparently had recovered from injuries suffered when he stepped on the land mine. The Communists surprised United Nations officials earlier Wednesday at a meeting when they Wednesday at a meeting when they announced they would release the two men. The officer and private had been accused by the Reds of being spies.

# For Nothing?

Most Top O' Texans know that you can't get something for nothing, even from the Federal government. And the reliance of the states on Federal funds is a debilitating element in our national life. Those are, in essence, the major points made in a study of "Federal Grant-in-Aid Programs" which was recently published by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The trend toward reliance on the central government has been enormously accelerated in a relatively short period of time. In the 20's, the Federal grants to the states were confined to about 10 functions and amounted to only \$100,000,000 a year, of which 75 per cent was earmarked for highways. Last year these grants came to \$2,600,000,000 and covered 40 programs. The fields of health, education and welfare, all historically local responsibilities, accounted for 75 per cent of the

Along with this has come a drastic change in the tax situation. Prior to 1913, there was little tax duplication between the federal government and the states. Now duplication is the rule rather than the exceptionas witness personal income taxes, corporate income taxes, estate and gasoline taxes, and so on. To quote the Chamber's study, the federal grants, rather than being gifts, are in reality "a partial return of money taken from the states and their peoples by the Washington tax-

So it is obvious that very important changes must be made if anything even resembling the old separation of powers philosophy which the Founding Fathers viewed as the cornerstone of our liberties to be regained. We ill have to work on the principle that not possible to accomplish on the state and local levels can be delegated to another authority. And that, if it happens, will be a sweeping adjustment indeed.

Organization is Another

Reason For Getting Out Of UN Those people who believe in the United Nations should read the report on the last annual meeting of the International Labor Organiza-

tion held in Switzerland. The report was written by William L. McGrath, president of the Williamson Heater Co., Cincinnati, advisor for four years from 1949-52 inclusive

The organization is known as the ILO. It was originally formed by the League of Nations but is now an agency of the United Nations. It is therefore an international body having an official standing with governments the world over, in-cluding the United States. It has a permanent office in Geneva, headed by a Director General and an ample staff, most of whom are sympathetic to socialistic ideas. Each one of the 60 governments belonging to the United Nations has four representatives. Two are supposed to represent the government, one is supposed to represent the employer and one is supposed to represent labor, which in reality represents union labor and not la-

Russia has had no representative at these annual meetings until the 1954 meeting, and then she came back into the organization. Russia is demanding four representatives for herself and four representatives for seven Iron Curtain countries, including the Soviet Union, Byelorussia, (Southern part of Russia), Bulgaria, Hungary, Poland, Czech-oslovakia and the Ukraine.

At the last annual meeting all the United States representatives, including the government representatives, the employer representative and the labor union representative, objected to communist countries having four representatives on the ground that the only employer in communist countries is the government and the only purpose of the labor unions there is to spengthen the government. Mr. McGrath reports on the objections to the seating of employer and worker delegates from iron

"The employers therefore decided the time had come to oppose; on constitutional grounds, the acceptance as 'tripartite'-that is, representing government, workers and employers, respectivelyof delegations from Communist

curtain countries as follows:

"The Employers' position was that Communist nations had every right to representation at the ILO in the government group-but that since their delegations represented in fact government and government only, these nations had no right to representation in the employers' or workers' group.

'The challenge was based on the first paragraph of Article 3 of the ILO constitution, which states that the Conference 'shall be composed of four representatives of each of two others shall be delegates representing respectively the employers and the workpeople of each of the members.

"The Employers' charge was that so - called "employer" delegates from the seven iron curtain countries 'do not represent interests in any way different from those of the Governments; they are really no more than State officials entrusted by the State with the management of a factory, and that, therefore, they are in no way employers within the precise meaning of the ILO constitution." "

The Employers were outvoted in the Credentials Committee and the case was taken before the General Annual Conference. As Mr. Mc-Grath says, the results were a foregone conclusion. They voted to admit the communist employer delegovernments voted with the United States. 

HOW TO UNIFY EUROPE

(Chicago Daily Tribune) Mr. Dulles could do quite a lot to mify Europe if he went at it in the right way. restraining order, to be followed by permanent injunction. If he succeeds in his attempt, it will leave newly appointed Sen. Ernest S. Brown, an "Eisenhower

Republican," in office until Dec. But if he does not succeed, Brown will have to fight to hold his post in the Nov. 2 election.

His Democratic opponent would be Alan Bible, 45-year-old former attorney general and McCarran protege.

Democrats are eager to have the issue decided in an election. They are confident they can win it.
