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Will We Fight?

Well, what are we going to do about the 13 Americans imprisoned in Red China on phony charges that they are spies?

Have we lost that spark that used to be known as national honor to the extent that we are to sit cravenly while these Americans, eleven of them wearing the uniform of the United States, are slapped into a Chinese

What does it take to get us going?
Certainly the Chinese are not going to do a thing about these men unless they are forced to. They knew, in advance, the position they would be in when they took the action and were perfectly willing to go ahead and take that position and to hell with the United States.

The mouthings of Secretary of State J. F. Dulles about exhausting peaceful means of getting these men released from prison are merely that and unless he has information not given to the rest of us, will be blithely ignored by the Red Chinese government.

It seems to us that we have gone a long way down hill from the days when the mantle of the American flag was considered a protection, both for those who were seeking asylum from their own countries and for Americans on legitimate business in other lands. Whether these Americans in question were on "legitimate business" when they placed themselves in the position of being captured is something that might be argued. But of the service men there is no question but that they were there under the direction of the military authority of the United States and it is up to the United States to see that they are given every protection that the nation

"But," you say, "if we go all out it means that we will have to go to war again. And there it is

At least if we go to war to save, or attempt to save, to the lives and rights of these Americans we will know what we are going to war for. And that's a lot more than can be said when we plunged into a war in Korea which we were not allowed to win.

To find the real evil in the situation we need to go back and back to the point where we started on the downward path toward servility and lost our place as the leader in world affairs

The history of it is still fresh in the memories of most us for it started with the recognition of Russia by **F. D. Roosevelt and has grown steadily worse down * through the years as we refused as a government to meet the issues of freedom squarely. These issues we refused to meet both here at home and abroad. Through concerted efforts on the part of Roosevelt and his henchmen we maneuvered ourselves into asking for war in Europe with the "loan" of our destroyers and jockeyed ourselves into forcing Japan to strike the first blow at

We have had one incident after another to indicate that the politicians have just about convinced the American people that to glory in national honor is "isolation-ism" and "nationalism" and that the defense of freedom eris not worth the effort. Realizing that there would be difficulty in obtaining the military services of Americans for the kind of battles that loomed ahead we took another swipe at freedom by conscripting our young men into military service and sending them into wars which had no purpose for Americans. The result of all of these things and more is that, while there apparently is no question but that the Russians think that their country is worth fighting for there seems to be a feeling on the part of politicians in Washington that the American people don't feel that their country is worth fighting for. Such a feeling, we have been told over and over again, is narrow nationalism and we must be international-minded.

We must worry about whether our "friends" in other lands are going to like or not like whatever action is taken in the way of attempting in obtain the release of the imprisoned 13. Maybe England will object — maybe France won't like it - etc., etc.

The whole truth of the matter seems to boil down to what we think is really worthwhile. If our nation (and these 13 Americans are a part of it) is not worth fighting for, then we ought to say so and quit beating about the bush. If we think the lives and honor of these men is sacred then we ought not to flinch from the decision that must be made.

"Nevertheless American Government does, or attempts to do, all these things today. Jefferson to the contrary, notwithstanding. Why? Because you and I and all of us have lost the moral courage that it takes to be free, and along with moral courage we have lost the moral capacity to govern ourselves. Our constitutions, state and federal, were written to restrict and restrain every branch and stem of American Government in the interest of human freedom. The Founding Fathers realized that men are free only as long as the power of their government is strictly limited. They also realized that such strictly limited civil government could endure only so long as the people living under that government willingly assumed the burden and responsibility of governing them-

"Shortly after the Federal Constitution was written, James Madison declared that we had staked the whole future of our political institutions upon the capacity of mankind for self-government. This is to say that our constitutional system would cave in when and we lost our disposition and capacity to govern ourselves. The principles of liberty and of selfgovernment are thus inextrica-bly inter-twined. Only morally strong, self-disciplined and selfsacrificing people can afford the rare luxury of constitutionally limited government, Freedom thus demands self-government, but self-government calls for personal sacrifice and continuous self-restraint, The government that undertakes to provide you with economic security must take your freedom and self-government in


exchange for that security, " give you economic security, government must give you dictatorial regimentation along with it.

Meanwhile, its outstanding indebtedness has mounted from 19 billion to more than two hundred and seventy five billion dollars, Confiscatory taxes on national income and transactions are now helplessly inadequate to meet the expenditures of what the international politicians hail as our first period of peace in twenty years. Last year's deficit was a piddling three billion. Estimated deficit for the current fiscal year is four billion seven hundred million dollars. Mind you, this is Peace-time. If the heralded hot war should break upon us, where, o. where, will the necessary money come from?

"At the present time, and for all the past twenty years except two, the Federal Government has spent more that it has taken in in taxes. If you want to know just how much more, all told, then measure the purchasing power of your present dollar against the dollar of 1939 or 1936. During this period the Federal Government mained in your pockets after your taxes were paid. This is what is known as deficit spending, Did any candidate in this campaign propose to outlaw this larcenous practice? On the contrary, the cry is for more spending, not less-


