

A Chancellor Speaks

People concerned with the problems of education were intensely interested in what Denver Universitys' chancellor, Dr. Chester M. Alter, said on the subject of private education.

'In Europe efforts have been made to make the individual subservient to the state," Chancellor Alter said, And that could happen in America. I am committed to do all that I can to see that it does not happen."

Not wanting to antagonize the public education monopoly Chancellor Alter stressed the importance of both government and private education. But it was obvious from his remarks that government education could take over private education, and that he believes we should embark on an opposite course of increasing private edu-

Dr. Alter said that even in England private institutions of higher learning are losing the private support they used to have. He said that both Oxford and Cambridge universities now derive 65 per cent of their support from grants from government.

"Many people," he said, "do not know this. This tendency is not unrelated to the economic tendencies in

Chancellor Alter's concern, illustrated by his words, "And that could happen in America . . that he has taken a diametrically opposed position to that of the National Education Association and to Dr. James Conant and others who are opposed to private

What the National Education Association wants is a single school system over which they will have sole and undisputed jurisdiction, and unquestioned authority and power, Such a system is what Chancellor Alter of the University of Denver is fighting against.

How do we know that the NEA is opposed to private

At a recent National Education Convention (NEA) in Detroit, Mrs. Eugene Meyer was a featured speaker. Mrs. Meyer was a member of President Truman's Commission on Higher Education.

Mrs. Eugene Meyer is wife of the owner of the Washington Post, which newspaper among other pinkish ideas still believes in the innocence of Alger Hiss.

Mrs. Meyer said at the NEA Convention that she agreed "with the statement of Dr. Conant of Harvard, attend independent schools, the greater the threat to our democratic unity."

Mrs. Meyer was warmly received.

Mrs. Meyer's charge, like Dr. Conant's, is that religious or independent schools are divsive, anachronistic, un-democratic, un-American.

We are thankful for men like Chancellor Alter of the University of Denver who are willing to step up and do battle with the National Education Association and all others who want to increase the monopoly of public education until no competition whatsoever is permitted.

Chancellor Alter has reached the milepost of recognizing the value of competition in education. Perhaps by following this road Chancellor Alter will reach the point of understanding that competition should be increased in even larger doses until finally complete freedom of choice becomes the rule rather than the exception in the field of education.

Money Talks

It has taken a retired professor at Columbia University to offer the analysis that the Ford Foundation, an enterprise commanding half a billion dollars or more and having \$30 million dollars a year in income to parcel out to its pet projects, is an intimidating force upon the educators of the nation. They hesitate to argue with its objectives or its specific projects because it has the money and they all feel that they can use whatever part of it that comes their way.

Dr. Thomas H. Briggs, professor emeritus at Columbia Teachers College, characterized the Ford Foundation as staffed with people not notably committed to the democratic ideal. He said that the foundation was used to advance pet theories which were not demonstratably sound or useful.

The foundation, in general, allocates cash to an educational institution for a specific project of its own choice. The grant does not serve the purpose of the recipient institution, but those of the foundation. It is necessary for the college or university getting the money to assign or recruit a special staff to carry out the job that the foundation wants done. The money would be far more useful if it were granted, with no strings attached, to help the institution receiving it to meet its overhead, grant scholarships, raise the standard of faculty salaries, obtain new professorial talent, or execute deferred projects for which the university itself has not been able to find funds.

But, such is the attraction of money, even if it is merely money appearing and disappearing, that edu-cators cannot restrain themselves from leaping at the handout. The testimony of Dr. Briggs suggests that these gentlemen would better serve their institutions if they banded together in the firm resolve to decline all Ford handouts unless they granted exclusive discretion as to the use of the money.

After all, the foundation was established to avail itself of tax exemption while preserving voting control over the Ford enterprises. That purpose can be achieved even if the administrators of the foundation are dearived of the opportunity of riding their special hobbies at the expense of education in general,

That is as it should be. If there s any moral justification for war, it is the need of safeguarding the life of the community. When the existence of the nation is at stake, the natural inclination of a people is to suspend their claim to rights. Their lives are forfeit in the common cause, and so should be their property. The only practical way for putting the property of the people to the common effort is to confiscate it, and income taxation is the perfect confiscatory instrument. But, since defense of the homeland is in the interests of all. both necessity and equity demand that there should be no discrimnation and no limit: all that is needed should be taken without regard to rights, even as life is conscripted. It is everybody's house that is on fire, and every available water bucket, without regard to ownership, must be taken to put out the conflagration. So, if war is justified, unlimited and unrestrained income taxation can also be justified. The question is: when is war justified?

Every war is fought with current wealth. There is no way of shooting off cannons that have not yet been made, no way of feeding soldiers with the produce of the next generation. The argument that a future generation can be made to pay the costs of a present war is both specious and expended in the struggle are current, not future, labor and materials. We pay as we fight.

The deception that some of the costs may be put on the future is created so as to ease the strain that total confiscation would put on patriotism. To prevent dissatisfaction with the war from getting out of hand, the government takes what it needs, and gives I.O.U.'s (bonds) to the owner. But, this I.O.U. is not payment for the goods taken; it is a claim on future production. So that, the holder of the I.O.U., the grandson of the one whose goods were taken for the war, can demand from other grandsons a share of their production. The bondholder is simply a partner of the tax collector. But how is this payment for much longer it drags along.

It has been argued that if the could not wage war. This may be true; neither could it wage war without soldiers. But if people will not give up their property or risk their lives, then the war is not wanted. If the war is not wanted, why should it be waged? If, instead of resorting to loans, the government should confiscate whatever it needs for the purpose, perhaps a waning patriotism would cause the war to be called

Those who describe bonds as payment for past years are wont to overlook the fact that the published in the newspapers, the bonds, taken as a whole, are never paid up. The bonded debt of a nation has a way of increasing from generation to generation. That is emergency that needs financ ing. and it is most convenient to say that the next generation ought to pay for the benefits it will derive from meeting the present emergency. But every generation conveniently ignores the obligation it has inherited. And so, the national

debt grows. Since all bonds are claims on production, what really happens call it by its right name-counterfeiting; the amount of purchasing power, or money, is increased.

There are several ways by which bonds are monetized, but that is not germane to the present subject; the point is that all bonds add to the fund of money in circulation, and unless the additional money is accompanied by an additional amount of goods in the market, we have inflation. Inflation is simply a greater amount of money bidding for the same amount of goods. The dollar looks like the old dollar, but it buys less. Hence, even the bond buyers are eventually cheated. The dollars they put into the bonds could have bought them more goods than the dollars they earn after the bonds have been issued, or the dollars they get from the government when the bonds mature. It takes a violent wrench of logic to say that we pay for past wars by depreciating the value of the dol-

Government borrows on its ability to tax, because taxes are its only source of revenue, the only security it has to offer the lender. Thanks to its low taxing power, the Lincoln administration had difficulty in disposing an issue of bonds bearing twelve percent interest. That means that its credit was very poor, and it had to resort to confiscation. Its first in-come-tax law called for a flat three percent of net income over \$600 a year; this was quite an exemption in itself, since at that time a man could buy an all-wool suit of clothes for \$6. WASHINGTON, June 10 -UP-Lt. Col. John P. Stapp recently irtled to a new ground speed rec ord of 421 miles an hour on a rock-et . propelled sled in the New Mex-ico desert, the Air Force announced Tuesday night.

de Jean as French high commissioner, and thus he will be in complete command politically as well


