Suspect Grilled in Murder

DALLAS, July 21 — UP — Home Capt. Will Frits said Wednesday that he believes a 23-year-old unemployed laborer, seized at his home Tuesday night, is a good suspect in the murder of a bus driver and the wounding of his wife. The laborer was not charged immediately, but Frits ordered him questioned further Wednesday. The driver was Durward G. Bursby, 36, who was killed with a .22 rifle or pistol Monday night while sleeping in his yard. Frits said his wife was wounded. Her condition worsened Wednesday and physicians now listed it as "poor." The unemployed laborer, who is married, lives in West Dallas. Frits said he believes the laborer is a suspect in the murder of Bursby's son in a laborer's home.

Three Killed In Auto Crash

WEST COLUMBIA, Tex., July 21 — UP — Three men were killed and five other persons were injured, three critically, in a collision between two automobiles on Highway 36 near here Wednesday. Deputy Sheriff Gene Watson said one car crashed a stop sign while crossing the highway and piled into another car carrying workers to the Dow Chemical plant in Freeport. The accident happened at 6:10 a.m. The dead were identified as J. P. McKinnon, 41, a large captain, Pasadena; Bobby G. Wilson, Pasadena; and R. A. Kueck, Needville. Hospitalized in Freeport were Leroy Foytik, 25, Damon; H. R. Judy, Needville; Mrs. J. P. McKinnon, Pasadena; W. F. Gerken, Needville; and F. F. Roberts, Pasadena. Watson said the Pasadena car hurtled on after striking the Needville car and abraded several signboards and two utility poles before it stopped. Kueck died when the Needville car rolled over him.

Bridge 25 Per Cent Complete

The Canadian River bridge, between Pampa and Perryton, is about 25 per cent complete. G. K. Resding, senior resident highway engineer, late this morning said 10 of the 41 "bents," rows of piling, were completed and that work on the structure was continuing at a good pace. The driving of piling, the work on the substructure, is considered the critical part of the job. Once that is done, weather can not stop the work. Boy Freed In Cave-In

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Russ Spy's Favorite Role Is 'Diplomat'

EDITOR'S NOTE: Three Russian spies who were expelled from the United States this year were operating in the guise of "diplomats." The following dispatch discloses that this is a favorite—but by no means the only—disguise of Soviet agents. It also tells some of the other facts that U.S. counter-espionage experts have learned about the operating methods of the Kremlin's "mosses army." By DONALD J. GONZALES
WASHINGTON, July 21 — UP — A Russian spy may adopt almost any disguise from manufacturer to military officer. But the favorite pose—judging from the spies that have been caught in this country—is as a "diplomat." All three of the Russians who have been expelled from the United States this year for "espionage and improper activities" were men who came here under diplomatic passports. Two were military attaches of the Russian embassy here. The third was second secretary of the Soviet delegation to the United Nations in New York. Arming a trained spy with a diplomatic passport and a high-sounding embassy title is one of the easiest ways to get him into this country. But for all its convenience, the diplomatic disguise has one great drawback — it rarely if ever fools U. S. counter-spies who long ago learned to regard all Communist diplomats as potential spies. Watch Secretaries A former high-ranking official who worked on counter-espionage says "you don't have to pay much attention to top Russian diplomats, but keep your eye on those secretaries." The latest official diplomatic register lists 18 first, second or third secretaries at the Soviet embassy here. Thirteen more names are listed as military or other "attaches." Diplomats don't think that all the Russian diplomats or even the major portion of them are spies. But experience has taught the FBI that all of them will bear watching. The Russian diplomat - spy tradition goes back at least to Vasill M. Zhablin, who came to the United States in 1943 as third secretary of the Soviet embassy. On the side, he had code names "Peter" and "Cooper." He left for Moscow in 1944. Years later, a House committee which studied his activities reported that "he had com-

GALVESTON, July 21 — UP — W. L. Moody Jr., 28-year-old financier who is believed one of the 10 richest men in the country, was reported in "critical" condition Wednesday from an attack of pneumonia. Moody was taken early Tuesday to John Sealy hospital, where the administrator, Dr. G. A. W. Curtis, said "anything could happen at Mr. Moody's age." The financier's son-in-law, Rep. Clark W. Thompson (D-Tex.), said Moody became ill Monday night. Moody heads a financial empire which includes the American National Insurance Co., several banks, the National Hotel chain, W. L. Moody Cotton Co. and the W. L. Moody Investment Co., bankers. He also is president of the company publishing the Galveston News and Tribune.

The other day Karen, 13, broke the rule against staying at friends' houses without telephoning home her whereabouts. She came home, nearly an hour late for supper.

When she explained that she'd forgotten to call because she'd become so interested in a television program at Jenny's house, her mother said, "That's understandable. You must be hungry. I've left your meat and vegetables on the kitchen table for you to heat up."

When Karen began to clutter her dishes in the sink, her mother went to the kitchen to dry them for her. As she took her towel from the rack, she said, "Breaking the rule for telephoning home will cost you 50 cents, Karen. You'll have to get by on a quarter this week."

Karen looked at her, stricken. "Oh, no, please no, Mother!" she wailed. "The Bijou is reviving the wonderful movie Jimmy and I missed last winter! How can I do without to see it tomorrow if you don't pay me my whole allowance?"

"I will lend you 50 cents until next week," her mother said.

Karen sank down on the kitchen stool. "Go on, you scared me!" she said. "Of course I'll pay you next week. But what a one you are then. First you dock me 50 cents and then you lend it back to me."

"Funny? Why funny?" asked her mother. "There's nothing funny about having to respect rules and love people at the same time. We all have to do it all the time. As a person who has to teach you to obey rules, I have to dock you 50 cents. But as a person who understands that a certain movie is important to you, I lend you 50 cents."

Perhaps the idea of discipline will seem a little soft-headed to readers of this column. It isn't really.

It is based upon the Christian principle of balancing our renderings to Caesar with renderings to God.

This is not a soft-headed principle, but one that secures our self-respect. So I hope that parents will bring fresh thinking to it.

Its philosophy that training in obedience to rules be tempered by our loyalty to love can revolutionize our discipline of children.

Pretty often, we feel the consequences of such action because we ourselves did not experience kind-ness when we were being punished.

So, in this theoretical spot, we have to take Jesus' word on faith. And walk out trustfully to this new idea, despite our second-hand fears of appearing weak, placative and uncertain to the child.

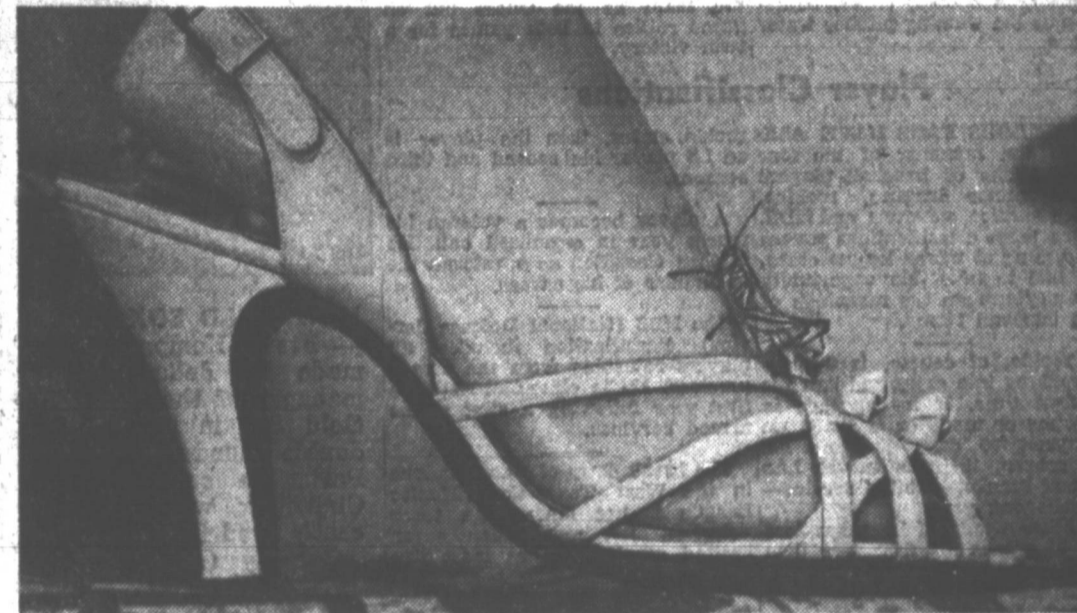

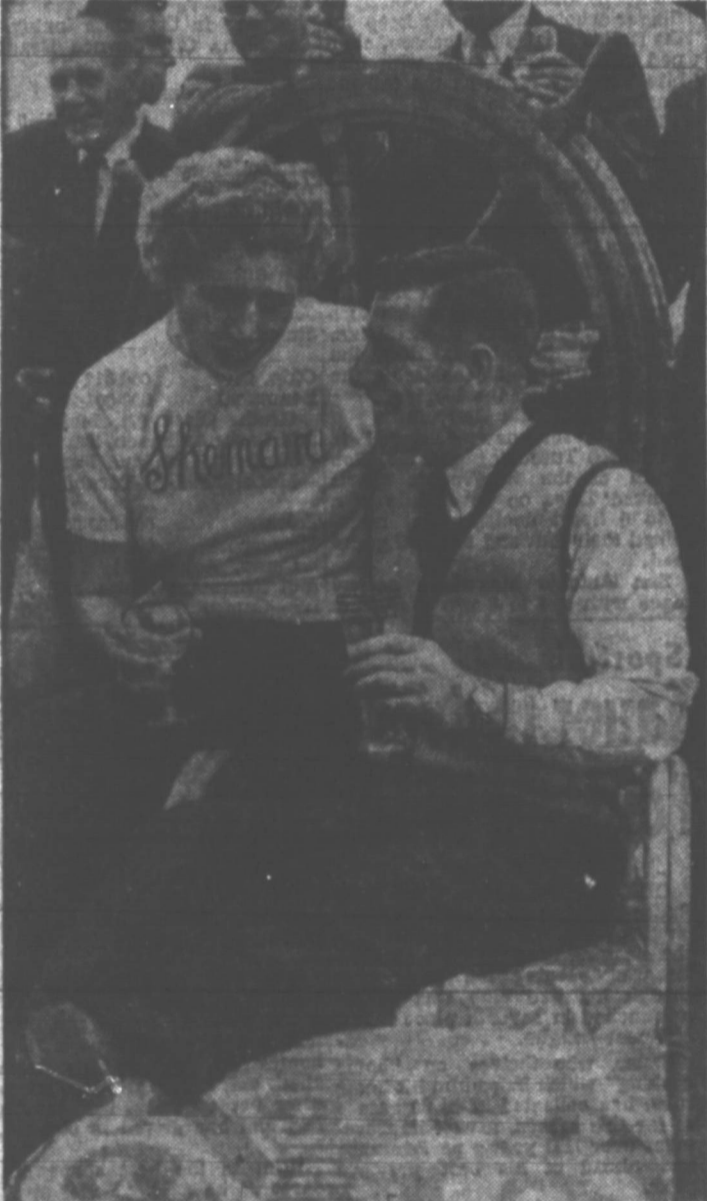

AF Trainees In Hot Water
DENVER, July 21—UP—Police, exasperated because Lowry Air Force Base authorities failed to curb the rowdy spirits of young trainees, said Wednesday that 46 servicemen will be tried in municipal court for trying to start a brawl in the center of town.

Forty-four Lowry airmen and two soldiers stationed at Fitzsimons Army Hospital here were collared Monday night after they had massed in opposing factions and marched toward one another near the statehouse. A riot squad of 20 police shook down the servicemen and found four knives, two glass bottles and a billy club.

Officers estimated that about 50 other servicemen eluded the cordon they threw around the statehouse lawn and the adjacent civic center. Most were dressed in jeans and T-shirts, and several witnesses said they saw guns.

The two gangs advanced for a king-sized brawl.

Opportunity provided to make new friends among business and professional men was cited by the Rev. Woodrow W. Adcock, pastor of the First Methodist Church, as one of the chief reasons a person should be a member of a service club as he spoke at the luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club today in the Palm Room of City Hall.

Speaking on "Why I Am a Service Club Member," Rev. Adcock said it gives a man an opportunity to mingle with other men and, many times, in talking with these new friends he picks up new ideas that will benefit him in his business as well as in his personal life.

"Another distinct advantage of belonging to a service club is the service a man is able to render his community," the speaker stated. "A service club member is able to render a greater service to his town by joining with others."

He gave several examples of various works being performed by, not only the Pampa club, but others throughout the nation.

Promotion of goodwill and understanding among the peoples of the world is another aim of service clubs, he declared.

Supplement Radar
A closely guarded development of aerial radar stations is under way on a top-priority basis at McClellan Air Force Base where the USAF is organizing several squadrons of radar planes to patrol both West and East coasts 24 hours a day.

The Air Force Early Warning and Control Division (AEW) has another mission, according to its commander, Col. Kenneth H. Gibson.

"What we're trying to do is supplement fixed radar defenses," Gibson said. "Radar in concrete is not enough in the jet age."

"We must assume the enemy knows where our ground radar posts are," he added. "And we must also assume they know the best ways to avoid them."

"We Have Mobility"
"But with our radar planes, we have mobility. We can shift them around at 300 miles an hour, and the enemy can't know where they are."

It is obvious, too, that the Air Force believes the radar planes will give Gen. Curtis Lemay's Strategic Air Command (SAC) atomic bombers an earlier upshot of the enemy assault. SAC thus would gain precious time to disperse its bombers from target areas or launch a speedy retaliatory blow from SAC bases scattered all over the world.

Travel Now, Pay Later Just One Travel Lure

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Rail, air, bus lines and hotels are going all out this year with reduced rates and other extras — including installment plan travel — to woo the modest-budgeted summer vacationer. And they are looking for a boom season which may top anything they ever experienced.

Pan American Airways, for example, recently introduced a "Pay Later Plan" — 10 per cent down and up to 20 months to pay the balance — to bring international air travel within reach of the average man. Sample round-trip from New York: A two-week tour of London, Paris, Rome and the Riviera for \$52 down and 12 monthly payments of \$5.97.

Scandinavian Airlines also has an "on-the-cuff" arrangement for European vacations that even includes cash for shopping. It features a "Signature Travel Plan" with no deposit, no down payment and 24 months to pay. Scandinavian says your signature alone is enough for the ticket — if your credit is good.

TWA World Airlines is prepared to arrange anything from a student seminar to Geneva to a tiger hunt in India with sky tourist flights. TWA officials say Spain and Portugal are among the best travel buys in Europe right now because of the dollar exchange in those countries.

One thing that is giving travel agencies and carriers a shot in the arm is the reduction of federal tax transportation to 10 per cent. Right now most airlines are enjoying a 23 per cent increase in passenger traffic over 1953, and they are anxious to see the travel boom continue through the summer months.

For instance, National Airlines is offering half-fare family plans between New York, Miami and Cuba on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays, as do many domestic lines. Eastern Airlines has long featured reduced rate night air coach flights to Florida points with combination "package" vacations at palatial resort hotels.

Resort Airlines has reduced the prices of winter flights from New York to the Caribbean area up to 40 per cent, and the new rates are approximately 15 per cent under last summer's prices.

These all-expense flying house-party air cruises include hotels, meals and sightseeing. Resort calls it "flightseeing" around the islands, and plugs the fact that lower altitudes and leisurely schedules mean more to see.

Since hotels and their facilities are usually the basic attraction for the vacationer, inn-keepers around the country have been sending out attractive lures for weeks now to entice the summer holiday throngs. Swank, ocean-front establishments at Miami Beach have already slashed winter rates, and many of them are throwing in meals and entertainment with the day's lodging.

In Washington, D. C., a tourist mecca the year-round, the Willard Hotel has a family plan that features no charge for children under 14 when they occupy the same accommodations with their parents. The Sheddham has a similar plan. During July and August, the



Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago offers a \$10-a-day special for room, breakfast and a special daily attracting such as a reserved seat

for Cicarrans or a major league baseball game.
The nation's railroads also have some choice travel buys for vacation bargain hunters. The railroads serving New York City recently established summer rate schedules for families who want to come to New York from any point in the U.S., either in class or coach.

Sample round-trip fare for a wife and three children aged 10 and four years offered by Pennsylvania Railroad: first class passage (berth extra) from St. Louis \$209.25 — a saving of \$15. Western railroads like the Santa Fe, Union Pacific, Burlington and Northern Pacific also feature family plan fares and other extras such as scenic tours. The Seaboard Airline Railroad and Atlantic Coast Line are plugging "package vacations" to Florida the "lowest fares ever."

"We don't have summer rates because our fares are already at lowest possible," says an official of the nation-wide Greyhound Lines. "However, bus travelers can save 10 per cent with a round-trip ticket. And our weekend excursions offer sharply reduced fares for the fellow with the short vacation in mind. We're looking for a booming travel business this summer."

So is everyone else in the business.

 Rev. Brooks used business and politics as examples of areas of activities where persons do enter the "arena of life" and sometimes come out dirtied. The latter example drew laughs from JayCees as Bill Waters, candidate for district attorney, and Don Cain, candidate for county attorney, were in the audience.
 One danger of getting into the "arena of life," the vicar felt, is that there can be too much aggressiveness, "you can go right through the problem without realizing it." That happens, he said, when a car salesman becomes so overzealous the potential customer is run off.
 Quoting George Fox, founder of the Quaker faith, Rev. Brooks said man should be "straight as a tree and pure as a bell." Investigate business and politics, he said, and "take what is worthy and reject what is unworthy."
 "Then you'll be well on the road toward being a good person in a dirty world and I don't mean that in the 'goody-goody' sense."

The Record Shop: You've heard about the kid who didn't want to take piano lessons but would rather be outside playing tennis or something? Well, meet the kid who sneaked away from the tennis court to take piano lessons on the sly. His name is Merv Griffin, and now he sings.
 Griffin is the Columbia record star who is currently pinch-hitting for Jane Froman over CBS-TV. He's a good-looking youngster with a pleasant voice and pleasant manner. Quite a welcome addition to show business, but once upon a cross-court lob it looked like he wouldn't make it.
 "My father is now 53," Merv said, "and he's a tennis bug. He's a stock-broker in California and he plays tennis every day — I can't take a game from him. Nobody in the family was in show business, so I had to take piano lessons without his knowing it. He used to say, 'No blankety-blank kid of mine is going to play the piano — he's going to play tennis.'
 "Then one day there was a surprise party for him and I played 'Tea for Two.' You should have seen the proud look in his eyes. I started doing radio shows in San Francisco — pretty soon I was doing 11 shows a week and making about \$1100 a week. That was more money than he made and he couldn't believe it. A&M Students Reinstated

 He said all of the students would be re-admitted on disciplinary probation.

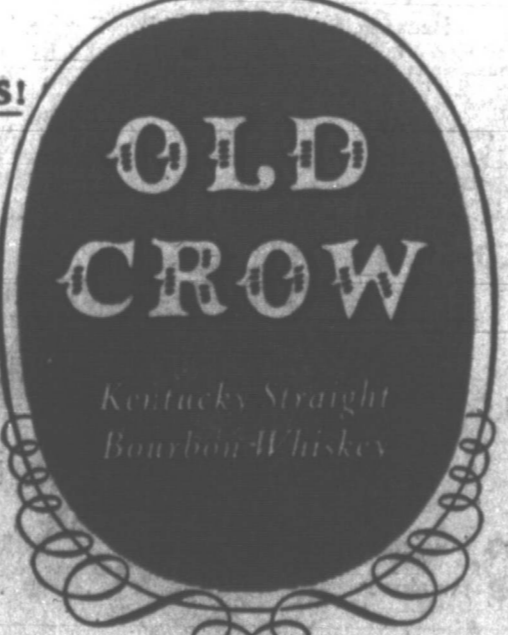
