

### Frozen Purees To Be On The Market Soon

You'll soon be able to buy fro-zen orange and lemon purees as fresh-flavored fruit bases for many delectable foods, such as pastries, jams, jellies, marmalades, sundae oppings and fruit ades.

These two new purees, developed by U. S. Department of Agricul-ture's Research Service, are already in commercial production. In making the purees, the fresh fruit is first crushed. Then it's reduced to puree consistency by moving it through a screening device that keeps out most of the air. Dry sugar is added then the product is canned and frozen. This method gives a yield of 50 to 60 per cent of the whole fruit.

While these new foods may be a boon to homemakers, they have a distinctive advantage for growers. For instance, some fruits are sound and of good quality but they're unsuitable for the fresh market besizes. This makes no difference when they're made into purees.

### Fiscal Policy

For a good many years this nation was "on the gold standard" and now we are "off the gold standard." These are two phrases used in connection with fiscal policy that to most of us are phrases and nothing more.

But if you had in your pocket a dollar bill that would only buy 10 cents worth of food and this came in large part as the result of failure to maintain a gold coin standard, the two phrases take on new meaning for those doing the buying.

Right now, officials of the Gold Standard League say that 10 cents may be an optimistic estimate of the future purchase value of our dollar. Unless we stop continuous deficit spending inflation will make worthless scraps of paper out of our life insurance, pensions, savings and bonds.

Readers of this column in 1942 and 1952 will recall that we conducted a check of what happens under Inflation and discovered this: that the war bonds bought by Gray County residents during 1942, for all their guarantee by the federal government, cost the buyers money. Based on a check of newspaper advertisements of food prices in 1942 and 1952, it was discovered that \$18.75 worth of food (the price paid for a small bond) in 1942 was considerably more than \$25 worth of food

While it was true that the government lived up to its pledge to pay the holders of bonds \$25 for every \$18.75 invested, it was equally true that the government-induced inflation had so cheapened the value of the dollar that buyers of bonds actually lost money on

It may be that our dollar will go like the French franc which has lost over 99 per cent of its value in 40 years. Both France and the United States have engaged in deficit spending. Both have indirectly manufactured money to pay their debts. It is hardly necessary to add that both countries have denied their citizens the protection of a gold redeemable currency.

Before the dollar was divorced from gold in 1933, deficit spending was the exception. Since then it has become the rule with the budget being balanced but twice in 21 years. And under actual practice it is virtually impossible for a government on a gold coin standard to inflate its people to the point that it can rob them as happened here when we left the gold stand-

Philip M. McKenna, president of the Gold Standard League, puts it this way:

We are aware that, wittingly or unwittingly, on March 6, 1933, the clock was turned back to the bad days two or more centuries ago when kings or dictatorships maintained that it was their exclusive prerogative to seize the money of the people and to reissue coins of less value, or sometimes only paper, as their whims dictated. The American people who generally could not conceive that such violence to principles of honesty could have been contemplated by serious men in any administration, did not advance prices immediately in proportion to the price of gold in 1933 and 1934. The newsboy who offered you a paper on January 20, 1934, bearing the headline 'Dollar Devalued to 59.6 Cents' did not expect you to pay five cents instead of three cents for the paper that day, It took 13 years for the full inflationary effect of the devaluation to take place, much too slow for short run needs of an administration seek-

ing a quick shot in the arm.
"We have also become aware that bad money does not mean good times, that a superabundance of credit at low interest rates does not necessarily cause activity In business and employment. Under the money and credit management upon that theory for five years we had 10,000,000 unemployed in 1938 and a 26 per cent decline in physical production in a one-year period. Only the harsh remedy of war obscured the failure of that attempt to manage the credit system without a redeemable currency. The red ink of deficit spending was only a prelude to the sacrifice of red blood in war. The first recourse of a dictator is inflation, all smiles to everyone. As that trick wears out it may be replaced by "emerg-

In the former article, Congress man Burdick had pointed out how the United Nations Charter was being used to override our Constituion by treaty. He continues:

"The next assault on the Constiyet been presented to the Senate for ratification. The United Nations had amended its first draft several times, and because of the rising tide of objection to what it is doing and planning to do, the latest draft has not come before the

"The subtle and fraudulent work of the United Nations in trying to prepare the people of the United States for the approval of this un-American document ought in itself to condemn its further consideration by the people and their lead-

"To prove to you that its procedure was fraudulent and totally dishonest, I wish to clearly state that the United Nations put out a Declaration of Human Rights which, upon its face was not objectionable. This declaration was propagandized by the spreading of millions of copies among church people, in the common schools, and in the higher institutions of learning. Every civic organization was also the object of this avalanche of propaganda.

"There was a cunningly designed purpose in this. It was necessary to prepare the people for the advent of the Covenant of Human Rights. When the propagandists thought the ground work had been sufficiently laid, the real human rights documents appeared. It was and still is called the Covenant of Human Rights, but it is entirely different from the propagandized Declaration of Human Rights. Here in this Covenant of Human Rights the United Nations, among other things, undertakes to do three important things all of which threaten the Constitution of the United States. It has rewritten what is meant by free speech, a free press, and free religion. The Constitution is not in doubt in defining these three rundamental attributes of a free government. Here is what it

'Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of reiigion, or prohibiting the free exercise therof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of griev-

"If the provisions of the document called the Covenant of Human Rights are adopted by the Senate please ask yourselves what has become of these precious constitutional rights. Here is what the covenant says about them:

John L. also charges that TVA violates the Walsh-Healey Act, which requires payment of union in Radio City on the Sixth Avenue or prevailing wages on all Gov-ernment work in excess of \$10,600. Although TVA compiles with the statute with respect to its own em-ployees, it buys coal from mines which do not pay Walsh-Healey rates. Since TVA is a Federal enterprise, Lewis insists that its purchases must be governed by this that concern the world. You might statute. COMMUNISM UNDERGROUND?

MASKED IDENTITY: In recent months we have heard a great deal about the Communist Party in this country "going underground." We have even been told that there are so few Communists here, and that the executive department of our government has them so well in hand, they "really can't do us very much harm" - not nearly enough harm to justify the methods necessary to root them out,

It is true that the Communist Party is masking its identity through clever brainwashing techniques and propaganda machines, and through infiltration into respectable American organizations and institutions. But the actual work for the Communist cause is going on well above ground, conducted largely by people outside the Party, many of whom have not the faintest idea of what they are doing.

Communist work is going on so well, indeed, that if the present trend continues it will be the pro-American individuals and groups who will be forced underground. The situation has already reached the point where many patriotic people are afraid to take a public' stand for the United States and its Constitution. They know that such action may subject them to censure and ridicule - not just from the Communist Party and its fronts, but from the anti-anti-Communists high in our government, our press, our educational system, and even some of our churches. They know too well the list of epithets that will be hurled at them — "crackpots, s u p e r-patriots, salf - appointed guardians of our security, hysterical fana tics," to mention only a few.
