

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Why Winnie Wants To Talk To Ike

The fact that ailing, 75-year-old Sir Winston Churchill feels it is vital that he fly across the Atlantic for a week-end talk with President Eisenhower is a measure of the ominous developments in the free world's fight against world-wide expansion of communism. It is also a measure of the gravity of the rising tensions between Great Britain and the U.S. There has been an ever-widening split between the two great allies over how to combat the Reds in the Far East. A realization of the need to heal the breach and harmonize the two nations' conflicting policies is what inspires Britain's prime minister to seek the Washington meeting. Also critical is the European defense problem. With the confusion in the French government, bringing possible official "neutrality" into the picture, Churchill fears there is almost no hope that France will ratify the long-pending plan for a European army as a shield against the Far East.

HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — Behind the scenes "Hollywood's New Look" — BIG motion pictures of quality — has cut film production in half, but another 50 per cent cut is due within two years.

Samuel Goldwyn tossed his starting prediction at me in an exclusive interview in which he also prophesied that HOLLYWOOD eventually will produce hour and two-hour telefilms, financed either by multiple sponsors of pay-as-you see-TV.

The new Goldwyn standard for Hollywood: "Hollywood no longer is in the picture business grinding out product. We're in show business now and only hits can make money."

"With a TV set in every home, Hollywood can't lure people to theaters. We've got to DRAG them out with big and great movies. The fewer pictures Hollywood makes the better chance it has to make money."

"Two years from now Hollywood will be making 50 per cent fewer movies than it's making today. But they'll be better. There can be profits in hour and two-hour telefilms. The half-hour shows can't last. You can't do anything in 30 minutes."

Goldwyn's next film in the "drag-em-out of their homes" class? His first movie in three years, the film version of the Broadway hit, "Guys and Dolls," for which he's writing a \$1,000,000 check, plus a 10 per cent of the gross bonus.

There's a worry line on Glenn Ford's shoulder. His contract to finish "Americano," following a lawsuit threat, looks likely to cost him the biggest role of his career in Columbia's "Joseph and His Brothers."

Wanda Hendrix chides "Now, now!" when asked about the date of her marriage to Bob Stack's brother, Jim. In the next breath she talks about plans for live TV shows in New York.

Judy Holiday is a buritis sufferer in the arm and shoulder region, but the camera grinding on "Phit" hasn't been stopped for a minute.

Colleague Scores 'Splashing Pastors'

CUSHING, Okla., June 25—UP—Cushing's "splashing pastors" swam in early morning privacy here this week, mixing the "Lord's work" with the Australian crawl, but some of the other brethren tossed cold water on the affair.

Rev. Carroll Fairbanks, pastor of the First Christian Church, was outwardly opposed to the private swimming for ministers at the local pool.

"I may not look like a Johnny Weissmuller in a pair of bathing trunks," he said, "but when I go swimming it will be during the regular pool hours along with everybody else. I don't think I should have any more privileges than any members of my congregation."

Set "Pastor's Hour" City commissioners last week set Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 7 to 8 a.m. as the "pastor's hour" at memorial swimming pool after some clergymen said they feared swimming in public would arouse criticism.

Rev. Lewis R. Rogers, Presbyterian minister who is president of the Ministerial Alliance, said the request did not come from the alliance.

Commissioners said only that the request was made by "several local ministers." Officials announced there would be no charge for ministers.

Rev. W. Randall Ball, pastor of the Assembly of God Church, admitted he was an advocate of the plan.

"Let them stew and get hot about it, but I'm going to stay cool in the pool," quipped the 21-year-old minister who is an expert swimmer.

Ball said "upholding the dignity of the clergy" was not the only motive for the special swimming hour. He described it as a social period where preachers can get together and relax and talk over church affairs.

"Lord's Work Doesn't Stop" "The Lord's work doesn't stop just because we meet for an early morning swim," he added.

Jerry Wisdom, manager of the pool, said at least three ministers showed up at Tuesday's first session. There are more than 25 ministers in Cushing.

Rev. Russell West, pastor of the Pentecostal Holiness Church and secretary of the ministerial alliance, said he had telephoned every city preacher "inviting him to go swimming."

Mr. West said he and Rev. Danny T. Sheaffer, Oklahoma City evangelist here for a revival, swam Tuesday morning. "The water was mighty refreshing," he said.

Last week the wife of one Cushing minister wrote the Cushing Daily Citizen ribbing clergymen for their reluctance to swim in public.

Korean Anniversary No Celebration For Kin Of 22 Still 'Missing' In Red Hands

Twenty-two U.S. airmen have apparently become helpless pawns in the vicious game of international politics being played by the Communists.

Out of the 137,000 Korean casualties, they're the only ones still considered "missing." The rest in that group will be officially declared "dead" or "presumed dead" by the anniversary of the cease-fire.

Thus, four years after the start of the Korean war on June 25, these 22 men still are listed as missing in the belief that Uncle Sam has forgotten them — will be the only ones not celebrating the first peaceful observance of that tragic day.

The U.S. State Department says: "The exact nature of the diplomatic steps to get the men freed cannot be revealed."

"God willing, we feel that Lyle will some day get home," Mrs. Cameron says.

The remaining four on the "missing" list are Navy pilots whose cases are similar to those of the AF jet pilots. The evidence they all landed safely behind enemy lines. There are further bits of information from returned POWs adding to the belief that they are alive and held in Manchuria.

Recently at Geneva, Huang Hai, a Chinese Communist press officer, was quizzed in a press conference about the status of the 22 missing men. He admitted they held Jet Ace Harold Fischer and countered with the claim that it was no worse than the 5000 Chinese students in the U.S. who were not being permitted to return to their homes in China.

Dr. 'D' Was Not Official Opposed To Building H-Bomb

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There has been a change in the attitude of Advanced Studies at Princeton, said Dr. Oppenheimer in his report.

Later in 1947, the sale of radioactive isotopes to research laboratories in friendly foreign countries was approved by a four-to-two vote of AEC. Admiral Strauss and the dissenting vote, Dr. Oppenheimer, then chairman of AEC's general advisory committee, favored it.

Two years later this decision was rescinded by the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy. Both Admiral Strauss and Dr. Oppenheimer testified. Dr. Oppenheimer's position was that the country's security was not endangered by the AEC policy.

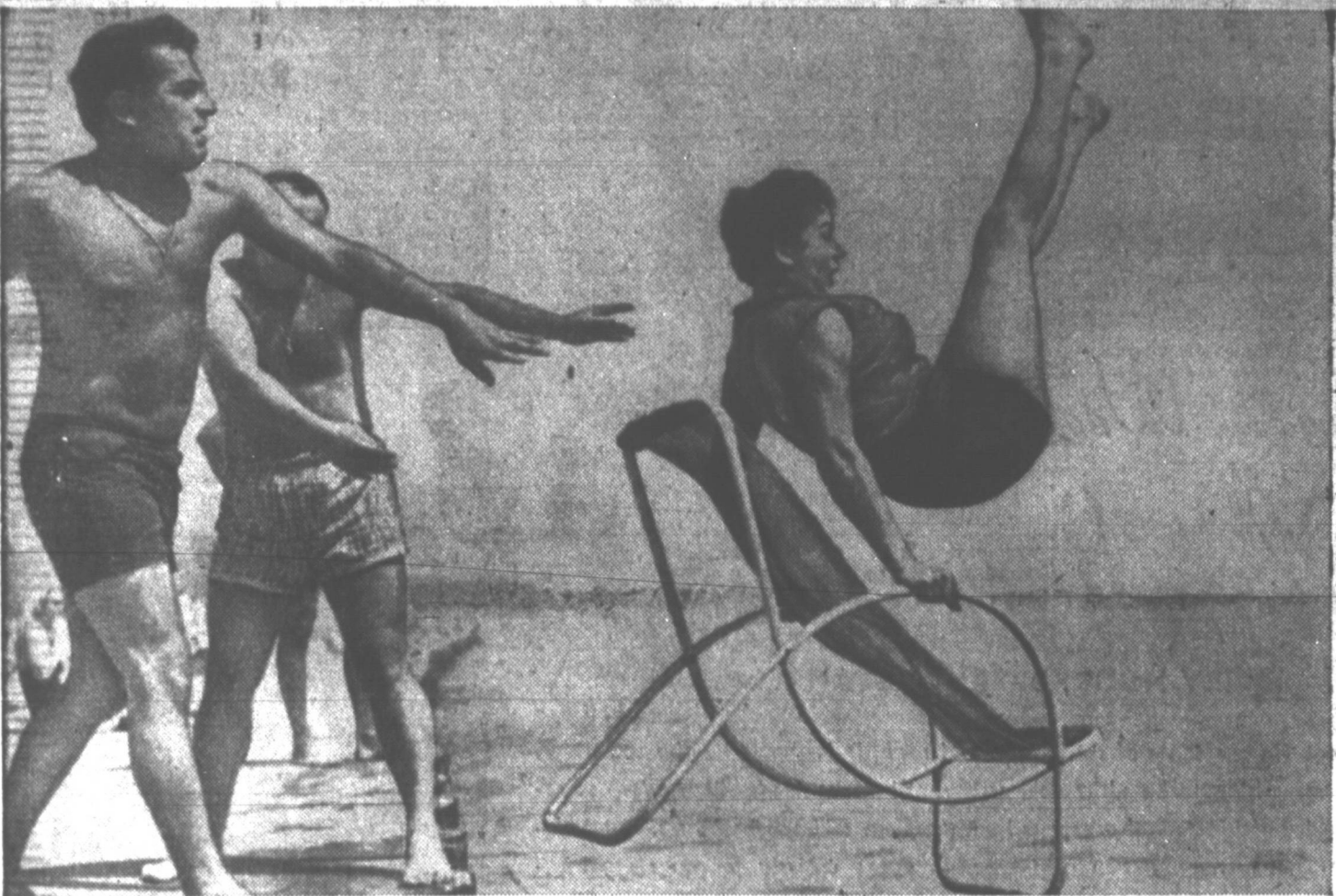

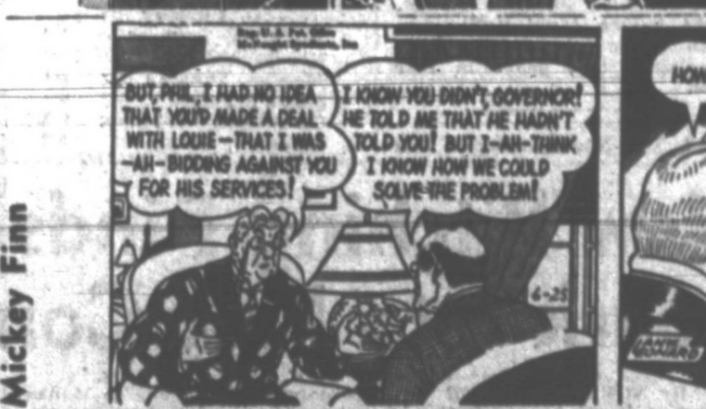

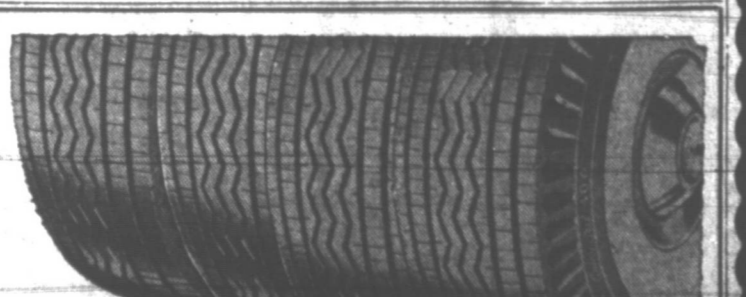
