

NEW YORK — Three famous comrades-in-arms of World War II, one of whom is now President of the United States, are serving together in peace time as leaders of the United Defense Fund—an organization financing the activities of USO and four other defense-related agencies.

The three generals, Dwight Eisenhower, Omar Bradley and "Jimmy" Doolittle, were among the principal speakers at UDF's recent leadership mobilization meeting in Washington, D.C., attended by more than 500 volunteer leaders of UDF, Community Chests and United Funds throughout the country.

At the opening session, held in the Rose Garden at the White House, President Eisenhower, UDF's honorary chairman, declared that "the big thing that the United Defense Fund does is to keep the soldier abroad understanding that he is part of America, no matter where he comes from, what may be his city, what may be his race, or his rewhat may be his race or his re-ligion—he still thinks, through this kind of effort, primarily of America, and of himself as an American.

"How do you decide what to his partner was going to make

"How do you decide what to discard in suction pinochie," asks a California reader. "If you decide to discard an ace or a trump, is it necessary to tell your opponents that you have done so?".

We'll answer the second question first because it is much shorter. There is no rule that compele you to announce what you have discarded. It is seldom wise to discard a trump, but if you decide to do so you may go ahead and let the opponents guess what you have done.

If you have no long side suit, the player with long trumps will get an assortment of aces and tens from his partner on the trump tricks that he wins.

Once you decide to save the ten of hearts, your problem is simplified. You must discard the two clubs and one other card. The ten of diamonds is the obvious choice as your third discard.

dred the correct discard is from a short suit. Your object is to avoid losing any tricks at all in a particular suit.

For example, suppose you have the following hand: Spades A-10-K-Q-J-9, Hearts A-10-K-Q-9. Diamonds A-10-J-9, Clubs A-Q-Q. The bid is 430, and you meld the flush, the pinochle and aces, for a total of 300 points. You need 130 points in cards, Which three cards should you discard?

If you needed only 100 points in cards, you would discard both of the red tens and the nine of diamonds. This would start you off with 20 points and a pretty short diamond holding.



Dan Thornton.

erosion conference sponsored by the National Association of Soit Conservation Districts, that was at-tended by more than 300 delegates from Texas, New Mexico, Oklaho-ma, Kansas, Nebraska and Colora-

The controversial proposal was that farmers who ruin land should be cut off from all government subsidies. In place of it, the delegates voted in favor of a new kind of record—combining land use records with production histories to form the basis for acreage allotments and price support subsidies.

Major objectives of Thornton's proposal that were acceptable included more education for farmers on the aconomic use of acreage to conform with proper land use, reconform with proper land use, re-vision of conservation district laws, and increased research on the program, as well as more approp

tions for it.

Among those who spoke out against economic penalties was New Mexico State Sen. Ike Morgan of Portales, who said it would "ruin farmers who are eking out an existence on the only land they can afford." Noel McDade of Clay-ton, N.M., said it was a "victous"

"No benefits can be derived from enforced regulations," said Zook Thomas of Wellington, Tex. Earlier, Assistant Agriculture Secretary Ross Rizley a former Okishoma congressman, told the meeting "the time has come when farmers and ranchers must balance quick profit against long-time survival."

"Too often, the lure of \$2 wheat has prevented the farmer from exercising proper soil conservation methods, Rizley said.

Waters S. Davis Jr., League City, Tex., president of the sponsoring association, said a recent survey showed 30 per cent of the Great Plains area had been damaged by wind erosion.

"These conditions can't contin-ue," Davis said, "If they do, there's a desert in the making," "Gov, Allan Shivers of Texas told the conference that it was time soil conservationists began asking the farmers themselves just what was needed and wanted. Adequate Moisture Helps

Shivers pointed out that adequate moisture is a big help in any soil program. He said he attended a esidential drouth conference in Amarillo a year ago, and the region had had only 2.01 inches of rain by the time in 1953.

More than that amount of rain

has fallen already this month in the Amarillo area, Shivers said, and what looked like a poor wheat crop has been turned into a \$35

Radford Asks Security Pact In Asia

LOS ANGELES, June 17 -UP-Adm. Arthur Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Thursday urged countries with vital interests in Southwest Asia to form a security pact to halt the spread of com-munium in that part of the world.

Adm. Radford, speaking at the first session of the national conveninal session of the national conven-tion of the American Red Cross Wednesday night, decried any pol-icy of "passively" accepting the Communist threat in Southeast Asia and said it was time for pos-titive collective actions,

He did not advocate directly that the United States should offer military aid in Southeast Asia to stem communism, but said "a Commu-nist Southeast Asia would be a threat to many."

The admiral scoffed at Red China's claim that it is seeking an "Asia for Asiatica," saying it ac-tually seeks a "Red Asia for Asiatic Reds" as part of a long-term Communist dream of "one big Red world."

Southeast Asia is of special strategic importance because it is astride the best sea and air routes between the Pacific and South Asia and is the gateway to South Asia and Indonesia, he said,
Communist control of that area, he added, would have "repercussions on situations in other parts of the world, including Europe, almost beyond calculation."



You may be among the many who think the bow and arrow went out with Robin Hood and the American Indian. If you do, you're in for a surprise, because in the Pampa area are 35 "Robin Hoods. Furthermore they can shoot as wellas the legendary archer from Sherwood. The only difference is that they use more modern equipment.

The 35 are members of the Top o' Texas Bowmen, a fairly recent addition to the sports that Pampans are enjoying this sum-mer. Organized a few months ago, the club is already a recognized member of the National Field Archery association.

On their range one mile southwest of Bowers City, the archers loose their arrows at all sorts of fixed targets. For safety's sake as well as to preserve their arrows, the targets are backed with sandbags, which stop the arrow with-out injuring the feather fletching.

Club officers are R. R. Field, president; Bill Rice, vice president; and Jimmy Carter, secretary. Dues in the bow-benders are only fifty cents a month. Meetings are held in the Boy Scout building at Bowers City every second Thursday of each month

"Anyone interested in archery is more than welcome to join us," says Field. "If they don't already know how to shoot, we'll teach them everything we know free. We'd be pleased to lend our own equipment to beginners who want o learn the sport."

Classes of bowmen are novice or beginner, archer, expert class "B" and expert class "A."

"Our group is scattered all over the four classes. We're not all experts by any means. New members would fit right into our club," Field continued.

Auto Heads Discuss New Body Plant

To Emphasize Safety Features

Packard lans to emphasize safety as well as design features in its bodies to further strengthen its position in the prestige car field. The move returns Packard to making its own bodies for the first time since 1941.

Packard is taking over the facility, known as the Briggs-Conner plant, from Chrysler Corporation under a five-year lease agreement with an option to purchase. One of the most modern of its kind, the plant occupies a M-acre tract and contains 760,000 square feet of manufacturing space.

Packard's decision to build its own bodies is the second step in the firm's manufacturing modernization program. Earlier this year the company announced plans to install its manufacture of engines, automatic transmissions and axies into a new multi-million-dollar plant at Utica, Michigan, just outside Detroit. This plant is scheduled to be ready for production operation by the end of the year. Nance said acquisition of the Briggs-Conner plant by Packard for manufacture of its own bodies was directly related to the company's long-range program "to develop new facilities and products in keeping with plans to confine the marketing of our cars to the medium and upper price ranges in the quality car field."

Well, If the Bureau is the "new" Bureau, it must be a change for the better. The old one was a real heller. Whether the 160-acre limitation does or does not have to apply to every Bureau project, remains to be seen; but it's our guess that the fat, heavy hand of the lender will always be firm on the throat of every debtor to a prestamos-dinero outfit.

Perhaps the Bureau is less repugnant than it once was; but socialism is never pleasant, never fair, never honest. Nobody is happy under socialism, ever.

Root Of All Evil

INSTALLMENT FOURTEEN One of the arguments which nelped to sell social security is that the "contributor" will not be dependent on his children for a livelihood when he can no longer work. Let's see if that is true. We must keep in mind that taxes are part of production; they are levied on what is being produced currently, not in the past. The payments to the nonproductive aged therefore come from what the government collects from those who are producing, their children. The government cannot get the money from anybody else. So that, in effect, the children are supporting their parents, collectively and without love.

The swindle is further compounded by the promise of something-for-nothing. The worker is told that his employer, the "exploiter," pays part of the premium, and is in effect compelled to make a contribution to old-age benefits. The fact, is, as every schoolboy should know, that the employer must include in his expenses what he is compelled to 'contribute.' This expense shows up in the price of his goods, and the wage earner, as consumer, actually pays it. There is a similarity in this scheme with the shell game at the county fair.

The more we look into this offspring of the Sixteenth Amendment the more we are astounded by its fraudulent character. Take the matter of the bonds in the reserve fund. The government can issue money against them-that is, it can "buy" them with printed money when it needs money to pay old-age benefits; that is part of the law. Or, if the government sells the bonds to private persons, or to the banks, the buyers can borrow against them. In either case, new money comes into the market, lowering the volume of all the money in existence. That is inflation. Now, the money taken from the worker's pay envelope is worth more, will buy more goods, than the money he will get when he is old, simply because these bonds are in existence. This social-security scheme was started in 1937. One does not have to be an economist to know that in 1937 the dollar bought more bread and shoes than it does in 1934. The man who in 1954 hegins drawing old-age benefits gets dollars that will feich him less of the things ne needs than the dollars he was compelled to "contribute" in 1937 and during the

years that followed. to reach fifty billions of dollars ofore the interest on the bonds will be enough to pay the stipulated benefits to all who are entitled to it. That is, if the stipulated benefits are not increased. However, for political reasons there have been changes in both the benetits and the number of people who have been forced into the scheme. The "premiums" have also been raised. These changes have been made under the name of "insurance," but the plain fact is that the government made them in order to increase its spendable funds. It wanted more taxes, and it dipped further into the pay envelope; that is the real purpose of the social-security laws; (Initially, the "social security" tax was I percent of all taxable wages up to \$3,000 per annum, paid by both employer and employee. In 1951, the lax was extended to wages of 35,600. In 1951, also, "self-employed" persons were pulled in; now they too must pay for "social security," ance" or not, and the rate, which was set at 214 percent in 1951, rises each year until it reaches the maximum of 4% percent in 1970. The rates on employer and employee at a rise from the initial rate of 1 percent to the 1970 limit of 314 percent.)

At this writing, the fictitious reserve fund has accumulated fifteen billions in bonds. Already some economists are beginning to wonder how the government will be able to pay benefits to all those who during the past sixfeen years have been making 'contributions" when they will have reached the age of sixty-five. Figurers have shown that the interest will not be sufficient to keep the aged barely alive, if they have to depend on these stipends; and under the law they are deprived of these stipends if they earn more than \$75 a month extra. This is the answer:


