

French Fade Out

There was a time in the history of France when the people were headed toward greatness. There was recognition by many that the powers of the state, whether they were in the hands of one of their kings or in the hands of a mob, were dangerous things that could ruin the nation.

Frederick Bastiat, French economist who so brilliantly argued the case for freedom, was convincing enough that he supported himself with his writing on the subject of economics and the dangers involved in letting the government control the nation's economy.

Events in recent months and in the last few weeks in particular leave no doubt that however great France was in the past that greatness is gone. Try as we may to excuse her shortcomings or to weigh them in the light of her terrible war experiences we must nevertheless conclude that France is no longer a major power in any true sense of the word.

The political weakness of her system of government Is not the cause of the present plight, but it does aggravate it. Ever since 1871 not a single French Cabinet has held office for more than three years. Yet, in spite of this, France in the past was able to maintain her place in the forefront of the nations.

The current crisis was born of the moral decadence which has continued to grow and shows no signs of abating. One such indication of this is the fact that although France was one of the great modern champions of liberty, she has tried in recent years to maintain 19th century colonialism in Indochina. This gave rise to the native rebellion which the Communists eventually took over for their own purposes. Another such explosion is looked for in the French colonies in North Africa.

Internally France Is racked by the pulling and hauling of pressure groups which have succeeded in taking over one-third of the entire national budget in the form of subsidies. The grossly unjust tax system which throws the burden on the white collar workers and lets off other groups with little more than token payments is another factor in the situation.

All that can be said now is that France WAS a great

Fraud Invitation

The federal - state unemployment insurance system is wearing a nasty black eye these days.

It results from charges that an estimated 176,000 American working people out of the four million who collected unemployment insurance last year have obtained up to \$75 apiece through fraud or overpayment by state agencies handling the claims.

Total of the overpayment is variously estimated at \$13 million to \$22 million.

These estimates were made by Robert C. Goodwin, federal administrator of the Bureau of Employment Security in the Department of Labor.

The existence of fraud in filing unemployment insurance claims has always been a threat to the system, says Goodwin. All the state laws have penalties for fraudulent claims. There have been many convictions.

Last year the states reported just under 40,000 cases of detected fraud, involving nearly \$3 million in over-

'Yet if thou warn the wicked, and he turn not from his wickedness, nor from his wicked way, he shall die in his iniquity; but thou hast delivered thy soul.'

If a man sees things going on that will make it more difficult for our children and our children's children to develop spiritually and materially and he keeps silent because it might require effort or cost him a little money or make him unpopular, it is pretty hard to conceive how he really gets very much out of life. 

2, Russia, with its hands freed in the Far East, turned promptly to Western Europe. Dispatches from Moscow showed clearly that the Kremlin's next step will be to try again to sabotage allied military co-operation and especially to block the European Defense Community pact. Russia may propose a new four-power foreign minis-ters conference on Germany. Such a bid might appeal to Great Brit-ain and France. It would not be welcomed by the United States. 3. The situation in Tunisia and Morocco confronted French Premier Pierre Mendes-France with a new crisis. The campaign of Nationalist terrorism continued un-checked. There is always the danger that the Communists may move in on this situation. It is reported that Mendes-France may offer a sweeping series of reforms.
