But whether the administration taking the lead in this activity has been Democrat or Republican, all the friendship and generosity has been directed toward the politicians and no effort has been made to show the people of those countries that we even know they exist.

During the reign of Franklin the Great, we had Nelson Rockefeller spreading largess (extracted from the taxpayers) for paved highway and the like. It was no secret n these parts that the money was handed over to the

politicians and most of it was wasted.

There was, for example, the Guatemala highway program in which the most magnificent stretch was built through difficult mountain country where there were no towns. But at the dead end of the road was the palace of the then presidente.

That was scarcely calculated to endear us to the ordinary citizen of Guatemala. It helped to earn us the name of Uncle Sucker. It was the same all over

Down in Mexico it was common knowledge during the war days that entirely too much of the cash we gave away was employed to build and maintain handsome establishments for the mistresses of the generals.

Mighty little trickled down to the peon working for the equivalent of 50 cents a day or less. Those people heard much of generous Uncle Sam, but they never saw any evidence that his liberality benefitted anybody except those who already had it too good.

That is the sort of thing that helped to make a host of followers for Vincent Lombardo Toledano and other devoted communist workers

Now-a-days we are not lodling the green stuff out so openly and freely, but we are doing it just the same. We have put up the money for the devaluation of the peso and the hungry Mexican is beginning to realize that devaluation was a device to make the rich richer at the expense of making the poor poorer and hungrier. That also is helping to make more Mexican com-

Now comes Operation Wetback. The border country and especially the Lower Rio Grande Valley, has long been a comparative paradise for the more ambitious Mexican farm laborer: He has come here with his women in great numbers solely because he could make more money here and, for the vast majority, receive better treatment and better working conditions than he could find anywhere in his home land.

It is true that he came here in violation of our laws. It is true that the Immigration Service has every right to try to keep him out and to deport him when it catches

Until the laws are changed to provide a more common - sense and humane, a more neighborly border crossing plan, the Immigration Service will continue to have the right and duty to try to keep these hungry people
