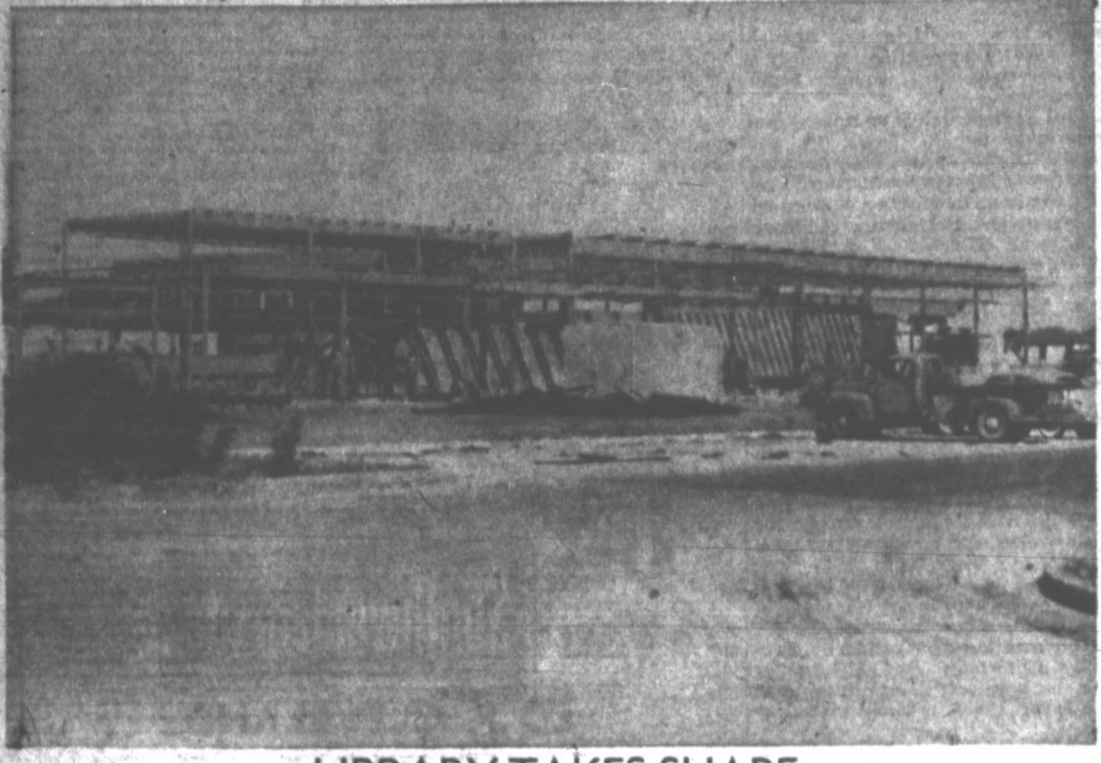

Future Citizen Featured On Lions Club Program

Mrs. Patricia Biasek, 710 N. Russell, likes to tell about the time in the southern part of the state when U. S. immigration officials looked at her "as if my feet were still wet from coming across the Rio Grande." She is Canadian-born and has lived in the United States for 12 years. Thursday noon she told the Pampa-Lion's Club about the experience to emphasize what the club's Americanization class has meant to her and her fellow colleagues. Thanking the Lions for sponsoring such a class, the citizen-to-be pointed out one of the major things she has learned from the course—the prejudice that can arise from different manners of speech, dress and custom among peoples. Introduced by Homer Craig, a club member who established and has been conducting the class, Mrs. Biasek sang two songs before making her remarks: "My Heart Stood Still" and "I'll See You Again." Craig explained to the club how he had contacted the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization office in Lubbock, how he had acquired a federal textbook on new citizens and how cards were sent out to prospective class members before activity actually got underway. Only seven replies were received, the Sam Houston School principal said, but 16 showed up for the first class last fall. That class number in the course now. Classes are spent hearing a lecture, doing written work and taking a test on the previous week's lessons. Indicative of the interest in the program, he continued, is the fact that the grades on weekly tests averaged more than 95 per cent. Classes to reconvert Americanization classes will begin again about Oct. 1 with some 20 class sessions yet to go. Class members, eligible to take their citizenship exams by reason of required residence, will do so about Feb. 1. Craig will provide next week's program, too. It will be on the Pampa recreation program, of which he is director. Paul West, first vice president, presided in the absence of Boss Lion Aaron Sturgeon. There were five guests, including Gene Dawson, a Boy Scout in the club's troop who attended a week of Camp Ki-o-wah and was named "Honor Scout."

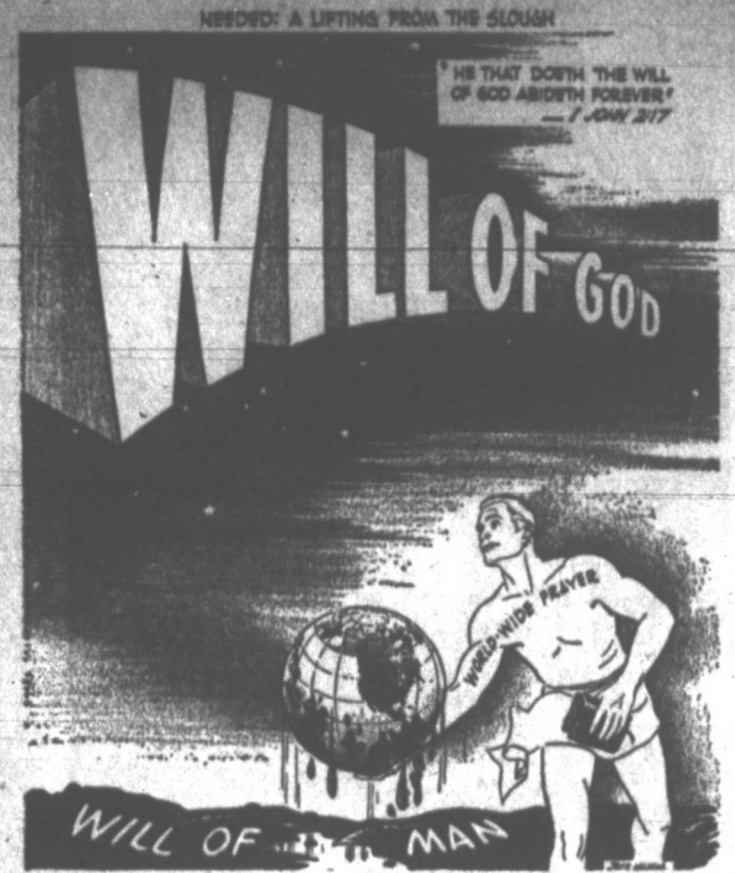

The Good And Bad News In Hot And Cold Wars

The week's balance sheet between the good and bad news in the hot and cold wars:

1. President Eisenhower announced he is "completely and unalterably opposed" to admission of Red China to the United Nations at this time. He said he did not see how any impartial UN member could vote to admit the Peking regime. But the President made it clear he would take no hasty action such as immediate withdrawal from the UN if the Reds are admitted. America's course must be decided only after "the most careful deliberation and study of all the consequences," he said.

2. The military committee formed after overthrow of the deposed Guatemalan government assumes control without meeting any resistance by Communist elements. Two thousand Reds were jailed. Crowds in Guatemala City cheered the leaders of the revolution.

3. There were increasing indica-

Bad News For Postal Workers

WASHINGTON, July 9.—UP—Rep. Harold C. Hagen (R-Minn.) said Wednesday Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield is exerting the greatest "pressure" he has ever seen to block a pending pay boost for postal workers.

"It's 20 years," Hagen said, "I have never seen anything like it. It is a constant pressured effort." Summerfield opposes a bill to grant pay raises ranging from \$240 to \$480 a year to some 400,000 postal workers. He favors lesser raises.

"He is doing the wrong thing," Hagen said. "The legislature should frame and consider legislation without interference from the executive branch."

Agriculture Bill Report Reassuring

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Rumbling of stormy farm bill oratory on the House floor during recent days all but drowned out reassuring, down-to-earth conclusions drawn by the House Agriculture Committee in its report on the bill.

Committee members pointed out, "Consumers get more and better food today with an expenditure of a smaller percentage of their total income than in any other period in history."

Their report refers to figures prepared by Department of Agriculture economists to prove their point. In 1914, say economists, the average factory employee could buy 3.5 pounds of bread with an hour's earnings; in 1929 he could buy 6.4 pounds, and in 1953, 10.7 pounds.

SUBMITTED by the committee was a table for other major foods, showing what one hour's average factory pay bought in the same three years. Foods included and the amount of each that could be purchased for one hour's average factory pay in each year included:

Round steak, 1914, 9 pounds; 1929, 1.2 pounds; 1953, 1.9 pounds; pork chops, 1914 one pound; 1929, 1.8 pounds; 1953, 2.1 pounds; butter, 1914, 4 pounds; 1929, one pound; and 1953, 2.2 pounds; milk, 1914, 2.5 quarts; 1929, 3.9 quarts; 1953, 7.5 quarts; eggs, 1914, 4 dozen; 1929, 1.3 dozen; 1953, 2.5 dozen; potatoes, 1914, 12.4 pounds; 1929, 17.7 pounds; 1953, 32.4 pounds; oranges, 1914 skipped; 1929, 1.3 dozen; and 1953, 3.4 dozen; bacon, 1914, 8 pounds; 1929, 1.3 pounds; and 1953, 2.2 pounds; tomatoes, (No. 2 cans), 1914 skipped; 1929, 4.4 pounds; and 1953, 10 pounds; cheese 1914, 1 pound; 1929, 2.4 pounds; 1953, 2.9 pounds.

"IT MUST be noted," the report continues, "that the largest reduction in the price of food in comparison with wages has occurred during the years of the development of the present program that has as its aim a parity of income for agriculture. It is evident, therefore, that consumers have gotten their greatest concessions in prices of food and fiber in the time of the growth of farm-income stability."

The committee, calling the belief that flexible price supports would result in important price reductions to consumers and a substantial increase in consumption a "fallacy," recommended an examination of current wide marketing margins for farm products.

It referred particularly to wheat and cotton, two of the biggest of the six basic crops that get 90 per cent of parity price supports.

* "A LOAF of bread — the 16-ounce loaf, by government figures, sells at an average of 16 cents. The farmer gets 2 1/2 cents for the total amount of wheat in the loaf. So if the price of the wheat were cut in half this would not mean much in the cost of the bread. The price a farmer gets for wheat would have to be cut about 75 cents a bushel to reflect a one-cent reduction in the cost of a loaf of bread," the committee report continued.

In addition to the "fallacy" that flexible price supports would result in important price reductions to consumers and a substantial increase in consumption, the committee listed for other "misconceptions."

The first was "that the present program of 90 per cent supports on the basics is primarily responsible for the accumulation of existing surpluses." The facts, said the committee, refute this.

"THE PRESENT accumulation of food and fiber has occurred in the last two years. This was due to the 30 per cent drop in farm exports, near record production by a war-expanded agricultural plant; and the failure of the former secretary of agriculture in 1952 to proclaim controls for the 1953 crops when evidence indicated that our agriculture was moving into a surplus position. Although a 90 per cent support program on the basic commodities was in effect for the 40 years previous to 1952, we accumulated no surpluses during that time," the committee stated.

"Misconception No. 2" was said to be the idea that a flexible price-support program, at 75 to 90 per cent of parity, would of itself discourage production and help remove the surplus problem.

"EVIDENCE before the committee indicates that with all farm products in ample supply farmers will maintain or increase their production as they seek to protect their incomes in the face of lower prices. Had flexible price supports been in effect since 1929, there is no reason to believe our surplus problem would have been any less," according to the committee.

Other "misconceptions" were described as the beliefs that flexible supports would mean less government control and less expense and that agriculture is subsidized to a greater extent than are other segments of our economy.

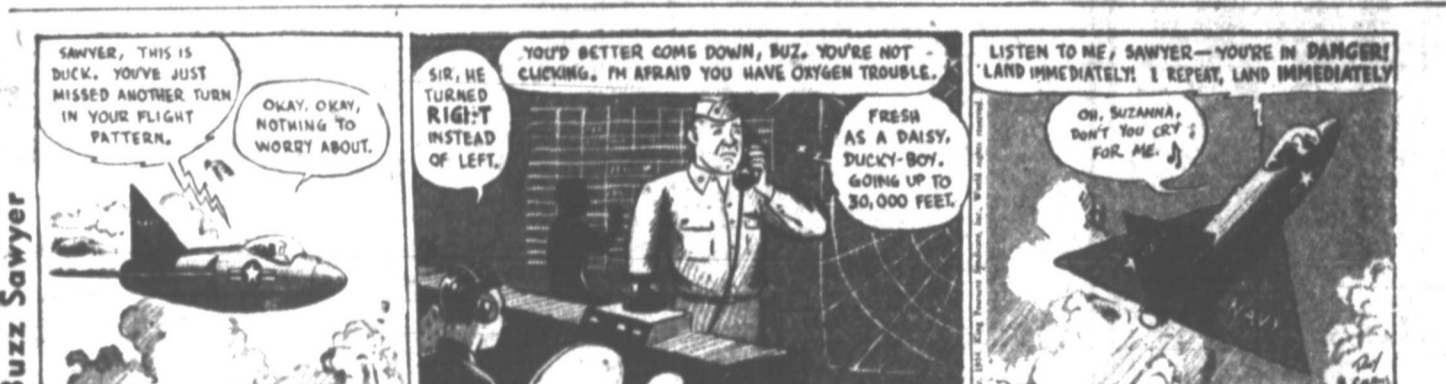

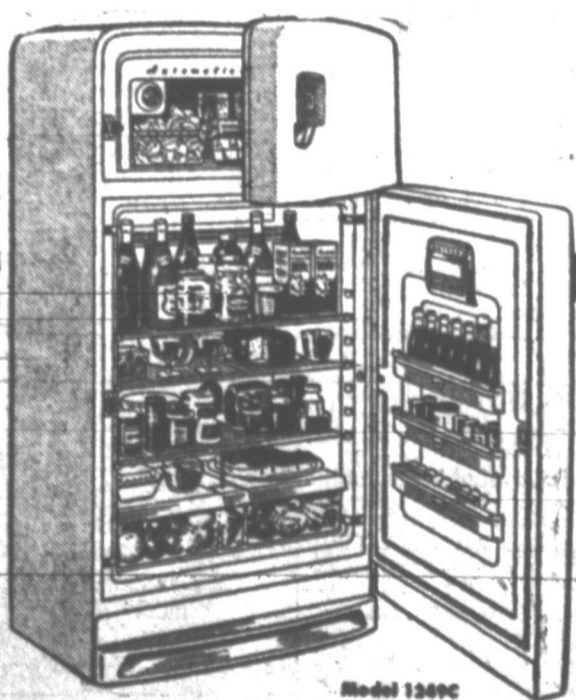
Oil Storage Value Cited

A 'Monopoly' Is Averted — A New Strauss Tune?

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Skipper Humphrey, 12-year-old son of Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D., Minn.), has just averted embarrassing his father politically and also getting himself in trouble with the antitrust division for establishing a combination in restraint of trade.

Skipper and two of his pals, Joe and Hope Liebersohn, publish a weekly paper, The Coquelin (Street) News, which sells for one cent a copy. Small ads cost two cents and larger ones three cents. Some time ago the News made an agreement with one of its competitors, the Coquelin Sun, dividing up their neighborhood, promising not to raid each other's territory.

An editorial in the Coquelin News has now disclosed that "the Sun just broke their agreement by getting subscribers in our area. By that example you can tell what kind of management they have. . . . Some of their news is very old. One news item appeared in the Coquelin News four papers ago. In fact, two of their news items wouldn't be considered newsworthy in the Coquelin News. And the way a lot of their items are worded, they sound like the parents way of talking. This editorial is just the way the staff feel."

Fortunately, the Coquelin Sun is suspending operations for the summer season. This will make prosecution for operating a cartel impossible, and Senator Humphrey won't be accused of fostering monopolies during the coming political campaign.

A tapped diplomatic grapevine from Geneva records one reverse-English apocryphal story that went around there as the great peace conference blew up. It concerns the return of Russian Foreign Minister Molotov to Moscow. Talking to Premier Malenkov, Molotov reported on the latest European appraisals of the Army-McCarthy hearings in Washington.

The premier is then supposed to have observed: "About this American McCarthy, I don't like his objectives. But I admire his methods." The great hassle in Congress

over whether to change the atomic energy law to make the chairman the principal officer of the Atomic Energy Commission, instead of just another member, puts the present chairman, Adm. Lewis L. Strauss, in a peculiar position. If the law were changed, he would become this principal officer. Three other members of the commission have strongly opposed any such shift of power.

Five years ago, when he was just one of the five members of AEC, Admiral Strauss may have had different views on this subject. Testifying before the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy, during the isotope export investigation, Admiral Strauss then said in explanation of his disagreements with other members of the commission:

"It was the occasion of a good deal of grief to me, but I feel and I think they understood that I believed and they believed that the function of a five-man commission as opposed to, let us say, the idea of a single administrator, was the idea of the Congress in obtaining divergent points of view. I felt strongly on that subject, and I felt it my duty to maintain it."

U.S. Information Agency Director Theodore C. Strebart really had some tough questions thrown at him at a National Press Club luncheon.

One question was: "Do you expect Senator McCarthy and Chief Counsel Roy Cohn to be of much assistance to you in the future?" Mr. Strebart had no comment on that one.

He did say, however, that the "Voice of America" broadcasts to foreign countries had carried both sides of the Army-McCarthy row. And in case anybody wanted to investigate, they had a file to show how impartial they had been in covering it.

Perryton Water Use At New High

PERRYTON — (Special) — Water consumption in Perryton has been higher during the past two weeks than at the same period last year, although the temperature has been less. City pumping facilities have been working at capacity to keep the supply of water up to the great demand since the middle of June.

With four good wells with a capacity of 1,800,000 gallons per day and a total storage of only 625,000 gallons, at the peak periods water

users are draining out the water faster than the pumps can put it into the water towers.

On June 23, the top day of water consumption, Perryton residents used 2,500,000 gallons of water. The peak load comes from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. when most people sprinkle lawns and yards. Another big user of the water is the thousands of air conditioners which used thousands of gallons of water during the day.
