By KENNETH O. GILMORE NEA Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON -- (NEA) -- Ev-ery state and territory in the Un-ion now has the opportunity to buy life saving emergency hos-pitals equip, ed to care for the worst victims of a hydrogen or atomic attack.

tomic attack. The Federal Civil Defense Ad ministration has developed a port-able 200-bed hospital which a

single moving van can speedily transport to areas of disaster. The first assembled unit has just been set up in one of Washington's temporary buildings,

The government is offering to pay half the price of each hos-pital, which costs \$26,435. Four-teen states and Hawall have al-ready put in orders for 93 of the units, although some states have not been able to afford the entire hospital as yet. Maine, Massachu-setts, New York, Maryland, Ohio and Hawaii purchased 47 complete inits.

Dr. Carlisle S. Lentz, who is in charge of the Civil Defense hospital program, explains that its purpose is "to provide an early ospital for severely ill casualties as close to stricken areas as pos-







Danger Ahead

In a recent speech Rep. Burdick of North Dakota, who has never fallen for the fashionable diet of globaloney, predicted that if the ratification of the United Nations were to come before the senate today, a great majority would say "No." But when the UN charter was proposed in 1945, with the whole United States sick of war and hoping for some formula that would insure peace, only two senators had to courage to oppose.

As Burdick views it, UN was the starting point in a continuing campaign to destroy the integrity of the Republic by leading the United States into a world government. He recites that the charter failed to conform to the often repeated rule of the Supreme Court that a treaty is an agreement between nations, to do or not to do particular things. The United Nations was not a nation. Its charter was an agreement reached by the agents of numerous nations, Alger Hiss, the convicted traitor, being a principal American agent in its drafting.

Rep. Burdick says that those who promoted UN here. knew that UN was not a nation, and so the proper subject of treaty action, but that they intended to overcome that defect by making it an integral power at the first opportunity. Their design was to convert UN into a world government and thus accomplish the extinction of the United States as a nation.

To this end, Burdick recites, the extreme internationalists first had resort to the provisions of the charter itself, contending that these overrade domestic law and even constitutional restraints. Thus an ill advised court in California tried to dispose of the state alien land tenure law by saying that it was in conflict with an asserted obligation in the charter for member nations to promote human rights.

Again, in Mr. Truman's seizure of the steel industry the late Chief Justice Vinson and two associates held a minority opinion that the UN charter imposed a paramount obligation upon the United States to preserve peace by deterring aggression, that the Atlantic pact and the Korean war were in pursuit of that objective, and that therefore Truman could seize the steel mills in furtherance of this grand UN objective, even though the Constitution said he could not.

Burdick also cited the proposed UN human rights covenants as designs to overthrow the Bill of Rights, to establish a paramount claim to sovereignty in UN and to reduce the federal government to a mere agency in parceling out "rights" defined by UN as the property of all persons, no matter what their citizenry or what laws or constitutions might otherwise bind them. Burdick makes the point, familiar to all our readers, that in a world government based upon popular representation the United States would be controlled by the votes of the communist world. That is equally true of other schemes of more limited super-government, such as Atlantic union, under which foreigners, if not necessarily Communists, would rule us.

Bibles For Movies

How many Japanese Bibles can you buy with a Donald Duck movie short?

That sounds like a nonsense question, but really isn't.

In the years since World War II, restrictions on trade and currency exchange have proliferated to such an extent that the successful world trader has had to learn how to barter.

In a report from Zurich, the world's leading barter market, The Wall Street Journal recently explained in some detail the intricacies of the Bible-movie cartoon swap. It went something like this:

Walt Disney, whose movies have scored a tremendous hit in Japan, began accumulating large profits he couldn't use. The trouble was that the profits were measured in Japanese yen, and Japan, like most countries today, has placed rigid restrictions on converting its currency to the currencies of other countries, including American dollars.

The Disney organization was free to spend the yen in Japan, of course, but the number of Japanese articles it had any need for was very limited. Consequently, the yen just kept piling up in a Tokya bank.

Finally, the Disney organization contacted a barter expert, and was advised to sell their yen, at a discount, for dollars, to a purchaser planning to spend money in Japan, A search for such a purchaser was made, and one was located: the Vatican. Interested in printing Bibles in Japan for Japanese distribution, the Vatican traded dollars for the blocked Disney yen.

Actually, the Disney - Vatican barter was a fairly simple deal, as such transactions go. Each barter is different, and some may involve a dozen or more participants. An example of a recently conducted three-way barter also was reported by the Journal.

France had been accumulating a huge surplus of olive oil. Denmark had been accumulating large credits. of French francs it couldn't use. The U.S.A. had a surplus supply of dried fruits.

Given these ingredients, French traders mixed quite a barter pie. They sold a substantial quantity of the olive oil to the U.S., at a cut-rate price, for dollars. With the dollars they bought American dried fruit. Then they gave the Danes the opportunity to use their credits in ex-change for the fruit, and the Danes, with a market for the fruit and glad to be able to use their credits at last, snapped up the deal.

In addition to the Zurich market, there are active barter markets in New York, Montevideo, Amsterdam and Hong Kong. Foreign trade experts estimate that ten per cent of all world trade is conducted today by barter and currency trading.

And while the "tariff problem" remains a lively issue In American politics, it is becoming increasingly evident that the real barriers to world trade are not only protectionist tariffs, but the government-managed conomies in-most of the world's nations today, where otas and rigid currency restrictions have brought about e return to the cumbersome, semi-civilized method of
