Accord Reached Under Terms By U.S., CIO Officials

WASHINGTON, July 10 -UP - Striking workers at the two plants producing Uranium-235 for the nation's atomic and hydrogen bombs voluntarily returned to their jobs Saturday.

The strike of 1,000 mempers of the CIO Gas, Coke and Chemical Workers Union at Paducah, Ky., and 3,500 members at Oak Ridge, Tenn., began Wednesday.





When you shop in the market to pick up a pound of butter it isn't any great chore. Maybe on occasion you have had reason to pick up two or even three pounds of butter.

But supposing you had to buy three or four million pounds of butter every day. Wouldn't that sound like a lot of work for anyone? Well, that is just one of the minor chores done by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T.

And now Benson has taken on a new infinitely more difficult task - one that he apparently has as little stomach for as the buying of butter. Benson has told us on a number of occasions that he firmly believes in less, not more, government regulations and control — a sentiment that is as unusual in official Washington as it is generally popular in other parts of the United

But in spite of this belief, Benson and his Department of Agriculture are now getting ready to give us some of the most drastic farm controls in the history of the department

Benson inherited a form formula - rigid ninety per cent of parity for basic crops - designed to spur tremendous production for World War II needs. He is trying. against determined congressional opposition, to modify that formula, the war having ended nine years ago. Meantime the formular works magnificently; surpluses have swollen to scandalous proportions, the government is running out of places to keep them, and the price of

In the absence of a modified formula, the only hope of cutting into the rapid growth of government holdings is by controlling what is produced. This has been tried, but up to now the controls have not been tight enough. This year, for example, plantings of wheat, corn and cotton were limited by government decree, but farmers planted the thirty million acres thus diverted to such alreadyabundant crops as soybeans, flax seed and rye. The more Benson tried to turn off his farm flood, the worse it raged.

Now Benson nas evolved an elaborate system of overlapping and contingent controls. A farmer who violates his acreage allotment for one crop will lose price support not only on that but on all other crops on which he would otherwise be entitled to price support. If he has more than ten diverted acres, he will submit to a "total acreage allatment" or lose price support on every-And acreage which may be planted to wheat will be cut thirteen per cent to the minimum allowed by law.

It is in the phrase "total acreage allotment," that we come face to face with the possible — even probable total regimentation of the farmer. We have all of us seen in our lifetime the steady increase in control and enforcement of control that government has been able to bring about as a result of just such orders as Benson proposes. Controls always start off in an easy fashion and become harsher and harsher as more and more violations are uncovered. And it seems to be in the nature of Americans to resent governmental controls and wehave been astonishingly good in getting around many of the restrictive laws that have plagued us. We cannot tell, at this writing, where the farm program of Eisenhower and Benson will lead us. But the record indicates that only more and more controls will result.

"Myth Of The Post Office"

For the past few days we have been discussing and quoting from a pamphlet entitled "The Myth of the Post Office" by Frank Chodorov. Today's column concludes with a summary in which it establishes does not function as a free enterprise institution. Chodorov s u mmarizes it this way:

"If the Post Office Department is in face a myth, if its claim to

being a business is a fiction, what then is it? It is a political insti-

tuion. In its organization and operation it is essentially in the same category as the War Department,

the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Tennessee Valley Authority. The revenue it receives is not payment for services rendered but is purely taxation. A plausible retionship between the rates charged and the costs is maintained only to make the tax levies palatable, but the final determinant of these rates is political exigency. Let us not fool ourselves. The price charged for the delivery of publications is a tax ameliorated by their capacity to influence public opinion, always a potent factor in politics. Third-class postage and parcel-post rates and rural free delivery came when the farm voter assumed importance, and not because of the arguments of the mail-order houses, (In 1892 the report of the House Committee on Post Offices and Post Roads contained this statement: 'It is believed that rural free delivery will aid materially in stopping much of the growing discontent that now seems to exist among the farming population. The depression was hen coming on the farmers.) That inarticulate and milling mass known as 'the general public' is taxed the heaviest by way of first, class rates simply because it lacks the political power of a pressure group. (In 1946 first-class mail (including air mail) produced nearly 50 per cent of the Department's revenue, and showed a 'profit' of \$199,000,000. This result is partially due to the three-cent letter rate, which Congress enacted only as an emergency measure during the war. Thus, the fiscal problems of the Government, not the cost of the service, decide the price charged.) 


