





## Public Trough

One of the disappointing aspects of our day is the feeling on the part of many people that, because of natural adversity, the government is somehow responsible to bail them out of trouble

We, of the Southwest, now have a good example with the advent of a prolonged drouth which has affected both farmer and rancher.

Here we have a perfectly natural and normal phenomenon which, although difficult to predict, is nonetheless an anticipated experience by those who are prudent enough to learn by former experience. The judgement of earlier generations was that you had to prepare yourself during the years of relative abundance to weather over the years of adversity.

When one enters the business of farming and ranching, the extremities of the elements are a part of the calculated risk just as an employe takes a certain risk in associating himself with a business for a livelihood, the business man assumes a risk in the employment of his capital and on and on

That one person should be taxed to relieve another individual of the sour fruits of his choice of a business enterprise for profit is, of course, a rank absurdity and this can readily be illustrated by carrying the principle to its ultimate.

Let's just have the government tax everyone to compensate for everyone's business adversity. Of course all sorts of specious arguments can be imag-

ined to justify government subsidy.

The number one rationalization for running to the government is that "everyone else is doing it." Well, everyone isn't doing it, but many people have gone to the trough of big government only to find that the passing of time brings more and more regimentation.

The trite old argument that "everyone else is doing it" 1s but conscience taking a holiday . . . for we must remember that it is a greater show of character and judgement to set a good example than to follow a bad prece-

There is only one way to resist the something-fornothing cancer and that is for the individual to accept the risks of life and the inexorable laws of the market place come what may. 


