'The founders of this republic

shared in the so - called 'natural rights' philosophy of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries." In that first sentence he is say-

ing, in effect by the word "so called" that there are no natural rights. It is a shy method of completely repudiating the whole philosophy of the American way of life as set forth in the Declaration of Independence. It seems to me that the following are also unsubstantiated statements:

"Rights themselves, when closely examined, appear to admit of as many exceptions and qualifications as the rules of grammar. War and capital punishment limit the right to 'life', and the ordinary criminal law restricts the right to 'liberty and the pursuit of happiness.' Poverty, as well as tyranny, may make theoretically established rights unattainable.

Why I Believe In Natural Rights I believe there are natural rights because I believe there are eternal moral principles-law, just as there are eternal physical principles - laws that no man made or can disobey without suffering the

Natural rights are the sequence of principles. If there be no principles, there would be no natural tions, there must be rights that harmonize with these principles. This must be so if one believes things do not just happen by chance or by the whims of men.

I know of no one who claims that we ever had in practice complete freedom or liberty or natural rights. 
