Ice Water Problem Solved In A Cold Cattle Country

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia.—(NEA)—Are you a tired steer? Listless? Thin? A shadow of your former self? And do your friends low in whispered voices:
 "He looks terrible. The bags under his eyes are big as hudders."
 It's come to this: you're no more. For cattleman Carl Johnson here has come up with a plan that may solve your — and one of ranching's biggest problems.
 It's a thermostatic control that keeps water troughs flowing in the coldest weather.
 For areas like Iowa, Montana, the Dakotas, Nebraska — ranges where the temperature drops far below freezing for long months — watering the cattle has always been an obstacle to raising good beef.



It still is common to ranchers to go out and chop ice to give their cattle a place to drink. In many places they have to build fires beneath the tank in order to keep water drinkable.
 Once the fire was out, the water would freeze until the farmer returned to relight it. In that time the livestock would be left cold and dry.
 Tests show that under this open-fire system, beef weight drops by as much as 10 per cent in areas where the sub-zero season is 180 days long. And it's hard work for cattlemen in these areas to keep the loss from dropping lower.
 Meanwhile, back at the ranch house of Carl Johnson in Cedar Rapids, the problem has a good chance of being solved.
 For \$100 worth of thermostatic equipment, Johnson has rigged a control on his tanks that keeps the water temperature at about 45 degrees, even on the coldest days.
 The thermostat is made by the Robershaw-Pulton Co. and it works this way:
 When the cold water sets in, the rancher makes his rounds to his stock-watering tanks and lights a small pilot light. This flame burns constantly and ignites the main burners under the tanks when the water temperature drops below the thermostatic level.
 Once the water is back at proper temperature, the main burners shut off, leaving the pilot light to wait for its next signal.
 Johnson's own experiments with the system show that beef weight was maintained throughout the winter, and the cattle ate less because they could drink more.

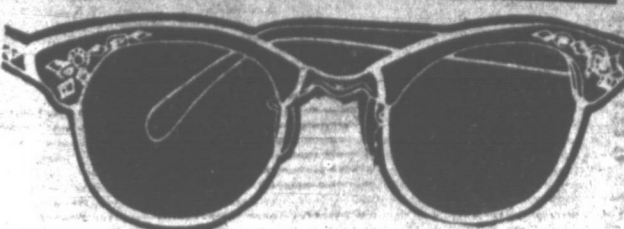

Oil Fire Controlled

LOS ANGELES, July 20—UP—A spectacular but short-lived fire ripped through the Richfield Oil Company's Wilmington Cracking plant Monday, threatening the multi-million dollar installation before firemen controlled it in an hour-long battle.
 The county fire dispatcher's office reported the blaze was "under control" at 11 a. m. Slightly more than an hour after it flared up 20 miles south of downtown Los Angeles.
 Pumps from the county and Richfield units fought the fire which sent flames 100 feet into the air and spewed black smoke over a large area. No storage tanks were threatened.
 Firemen said the initial outbreak was "terrific" and in danger of spreading. No casualties were reported and company spokesmen said a damage estimate was not immediately available.

Tornado Tracker Studied

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 20—UP—The Air Force is giving recognition to an Oklahoma A&M College tornado expert in a study that may bring improved twister-forecasts to the public next year.
 Col. E. J. Fawbush, director of the severe weather warning center at Tinker Air Force Base, said the center has been assigned to study the techniques of Dr. Herbert L. Jones, A&M electrical engineer who has worked out a method of tracking tornado funnels across the sky.
 A group of Air Force experts already have been stationed at Angus Air Force Base, McConnell Air Force Base near Wichita, Kan., and Camp Chaffee, Ark., to work in closed communications setup with Stillwater. They send Dr. Jones information picked up at their stations and he applies it to his tracking system.
 Jones' conclusions then are sent to Tinker, where they are checked against known facts by Fawbush and his technicians.
 The Stillwater scientist's tracking is based on the idea that tornado clouds give up an electrical charge that can be distinguished from those of other storms.
 Fawbush, one of the nation's leading students of tornadoes, said the study has been in progress about three weeks. It will continue for several months and will be intensified next spring, in the heavy tornado season.
 By that time, he hopes information gathered by the tornado students will be passed to the weather bureau, and possibly will be released to the public.

U.S. Draws Lines In Asia In Attempt To Stem Reds

EDITOR'S NOTE: What nation in Asia is marked next on the Communist list? United Press Vice President Frank H. Bartholomew has taken him through Australia, Singapore, Indo-China, Hong Kong and Tokyo. In the following dispatch he describes present defense lines and sums up expert opinion as he found it.

By FRANK H. BARTHOLOMEW TOKYO, July 20—UP—American military and diplomatic officials are convinced a truce in Indo-China will not mean an end to Communist aggression in Asia. Instead, the United States and the Communists seem to be moving ever closer to a direct showdown. Three dividing lines "across which the Red Army shall not pass" have already been established in Asia, and a fourth is in process of negotiation at Geneva. The principal policing force along each existing line is the United States, and in varying degrees its western allies and the free nations of the Orient.

They are prey for Red revolutionists. Meantime squatters are taking over many plantations and oil wells. There is no thought in the minds of any observers with whom this correspondent talked that the Reds will boldly march their present army into Thailand once the hammer and sickle is flying over northern Vietnam, or that it will be loaded onto transports for the Malay states, Singapore or Indonesia. First, the fifth column must get the local revolutions under way; then the "people's army of freedom" thus created must take the field against whatever government is attempting to rule. Political advice and military direction will be supplied; military supplies come later as needed, as in Vietnam; and the Red army of China itself will intervene if the revolution starts to go to pieces as in Korea.

Wants ROK Army Built Up

Syngman Rhee To Visit White House Next Week

By CHARLES M. MCCANN United Press Foreign Analyst People who meet President Syngman Rhee during his visit to President Eisenhower next week may notice that he sometimes blows absent-mindedly on his finger tips. It is a habit which the 70-year-old president of the Republic of Korea, acquired in his youth. As a rebel against the old Korean monarchy, Rhee was tortured for seven months. Among other things, his jailers inserted bamboo sticks under his finger nails and set them alight. Rhee blows on them still to cool them. Never Forgets Goal Rhee was spent 60 years fighting for Korean independence. He never forgets his goal — a free, united Korea. It is reported from Seoul that Rhee has abandoned — for the time being — his threat to invade North Korea alone if necessary. But it seems pretty certain that Rhee will impress upon Mr. Eisenhower the fact that his present goal is the complete unification of Korea by any means necessary. Pending a solution of the Korean problem, by peaceful means or a new war, Rhee wants the United States to underwrite a big build-up of his army. Advice from Seoul say he wants to add 15 divisions to the present 600,000-man Korean army. He also wants a jet plane air force and a navy. Rhee is expected also to urge upon the President the necessity for a strong East Asian alliance against communism. Increasingly Impatient Despite the reports that Rhee is now willing to wait a while, he is increasingly impatient. He always has been an impatient man. Now he also realizes that for him, at 70, time is running short. This diminutive man, brown-skinned, wrinkled, full of nervous energy, is a burning patriot. Rhee was converted to Christianity in his boyhood, and is a practicing Methodist. He was sentenced to life imprisonment as a rebel when he was 22. It was then that he was tortured. Released under a general amnesty when Japan took over Korea in 1945, Rhee came to the United States. He spent six years studying at the same time working for Korean freedom. He got the degree of bachelor of arts from George Washington University, master of arts from Harvard and doctor of philosophy from Princeton. Exile for Long Time Rhee was an exile nearly all the time until he returned to Korea after World War II and was elected president. He was in Geneva, appealing to the old league of nations to help his country, when he met Francesca Donner, daughter of an Austrian iron manufacturer, in 1932. They were married in New York in 1934 in a Methodist ceremony. Rhee calls it the perfect marriage. She addresses each other in English. She is "Mama" to him, and he is "Papa" to her. Mrs. Rhee avoids publicity but is reported to be boss around the house. Americans will have a chance to see Mrs. Rhee, even tinier than her husband, for she is going to Washington with him.

Chiang Frees Ex-Formosan Chief's Son

CHICAGO, July 20 —UP— The 18-year-old son of K. C. Wu, former governor of Formosa, rejoined his parents Monday, ending a 14-month struggle to leave the island stronghold of Chiang Kai-Shek. Haul-Hwang Wu was greeted by Wu and Mrs. Wu as he alighted at Midway Airport on a flight from Seattle, Wash. "Thank God, he's here," said Wu who fled the Nationalist regime after a falling out with Chiang in May of last year. The elder Wu said he is grateful to the effect of world opinion "and especially that of the United States" in his son's fight to obtain a passport from Formosa. Young Wu said he was able to leave the island only after lengthy negotiations for a passport and not until another Formosa resident could be named as his "guarantor" who would be held responsible for any anti-Nationalist China actions by young Wu while in the U.S. The son declined to comment on his stay in Formosa but the elder Wu has charged that his son was held as a hostage by the Chiang regime. Wu said at the airport that the Nationalist government is a "police state as much as that of its enemy Red China."

Chief Due Scalping In Governor Bid

HELENA, Mont., July 20 —UP— Political observers predicted Indian Chief Robert Yellowtail would probably get scalped Tuesday in his bid for the Republican senatorial nomination in the Montana primary. Yellowtail, a 63-year-old Crow Indian chief, was seeking the nomination from Rep. Wesley A. D'Ewart, who represents Montana's eastern congressional seat. D'Ewart decided against running for the lower house again. He has spent most of the campaign in Washington, claiming urgent legislative business kept him there. He will not be in the state Tuesday night to hear the returns. On the other hand, Yellowtail has been whooping it up around the state since he first announced his candidacy last year. He confidently claimed the vote of every one of Montana's 24,000 Indians. However, political observers said that would not be enough to win. A well-to-do landowner and cattle raiser who is no stranger to Montana's political battlefield, Yellowtail pledged himself "to stand by the American Indian." "I will do my utmost in the defense of every minority group under the American flag," he promised.

U. S. Carriers On 'Mission'

MANILA, July 20 —UP— The American aircraft carriers Boxer and Hornet and four escorting destroyers left Manila Bay Tuesday for "operations at sea," it was learned. A spokesman for the U. S. naval station at Sangley Point said the information "operations at sea" came from the commander of the U. S. 1st fleet. There was speculation that the carriers, which left before their scheduled departure, were en route to Indo-China to participate in evacuation operations. Another carrier, the Tarawa, meanwhile, steamed into Manila Bay Tuesday. The Sangley Point spokesman admitted that the itinerary of the six warships was under a "security blackout." Check Refund FORT WORTH — UP — Jack Montgomery, a carpet installer, paid two overtime parking tickets with a check for \$111.95 but got a refund of \$109.95. AF Takes Measures -- 'Just In Case'

Barging into the women's room can be doubly disastrous in enemy territory. Preventing this social blunder is one of the many things the Air Force is doing in a program to get its men home safely from the places they may be sent on wartime missions. Combat crews at Lockbourne Air Force Base, near Columbus, Ohio, must learn to recognize and translate a number of basic words and phrases in Russian that may help them in going undetected in that country. To simplify the training, the Russian signs appear in place of signs in English in areas where the combat crews train. At first look, a visitor is liable to think that the revolution is here and the Russians have taken over. Becoming familiar with the signs will save an airman from getting the wrong door to the rest room, from going into places that are off limits from going the wrong way in a one-way street. An airman who crash-lands or has to resort to his parachute over enemy territory, for instance, would be quickly discovered if he walked into an area marked "off limits to civilians" no matter how good his disguise. While airman are encouraged to learn foreign languages, they're not required to learn to pronounce on the signs or to speak Russian. Main idea is to recognize the sign and act accordingly. These photos show some of the typical signs.

Zero-Hour Report Out Of Viet Nam

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is an uncensored eyewitness dispatch on zero hour in Viet Nam, largest Indo-Chinese state, as the self-imposed deadline for peace set by French Premier Pierre Mendes-France approached at Geneva. The correspondent, Frank H. Bartholomew, vice president of the United Press, arrived in Tokyo by air from Hanoi via Hong Kong.)

TOKYO, July 20 — UP — This is Viet Nam in the last hours approaching her fateful deadline at midnight Tuesday.

The southern state of Cochinchina, centering around the nation's biggest city of Saigon, bursts with military activity and is full of night talk. French transports land additional troops while cargo ships of all free nations fight for berthing space. Uncle Sam's tremendous contribution of ammunition, guns, trucks, jeeps, mobile artillery pieces and materiel of every type is stockpiled in guarded depots throughout the city or is loaded in flying boxcars for movement to Hanoi and Haiphong.

Saigon teems with soldiers: French officers, bereted French troops, Arabs of the French colonial army, Foreign Legionnaires, soldiers in fezzes and turbans, Senegalese soldiers so new in military service that the tribal knife marks on their coal black faces are still visible — many of them strolling the boulevard in pairs holding hands, a custom of the African homeland; youthful and rather sloppily uniformed French soldiers mingling with equally youthful but meticulously neat soldiers from American warcraft.

Clinton Pool Admits Negroes

CLINTON, Okla., July 20 — UP — The municipal swimming pool was opened Monday for use by Negroes, and eight teen-agers immediately swam there.

A. E. Potter, superintendent of the pool, said pool attendance was normal, although it was the first time Negroes had used the pool since it was opened in 1936.

Potter said pool workers were ordered not to discriminate against anyone and to throw out "white or colored" troublemakers.

Clinton, in west central Oklahoma, is made up of about 7,000 whites and 1,000 Negroes.

KIND OF MESSY, HUH?

ENID, Okla., July 20 — UP — Bill McMahan didn't mind so much when a group of honey bees moved in with him but he objected when an army of ants decided to take up residence, too.

He spread DDT and motor oil along the wall where the bees had established their hive to discourage the ants.

He discouraged the bees instead. They departed, and the ants remained.

Money For Roads On Indian Lands Is Asked

WASHINGTON, July 20 — UP — Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay said Tuesday his department will ask Congress for \$3.5 million to round out a \$10 million road program in Indian reservations in 26 states.

The supplemental appropriation would be in addition to \$2,897,000 for Indian road construction and \$2,042,000 for Indian road maintenance already appropriated for fiscal 1955. Contract authority for \$1,160,000 provided by the federal aid highway act would round out the \$10 million program.

The proposed program provides for grading and draining 469.8 miles of reservation roads, surfacing 436 miles, and constructing 2,284 feet of bridges. Most of the work will be on reservations in the western states. There are also projects for the Seminole reservation in Florida, the Choctaw reservation in Mississippi, the Cherokee reservation in North Carolina, and the Chippewa, Potawatomi, and Menominee reservations in Minnesota and Wisconsin.

McKay said a major objective of the new program is to bring reservation roads up to acceptable standards so that they can be turned over to counties for maintenance. Federal responsibility for constructing Indian roads is based on the tax-exempt status of Indian trust lands. But since most of the county road maintenance funds are derived from gasoline taxes and motor vehicle license fees, which Indians pay the same as other citizens, the counties are willing to

assume maintenance of these roads after they have been improved by the federal government. More than 1,000 miles of reservation roads have been transferred to counties for maintenance in the last few years.

An allocation of \$600,000 is being made for road construction work on the reservations (except for Navajo) in New Mexico and Colorado. Project allocations include \$39,300 for the Tom Newton Road and the Strain Road on the consolidated Ute reservation in Colorado, and in New Mexico \$62,000 for the Las Norias Road on the Jicarillo reservation, \$64,000 for improvements on the Elk Silver Road of the Mesquero reservation, \$100,400 for road improvements on the San Felipe, Tesuque, and Taos pueblos, and \$100,000 for the Zuni west road on the Zuni reservation.

Anadarko to Get \$195,000
The Anadarko area, covering western Oklahoma, will be allocated \$195,000. It will cover improvements on Calumet Road, Canton Road, Fort Cobb River Road, Spring Creek Road, and the Watchhorn Road. These improvements are on the Cheyenne and Arapaho, Kiowa, and Pawnee reservations.

The Muskogee area, covering eastern Oklahoma, Mississippi, and Florida, will get \$300,000. Allocations include improvements to Milan, Dry Creek, Chewey-Chance, and Marble City roads, Five Tribes agency, eastern Oklahoma, \$151,000.

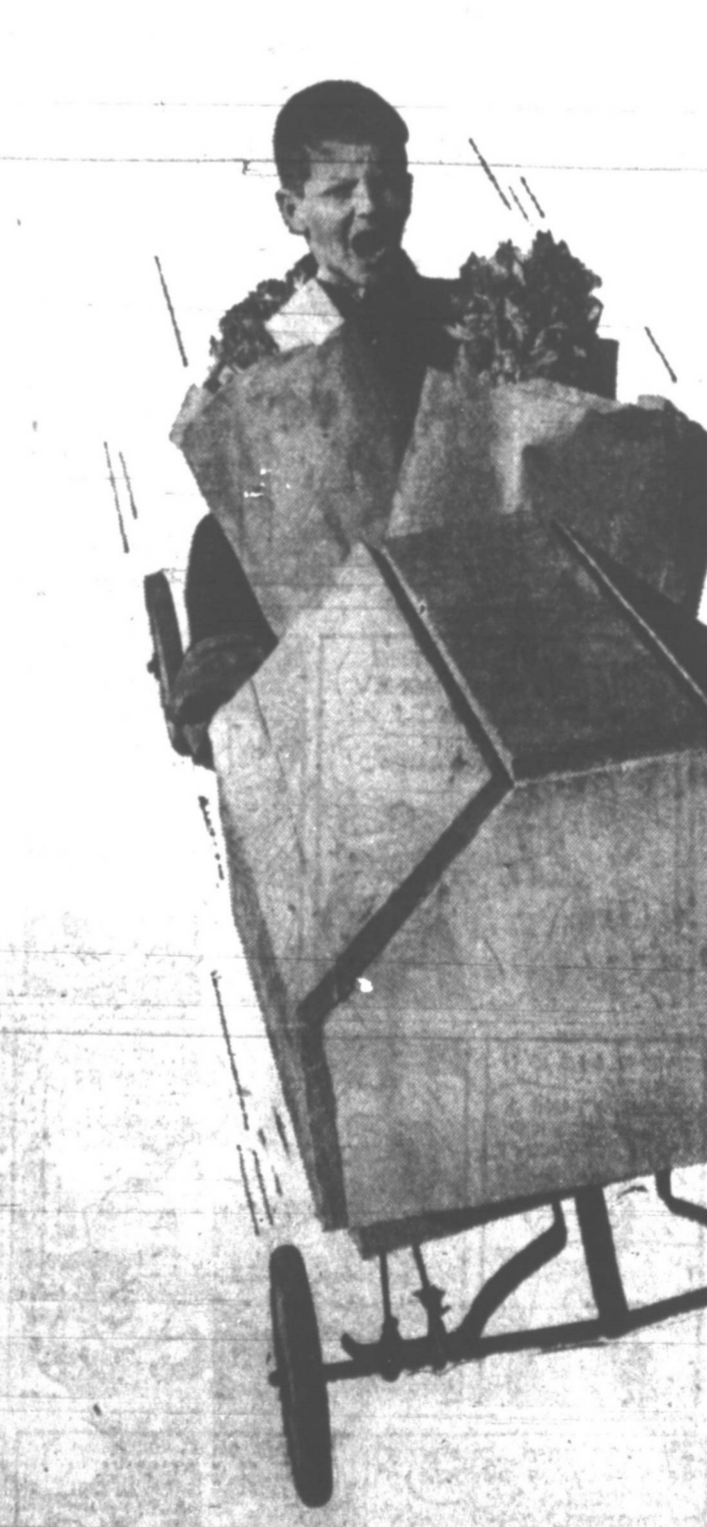

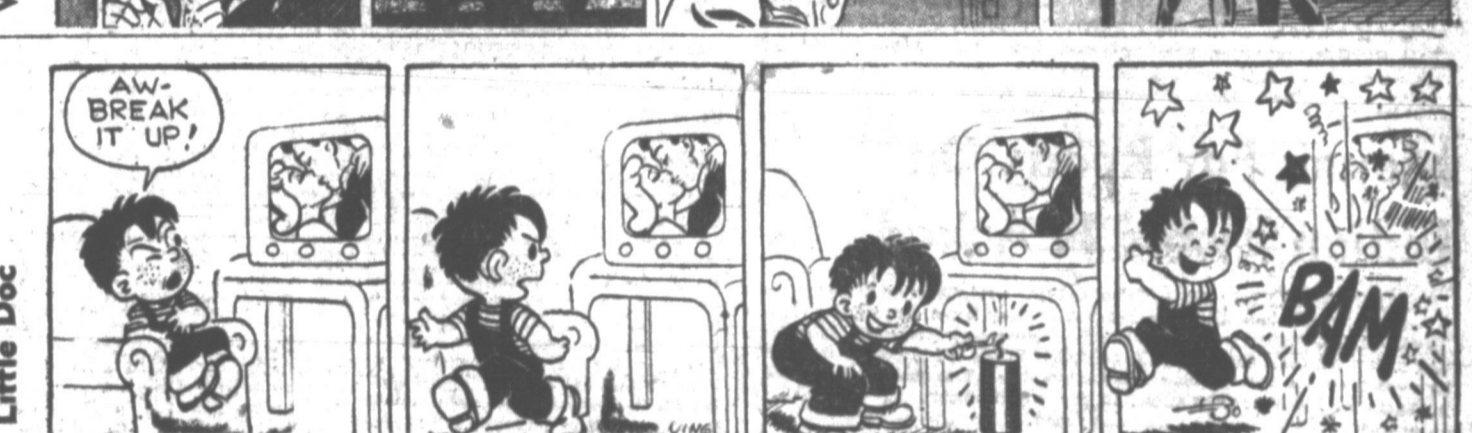

No Runoff For Kerr

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 20—UP—The Oklahoma Supreme Court Monday gave Sen. Robert S. Kerr (D-Okla.) a clear track into November's general election. The high court turned down "for lack of apparent merit" a request by David C. Shepard, Oklahoma City attorney, that he be put on the July 27 run-off ballot with Kerr. Shepard, who received 11,071 votes to run third in the July 6 primary, contended he was entitled to enter the run-off when the run-up, former Gov. Roy J. Turner, withdrew because of financial troubles. Kerr polled more than 238,000 votes and Turner 205,000. Kerr will face the winner of a Republican run-off between Fred Mock and Raymond Fields. **Ranger Rodeo to Open** RANGER, Tex., July 20—UP—The Annual Jaycees Rodeo opens in Ranger Wednesday, and will continue through Saturday.

"It's because I'm particular about what I do, and there aren't many good scripts going around," he told me on the set of his first movie in a year, Paramount's "Run for Cover."

Jimmy plays a veteran sheriff who makes a man out of his deputy, John Derek, and it's his first western since 1938. "Mr. Roberts," in which he'll play the ship's skipper, is Jimmy's next, and he admits having a score of TV offers. "But I have no interest in TV and I think film stars better watch out. Henry Fonda Becomes TV 'Announcer'

HOLLYWOOD, July 20—UP—Henry Fonda, one of America's top actors of stage and screen, is emoting before the cameras Tuesday in his debut as the star of a television series—but he's doing only the commercials.

The distinguished thespian studies his script diligently. He paces around the stage, rehearsing his lines. Then he takes his place on a set as lavish as those for Hollywood movies.

In his impeccable tweeds, the famous star of Broadway's "Mister Roberts" picks up a glass of beer and delivers his dialogue: "Try this extra-dry beer, the largest selling lager beer in the east..."

Fonda became the first actor of stature to deliver the commercials for somebody else's program when he accepted the job of doing the blurbs for a filmed dramatic series, "The Star and the Story."

His appearance stirred up a controversy among fans and critics, but the actor drewled he doesn't see anything wrong with switching from Broadway to beer.

"I am an actor and this is part of acting," Fonda said. "I feel if they keep the commercials dignified, it's all right."

"Yes, I am being very commercial, and for commercial reasons. I am getting more money for this than I would for a movie."

The task is not to be tossed off lightly, he went on. "It's three times as much work as a movie. It's taking eight weeks to do 78 commercials. And I'm in every shot all week long. I've said more words in these commercials than I said in all of 'Mister Roberts'."

"I just finished learning four pages of dialogue and there's nobody else to talk to, to cue me." Fonda admitted his friends were "surprised" to find out he has turned commercial announcer.

He'll receive no Oscar nominations for this role. But, he pointed out, many fans congratulate him on "how interesting and painless the commercials are."

He may appear in one of the dramatic portions of "The Star and the Story." But, if so, somebody else will deliver the commercial. He frowns upon such stars as Loretta Young "stepping out of character" to deliver the spiel.

After finishing his beer guzzling, Fonda heads to Honolulu and Midway for the filming of his first movie in seven years, the film version of "Mister Roberts." He last appeared in "Fort Apache" in 1947.

"I'm glad I was trying to stay away from movies," he said. "I just was lucky to find three wonderful play scripts that have kept me away from films."

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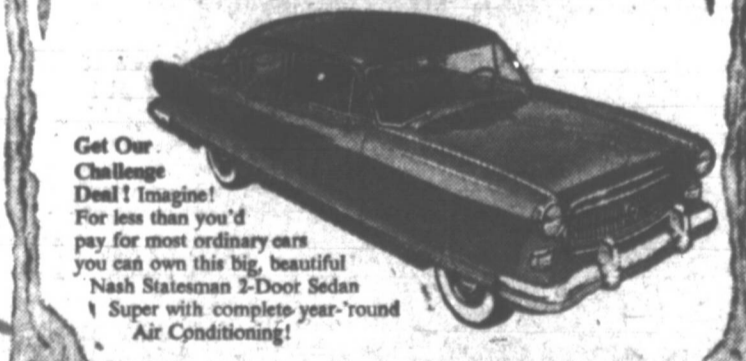
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
