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### Treated Thinnings from Woodlots Provide Farms with Fence Posts



Two-to four-inch growth thinned from farm woodlots, some empty oil drums, and copper naphthenate preservatives mixed with stove oil, give any farm a supply of enduring fence posts. Defense against virtually everything destructive, the preservatives also protect wooden construction in all farm structures and equipment.

Technicians and forestry experts are working out a scheme
to ease the \$70-a-day drudgery
of replacing farm fence posts.
The plan includes farm woodlot
control by cutting less desirable
young growth for fencing and
treating the posts with the jear.

Stitute technicians are developing
formulas whereby naphthenate
preservatives obtainable at local
paint stores can be mixed with
fuel oil and other cheap carriers
to treat posts right on the farm.

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### Need No Law

There ought to be a law" was the response of some Pampans to last Friday's Pampa News "Question of the Week" concerning the problem of sex and horror type

Latest indication of this viewpoint is the establishment of special committees throughout the country designed o "do something" about horror and sex type comic books now being sold on some news stands,

Men and women's civic groups want to do something about these comic books.

The main problem is in finding a method whereby the books could be placed on a restrictive sale without running into an intringement of the freedom of the press. And there you have it in a nutshell.

A bunch of us don't like something so we'll make a law and change it.

The battle of vulgarity as opposed to good taste is one that has been going on a long time and probably will continue so-long as there are people with different backgrounds, different tastes and different cultures. Public opinion in connection with matters of good taste and bad are subject to the whim of officials and the general public at any given time.

Most of us can remember when the present day bathing suit, for either men or women, would have been consiaered extremely vulgar and in bad taste and there were many instances in which communities tramed legislation that was designed to halt such practices. Today there is general recognition of the fact that it is not within the province of government to legislate in such matters and the only police force necessary is that of the individuals

In the instance of comic books and horror stories, Freedom Newspapers, Inc., has conducted a survey which shows that there has been considerable voluntary censorship of the material presented to the public by the store owners, who have a perfect right to determine for themselves what they will and will not sell.

Moreover, this judgment on the part of the sellers may not necessarily be dictated by their disagreement with the material presented but may stem from the fact that their customers for other items being sold in the establishment may object to buying where such comic books and horror stories are sold.

What apparently has been overlooked in all of the furor is that all of the books are sold to individuals, either adult or children. In the instance of adults, it may be their preference for this type of reading and judging from the sale of the books there is quite a market.

In the instance of children, particularly children under 18 years of age which is the primary concern of many civic groups, it would seem that the parents of the children involved ought to be the ones who would do the policing. Of course, if parents who have long been in the habit of turning over the training and instruction of their children to the public schools and who feel no responsibility this is no excuse for attacking the freedoms of

If the civic groups are really interested in education, here is a project for the members to get their teeth into by attempting to educate through voluntary effort and persuasion the parents to accept the responsibility for their children and see that the youngsters don't buy the books. Then the objective is accomplished, the youngsters are insulated against the bad taste and no one is in-

But "there ought to be a law" is not the answer.

"Now, as a matter of fact, it is nonsense to assume that because the child is not taught values and drilled into habits of thought he will spontaneously develop an educated independence of thought. What will happen instead is what is happening. The teacher, freed from the responsibility of teaching 'abstract values' in a disciplined manner, must fill the gap with something. 


