RAN ACROSS SOMETHING NEW - Pizza U.S.A. , a recipe, that is quick and easy, and really something special. It can be the main dish for lunch or for the evening meal, or you can treat the gang to it late in the evening.

INGREDIENTS:

1 cup uncooked white rice

2 cups cold water 1 teaspoon salt

1, 8 oz. can tomato sauce

2 tablespoons butter or margarine

1-3 cup chopped onions

1 small clove garlic, minced

1 cup canned tomatoes or peeled fresh tomatoes, well drained

1-2 teaspoon salt

1.8 teaspoon pepper

1 small can anchovies or a 3 1-4 oz. can sardines in oil

1 cup sharp cheese, grated 1-2 teaspoon oregano

METHOD: Put the rice, water and salt in a 2-quart saucepan bring to a vigorous boil over a high heat. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover and cook over this low heat for 14 minutes. Remove the saucepan from the heat but leave the lid on for 10 minutes. Mix in 1-2 cup of the tomato sauce. Press and firmly pack the rice into a well greased 9" pie pan. It is important to pack the rice in firmly. Melt the butter or margarine in a saucepan. Add the onion and garlic and cook until the onion is yellow. Add the tomatoes, the rest of the tomato sause, sait and pepper. Cook about 19 minutes or until thick. Spread over the rice. If anchovies are used, they may be chopped and sprinkled over the top of the tomato mixture or the whole filets may be arranged over the top. If sardines are used, chop and sprinkle over the op. (You may wish to used cooked, bulk sausage). Sprinkle the cheese and oregano over the top. Cover and chill until about 20 minutes before serving time. Then place the pie pan in a preheated 350 F, oven 20 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Place under broiler to slightly brown, if you wish. To serve, cut into wedges. It is best to allow the pizza to cool slightly before, cutting since the wedges hold stogether better. Makes 7 to 8 servings.



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# Big Question

This probably comes under the heading of a warning for the future but we want to get it on paper so that later on we can say that we warned you.

The worry of the day is contained in a too-long headline sent by NEA, a newspaper feature service, which says: "Ike Launches Sweeping Study of Public Schools; Top Query: Is It Time for Uncle Sam to Step In?"

It is interesting to note the manner in which the headline writer phrased it — "Is It Time" etc., etc. Note that there is no suggestion as to whether Uncle Sam, in the form of federal bureaucracy, should or should not step into the public school picture. It is merely a question of

The author of the article, Douglas Larsen, naturally went to the fount of knowledge on the subject in pre-paring the article. He interviewed Dr. Samuel Brownell, U. S. Commissioner of Education.

Larsen then goes on to report that President Eisenhower, in his giant wisdom, is launching "the most comprehensive study of the American school system ever attempted to try to find a permanent cure for the chronic crisis which has beset U. S. education since before the

This little venture, we must hasten to add, will cost the taxpayers roughly \$900,000 - \$700,000 to pay for state conferences all over somebody's half acre and another \$200,000 to pay for the final and deciding meeting in Washington. And it is the assignment of Dr. Brownell, incidentally the brother of Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell, to set up these various conferences of "educotors" and citizens.

And who will be head of the White House conference? Neil H. McElroy, president of Procter & Gamble, who is also a big wheel in the National Citizens Commission for the Public Schools and on the Advertising Council. And for the uninitiated we might point out that the Advertising Council puts on propaganda campaigns one of which is to get its direction from the National Education Association.

Even Oveta Culp Hobby, who did mental flip-flops all over the place when she was given a chance to get a top government position, has some grave doubts about the program. Speaking as Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, she was opposed to a bill which would have given \$250,000,000 for school construction and wanted Congress to wait and see what sentiment there was from citizens at the White House conference on the question.

That's one we would like to venture a guess on for Mrs. Hobby. Our guess is that such legislation will be approved and it will be approved because there is a spontaneous and national" support for the entry of the federal government in the field of controlling the public schools. Right at this moment, at the grass roots, the inclination is against such a course of action on the part of the federal government. But that is because "the word" hasn't been sufficiently sent out to the noisemakers for the scheme. And by the time the \$900,000 is spent for studies and conferences, all of them in favor of expansion of the federal activity in the field of public schools, there will be a great beating of the tomtoms to provide the congressmen with proper "public sen-

So far as we can learn from Larsen's article, there has been no thought given to the possibility that people who are opposed to federal intervention in the schools will be included in the conference arrangements. And of course there will be no spokesman for those who believe that the public school system, itself, a splendid example of socialism-communism at work, invited to attend the con-

The End Result Of "Social Security"-Disappointment

The U. S. News & World Report has an eight-page article on "Social Security," After one has read it, it is hard to believe that any security" will be of any value to the younger people. It shows sevit would cost to get the same insurance under private insurance than under so-called "social security". Here are a couple of ex-

Under "social security" a single employe has been "covered" tire on his pension in January, 1957. His monthly old - age pension check will be \$108.50 and he has contributed into the pension fund \$837. His employer will also have contributed the same amount, making total of taxes \$1.674.

To get \$108.50 monthly pension under a private insurance plan if an employe in 1937 bought an annuity to start paying off in January, 1957, when he reaches age 65, his annuity would have cost him in premiums \$8,200. In other words, the United States Government is promising to give over five times as much as private insurance companies can give. It seems ridiculous to believe in this

U. S. News & World Report also gives another example: Under "social security" a single farmer who is earning more than \$4,200 a year, enters the system January 1, 1955, at age 631/4. He will retire at age 65 in mid-1956. He will get \$108.50 pension check monthly. His pension cost him in self-employment taxes \$189.

For a farmer to get the same amount of money (\$108.50 per month) as an annuity check under a private insurance plan, his annuity premiums would cost him \$16,200. In this case the government is promising to give the same amount for a little less than 1-80th as much as he would be obliged to pay by buying nontax-supported "insurance."

It promised them certain 'benefits' in return for a ridiculously small tax. Careful manipulation and very clever propaganda caused other groups of slightly higher incomes to 'demand' that they be included and be 'given' similar government benefits.' This process continued, each group of a slightly higher income being brought under system in gradual steps, usually After all, why should not a worker earning only a few marks more than another, cry out for his 'share' of government gifts? Soon every segment of the economy was included. The funds thus obtained were utilized to meet current expenses, and so-called 'indebtedness' was incurred for future benfits. No longer was there need for the fiction of a special tax. Everything came from the tax proiding the general funds.
