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## Housing Scandals

Do you just yown, the story with the above headline being just one of the series of scandals by which Uncle Sam and his maze of federal institutions are sinking down so far as to undermine the foundations of our faith in all government?

This story reeks with more of the political shenanigans of the Federal Housing Administration.

Only a few citizens have glimpsed the inner workings of this vast bureaucracy.

Only a few can see that the political insuring of mortgage loans creates a standing invitation for crooks, great and small, to come dip into the gravy-boat of politics.

Only a few can know that the honest mortgage banker, the honest promoter of real estate development, the honest builder, architect, engineer, and, above all, the honest appraiser, is at a disadvantage when he deals with one of its offices. That by its very nature, the FHA makes it extremely profitable to be crooked. But this is so! The stories of the scandals have explained it all . . . how the statutory 80 per cent or 90 per cent loan can become the 110 per cent or 120 per cent loan by a mere stretching of a statement of valuation by a politically appointed valuator.

Political lending. How did politics get into the loan rackets in the first place?

It was back when the Communal-Social idea of sharing the wealth through a political redistribution of the earnings of production was imported. The New Deal developed the idea of communal lending as "emergency" depression policy. And it turned out to be such a promised land of political milk and honey that, at once, Washington promoted the idea that welfare lay in an individual, a family, a corporation, a municipality, a state or a nation getting into debt for:

(1) As many projects as possible. (2) As large an amount as possible. (3) As long a term as possible.

This created wealth. Bonds and mortgages, including Government Bonds, became accepted evidences of wealth in their new books of economics. Thus it became the social obligation of governments to provide as many permanent and convenient counters for borrowing in the shortest possible time. More especially for veterans of wars who could get extra large loans for terms up to the rest of their natural lives.

Private commercial or mortgage bankers must in theory, at least, be prudent and think of the day of repayment in appraising the pledged collateral.

Not so with politicos and their great heart and open hand.

One of the first acts of the government of social experiment was to slip a cushion under those who had borrowed unwisely in the boom markets in creating RFC for the bruised corporation and Home Owners Loan Corporation for the buyers of over-priced houses.

Wonderful! Both borrower and lender had thought they were stuck in those days when the pledged property was often worthless or a liability. And so popular was the general idea that opposition was almost nil when Congress "gave the people" the method and the means to reckless credit in a whole catalog of communal lending corporations. And how the administrators and manipulators made all this popular with the private bankers, especially the big ones who became the brokers of easy loans is another sickening story of national bribery of a whole people WITH THEIR OWN TAX MONEY. And

Will they abolish FHA and its inherent evils as a discredited institution by which the all-powerful state tried to supplant natural laws of risk and repayment with political whim and favor?

Ask your Congressman or Senator.

If he is reasonably frank and honest, he will tell you that like the RFC whose evil life was prolonged, the FHA is the refuge and meal ticket for too many poor relations of too many politicians. And the milk-cow of too many generous campaign contributors.

We the "sovereign" voters? Are we too easy-going to care?

This means that the rights of persons are superior to the authority of governments, and that the individual should be sovereign rather than government. Or, it may be better to say that in freedom there is no sovereign, since government Following this view of govern-

ment as servant rather than sovereign, the Constitution of these United States strictly limited the Federal authority, as for example in respect to government interference with the individual's rights of speech, publication, religion, assembly and taxation. Further, it reserved to the states or to the people any powers not delegated to United States government and not prohibited to the state govern-

States Were Also Limited But this alone would not have preserved the Union or kept peace among its members. It was necessary also that the consitutions of the various states of the Union limit the authority of these governments much as the Federal Constitution limited the Federal government, for no central authority could have kept peace among

imperialistic state governments. Finally, all of the consitutions, both state and Federal, provided means by which the people's rep-resentatives might take back any of the limited authority delegated

Results Of Our Foreign Policy

Here is the last installment of Howard Buffett's article in Faith and Freedom under the heading of Global Intervention-On Its Rec-

Here is a good place to review another propaganda legend. For League of Nations everything would have worked out okay and the second world war would not have occurred.

To assess this claim, let's just make a little comparison. On the one hand, "isolationists" kept us out of the League of Na tions, and for twenty years there was no serious conflict in the

On the other hand, beginning with 1939 and markedly since 1945. the advocates of global intervention have gotten their way on every scheme they have proposed. We went into the United Nations, whole - hog: and five years later found ourselves in a bloody conflict in Korea.

The whole story since 1939 hardly needs retelling. First our resources were poured into the hands of those who were fighting Hitler. As the strain of this burden increased, it became essential to those nations and to the continued big boom in America that we enter our military forces as well as our resources, in that war.

The existence of the secret determination to plunge our military into the war was revealed in the postwar publication of Secretary of war Stimson's diary. Secretary Stimson wrote in his diary on November 25, 1941 (after returning to his office from a cabinet meeting) "The question was how to maneuver the Japs into the position of firing the first shot without allow ing too much danger to ourselves."

The question was soon solved. twelve days later the United States was at war. In that war approximately 40

thousand Americans died in uniform, while 300 thousand - plus came home mental cases, Probably 300 thousand more came back so scarred by war that normal life was out of the question, A million of our best youth were sacrificed. But that is only part of that

story. With a million boys elimmated, a million American girls lost the chance for a normal life with husbands, homes and families. This is just a small part of the domestic cost of U. S. global intervention during World War II. A tree is known by its fruits. This costly sacrifice-what were its fruits?

More Militarism Out of World War II came a Russian Communist empire with control over 800 million people, one-third the population of the reld And now our military leaders are telling us that Russia constitutes the greatest menace in the history of the world.

They said that about the Kaiser n World War I. They said it about Hitler in World War II. If Russia is that menace today,

who made that power' possible? Not the Russians! Before we, entered World War

II. Germany and Japan stood on opposite sides of Russia like two great dikes, protecting their respective continents from the Slavic-Communist hordes. Who destroyed those dikes? It

was not the Russians! American military might-American global intervention - destroyed those dikes, and ended the balance of power that had confined the Russian bear to his lair for

hundreds of years. But that is only one phase of our peril.

with the financial consequences of thirty-seven years of global intervention. Today it is costing so much that it becomes only a question of time until we embrace communism by way of a debauched currency - by way of an alley that has elsewhere led straight to totalitarianism,

Our troops are in forty - nine lands or more. Our youth from 18 to 26 somersaults frighten even those whom we call friends.


Global intervention - a tree is known by its fruits.

The question now is: Are our rulers doing any better at understanding and countering Russian done previously? If so, where is the evidence? Is it Korea? Indo-China? Europe?

Continued American global intervention is leading us into another war, and war that would result ultimately in global victory for masters in the empire of global

Whether this total disaster comes about may depend on the ction of American church people in the next few years. If the church people of America will stop blindly supporting global intervention, that policy may soon be Entangling Alliances With None

America can again be the light of the world — by restoring its faith in the Monroe Doctrine, and living by Jefferson's time-tested injunction: "Peace, commerce, and honest friendship with all naions, entangling alliances with

Crime in the cities during the first half of 1954 was up 7.2 per cent over the same period in 1953, according to the FBI's semi-annual report.
