She is a spring candidate for an associate degree with a grade point average of 3.6.

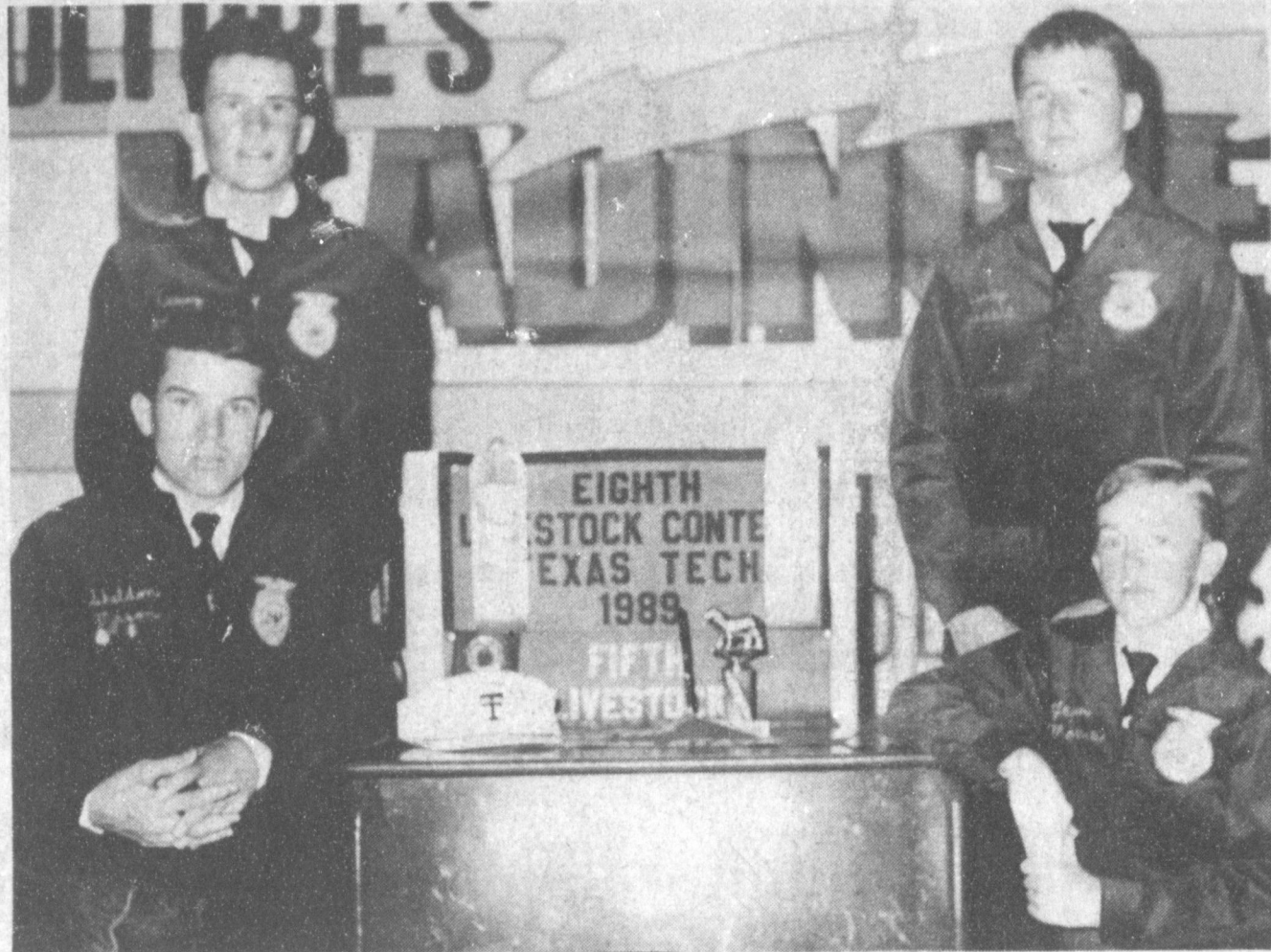
Chandra is married to Junior Sanchez and they have one daughter, Bethenie.

Summer Production Moves To Auditorium

It's official now! The name of Muleshoe's own theater and show company is Mule-plex Production Company. During a meeting late Wednesday evening, with 22 committee members present, and following a lengthy discussion, it was unanimously voted to adopt the name Mule-plex Production Company.

Also, membership dues were set at \$1 per year. All the committee members present Wednesday evening paid their dues for the year.

After a discussion, about the expense of renting the Bailey County Coliseum for the two-night production, which would cost well over \$500, the members voted to contact the school about the possibility of holding the dinner theater and variety show in the Muleshoe High School cafeteria and the melodrama, more variety show and candy sale in the auditorium at MHS. It was noted that with the production scheduled late in June, the air conditioned buildings would probably draw a lot more people, who could dine, and then enjoy the shows in comfort.

Also discussed was the type of food to serve during the dinner in the cafeteria, which will also

include variety acts.

The food committee is checking with various groups who have shown an interest in bidding on catering the two-night dinner.

Costs for the rental of facilities, and food costs will determine the final cost for tickets.

Also, an alternate plan will be implemented. Persons who do not wish to attend the dinner and variety show preceding the melodrama can buy a special ticket, with both adult and children's prices available for both the tickets that cover everything, and the tickets for the auditorium production only.

"He Done Her Wrong - or - Wedded, But No Wife," is the melodrama that will be presented.

Try-outs for actors and actors, and anyone wishing to participate in any of the variety acts will be held 7:30-9 p.m. on Friday, April 28; and again 2-4 p.m. on Saturday, April 29.

It has sort of become traditional that the Lazbuddie FFA Awards Banquet 'kicks off' the end of school activities for Lazbuddie, Muleshoe and Three Way.

This year was no exception as the annual banquet was held in the Lazbuddie School cafeteria, with a full cafeteria on hand.

After a chicken-fried steak dinner, prepared and served by the cafeteria workers and vo-ag instructor Rick Copp, Superintendent Joe Hall issued the welcome, immediately after the FFA Chapter officers formally opened the meeting.

Superintendent Hall welcomed the parents, FFA members, and singled out the news media present, Judy Pomper of the State Line Tribune, Farwell and Clea Williams of the Muleshoe Journal and Bailey County Journal. He thanked both for being faithful in their coverage of Lazbuddie school activities.

He also was highly complimentary of the FFA students who work diligently throughout the year making improvements on the school grounds and in the schools.

David Frazier, a junior ag education major from Texas Tech University, and native of Melrose, N.M., was guest speaker.

He has won numerous speaking contests, and mixes humor with thought-provoking ideas to keep his listening audience's attention.

He is also the anchorman of a weekly Ag and Talk Show in Lubbock.

"The Boogey-Man" was the focus of his talk Thursday night. Centering on the Boogey-Man of Reality -- the Boogey-Man of Failure and the Boogey-Man of the Future, he told humorous stories of being afraid of the dark when he was a child to set a light tone for a serious discussion.

"Life is a lot like a long, dark hallway," he said. "You've got to be proud of what you have and who you are. Don't let the Boogey-Man of Reality get to you."

In The Boogey-Man of Failure, Frazier talked about once being such a 'stutterer' when he tried to talk, he wouldn't even speak in public unless absolutely necessary.

He added, "Believe in yourself. I had to before I could overcome my stuttering. If you think you're going to win -- you will."

He used several illustrations to tell about people who had overcome adversities -- and averted being called failures.

In the Boogey-Man of the Future, the speaker said, "Look at the future in a positive aspect. You're the people who will be putting the future in history books."

"We don't know what the future holds," he commented, "but, know that you can become anybody you want to be. Every minute you are given, you are developing eternity."

He closed with the following statement, "If you think you can, or if you think you can't -- you're right!"

When award time rolled around, Greenhand awards went to Monty Foster, Kirk Jesko, Justin Morris and Luis Gonzales, while the Star Greenhand Award went to two young men, Kirk Jesko and Justin Morris.

Casey Russell, Jason Morris and Casey Bradshaw received the Chapter Farmer award while Casey Bradshaw was named Star Chapter Farmer.

Casey Bradshaw received the Diversified Livestock Award and Justin Morris was presented the Beef Cattle Award.

The Sheep award went to Casey Russell and Ginger Jesko received the Swine award. Sheldon Mason was winner of the Ag Mechanics award and also received the Dekalb award, which goes to a senior with exceptional good leadership, a

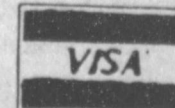

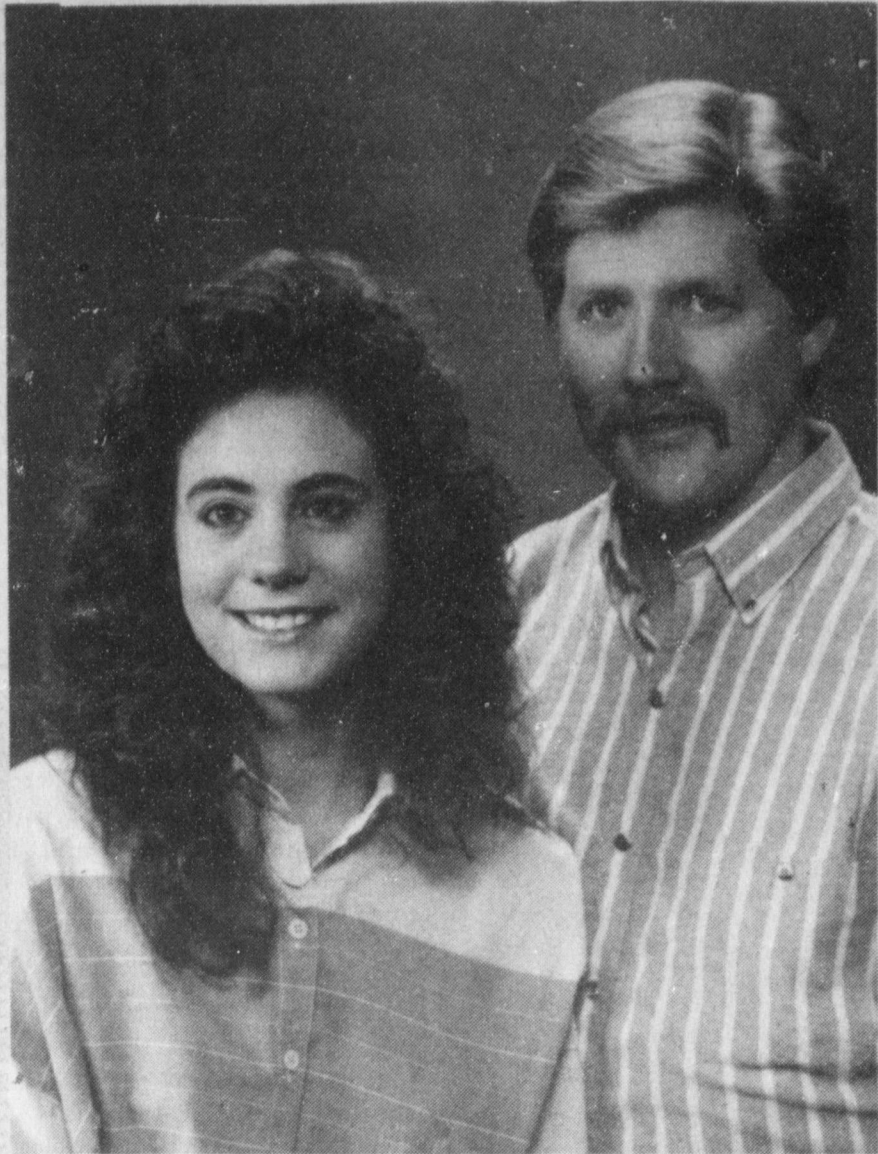

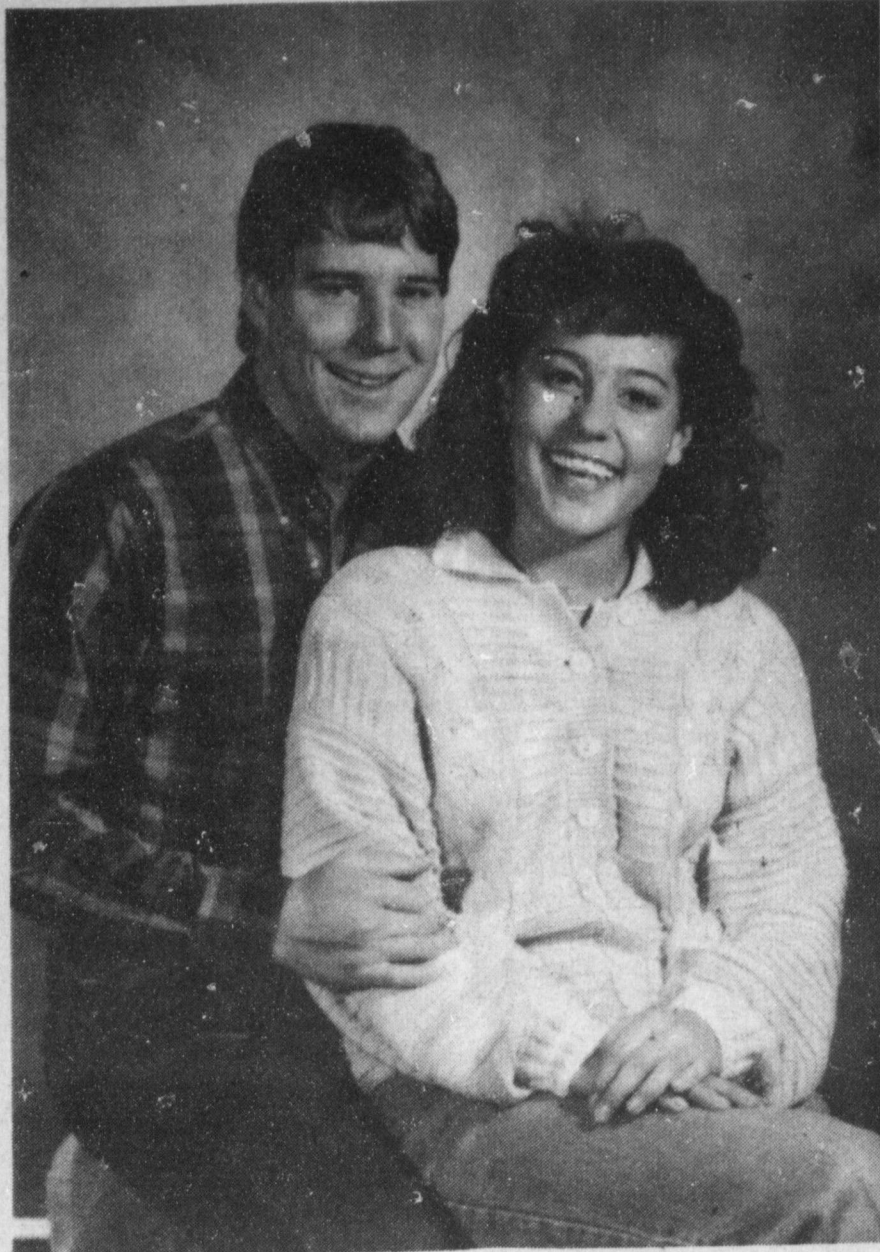

MICROWAVE TIPS

A good rice stuffing, for fowl, can be cooked in the microwave in minutes. This stuffing can be used inside birds, such as Cornish game hens, or as a side dish.

Use half a cup of chopped Brazil nuts, half cup of chopped celery, a fourth cup of onion, 2 tablespoons of butter or margarine, 2 teaspoons of dried parsley flakes, half teaspoon of salt, a pinch of dried rosemary leaves,

dried, crushed sage leaves, and dried thyme leaves, a good pinch of pepper and a fourth cup of white raisins.

In a casserole combine nuts, celery, onion, butter and seasoning. Cover and microwave at high for four or five minutes, until all is tender. Add remaining ingredients and mix well.

This will stuff a 3-lb. chicken or 4 Cornish hens. For a side dish, microwave full mixture, covered, one or two minutes at high.

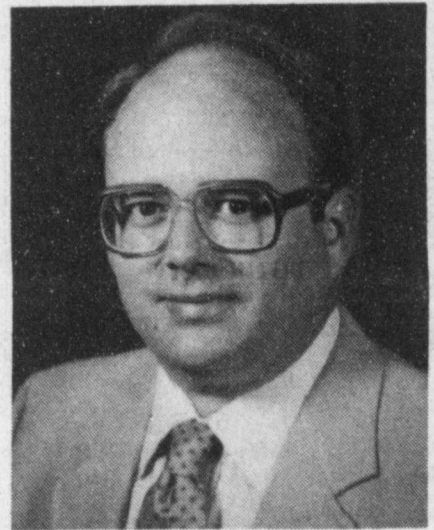

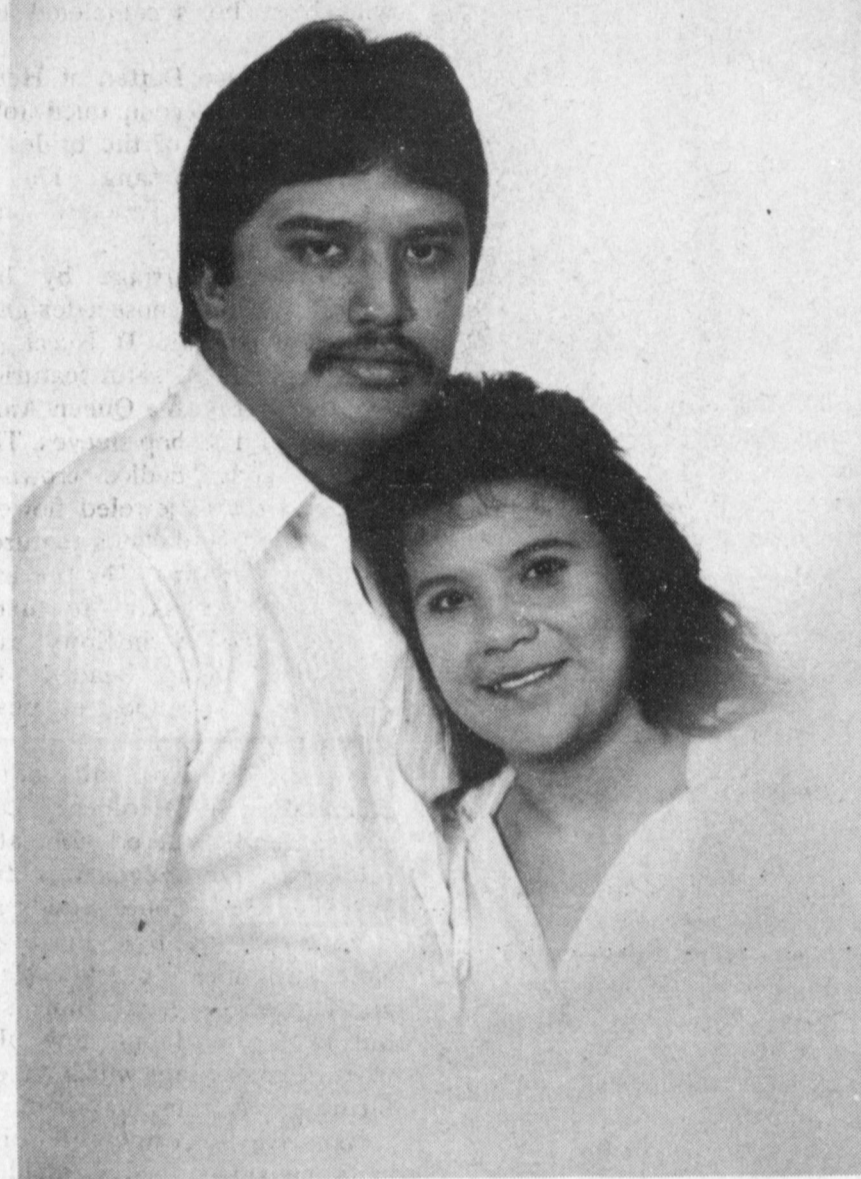



And, if they have complaints about your service or product, Haake said an unhappy customer will tell four times as many people about a bad experience as they will usually only tell one person about a good experience.

He commented, "If complaints are resolved quickly, 82-95 percent will buy your product or use your service again."

To show that small businesses would benefit from '800' num-

bers and WATS Lines, he gave the monthly base prices, and explained how the calls are billed, stating that any small benefit could afford those services.

These past few years have seen some hard economic times for our state. As a result, many honest Texans have sometimes cut it a little too close when writing checks and have had those checks "bounced" by their banks—usually for insufficient funds.

processing fee, which shall not exceed \$15." Sales tax may be added, but "interest may not be charged" on the check return fee.

This law applies to the merchant who is holding a bad check, as well as any agency or individual hired to collect the amount owed on the check. And a fee cannot be charged by both the holder and the collection agent.

Report Violations

A merchant who charges more than the law allows may be subject to fines and other penalties including attorney's fees, court costs, and consumer restitution. Violations of the \$15 returned check fee limit should be reported to one of the seven regional Consumer Protection offices.

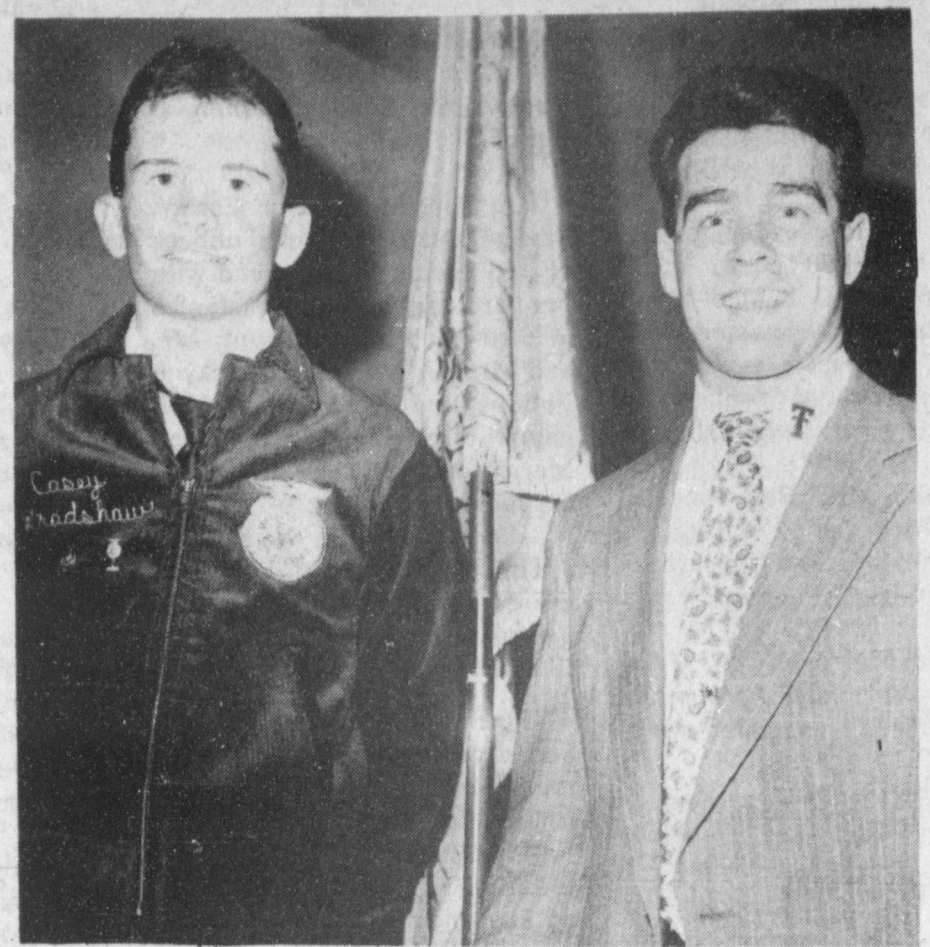

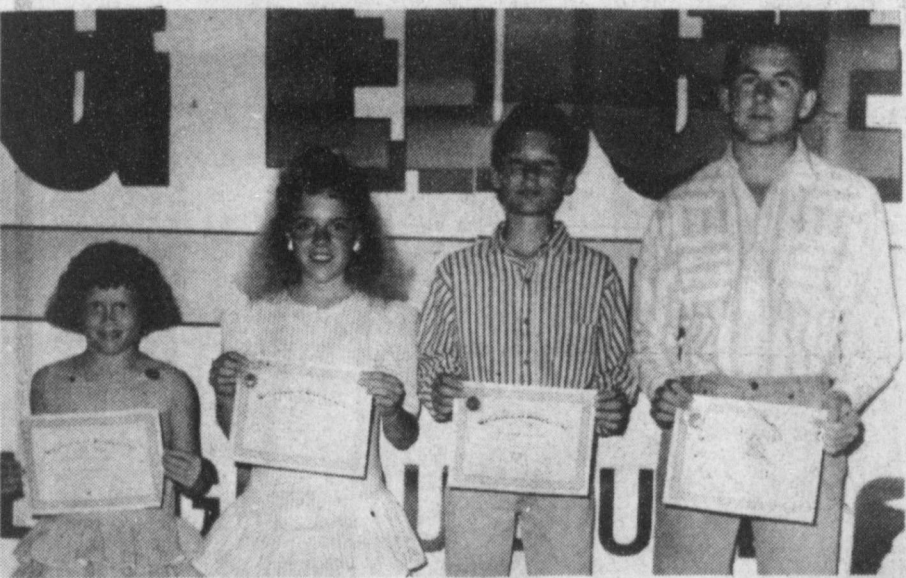

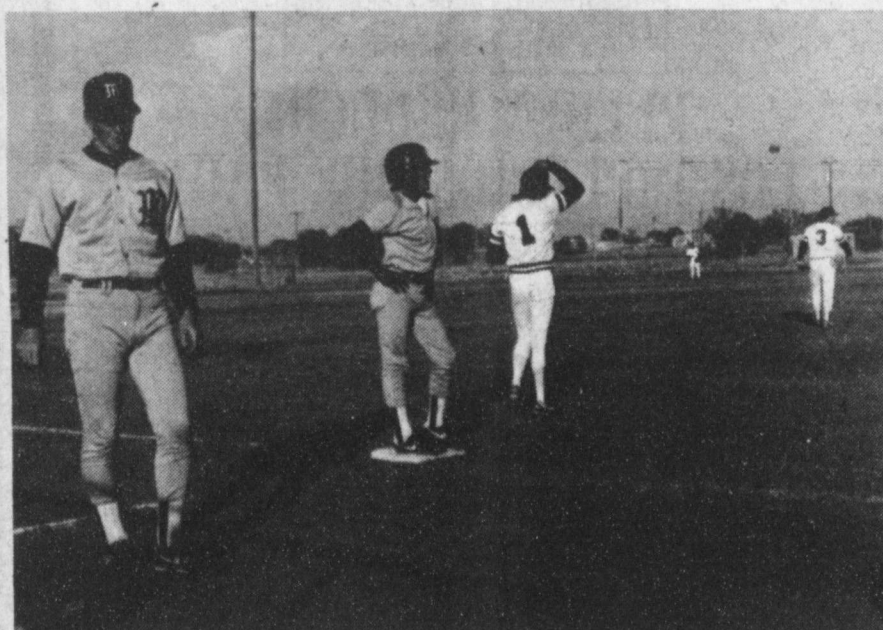

Deteriorating Wheat Crop Facing Area Producers

Over the last couple of weeks there has been much speculation by producers, consultants, and Extension and Experiment Station specialists over the cause of the deteriorating wheat crop.

Following evaluation of numerous wheat fields throughout the area by agronomists, plant pathologists, and entomologists, the general consensus is that no one factor can be blamed for this year's poor wheat crop.

Most of the damage can be traced back to the hard freezes experienced in February. These freezes were preceded by unseasonably warm temperatures, causing the wheat to lose some of its winter dormancy, thus making it more susceptible to freeze injury.

Many producers felt that their wheat was beginning to green up following the last freeze, but then deteriorated rapidly following irrigation. Why this occurred is somewhat of a mystery. However, it is generally felt that the irrigation stimulated growth that the plant was unable to sustain due to injury and/or poor root development.

In some cases the wheat crown has been injured by the fungus *Bipolaris sorokiniana* which causes common root rot. This is not a new fungus to the Texas Panhandle, but seems to be more prevalent this year due to our unseasonably dry warm fall.

There are many factors that influenced the degree to which a given wheat field was hurt by the freeze. The two most important being dry warm weather and heavy greenbug infestations this fall.

When wheat is planted in dry soil, secondary roots will not develop until adequate moisture is available. Greenbugs also tend

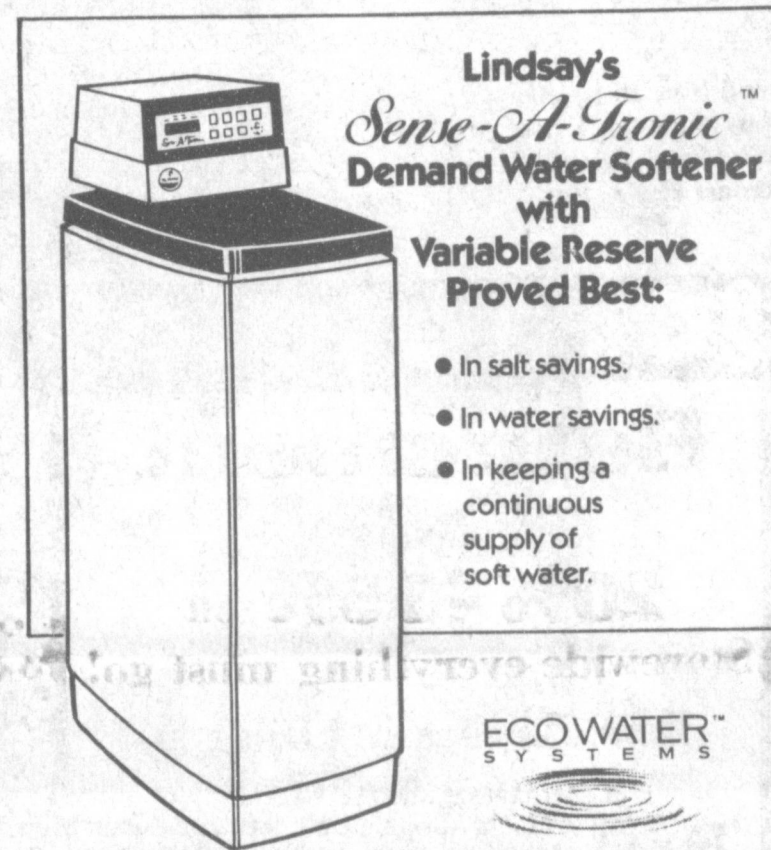
to cause poor root development. In general, those fields that were sprayed for greenbugs are in better shape than those that were not.

Any additional stress placed on the wheat such as rust or heavy grazing, further weakened the

wheat plant, making it more susceptible to freeze and root rot injury. Other factors such as planting date, planting depth, row vs. flat planting, and timing of irrigation, also played a role in determining a given wheat field's susceptibility.

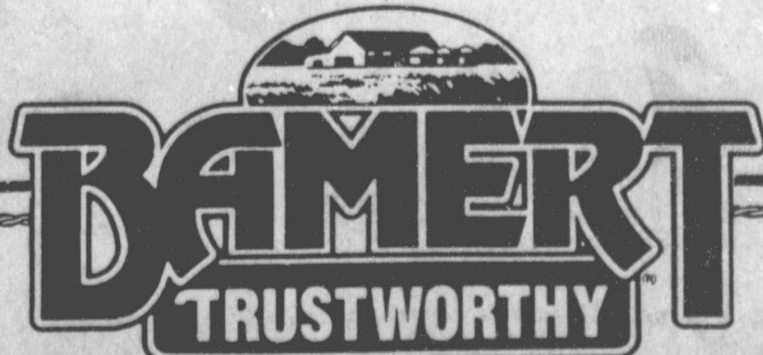

Congressman Combest Against Catastrophic Health Bill

U. S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) is cosponsoring legislation to reform the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act of 1988, a measure many consider an unfair, mandatory income tax for the elderly.

The bill calls for sweeping reforms of the legislation enacted last year which places costly income surtax burdens on the backs of older Americans. Most of those who pay the increased fees for catastrophic coverage will never require the health care provided for in last year's bill.

"Our mailbags have been overflowing with letters from senior citizens who realize how financially devastating the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act will be," Combest said. "I voted against this issue both times it came before the House of Representatives last year because I saw the inequity of this catastrophic legislation.

"For the millions of senior citizens who have begun to receive their bills for the catastrophic coverage, in the form of an increased surtax on their health care, this repeal will be a tremendous relief," Combest said. "After working all their lives toward retirement, I'm sure this added tax on a fixed income is nearly unbearable."

Unable to block passage of the bill on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives last year, Combest took his fight against the measure to the White House. In December Combest wrote to former President Reagan asking him to delay enactment of the health bill so that Congress could further study alternate methods of financing the legislation. Since the law was enacted, a groundswell of opposition from senior

citizens has been heard throughout the 19th Congressional District as well as across the nation.

"I have held numerous meetings with senior citizen groups since Congress passed this legislation, and at every meeting I ask if anyone favors the catastrophic health bill," Combest said. "Of the approximately 4,000 seniors I have talked with, not one has come out in support of this measure. That should send a strong message to those who voted for this coverage."

The reform legislation calls for the following:

- * Repeals the mandatory income surtax and replaces it with traditional means of financing;
- * Retains provisions of the law which expand the scope of

legitimate catastrophic expenses, such as removing the limit of days of inpatient hospital services and hospice care, expanding coverage of skilled nursing facilities, and improving home health care coverage;

- * Repeals the costly prescription drug benefit and replaces it with a \$50 deductible drug benefit under the Medicaid program;
- * Repeals coverage for mammography screening, respite care and home-administered intravenous drugs;
- * Changes the cap on beneficiary expenses to \$2230 for Fiscal Year 1990; and
- * Retains protection which provides for individuals whose spouses are receiving nursing home care.

The repeal package also addresses the overwhelming concerns of long-term care for the elderly. The bill contains revisions in the tax code needed for development of the long-term care insurance market.

"Major revision of this law will result in a package which truly meets the catastrophic health care needs of older Americans," Combest said. "This proposal accomplishes these goals without unfairly taxing those who have been fortunate enough to maintain some savings."

Combest has cosponsored legislation during the last two sessions of Congress which sought to repeal catastrophic health care legislation. Two current bills to repeal the law, H.R. 332 and H.R. 1080, are pending House committee action.

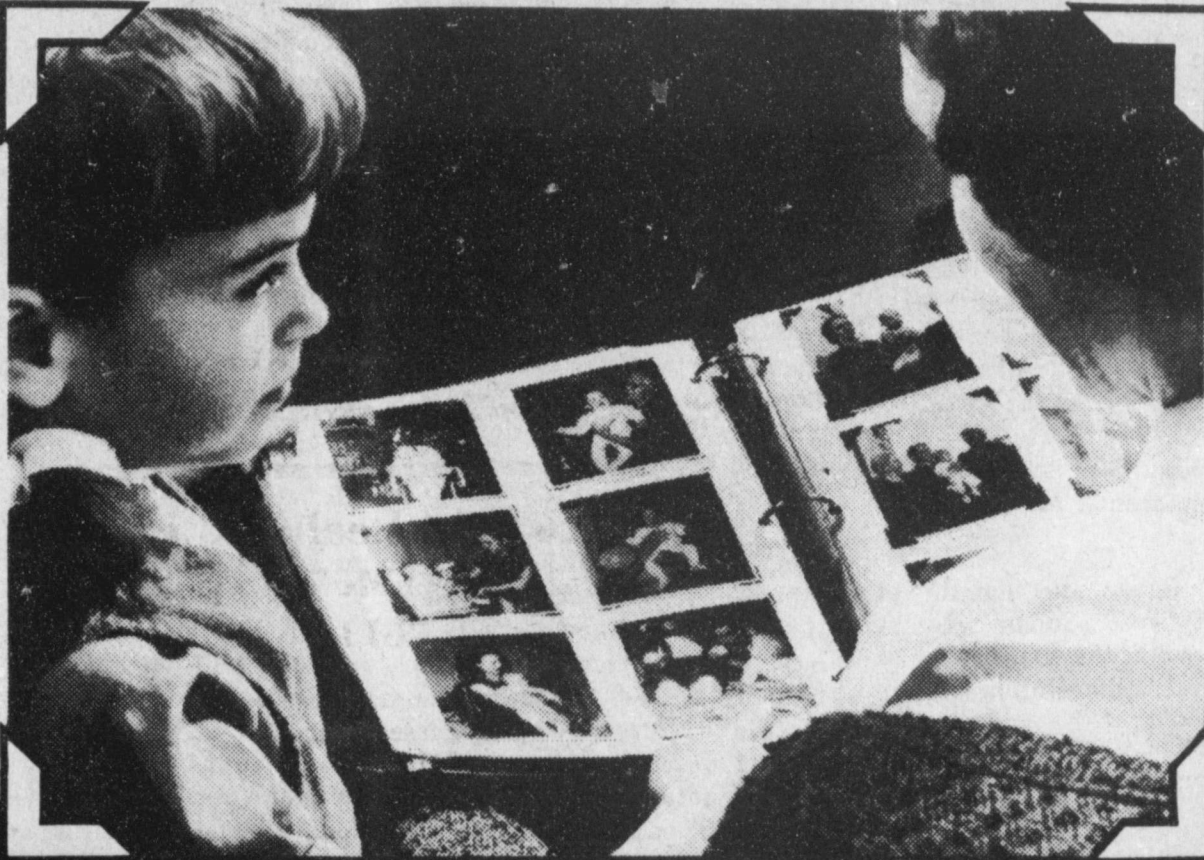
