Aside For 11 Wings

awesome new "retaliation" force will comprise about 350 B-52 bombers, which fly more than 600 miles an hour, and 200 tankers for inflight refueling.

The all-jet fleet will be organized into 11 wings in the Air Force's Strategic Air Command. Designed for immediate counterattack from American bases if a global war starts, those wings now fly much slower B-36 Super Bombers. The B-36s now are America's chief means of delivering the H-bomb

Officials emphasized that it will take several years to build the new multi-million dollar jets and forge them into a fighting force. They will be long-range bib brothers of the B-47 Stratojet medium combers, of which the Air Force ow has 1,000 with another 1,000 to

The B-52 Stratojet, an eight-jet nonster estimated to cost \$8 milon, is in production at Boeing Airplane Co.'s Seattle, Wash, plant and will be coming later from Boeing's second line at Wichita, Kan. The first jet tanker, the Boeing 717, is some months away. Contracts for a larger tanker are expected to be placed soon with one of several bidders. The tankers will cost an estimated \$4 million each,

Firmness

Today's parents of teen-agers could save a lot of wear and tear on their nerves, their energy and their pocketbooks if they could just get up the courage to say a flat "No" occasionally.

Mrs. Jones complains about how much it costs to clothe a teenager — with every week or two bringing forth a new style that is an absolute must. But it never occurs to Mrs. Jones that it is possible to say "Nothing doing" to some of her daughter's demands.

Mrs. Smith says she worries the whole time her 14year-old daughter is out in a car with a teen-age date. But she doesn't see that she could have saved herself at least two years of such worry by not letting her daughter have car dates while she is too young to be driving

Mrs. Brown spends most of her time chauffeuring. Some of the activities her children are in are important -But Mrs. Brown doesn't say "No" to the most unimportant plans. Wherever her children want to go, she hops in the car and takes them, as much at their command as any hired chauffeur.

Civic clubs in one town have come in for a lot of praise because they planned a series of afterprom parties ending with a breakfast to keep high school juniors and seniors from tearing around the countryside in their cars.

That's the modern way, all right. Figure out some way to give the kids everything they want, no matter how much trouble it is for the grownups.

Of course, those parents could have kept their kids from tearing around the countryside for hours after a dance just by telling them they had to come home as soon as the dance was over.

But nobody says "No" to teen-agers any more. It's the one word today's parents are afraid of.

A child specialist advises parents to "treat your children with friendly firmness, and they'll like it.

Of course, they'll like it, especially if they are sure your firmness is going to stay "friendly" no matter what

In a drugstore, a few days ago, we saw what one mother got for her firm but friendly manner with her young son who was loudly insisting that she buy the box of candy he had grabbed off the counter. When she told him "No" in a firm but friendly way and reasonobly explained why he couldn't have the condy, he accepted the verdict. But only after kicking her in the shin.

And that's the point the experts seem to overlook. Parents have the experts to tell them how to act. But the kids make their rules as they go along.

And once they know the worst they are going to get is more of the same — friendly firmness — they act

exactly as they please. It seems that parents — even in this enlightened age

have to back up their friendly firmness with some means of discipline not quite so friendly. In other words, try friendly firmness but if it fails, be prepared to try


