



"I was not a good patient," he admitted later, "Days were black and nights blacker. I was mainly frightened and convinced I could never walk again, I was washed up as an actor.'

MGM arranged for him to act in bed or behind desks, and gradnally he learned to walk. Then one day he tripped over a microphone cable on the set of "Saratoga" and broke his hip again.

When he finally got out of the pulleys and ropes, he could not walk. But his studio bosses quietly gave him roles so he could keep his earning power and self-respect. He made 40 pictures in his wheelchair, many in the "Dr. Kildare" series. Barrymore was so happy with his role as the grumpy docfor that he subscribed to medical journals and became, as he said, 'a second-class quack and firstclass hypochrondriac."

At home he got around on crutches. Yet he often insisted he could walk.

"I am handicapped only by twice-broken hip which has knit-ted but which makes walking a burden." he recently wrote in his autobiography.





#### Commercial A-Power 10 Years Away

Don't Look Have

DALLAS, Nov. 18 - UP spokesman for the electric power dustry said Wednesday it would take at least 10 years before atomc production of power is commer-

cially practical Walker L. Cisler, president of the Detroit Edison Co., made the statement in a speech before a Mineral Resources Conference sponsored by the Dallas Council on World Affairs.

"It will be five years or more before the (atomic power) reac-tors now under consideration can be built and fully tested," Cisler said. "It will be another five years before a second generation of reactors can be designed, constructed and evaluated, based upon the experience to be gained from those

now being built or considered ... "From that point on, however, the use of atomic power should accelerate and we should begin to enjoy the fruits of our present ef-

forts," he said. Cisler said one of the major problems was that "it does not seem possible at the present time to build reactors which have the possibility of being commercially competitive" with older forms of power generation.

Another problem he forsaw was the disposal of atomic wastes, and said that might be "the deciding factor in determining whether a power reactor might be competi-

Development of atomic energy e said, not only has made available a vast new source of heat en ergy which probably can be used for peaceful purposes, but there also is a possibility that low cost methods of using it for production of electricity can be developed,





One illustration pretty well describes what has happened. Today food chains and other large-scale food distributors commonly earn a profit of about one cent on each dollar of sales. Back in 1933, there were multitudes of very small food stores which did less than \$100 a day in total business. If their profit had been on the same basis as that now earned by the chains, it would have run to \$1.00 a day or less. Obviously, they couldn't have operated on that kind of margin. In order to make even a sparse living out of their tiny volume they had to add heavy mark-ups, at the consumer's expense.

The answer was large volume at a small unit profit —and that was mass distribution, as pioneered by the chains. But the chains, of course, had no monopoly on the idea. Independent stores met the competition, increased their volume, grew and prospered. The fear that the mass distribution revolution would be ruinous to independent merchandising proved thoroughly unfounded. Actually, the percentage of the total trade done by the independents and the chains has not varied materially

Mass distribution did more than hold prices to levels much lower than would have been possible without it. It also gave us better and more convenient products, greater choice and improved services all along the line. That is true not only of food, but of all the other branches of retailing. An idea became a peaceful revolution that benefitted everyone in the long run.

But don't take my word for it. Here is a presentation by Dr. V. Orvall Watts as published in Christian Economic This is the way he puts

"In previous articles I have tried to show why I believe the United Nations Organization leads to war, not peace. Its charter, its membership and its personnel commit it to teach and promote coercive collectivism, which does evil that good may come. We have only to look at Soviet Russia or back to Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy, to see why this increases conflicts and militarism.

"But does this mean that we must abandon all hope of lasting peace? Must the tragedy of war continue until all human life is destroyed in a holocaust of Hellbombs, nerve gas and germ war-

"I do not believe so. On the contrary, if or when we abandon the UN it will be because we see the folly of this particular venture in collectivism. #### A Revolutionary Doctrine

"The American idea of limited government put moral law - the law of the Ten Commandments and the Golden Rule - above statute law. This meant that individuals have God - given rights which no government can take away. When government persists in violating these inalienable rights it loses its moral authority, and individuels are not morally bound

"This was, and is, a revolutionary doctrine, and from 1776 to 1917 overthrew or transformed previously existing despotisms, from that of France in 1789 to China in 1911, Turkey in 1913 and Russia in March (not November) 1917. One government after another had to yield to popular demands for a constitution modelled more or less after that of the United States. Finding that only governments make wars and that free men cooperate, liberal leaders of thought hoped to win peace by limiting governments and increas-

ing individual freedom. The Collectivist Reaction.





#### The Doctor Says By EDWIN J. JORDAN, M. D.

It is particularly distressing to see a small infant with that pesky nuisance, the common cold. They always seem so extremely uncomfortable and as though their feelings were hurt by this sign of cruelty in the world.

There are some questions about colds which bear particularly on children Mrs. L. asks whether it is true that babies cannot catch cold unless they get the germ from another person. The answer is that it is almost certainly true, since Certainly someone with a cold should stay away from babies who are just as susceptible to catching

cold as the rest of us. Mrs. H. says that she has ble with her children getting colds and that she does not like to give them the mycin drugs or penicillin. There is indeed little reason to feel that penicillin or the mycin drugs are of much value in uncomplicated common colds, since they apparently do not act on the responsible virus. These preparations should probably be held

for more serious illnesses. Nevertheless, nose drops, inha-

lants, liquid and solid medicines, gargles, special diets, lemon cures and innumerable treatments will be used by thousands.

The supply of moisture of the nose and throat by means of steam inhalations is probably of some help at the very beginning. Cathartics or laxatives are hardly desirable unless needed for other reasons, and if used to extremes these may cause too much loss of fluids from the body.

The only thing which has really stood the test of time so far is rest in bed. If children -or grownups - went to bed at the first sign of a cold and used steam inhalations, their colds would almost certainly not last so long. Also such sensible practice would prevent exposure of others.






