UP -- A mild-mannered Texas bookkeeper told authorities Monday that he was "in love" with the 11-year-old niece he admitted kidnapping and then killing with a bullet fired into her brain.

But 48-year-old Thurman Priest, described as a "quiet, meek, little man," maintained he didn't know why he shot Jeannette Earnest in a wood near here and left her body beneath a pile of leaves. Sheriff Neil Brown described Priest as "an alcoholic suddenly turned killer." Laclede County Prosecutor Edgar Mayfield said "he's sane all right."

"He was drunk when we picked him up, but there was nothing the matter with his mind but alcohol," Mayfield said.

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

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Dixon-Yates

One of the running news stories of these times is that one involving the Dixon-Yates contract with the Atomic Energy Commission. It is a safe bet that not one in 100 readers has an intelligent grasp upon this fracas and this is no reflection upon the intelligence of the reader but rather upon the political smog that has been raised around the issue by the smudge pots of the public power advocates.

It is a vitally important issue if we are still to consider the United States a land of free enterprise. Development of the situation stems from a policy of President Eisenhower in which he asserted it is not "properly a federal responsibility to try to supply all the power needs of our people." Then he declared:

"The Federal Government should no more attempt to do so than it should assume responsibility for supplying all their drinking water, their food, their housing and their transportation.

This Dixon-Yates case, to use the name the issue has become known by, is more an indictment of public power than of private power despite the screams of public power advocates and leftwingers.

A few months ago Edgar Dixon, head of the Middle South Utilities, Inc. and Eugene Yates, chief of the Southern Co., were businessmen whose names were rarely heard outside the cloistered halls of the Edison Electric Institute. Now they would appear through the political fog as the most notorious utility executives since Sam Insull. They have been variously accused of raiding the public treasury, extortion, exploitation, bribery and co-

Such attacks on utility magnates are nothing new in this land and certainly since the Roosevelt era began the prosaic business of generating electric power has become surcharged with political and economic voltage.

Yet future historians may scratch their heads in puzzlement over the sound and fury around the Dixon-Yates

What the contract involves is nothing more sinister than an offer of two private utilities, Middle South and Southern Co., to sell a large amount of electricity to the Atomic Energy Commission, in lieu of the Government's building new generating capacity with tax-payers' money. Offhand such an offer would seem to be perfectly natural in a free enterprise economy, and one to be particularly welcomed at the present time when the Treasury is seeking to retrench.

Robert M. Bleiberg, writing in Barron's magazine, November issue, has reviewed the case at some length. This is what he has to say:

The proposition has been aired before the Federal Power Commission, the Bureau of the Budget, the TVA. and is now up for final review by the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy. What this committee will find is still anybody's guess, but the fact is that this new investigation has to be held at all suggests at least one tentative conclusion. (The AEC has now approved the contract with minor changes.) This is that the furor over Dixon-Yates may be much less an indictment of private power than it is a tribute to the enormous and irresponsible influence which public power advocates still exer-

That this conclusion has not already been drawn by the general public is in no small part due to the confusion which enthusiasts for socialized power have been able to stir up. Actually, the rationality of the Dixon-Yates contract is plain enough. It begins with the fact that in one way or another the building of atomic facilities in this country has been putting an ever-increasing strain on generating capacity, particularly in that area where the Tennessee Valley Authority holds sway. To meet this need, which already draws on 30 per cent of its facilities, TVA has been asking bigger and bigger appropriations from Congress to build new steam generating plants within its far-flung system, despite the fact that its original charter contemplated the use of water power facilities. Its latest request has been for a \$100 million plant at Fulton, Tenn.

Faced with this request, the Bureau of the Budget last winter suggested that the plant could more logically be erected by private business.

The Dixon-Yates group offered to organize a new corporation, the Missouri Valley Generating Co., for the purpose of building a 650,000-kilowatt plant at West Memphis, Ark. The new company, to be owned 79 per cent by Middle South and 21 per cent by Southern, planned to raise an estimated \$107 million of private funds.

It swiftly became apparent that TVA, while giving a measure of lip service to the President's Budget message, had by no means abandoned hope of getting its coveted Fulton team plant. Gordon Clapp, the agency's chairman at the time, told a House subcommittee that it would "be a great day for TVA when it finally broke ground at Fulton." And even while the Dixon-Yates peowere sharpening their pencils, Clapp was writing to the Budget Director to urge a supplemental appropriation of \$30 million for starting the Fulton plant in fiscal

As summer approached, he negotiations became increasingly tangled. Finally in mid-June the President, in an effort to cut through the thicket issued his nowfamous order to all agencies involved "to proceed with regatiations with Messrs. Dixon and Yates with a view

of signing a definite contract . . ."
Instead of ending the controversy, however, this move merely served to intensify it and transfer it to another arena. Capitol Hill soon began resounding with public power oratory. The Dixon-Yates contract, said Senator Lister Hill of Alabama unblushingly, would put the people of Memphis at the mercy of the same grassing itilities they rejected as power suppliers 20 years ago (though both Middle South and Southern are postwar creations of the AEC). 
