Do You Approve Texas Court M'Carthy Ignores Rule On Mixed Boxing Bouts? Compromise Plan

"Do you approve of the action taken by the Texas Supreme Court in declaring unconstitutional a state law which prohibited boxing matches between white persons

The inquiry this week came as a result of the recent Supreme Court decision and the mixed matches on the boxing program presented by the Optimist Boys Club last week for the first time in Pampa history.

Of the ten persons quizzed, six approved of the court action, two took a "middle-of-the-road attitude" and two felt mixed matches should not be permitted.





Price Supports

What do typical farm people think about price supports? Do they want high supports, flexible supports, or no supports at all?

The Michigan Farmer, published in East Lansing, decided to obtain an answer. It engaged an independent agency to make personal calls on farm families in 16 Michigan counties. Here's what the agency reported:

Only 14.4 per cent of the men and 13.5 per cent of the women favored high supports; 38.5 per cent of the men and 40.3 per cent of the women were for flexible supports; 41.3 per cent of the men and 33.7 per cent of the women were against supports of any kind; 5.8 per cent of the men and 12.5 per cent of the women had no opinion

This certainly indicates that agriculture's attitude toward supports, is changing. There's good reason why that should be so. For one thing, it's axiomatic that when government subsidizes any enterprise in any manner it does more and more bossing - and the recipients of the subsidies enjoy less and less independence. And it's certainly obvious that we can't forever use tax money to purchase incredible surpluses that strain the nation's storage facilities to the bursting point.

In this connection, beef producers are presenting us with a fine example today. The supply of beef is huge - but producers aren't asking for supports or other governmental financial aid. Instead, they are carrying on an intensive, nation-wide marketing campaign, in cooperation with other interest ad agencies, designed to show the housewife that beef is a good buy and to encourage her to use more of it. In other words, they want their production to go into the homes of consumers not into storage. That is the only sound solution to any such form problem.

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Anyone who thinks there is too much spread between what farmers get for their produce and what the housewife pays for food at retail would do well to read an article by Philin W. Porter which appeared in the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

The pleasant surprises were many - from cellophanewropped meats through the attractive vegetable displays to the efficient system of handling, charging for, and wrapping the purchases. After a full account of his nture Mr. Porter wrote: small, dark grocery store of your youth, where you used to swipe pickles out of a big barrel, a cat slept on the counter, and flies swarmed around the sugar bin. You bought stuff in bulk then, at a lower price. Do vou want to go back to that? I don't think many would answer

"The fact is that all the way along the line, in packing, in freezing, in shipping, in trucking, in selling, more labor is required all the time to deliver more food to more consumers. The new era has made more jobs and produced better goods at about the same price as last

That tells the story accurately - and it's true of retailing in all its branches .- the public demands more service, more variety and more luxury items.

Just to give you a little idea of how stupid our foreign relations can be, I want to quote some of her statements in this article.

She tells how Henry Capot Lodge, U. S. representative to the U. N., course we are not getting peace, but just being lead on the losing more and more of our liberty.

Freda Utley writes: "But the enjoyment of self-deception is a luxury which we can no longer afford.

"The most recent example of the wondrous way in which international organizations, conference es, treaties and agreements, are misrepresented to the American public as being what they are not. or as the opposite of what they are, is afforded by the London agreement, or accord, of October . Entitled Text of the Final Act of the Nine Power Conference on Arming West Germany,' it has been widely heralded as achieving that long sought aim of American policy; the establishment of a visable European defense by the Eur-

"But, if you examine the text of the agreement, you will find that it should have been called Final Act on the Manner and Method of Preventing Europe from Raising and Equipping Sufficient Forces to Defend Itself Against Soviet Russia.

Function Is Self Restriction "I am not exaggerating. The function of BRUTO (Brussels Treaty Organization), according to the text, is not to ensure the maximum defense effort of which its members are capable. Instead, its signatories promise to make sure that no one of them should ever exceed the low level of armies and armaments agreed upon. The functions of the agency,' as laid down in paragraphs one to twelve. are entirely negative. It is to enture that the 'prohibition of the manufacture of certain types of rmaments' is being observed; to control the level of/stocks,' etc., etc. Even 'those forces remaining under national control' are not to have stocks of arms larger than necessary for their 'size and mis-

"Next, we find detailed proviions as to how inspection shall be carried on, not to ensure that each member of the defense comnunity is fulfilling its military obligations, but to prevent anyone from being too well armed. The russels Council is to make an trols of armaments.' Instead of seeing that the members fulfill their defense obligations it is to make sure that they do not over-

Veto Too Much Defense "Nor is this all. The worst provision of the London agreement is one which repeats the major weakness of the United Nations, namely the veto power given to any one member to defeat the purpose of the organization. It says: 'The maximum defense contribution to NATO of all members of the Brussels Treaty Organization will be determined by a special agreement fixing levels which can only be increased by unanimous consent This proviso gives France, or any other of the BRUTO members which may dec'de to act in Moscow's interest, the right to stymie European defense, It could, and probably will, give the Soviet Government the same veto power over European defense as it already enjoys in the UN over world security. The 'neutralist' forces are growing in strength in Europe as well as Asia, thanks largely to our policy of rewarding our enemies and failing to support our friends. The London agreement gives them the right to prevent any increase European armament which

might 'provoke' the Soviet Union. "Anyone reading the text of the London agreement, without having had his mind confused by newspaper comment, might well conclude that it concerns the containment of Germany, rather than the containment of Russia, And this, perhaps, thanks to France, is what it is. 



If I shut up heaven and there be no rain, or if I command the locusts to devour the land, or if I send pestilence among My people; if My people, which are called by My name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek My face and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their

God said He would bless His people provided they would meet His conditions. The burden always rests upon God's people! "If My people, called by My name shall . . .

- A. "Humble themselves." Humility is the first requirement. That does away with egotism, self-sufficiency and arrogance.
- B. "And pray." Prayer is the second requirement. Most of us are in too big a hurry to pray. We are so completely engrossed with the affairs of this present existence that we have little time for guiet meditation and thanksgiving.
- C. "And seek My face." That is the third condition. Not riches, not wealth, not a place of prominence or preferment, but God's face and God's will.
- D. "And turn from their wicked ways." "There is a way that seemeth right unto man but the end thereof are the ways of death." Prov. 14:2. As we turn to God we must turn from our sin and wicked-

If we meet these conditions as Solomon and his people met them we are promised a threefold blessing:

"I will hear from heaven."

"Will forgive their sin." "Will heal their land."

I pray that any person who reads this message will join me in earnest prayer that God will enable us to meet His conditions so we may walk the road of Revival together.



Oveta Cutp Hobby, Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, wrote to the Senate Banking and Currency Committee, which was considering an air pollution amendment, "There is increasing evidence that polluted air over cities and metropolitan areas constitutes a serious hazard to their health and welfare," she pointed out.

During the last session of Congress legislation providing money for this purpose nearly passed but was knocked out in conference at the last minute.

Last May before the House Subcommittee on Appropriations Dr Arthur Vorwald, chairman of the Department of Industrial Medicine and Hygiene at Wayne University, Detroit, Mich., urged the adoption of a broad laboratory program to study the ability of various pollutants to cause lung cancer.

He was one of the several witnesses introduced by the American Cancer Society, which was seeking adequate government funds for the National Cancer Institute.

"We know that the atmosphere that we breathe every minute frequently contains compounds which cause cancers in animals," said Vorwald. "This is enough to make us suspect that they may contribute to the rapid rise in lung cancer Reg. \$8.98 VALUE and perhaps some other cancers in

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
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
