



Dixon-Yates

In order to cast some light on the confused Dixon-Yates power contract now before a committee of Congress, we are publishing, in three installments, a review of the case by Robert M. Bleiberg, writing in Barron's

In yesterday's installment, Mr. Bleiberg outlined the power situation in the Tennessee Valley, where additional Atomic Energy Commission demand required either costly steam plant additions by the Tennessee Valley Authority or by private industry.

The administration chose to make a contract with private industry and ran head-on into the advocates of

Mr. Bleiberg continues:

After a two-week filibuster in July, the Administration position was finally upheld. Congress approved an amendment to the Atomic Energy Act, specifically authorizing the AEC to enter into contracts such as Dixon-Yates. Gordon Clapp's post on TVA was filled by Brig. Gen. Herbert D. Vogel, a middle-of-the-roader who appears to subscribe to the Administration's conservative power philosophy.

But the public power bloc wasn't ready to quit. One of its fiercest partisans, Senator Langer (R-N.D.), without Senate approval began holding hearings on Dixon-Yates before a Senate Monopoly sub-committee which he heads. These hearings provided a perfect forum for anyone who ever had a grievance again Middle South or Southern Co. The wild charges made by such witnesses have been repudiated by various regulatory bodies, including the SEC and FPC, which sent a special task force of investigators to audit the books. However, the din they raised helped to frighten the Republican high command into tabling the issue until after the election.

Actually, it is not too hard to break the issue down into comprehensible terms. Through all the smoke of controversy two questions emerge - the first relating to what the companies are going to get out of the deal, and the second relating to what the Government is going to get. As to the companies, the record badly needs to be set straight in a number of particulars. For one thing, the proposed capitalization of Mississipi Valley Generating Corp. - \$5.5 million in stock and \$102 million in debt securities - has been widley criticized for the thinness of the equity. But the fact is that it is by no means out of line for an investment of this kind. For example, Electric Energy, Inc., the private utility group which is supplying power to AEC at Paducah (and which, incidentally, is 10 per cent owned by Middle some \$195 million in bonds and only \$6.2 million in common stock. Ohio Valley Electric Corp., the other big AEC - utility project, will when complete boast an equity of only \$20 million and a total indebtedness that may reach as high

Similarly, the profits which the Middle South - Southern Co. combine can expect to earn are scarcely as lish as they have been painted. Mississippi Valley Generating Corp. will receive revenues of little more than \$20 million per year from its contract with AEC. On this sum, if its estimates of construction and operating costs are accurate, it will earn \$495,000 annually after taxes. These figures aren't small potatoes, but they should be kept in perspective. Middle South, in a recent 12-month period, reported total operating revenues of \$139 million and net income of \$16 million. In the same period, Southern Co. took in \$190 million in revenues and earned \$23.3 million after taxes.

In terms of dollars and cents, then, the Dixon-Yates project doesn't add up to any great windfall for its sponsors. This is equally true of the rate of return. The two companies are shooting for a net profit of 9 per cent on their equity capital, a figure which has been contrasted unfavorably with the 6 per cent return permitted most regulated private utilities. This comparison happens to be the sheerest nonsense. For utilities earn 6 per cent on their total investment, including those facilities which have been financed with low-rate instruments such as bonds and preferred stock. On the equity alone they frequently earn more than 10 per cent (in 1953 all U. S. private utilities netted 9.9 per cent). On its total investment Mississipi Valley Generating Corp. expects to earn not 9 per cent, or even 6 per cent, but an estimated 3.75 per cent.

Moreover, despite what has been said, this profit is not guaranteed. The fact is that the Dixon-Yates proposal contains no small element of risk. It arises principally out of the provision in the contract concerning construction costs. If the cost of building the plant at West Memphis should exceed the estimated cost of \$107¼ million, Dixon-Yates would have to bear half the additional expense, up to \$117 million, at which point it would assume the entire burden. The carrying charges on the extra capital that would be required if the project cost exceeded its estimates would quickly begin eating into earnings. At \$117 million the return would shrink to less than 4 per cent. At \$120 million and above it would completely disappear.

These risk provisions aren't just window dressing. Other big utility construction jobs in the post have wound up well beyond their original estimates. For example, the installations built for Electric Energy, Inc. at Joppa, III., which were designed to cost around \$140 million, are

now expected to cost \$193 million. (To Be Continued Tomorrow)

I take the magazine called "United Nations Review," which is pub-lished by the United Nations Department of Public Information, I take it simply to find out what means the United Nations proposes o use to bring about its proclaimed objective. Its claimed objective, of course, is peace. Its methods, however, will never promote peace. Its method of promoting peace is to establish more state socialism on a world-wide basis.

The writers of this magazine are perturbed about the difference of standards of living in the different nations. They think it is the government's business to take care of people. One of the ways they believe that the government should take care of people is to furnish them houses for less than cost. They print a lot of pictures of slums and poverty and then give a lot of pictures of beautiful buildings financed by governments They don't explain of course that these buildings that are built to be sold or leased for less than cost make it more difficult for the rest of the people to get desirable housing. They seem to think that state socialism that is based on no moral principle is good. They seem to believe that taxation that takes from one to give to another, which is an evil, will result in good.

On page 25 of the November issue of "United Nations Review" under the heading of "Attacking the Housing Problem" the editors have a sub-heading that rays:

"In their efforts to solve this serious problem, many countries use the resources of the United Nations and its specialized agen-

In the first paragraph of this article this statement is made: "Increasing industrialization has made for a perpetuation and an aggravation of squalid conditions in city slums."

That is an old, socialistic argument. Industrialization that adds to the wealth of the world does not increase slums as this article contends; it reduces slums. Slums cannot be reduced without more capital, and if we did not have industry and we were dependent on agriculture without good tools, we would have more slums in stead of less.

Gain Of One Gain Of All The members of the Secretariats group of the UN that issue this magazine do not seem to realize the truism that in production the gain of one is the gain of all. They seem to think that the gain

in production is like it is in taxation, or gifts, or gambling-where when one man gains the other "By Passing" Criticized

The United Nations seems to want a monopoly. It objects to any nation settling its differences with without going another nation through the UN. 
