Reds Bomb Tachen Island

TAIPEI, Formosa, Nov. 1 — UP — Swarms of Chinese Communist planes bombed the Tachen Island Monday in the first aerial attack against an island held by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek since the fall of China. The Nationalist Defense Ministry, which announced the attack, said the Communists dropped more than 40 bombs. The Defense Ministry claimed one Red plane was shot down. The Nationalist garrison on the tiny island, 300 miles north of Quemoy, was alerted for a possible invasion. Military sources on Formosa have expressed fears that Tachen might be the first on the Communist invasion list. Chinese Communist MIGs have been reported over Tachen, Chiang's northernmost outpost, in increasing numbers in the past few weeks. Red artillery on Tachen, a small island just north of Quemoy, also shelled the Nationalists for four hours Monday, a spokesman said. The shelling was described as heavy. There was no activity reported at Quemoy, where the Reds opened a "little war" Sept. 3 with a roaring barrage of artillery.

Nixon Is Refused Air Time

Vice President Denounces NBC

DENVER, Nov. 1 — UP — Vice President Richard M. Nixon denounced the National Broadcasting Company Sunday night for refusing him free time to answer what he termed a "vicious, hysterical, scurrilous" Democratic attack on President Eisenhower. He called on 70 major news outlets Monday to print what he would have said in his answer to the Democratic attack. The vice president sent a message and an accompanying 1,500-word text by telegram to a list of publishers, editors, press associations and political writers throughout the country. In New York, NBC spokesmen said they had no immediate comment. "We'll wait until we've seen his statement," an official said.

Request Rejected Nixon's message said in part: "The Democratic National Committee and Mr. Stevenson are allotted a half-hour of free time Saturday night by the National Broadcasting Company's radio and television networks. I asked NBC to grant equal time for a reply to Mr. Stevenson. The request was rejected. Therefore, I am delivering to you a condemnation of the statement I would have made on the broadcast."

In his statement, Nixon said that Adlai Stevenson's nationwide TV and radio speech from New York Saturday night constituted "one of the most vicious, scurrilous attacks ever made by a major political figure on a President of the United States."

Vicious Charges He said his telegraphed statement to newsmen throughout the country answered Stevenson's "vicious charges." Nixon's statement accused Stevenson and former President Truman of setting a prize example of "now not to run a campaign." He said the Democrats started the current Congressional campaign by questioning President Eisenhower's honesty and that they were ending it "by slily impugning his patriotism." Nixon said the Democrats had consistently used the "big lie" tactic in this off-year campaign. "Even the totalitarian dictators who developed this tactic could learn something from this group," he said in the statement.

London Docks Struck Again

LONDON, Nov. 1 — UP — A sudden new strike spread across London docks Monday as 44,000 stevedores were ending a 27-day walkout that crippled eight British ports. Four thousand stevedores who had just returned to work in London marched right back out on strike in a dispute over the hiring of non-union truck drivers. Elsewhere in Britain the situation was getting back to normal. Labor Minister Sir Walter Monckton, who was to have made a triumphant speech in the House of Commons on his success in ending the earlier strike, was forced to make another appeal to end the newest walkout. Two other local disputes broke out on the London docks, but work resumed pending negotiations. In the major smart, dockers refused to load trucks whose drivers could not produce union cards or whose owners had maintained trucking operations during the strike.

Mothers Exchange 'Switched' Babies

LONDON, Nov. 1 — UP — Two mothers whose baby boys were exchanged in a hospital nursery have agreed against their better judgment to switch them back, at least for a "trial period," it was reported Monday. The Daily Mirror front-paged a picture of Mrs. John Bowers and Mrs. Alfred Read tearfully exchanging the infants they have learned to love, while their husbands sympathetically looked on. The Laborite tabloid said the mothers have agreed at last to accept "conclusive evidence" of the hospital's error and yield to the pleading of their husbands. The Mirror has the two families "under wraps" — hidden out at some country hotel — and they could not be reached.

Seven Killed, 60 Injured In Accident

DEL. RIO, Tex., Nov. 1 — UP — Seven Mexican migrant farm workers were killed and more than 60 injured when a big trailer-tractor hit a culvert and overturned near Del Rio Sunday. The truck driver, identified by sheriff's officers as Raymond Hewitt, was charged with negligent homicide and later was released on \$500 bond. The trailer was packed with 85 of the braceros, who were being returned to their homes in northern Mexico after picking cotton in the vicinity of Plainview, Tex. Dead and injured were strewn along U. S. 90, officers said. Most of the dead and injured were pinned beneath the trailer wreckage. At least eight of the injured were reported in critical condition. The truck was taking the braceros to the Eagle Pass, Tex., processing station. Officers said the truck left the highway and straddled a small culvert, then plunged down a decline and overturned several times.

'Prankster' Damage High

A rash of broken plate glass windows has been reported by Pampa businessmen over the week end according to Police Chief Jim Conner. A piece of concrete "the size of a man's fist" was thrown through the window of Reeves Oldsmobile, 333 W. Foster, sometime Sunday night, but no damage was done to any cars, Conner said. At the Trail Electric Co., 408 N. Cuyler, a rock was thrown through the store window sometime Sunday night, but the owner, Jack Chisholm, reported nothing was stolen. The showroom window of Culbertson's Chevrolet was broken in the early hours Saturday when a 13-inch section of pig lead was tossed through the window denting the fender and breaking the windshield of a 1955 model four-door sedan, according to police records.

First Freeze Early Today

November dawned bright, clear and freezing. It was the first time this fall that freezing temperatures had come to the Pampa area, even though the forecasts all last week called for it. The mercury in Pampa dipped to 31 degrees sometime between midnight and 6 a. m. today, according to Station KPND, Pampa's weather station. At 6 a. m. it was up to 34 degrees and, by mid-morning it was 38. The high Sunday was 66. This first freeze beat that of 1953 by 18 days — it was Nov. 19 then, KPND reported this morning. The United Press reported a "small cold wave" was moving in, to the state today and that another, much colder, one was expected Tuesday morning — just in time for election day. The forecast for the South and Southwest generally fair. Survey Says Demos Will Win House

NEW YORK, Nov. 1 — UP — The New York Times said Monday that its pre-election survey of 47 states indicated sufficient Democratic gains to control the House. There will be a tight battle for the Senate. The survey showed Democrats ahead in key races which will determine party control of the next Congress but margins were reported to be "perilously close and still subject to change" in many states. The New York Times warned that latest reports were subject to change if an unexpectedly large vote developed because of election enthusiasm in the final days of the campaigns. The soundings were completed last Friday before President Eisenhower began his "get out and vote" telephone campaign and before his stump in a whirlwind tour of Ohio, Michigan, Kentucky and Delaware. Both Democrats and Republicans had complained until recently of nationwide election apathy. The survey said that the trend, unless it is reversed, was clearly Democratic as of last Friday and was not confined to any single region.

Last-Minute Bids Futile, Say Pros

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 — UP — The 20th century's most remarkable off-year election campaign ends Monday with President Eisenhower leading a Republican blitz to create victory out of what seemed a few days ago to be probable defeat.

At Stake In Tuesday Vote

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 — UP — Tuesday's elections at a glance: Senate at stake. Senate: 37 Democrats, 33 Republicans, 23 House 432; 32 governors also to be chosen. One Republican senator and three GOP congressmen, already elected in Maine. Present Congressional lineup — Senate: 49 Republicans, 46 Democrats, one Independent. House: 218 Republicans, 212 Democrats, one Independent, four vacancies. Congressional control — Senate: Democrats must win 20 of 31 contested races. Republicans can keep control by winning 14. (Six Democrats have no opposition.) House: 218 seats needed to control. (Only two Republicans are unopposed; 71 Democrats unopposed and others, notably in South, face only token opposition.) Present governors lineup — 28 Republicans, 20 Democrats, 13 Democrats elected in Maine Sept. 13.

Lively Voting Expected Here

Gray County voters go to the polls Tuesday to pass on 11 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution, to decide whether a Republican or a Democrat will represent this district in the U. S. Congress and to vote on two county commissioner posts contested by write-in candidates. The polls in the county's 18 voting precincts will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Tuesday. The banks will be closed. A total of 114 persons have voted absentee in the general election, with five mailed-out ballots still to be received. Though the 11 proposed constitutional amendments are expected to draw out the voters somewhat, the Panhandle is probably more interested in the race for U. S. representative from the 18th Congressional District between incumbent Walter Rogers, Democrat, of Pampa, and challenger LeRoy (Pete) LaMaster, Republican, of Perryton. LaMaster, in a telegram from his Amarillo headquarters, this morning replied to Rogers' answer to LaMaster's charges about the congressman's son being on the federal payroll; about Porter Oakes, Amarillo publican, being on Rogers' payroll and hence on the federal payroll; on the congressman's stand on price supports for live cattle and on the Texas tidelanders and on the economy of running his Washington office. J. M. McCracken, Grandview, is running as a write-in candidate for county commissioner of Pct. 3. And H. C. Little, Lefors, is doing the same thing against County Commissioner (Pct. 1) Artie Carpenter. To mark the ballot, voters can either place an X-mark in the square beside the name of the candidate or scratch out all the other names of candidates for a particular office. When they get down to the bottom of the ballot, where the proposed amendments are, they scratch out either the "For" or the "Against" — the one left unscratched is the one they are for.

Beaumont Union Vote Ordered

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 — UP — The National Labor Relations Board has ordered five Port Arthur, Tex., retail stores to hold union representation elections among its employees within 30 days. The concerns are McLellan Stores, F. W. Woolworth, Franklin Stores, C. R. Anthony Co. and Mayfair. The elections will determine whether the employees want to be represented by the Babine Area Industrial Union local 1814 (CIO). The board voted 3 to 1 that the elections be held.

# June Talk

**IF YOU'RE BUILDING** a new home or thinking of re-decorating, or just hankering for some new draperies, here's what's new in the way of fall drapery fabrics. In general, although elegance prevails, it's offered in both the casual and more formal designs to fit almost any type of decor.

**ELEGANCE IS THE** main mood of fall drapery fabrics and it's executed and interpreted in a number of ways. Analysis of fashion trends in decorative fabrics by Retailing Daily reveals that in modern prints, the wild mobiles and abstracts are considerably toned down for easier, more relaxed patterns. In traditional florals, the overall, muted, soft-edged variety is proving most likely to succeed. In print cloths, the one outstanding number of the season that's keyed to the luxurious theme is an antique satin construction with narrow metallic horizontal stripes.

In sheers, there's more interest being generated than in many a season. Sheers are shown to match heavy weight patterns. They're printed on either rayon constructions that are fairly inexpensive, or on Fortisan-warp cloths.

In wovens, there's a remarkable resurgence of good design at a price. The powerloom is fast achieving hand-loom effects according to the fabrics now available. New feeling here is for loop textures and subdued slubs and nubs.

In color, the swing is to a more muted palette. White and light grounds seem to be in to stay, with offbeat head combinations now including green with blue orange and red with pink, walnut with periwinkle, lavender with green. Blues and purples are finally coming into their own, and the one dark color that's bound to be around is charcoal and its variations.

**NEW TEXTURAL EFFECTS** Surface interest is spotlighted this season as the most significant style trend in upholstery fabrics. Subtle textural effect in both flat and pile fabrics are produced through a variety of treatments: Cut and uncut pile, high low loops, irregular and horizontal tufts or shags on a flat ground, random over-all nubby effects.

Color underscores texture by adding dimensional interest, as well as a more subtle, versatile palette. Two- and three-color combinations, iridescent and variegated effects, contrasting warp and face combinations, these are all color treatments which add depth and new dimension.

Some examples of this season's most important treatments include coordinated patterns and plains; all-over nubby tweeds with a hand-woven look; color-contrasted shag or polka dotted pile effects; and all-cotton fabrics designed with an eye to the indoor-outdoor furniture, such as stripes, diamonds, coins, teardrops, geometrics, harlequins and abstract leaf and floral effects are well represented even in traditional weaves.

Plastic upholstery has come in to its own as a fashion fabric. The types of plastic patterns available this season include embossed vinyl abstract or geometric designs; embossed vinyl tweed effects; woven sarans, used extensively for summer furniture; embossed woven cane, a popular indoor-outdoor pattern.

## Mrs. M. F. Roche Gives Book Review

"Sea of Glory" by Rev. Francis B. Thornton was the book reviewed Saturday by Mrs. M. F. Roche in Holy Souls Parish Hall. The event, which included a luncheon, was sponsored by the Altar Society.

The book deals with the story of four chaplains who lost their lives at sea in January, 1943, when a troop ship, headed for Greenland, was torpedoed. The chaplains — one Catholic, one Jewish, and two Protestant — gave their life jackets to soldiers without them and remained with the ship, Mrs. Roche explained during the review.

The book, written by a Catholic priest who served as a Chaplain himself in WW II, also gives biographies of each man. It tells of the life of George Fox, a Methodist minister who survived World War I to lose his life in World War II. Born in Altoona, Pa., he entered service from a parish in Vermont, leaving behind a wife and children. The other Protestant minister was Clark Polving, who left a parish in New York and also a family. The Jewish Rabbi was Alexander Goode from Pennsylvania who worked for inter-faith and inter-racial harmony. The Catholic priest was John Washington of New Jersey, who loved music and was devoted to his mother.

Throughout the voyage, the four men worked together to keep up the soldiers' spirits and when the ship was torpedoed, worked together to calm the men, avert panic, and stimulate faith.

"Catholic, Jew, Protestant proved bravery had no creed," Mrs. Roche stated.

Mrs. Roche was introduced by Mrs. Thomas L. Wade, president of the Altar Society. Guests were greeted at the door by Mrs. R. E. McKernan, Parish Council president.

The serving table was covered with a white cloth and centered with an arrangement of a pumpkin, squash and fruit on green and red leaves. Each individual table was centered with an arrangement of fall flowers.

## Cook's Nook

### Old New England Tradition Features Election Day Cake

Early in the 1800's, Hartford, Conn., originated the idea of eating a special cake on election day. That local custom has spread throughout the U.S. and this year bakers all over the country are featuring a 1954 version of the traditional Hartford election day cake.

It is a yeast-raised cake full of fruit and raisins, spices and nuts. Serve it as is or as they sometimes did in Hartford, with a dusting of confectioners' sugar or a sprinkling of molasses; or frost with plain sugar frosting, or serve with hard or foamy sauce cut into donkey and elephant shapes.

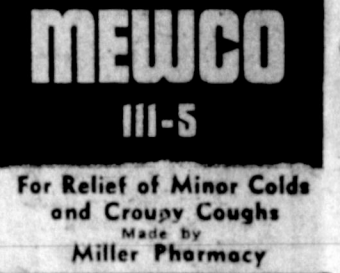
**CONNECTICUT HARD SAUCE** (Makes 1 1/2 cups)  
Cream thoroughly 1-3 cup margarine or butter. Add gradually and continue creaming 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar. Add 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract. Mix well. Chill.

To make election day hard sauce donkeys and elephants — On a piece of waxed paper placed on a cookie sheet, spread hard sauce with a spatula. Chill in refrigerator or freezer until hard. Cut out donkey and elephant shapes with cookie cutters.

**OLD-FASHIONED FOAMY SAUCE** (Makes 12 ounces)  
Cream thoroughly 2 tablespoons margarine or butter. Add gradually and cream 3/4 cup sifted confectioners' sugar. Add alternately, 1 egg yolk, beaten. Add alternately, beating to keep smooth after each addition, 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar and 2 tablespoons milk.

Add and beat in 1/4 teaspoon vanilla. Beat until stiff, but not dry. 1 egg white. Add gradually and beat in 1/4 cup sifted confectioners' sugar. Fold sugar-margarine or sugar-butter mixture into beaten egg white.

**Election Day Dinner:** Grapefruit and orange cup, rolled roast beef, roasted potatoes, buttered spinach, buttered acorn squash, rolls, butter or margarine, celery and olives, election day cake with hard sauce, coffee, tea, milk.

### Love 'Em, Leave 'Em Brando Off For Rest On Riviera

BANDOLI, France, Nov. 1—UP—Actor Marion Brando kissed the "only girl" in his life goodbye Saturday, promised to return and marry her, then left for Italy because he wanted to be alone.

The moody American film star announced he could not take the "persecution" of photographers and newsmen who flocked to this southern French sea coast town following the disclosure Brando would marry a fisherman's daughter.

He cut short his idyll with Josiane Mariane Berenger because the newsmen were harassing him, he said. He left for Cannes, on the French Riviera and Genoa, Italy.

Before he left he told newsmen he considers himself officially betrothed to Josiane who was "the only girl I ever really wanted to marry."

He told the 20-year-old shapely French girl he would see her in two or three weeks in New York.

Dark-haired Josiane said she was tired of hearing her engagement to the eccentric young actor described as a "fairy tale." She looked tired, too.

"I am proud to be the daughter of a fisherman," she said. "I like Marion as a man and not as an actor. I don't see that we are different from any other couple."

Josiane's mother told correspondents this was her daughter's first love affair.

"Up to this time," the mother said, "Josiane was interested only in her studies and in posing as a

photographer's model."  
"I cried at first when my daughter told me she would marry an actor and become an American citizen," Mrs. Berenger said. "But I know she will be happy because Marion will do everything in his power to make her happy."

Josiane met Brando in New York two years ago. Saturday she sat beside the unpredictable actor, her voluptuous figure in a pink sweater and skirt while he told newsmen: "I consider myself officially engaged to this lovely girl, and I gave her an engagement ring I bought for her."

Asked how she felt at the actor's suddenly walking back into her life and asking her to marry him, and then leaving for Italy to be alone, Josiane said:

"It's like a dream, and a nightmare."

### No Survivors Found At AF Crash Site

NICE, France, Nov. 1—UP—An American rescue team reached the wreckage Saturday of a U. S. Air Force transport which crashed in the Italian Alps "airplane graveyard" and reported that all 21 airmen on board had been killed.

The six-man rescue team, led by Maj. Rufus Hessberg, U. S. 12th Air Force surgeon of Albany, N. Y., climbed the Fenestrelle peak to the wreckage of the twin-engine C-47 which crashed Sunday night.

Hessberg and his team were dropped four miles from the wreckage Friday. They were joined at the crash-site by 12 Italian Alpine troopers who will aid in bringing the bodies down from the peak.

### Scientist Urges H-Bomb Test Ban

CHICAGO, Nov. 1—UP—One of the chief values of such a plan, he said, "is that it would slow down the rate of development of new techniques of offense and allow the techniques of defense to come closer to catching up."  
The scientists were Dr. David R. Inglis, physicist at Argonne National Laboratories here, and Dr. James R. Arnold, associate professor at the University of Chicago's institute for nuclear studies.

They wrote separate articles for the bulletin of the atomic scientists.  
Inglis urged an international agreement to end all H-bomb tests.

He said at present it is impossible for the United States and Soviet Russia to agree on disarmament but that they might be able to agree to make the tests illegal.

tests anywhere in the world without endangering civilian populations.

Arnold told in detail of injuries suffered aboard Japanese fishing vessels in U. S. tests last spring. He said "nearly 300 persons received unpleasantly large doses of radiation," one Japanese fisherman died, and 77 boatloads of fish totaling 135 tons had to be destroyed. Among those affected, he said, were 236 Marshall Islanders caught in the "fall-out," 33 Japanese fishermen aboard the vessel Lucky Dragon Maru, and 28 Americans.

Arnold said the best solution would be to conduct the tests inside the United States.  
"It may be objected that the number of casualties would very likely be increased," he said. "This is true, but they would be American citizens."  
"A nation which feels itself in danger has some right to ask certain of its citizens to run special risks on behalf of all. This is the principle behind compulsory military service."
