

# UN Is Dying

An article in the Readers Digest says the United Nations is dying. And we say "good riddance." It never should have been born in the first place. Its charter was the brain child of Alger Hiss, a traitor. It copied its so-called "Bill of Human Rights" from the Russian **Communist** constitution.

Amid a great ballyhoo of propaganda by the radio and by the press that should have been better informed, the UN was put over by hysterical one worlders and its charter ratified by the U. S. Senate without most members bothering to read it, thus involving us in a mesh of "entangling alliances" that our senators had brains enough to avoid after World War I.






