## Canadian River Bridge Dedication Discussed

Dedication ceremonies for the Canadian River Bridge, between Pampa and Perryton, will probably be held sometime on a weekday between April 20 and May 1. But if bad weather holds up the present fast pace of bridge construction, the ceremonies will have to be held at a later date. This was the upshot of a meeting Wednesday noon among Gray, Roberts and Ochiltree County officials, together with G. K. Reading, senior resident highway engineer. It was held in a private dining room of the Poole Drive Inn.

**Weather A Factor**  
Reading told the 25 others present that if the present rate of laying two concrete slabs per working day continues, the bridge could be completed and accepted by the Texas Highway Commission by April 20. The 25th of 100 slabs was laid minutes before the dinner-meeting began. Once the slabs are all laid, only the handrails, painting, finishing and completion of one mile of approaches will remain, he said.

However, Reading cautioned, if there is bad weather in January, February and March, the job could take much longer. "The contractor (Frost Construction Co., Hydo, Okla.) can shut down the job if he wants," he commented.

Fred Thompson, chairman of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce, Highway and Transportation Committee, who presided over the discussion, pointed out that current plans call for members of the Texas Highway Commission to be on hand for the dedication ceremonies and that DeWitt Greer, Austin, state highway engineer, had indicated they would be able to present.

A six-man general steering committee, to be in charge of the dedication ceremonies, was named. On the committee are W. B. LaMaster and Johnny Mayfield, of Ochiltree County; Woods King and C. E. Hanes, of Roberts County; and E. O. Wedgeworth and Fred Thompson, of Gray County. The six met during the afternoon in the chamber of commerce office to set up various sub-committees.

The ceremonies, probably in the wooded area just north of the bridge site, it was decided. Each of the three participating counties will contribute two beaves apiece. And it was decided to invite the Highway 70 Association to participate in the ceremonies, as the bridge will open up the road north from Pampa on Hwy. 70. The Pampa High School and Perryton High School Bands are expected to play during the affair.

LaMaster suggested that no traffic be permitted to cross over the new bridge until after the dedication ceremonies, but Reading pointed out it would be difficult to keep traffic off. Right now, he said, it is strictly an "own risk proposition" for motorists to travel over the river bed as they have (See RIVER, Page 3)

## Convicts Charged In Murder

Ex-U. S. Official Killed In Prison

LEWISBURG, Pa., Nov. 24-UP - William Walter Remington, 37, former government economist imprisoned for lying about his Communist associations, died in prison Wednesday two days after two fellow convicts allegedly smashed his skull with a piece of brick wrapped in a sock.

The FBI identified the alleged killers as George Junior McCoy, 34, of Grundy, Va., and Robert Carl Parker, 21, of Washington, D. C., both serving sentences for transporting stolen automobiles across state lines. No motive was announced for the attack on Remington as he slept in his honor cell in North-eastern federal penitentiary. He was found a few hours later bleeding profusely and in a daze. An emergency operation to remove bone fragments failed to revive him.

In New York, Richard G. Green, Remington's attorney, said the lockers of Remington and his cell mates had been robbed four times in two months and a mattress was burned.

**Underground Feuding**  
He said he believed the attack on Remington resulted from internal feuding between "underground" prison groups. He said he did not know anything "first hand" about what led to the fatal beating but that it would be "illogical to say he was beat up by an anti-Communist fanatic."

It was, rather, Green said, the "usual pattern of gangs running a prison. No politics were involved." Norman H. McCabe, special agent in charge of the Philadelphia FBI office, said a complaint charging McCoy and Parker with first degree murder had been filed before U. S. Commissioner Andrew A. Leiser Jr. They were charged with murder on a government reservation, which carries a maximum penalty of death.

The official complaint charged "pre-meditation" in the assault on Remington "with a deadly weapon... a partial red brick in a white sock." **Coroner's Report**  
It was disclosed that a coroner's report said Remington died of a "fractured skull, multiple lacerations of the face and damage to the brain."

# Chinese Evading Hot U.S. Protest

Fake Spy Charges Incense Country

GENEVA, Nov. 24 - UP - Red China Wednesday evaded for the time being a "strongest possible" protest by the United States against the jailing of 13 Americans as spies and said still more "U. S. agents" were held for prosecution.

Consul General Franklin C. Gowen received no immediate reply to his challenge to the Chinese Communist envoy here to meet him on neutral Swiss ground to hear an extraordinary verbal denunciation. But Gowen said such arrangements take time, and consul general Shun Ting no doubt had to check with Peiping. The two were expected to meet sooner or later at the lakeside Beau Rivage hotel for the session bridging the lack of diplomatic relations between their countries.

**Propaganda Cast**  
While the Red diplomat temporized, Peiping broadcast an ominous propaganda follow - through to its statement Tuesday that the 11 American airmen and two civilians had been imprisoned for terms of four years to life. It said 124 American - trained espionage agents had been captured.

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 24-UP**  
President Eisenhower sent an anxious mother his personal assurance the government is doing everything "humanly possible" short of war to free 13 American jailed in Red China on bogus spy charges. The White House telephoned the message to Mrs. Hurley L. Baumer of Lewisburg, Pa., who had been trying for two days to contact the President about her son, Maj. William J. Baumer. Mrs. Baumer said the message raised her hopes for her son's eventual release.

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**WASHINGTON, Nov. 24-UP**  
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In a frank appraisal of the U.S. military position, Talbot declared that neither the Army's Nike guided missile, which he did not mention by name, nor the fastest jet fighters can be counted on to destroy an attacking force of 600-mile-an-hour bombers.

Warning that attack weapons "will always tend to get ahead of the defense," he told the National Press Club that only one enemy bomber needs get through to wreak untold havoc. He also warned of guided bombs released miles from their targets.

"I wonder how many people realize that a single strategic air command bomber with a three-man crew, carrying only one bomb, can carry more destructive power in one mission than the entire air force of all the combatants could carry in the last world war," he said.

Faced with this situation, he said, the United States must try to prevent war rather than rely on winning it. He said this is best done through a strategic bombing force capable of "instant retaliation." The enemy must be convinced that war will "mean suicide," he said.

**Seal Sales Reach \$250**  
The 56th anniversary sale of the first Christmas seals is "progressing nicely, and on the basis of early returns, it looks as though we may top last year's totals of \$2,118.10," according to Mrs. C. L. McKinney, Pampa sale chairman.

The stamps were received by most Gray county residents the beginning of this week, and returns are already over the \$250 mark," she said.

Mayor Tom Ross officially opened the Christmas seal sale of the Gray County Tuberculosis Association Saturday. No goal has been set by the Gray County board.

The funds will provide free chest x-rays in Gray County, help furnish a school nurse, provide patch tests for children, and aid in treatment and rehabilitation of tubercular patients. More than 4,500 chest x-rays were provided free in Gray County during 1953.

## Hoover Forsees Peace With Russia

Talbot Asks Mightier AF

BONN, Germany, Nov. 24-UP - Former President Hoover said Wednesday that there is an increasing hope of prolonged peace with the Soviets but warned that continued Western rearmament remains the only answer to Communist aggression.

The 80-year-old statesman expressed his views in a major speech to the German Press Club in Bonn. It was his first public address since he arrived here Monday on a six-day official visit to West Germany and West Berlin at the invitation of the Bonn government.

Mr. Hoover received a standing ovation of fully two minutes at the end of his speech from the 100 newsmen present, an honor almost without precedent at the club.

"The tensions of military conflict with Russia seem to have abated in these recent months and from this statement, I believe, we can have at least a gleam of hope," Mr. Hoover said. "Moscow has made many declarations of peaceful co-existence."

"It may be that they want more time to consolidate their gains. They may want more time to promote their infiltration of conspir-

acies in free nations. It may be that the growth of our deterrents against military aggression has influenced their minds. It may be that internal forces are working within to restrain them.

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## 3-City Meet With CRMWA Is Doubtful

The proposed tri-city meeting between Pampa, Borger and Amarillo city officials and Canadian River Municipal Water Authority officers has apparently been cut down to a one-city meet.

The session will be held at 10 a.m. Dec. 2 in Pampa's City Hall, according to City Secy. Ed Viars who talked by phone Wednesday with A. A. Meredith, Borger, authority secretary-treasurer, in Lubbock. Meredith advised him of the time and date of the meeting, but made no mention about Borger and Amarillo meetings.

The idea had been to have a joint tri-city meeting with the authority in order to discuss the upcoming election on the proposed dam - and - reservoir project. With three authority communities "out of the way" at one time, it would have given authority officials more time to get around to the other eight authority communities before Dec. 15, date of the next authority board of directors meeting.

The authority directors - the two Pampans are Lynn Boyd and B. D. Robison - voted Nov. 8 to call an election within 90 days, or rather, by Feb. 6. The purpose of these "educational" meetings with officials of the authority communities is to familiarize the communities with the details of the project and the election.

**JACOBY ON BRIDGE Sloppy Players—Mend Your Ways**

If I weren't afraid of boring my readers I would probably print some such hand as today's about once every week. It might act as a horrible example and a warning to all adventurous bridge bidders to mend their ways.

There is no excuse for a vulnerable overcall on the South hand. The hand may take three or four tricks, but that is hardly

enough to justify a bid that promises to take seven tricks. In this case South was promptly punished for his foolish bid. West doubled crisply, and all passed with varying emotions. North knew that he was in trouble, East was glad to have a chance to defend with his balanced hand, and South knew that he had heard the crack of doom.

West opened the eight of diamonds, and East won with the jack of diamonds and promptly returned his low trump. South played low, and West won with the nine of hearts.

West led another diamond, and East won with the queen. East now returned the jack of hearts, and South put up the ace. For lack of anything better to do, South led the ten of clubs and let it ride for a finesse.

The rest was easy for the defenders and very sad for South. West took his two remaining top diamonds, after which the declarer took their two top clubs and went out with a spade to South's hand. South had to lead trumps to West, giving up two more tricks to the king and ten.

Altogether, the defenders took seven tricks, four diamonds, and one club, setting the contract for a penalty of 1100 points. The result was almost twice the amount that East and West had bid. They were supposed to accept the

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### THANKSGIVING REAL FOR THEM

Thanksgiving Day, 1954, brings a double celebration to the Natick, Mass., home of Mr. and Mrs. Al Geniar. That's because Belgian-born Geniar is also celebrating the completion of the necessary five-year residence in the U. S. and his just-acquired American citizenship. He was active in the Belgian underground resistance, sabotaging, hiding fugitives, distributing money, forged food coupons and passports. M., having worked for the firm in Antwerp in 1925. Arriving in this country in 1948 he worked in the St. Louis Chevrolet plant.

### Living Cost Index Rises

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 —UP— The government said Wednesday its cost of living index fell last month to the lowest point since June, 1953, chiefly because of declining food prices and the influence of cut-rate "discount" houses.

The decline will mean a penny-an-hour pay cut next month for 1.3 million auto, aircraft and farm equipment workers, whose wage contracts provide for quarterly adjustments based on living costs. Ford, Chrysler and General Motors said the cuts will take effect Dec. 5.

The government's consumer price index stood at 114.5 per cent of the 1947-49 base period on Oct. 15, down two-tenths of one per cent from September. It was the third straight month of decline.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said falling food prices, including the cost of Thanksgiving turkeys, were chiefly responsible for pushing the index down.

The bureau also reported "large decreases" in prices of household equipment such as refrigerators, vacuum cleaners, toasters and stoves. It said these decreases resulted from competition from so-called "discount" houses which sell for less than "fair trade" prices.

**THANKSGIVING DAY GREETINGS!** I hope this is a wonderful day for you all... a pleasant time with friends and relatives. I imagine most of us will be out for the Pampa-Borger game, rooting for our Harvesters, who, we hope, will come out on top.

**ALTHOUGH IT IS** too late for the breast up. Another way of baking is to cover the top and sides of the bird with a loosely woven cloth, which has been moistened in fat.

"Here is a time table for roasting whole ready-to-cook birds."

5-7	325	2 1/2-3
8-11	300	3 1/2-4 1/2
12-15	275	5-6

"Usually, after the holiday, there is enough turkey left for another meal or two. It can be placed in the home freezer for later use, while some may be made into various dishes.

"Here is a recipe for making Turkey Souffle. 2 tablespoons fat, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1 1/2 cups milk or stock, 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs, 3 eggs, separated; 2 cups cooked chopped turkey; 1 teaspoon lemon juice, chopped parsley, green or red pepper or pimiento.

"Melt the fat, blend in flour, pepper, salt and paprika. Add milk and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add crumbs. Pour over beaten egg yolks. Add turkey and lemon juice and cook. Fold in slightly beaten egg whites and remaining seasonings. Set in a pan of hot water and cook in a moderate oven 350 degrees 20 to 35 minutes, or until firm. Serve with white sauce or mushroom sauce.

**TURKEY SCALLOP**

"Two and one-half cups bread crumbs, 1/2 cups diced cooked turkey, 1 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, few drops Tabasco sauce, 2 cups turkey gravy, 4 tablespoons milk, 2 tablespoons butter.

"Arrange alternate layers of 1/2 cups crumbs and diced turkey in casserole, seasoning each layer of turkey with salt, pepper and Tabasco sauce. Pour gravy over all. Combine remaining crumbs, milk and eggs. Spread over the top of casserole and dot with butter. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, about 30 minutes."

Myra Waldo, young gourmet and collector of recipes, invited us to luncheon. It was served aloft on a double-deck Pan American President plane as we flew over New England. The surprisingly good food was prepared from recipes from Miss Waldo's new "Complete Round-the-World Cookbook." The attractively bound and illustrated book contains recipes from 84 countries, menu suggestions and travel comments plus a glossary for gourmets. As we returned to Idlewild Airport, we decided to put it on our Christmas list for special friends.

Our luncheon: Hawaii salmon, a Central American clam appetizer and Guacamole, an avocado mix from Mexico. Shrimp with almond sauce (Ecuador), a Belgian beefsteak, an Italian green salad and coconut rice in Burmese style followed. For dessert we had a south-of-the-border nut cake and American cheese cake with either Turkish or American coffee and cherry liqueur from Denmark. Quite a meal 20,000 feet up.

The book makes exciting reading for anyone. We visited Miss Waldo and her husband later in their New York apartment. They are vital, interesting people who have traveled all over the world, enjoying the best of local food wherever they were. The book reflects that youthful joy in living.

For Christmas dinner, you may welcome a "Complete Round-the-World Cookbook" recipe for baked ham, Southern style.

**BAKED HAM, SOUTHERN STYLE**

Ten-pound ham, 2 tablespoons whole cloves, 1 stick cinnamon or 2 teaspoons powdered cinnamon, 1 cup sugar, 1/4 cup vinegar, 2 cloves garlic (optional), 1 onion, 1 cup dark brown sugar, 2 teaspoons dry mustard, 3/4 cup water.

Wash the ham carefully and place in a large saucepan with water to cover. Add 1 tablespoon of the cloves, the cinnamon, sugar, 1 cup of the vinegar, the garlic, and onion. Bring to a boil, reduce to medium heat, and simmer for 2 1/2 hours. Remove from heat and let cool for 3 hours.

Remove the skin from the ham and then dry the ham. Place the remaining cloves in the ham at more or less regular intervals. Combine the brown sugar and dry mustard and rub into the ham well. Place in a baking pan and add the remaining vinegar and the water. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 1 hour, basting frequently after the first 30 minutes.

### Freeze Leftover Thanksgiving Bird

So you're tired of turkey. You've had your fill during the Thanksgiving meal and now you wonder what to do with the leftovers.

Take the meat off the bone and freeze it, suggests the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This way you can save your left overs until you're hungry for turkey again.

Or you can mix the turkey left overs into a combination main dish and freeze it. What you make will depend on the smother and kind of meat you have left.

If it's mostly dark meat, it will need the flavor of vegetables, so make a turkey stew, hash or pie. If you have a generous mixture of white meat, try a recipe for turkey à la king, turkey croquettes or cutlets.

Prepare and cook any of these dishes just as you would if you planned to serve them the next meal. Then cool the dish quickly. This helps keep the natural flavor, color and texture of the food. Also, it retards or prevents the growth of bacteria that may cause spoilage.

To cool, set the uncovered pan of food in iced or very cool water, or on ice. As soon as the food is cool, pack it promptly into moisture-vapor-proof freezer containers. Freeze your turkey dish as soon as it is packed. Freeze and store at zero degrees F. or below.

### Turkey And Cheese Shortcakes Tasty

If you have some turkey (two cups, to be exact) left from Thanksgiving, you can feast again on Turkey-Cheese Shortcakes. If you've picked the bones clean as a whistle, do buy some canned turkey or chicken for the dish. It's not just another way with leftovers, but mighty good eating.

**TURKEY-CHEESE SHORTCAKES**

4 tablespoons butter or margarine  
5 tablespoons flour  
1 cup cream  
1/2 cup turkey or chicken stock  
1/2 cup California sauterne or other white table wine  
1 tablespoon California sherry wine  
2 tablespoons chopped parsley  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
Dash of nutmeg or mace  
Salt and pepper to taste  
2 cups coarsely diced cooked turkey

1 recipe baking powder biscuit dough (2 cups flour, etc.)  
1/2 cup grated natural American Cheddar cheese for garnishing  
Sprigs of parsley for garnishing

Melt butter and stir in flour, add cream and turkey or chicken stock; cook, stirring constantly, until mixture boils and thickens. Add Sauterne, Sherry, parsley, paprika, nutmeg, salt and pepper. Stir in turkey; heat gently but thoroughly before serving. Prepare baking powder biscuit dough, cutting in cheese along with the shortening. Roll out and cut into 6 (3-inch) rounds. Place 1 inch apart on ungreased baking sheet and bake in a hot oven (450 degrees F.) for 12 to 15 minutes. Split hot biscuits; spoon hot creamed turkey between halves and over top. Garnish with parsley and serve at once. Makes 6 "lady-like" shortcakes, an ideal size for luncheon. For 4 dinner-sized shortcakes, cut 4 larger biscuits, then use remaining dough to make smaller biscuits to serve with the meal.

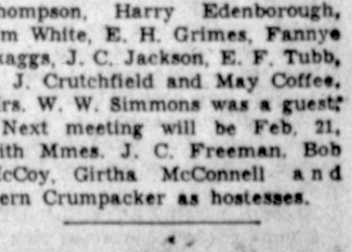
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**BABY**

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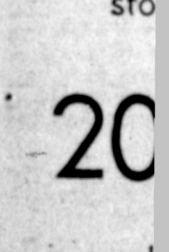
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# Alger Hiss Faces Freedom, Doubt

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Here's the first of two dispatches in which Peter Edson, chief of NEA's Washington Bureau, recalls five years of anti-Communist war in the United States — a war which reaches a new milestone on Nov. 27 with the release of Alger Hiss from prison.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — It is something more than a coincidence that within a few days from the time the U. S. Senate is scheduled to take its vote on a resolution to censure Wisconsin Republican Senator Joseph R. McCarthy, Alger Hiss will be released from Federal Prison at Lewisburg, Pa.

The date when Hiss will go free is Saturday, Nov. 27 — two days after Thanksgiving. He will be released for good behavior as required by law after serving three years and eight months of a five-year sentence on conviction of perjury.

It was three weeks after Alger Hiss was first found guilty in his second trial before a Federal court — Jan. 21, 1950 — that Senator McCarthy made his Lincoln's Birthday speech at Wheeling, W. Va., in which he charged there were still 57 Communists in the State Department. The number was later raised to more than 250.

But it was the Wheeling speech which launched the Wisconsin Senator on his now nearly five-year-old career of anti-Communist crusading.

McCarthy had nothing to do with the exposure or conviction of Alger Hiss. But the Senator hit upon the anti-Communist issue at the correct psychological moment of the Hiss conviction to build up a reputation as the idol of the movement.

Hiss was among the first of the U. S. government's war-time employees accused of betraying American secrets to the Communist Russian government. His name was on the first list of 12 U. S. State Department employees whose loyalty was questioned by Congressmen in 1946.

On May 2 of that year, the late Rep. Gene Cox (D., Ga.) had declared on the floor of the House that a security board, working with the FBI, "have cleaned out hundreds of people in the State Department, and they are going out daily."

On July 20, 1946, former Congressman Bartel J. Jonkman (R., Mich.) replied that, "It is my well-founded opinion that not a single person has been separated from the Department of State exclusively because of doubts as to his loyalty."

Rep. Jonkman reported his findings to Secretary of State James F. Byrnes and in his press conference a week later, the name of Alger Hiss came out in the open for the first time as suspect.

"Hiss, according to my information, has been in the department for some years," said Secretary

Byrnes in answer to a question about him. "I have not kept up with all personnel matters, but as far as I know, there is no adverse report from the Security Committee as to Mr. Hiss.

"It is a very serious matter to charge any man with disloyalty to the government," Secretary Byrnes continued. "If you do it — if the government does it — you destroy that man for life. You can ruin a man's reputation in a few minutes. Therefore, in any department — I don't care what department — it

must be discretely and wisely done." It is a matter of speculation and hindsight now, but it is probable that a sorry chapter of American history would never have been written if this first lead had been followed up aggressively in 1946. Instead, it was to be another two years before the Hiss case was finally exposed by the testimony of Whittaker Chambers, who revealed the now all-too-familiar story of the pumpkin papers. This was Chambers, and (2) that he lied when he denied seeing Chambers

In the end, Hiss was not convicted of Communist espionage. He was found guilty of perjury before a U. S. grand jury on two counts: (1) that he lied in denying that he had passed State Department papers to Whittaker Chambers, and (2) that he lied when he denied seeing Chambers

after 1937, when that ex-Communist courier broke his contacts. The U. S. Department of Justice has made no announcement on whether it has other charges to bring against Alger Hiss as he is released from prison. The statute of limitations has run out on most of the still unproved charges that have been made against him. But if a witness were to come forward with new evidence on espionage, the case might be opened again.

So the future of Alger Hiss is most uncertain. He must report regularly to Federal officials as a paroled prisoner until his five-year sentence is up. Having been found guilty of a felony, Hiss cannot vote and he cannot practice his old profession of law, work for the government or travel abroad on a U. S. passport unless granted Presidential pardon.

## Steel Chief Sees Hike In Output

DALLAS, Nov. 24 —UP—A Kansas City steel company executive, John W. Anderson, predicted Tuesday night construction in the United States next year would total \$39.5 billion, a 7 per cent increase over 1953.

"That is evidence in concrete and steel of the faith Americans have in their own destiny," said Anderson, president of Sheffield steel division of Armco Steel Corp. He spoke at a dinner meeting of the Dallas County Construction Employers Association.

Anderson said the nation's prospects were of "unrivaled magnitude," based on the average income earner and his desires.

As long as the income earner shares the confidence in America's future and as long as the building process brings to him that which he desires, said Anderson, "he'll be in the market for new motor cars, household appliances, new homes.

"As long as he catches this great vision, he'll favor building the schools and churches and the courthouses and hospitals we need," he said.

But Anderson said wise planning was needed "to keep the momentum of prosperity with peace already in effect."

"And we must think in terms of what the income earner — you and I — wants for himself and his family.

"Those are the yardsticks for the planners," Anderson said. "With them, we'll soon be measuring new horizons in America."

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 —UP—Iron Age declared Wednesday that "steel business looks better this week than at any time during the past year."

Operations are scheduled at 80 per cent of rated capacity this week, despite the Thanksgiving holiday, marking a high for 1954, the national metalworking weekly stated. This represents a gain of half a point over last week's revised rate.

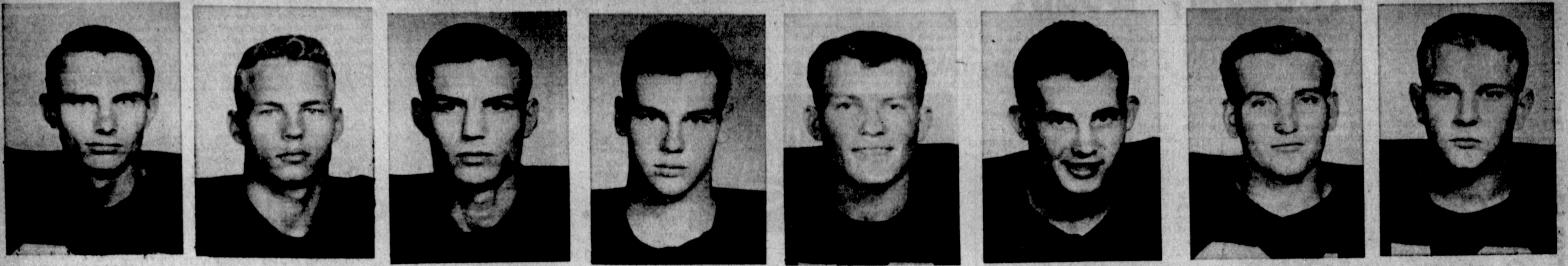

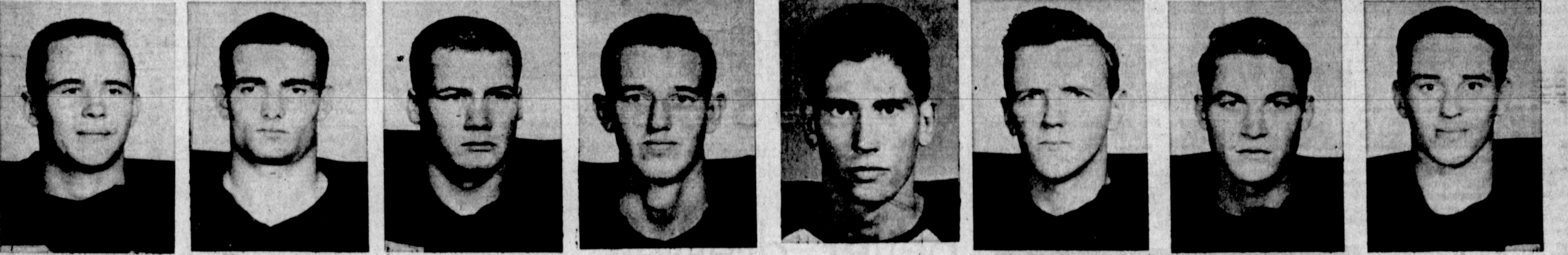

Center Rex Fenton is out with a bad knee; tackle Damon Runyon is sidelined with an injured back; and guard Jerry Neef is ailing with a virus-infection.

The other 17 Harvesters winding up their careers are Robert Fleming, Bill Fulenwider, Bobby Marlar, Carl Blonkvist, Harold Lewis, John Watson, Johnny Claunch, Ray Bonsal, Jerry McNaughton, Ben Sturgeon, Bill Culpepper, Don Hinton, Jim Green, Marion Stone, Jon Cantrell, J. R. Cross and Harlan Boyle.

All are seniors with exception of Fulenwider and Hinton who are juniors but do not have any eligibility left.

In addition to the three seniors who are injured, one other Harvester won't suit out today because of an injury. Reserve quarterback Jimmy Alvey is still nursing a broken hand.

While the Harvesters hold a distinct edge in the series with Borger, the Green and Golders will be gunning for revenge from last year's surprising 33-6 walloping handed them by the Borgerites.

The other Borger win in the series with the Harvesters came in 1946 when the Bulldogs won by another lopsided score, 34-7.

Quarterback Johnny Baskin is the Bulldogs' main offensive threat. Baskin, speedy afoot, has been causing some uneasy moments to Bulldog fans this season with his wide end sweeps. And Baskin is a fair passer.

The Harvesters, however, own the top passer in the district and second best ground gainer and pass receiver.

Quarterback Buddy Sharp took over the lead in the 1-A passing last week with seven completions for 102 yards, giving him 574 yards gained in district play on 40 completions.

Baskin, however, is the top punter in the district. The 135-pounder

has averaged 38.6 yards on 29 boots.

Coach Aubra Nooncaster of the Harvesters will be unable to be on hand for today's game for the second week in a row.

Nooncaster has been advised by his physician to stay away from his football duties for the remainder of this year, due to a run-down condition.

## Baylor-Rebs Head Sugar Bowl List

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 24 — UP — Mississippi and Baylor, two free-wheeling teams with spectator appeal, were a good bet Wednesday to meet in the 1955 Sugar Bowl football classic if they get by all-ways tough rivals in grudge games Saturday.

Mississippi, beaten by Arkansas 6-0 for its lone defeat this year, meets downstate rival Mississippi State, a "spoiler" on many occasions. Baylor plays Rice, a team that has killed the Bears' golden dream twice before.

"I can tell you for sure that Mississippi will be in the Sugar Bowl if it beats Mississippi State," said Fred Digby, general manager of the Mid-Winter Sports Association, sponsors of the game.

"There's no question about the Sugar Bowl being interested in Mississippi. They have the speed and experience."

Although Sugar Bowl officials were not as definite on Baylor, it was a good bet that the Bears will be the other team if they beat Rice Saturday because of complications involved in trying to get Navy, the third team under consideration.

"We like Navy very much," said one Sugar Bowl official, "and we might extend them an invitation if they beat or tie Army Saturday."

However, a source said because of "complications" Navy probably couldn't accept a bid. It was also understood that the Cotton Bowl had felt out Navy about a bid.

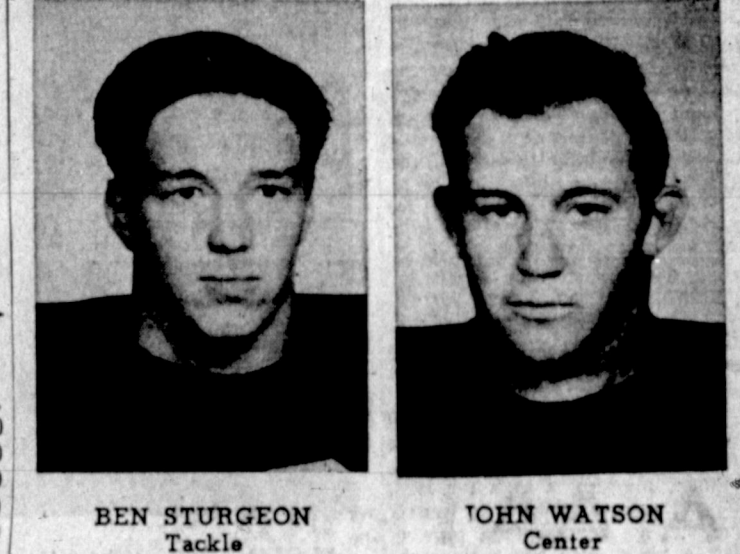
Announcement of the teams selected to play probably will be made late Saturday unless defeats complicate matters.

Twice before, State has upset Mississippi's express. In 1941 the Maroons upset the Rebels' Southeastern Conference championship and bowl hopes with a tie, and they turned the same trick last season.

Baylor has been in a similar situation also: Twice before in the past six years, the Bears have come to their final game against Rice needing only a victory for a share of the Southwest Conference crown that has been denied them since 1924. Each time Rice won.

A win this Saturday would give Baylor, which has a 7-2 record, a share of the crown. It could not go to the Cotton Bowl, however.

Arkansas has clinched that spot because it beat the Bears by one point earlier in the season.

## Press Box Views

SEVERAL FANS HAVE ASKED US if Mitchell Williamson, author of the Williamson System Ratings that appear in the News each Tuesday and Wednesday, has answered the letter we wrote him last week in regards of "under rating" our Fighting Harvesters.

Well, we haven't heard from him direct, but guess last week's rating was intended as an answer to the letter.

You probably noticed he elevated the Harvesters four notches in the ratings this week even though the Harvesters lost to Lubbock, 14-7, last Saturday.

And this is in contrast with his ratings the week before when he left the Harvesters in 30th place despite a rather convincing 28-14 win over Odessa.

But here's what is more amusing about his ratings.

When Pampa met Odessa, the Broncs were rated sixth in the state. The Harvesters tripped Odessa but didn't move up in the ratings.

Then the next week (which was last Saturday) the Harvesters met Lubbock who was rated 25 in the state. The Harvesters lost to Lubbock but advanced four notches to 26th in Williamson's state ratings.

In other words, the Harvesters received more mention by losing to the 25th ranked team in the state than they did by defeating the sixth ranked team.

However, last week's ratings must have been an "indirect" answer to our letter. We wrote him after the ratings came out following the Odessa game as he apparently had lost track of just how the Green and Golders had been fairing on the gridiron.

We imagine he only glanced at the won-lost record of the Harvesters when compiling his weekly ratings and not noting the scores of the games.

Well, we weren't trying to pull Williamson's leg in the letter. We just like to see the Harvesters get the credit that is due them.

We might add that Williamson, as a whole, is pretty accurate with his rating and predictions. You'll recall that last year he picked six of the eight Class AAAA district champions. And the two he picked to win that didn't finish second in the district race.

Then he has a tremendous task of rating all of the high school teams in Texas. He is the only person who knows of that rates

## Layne Only One Short Of 100 Pass Completions This Season

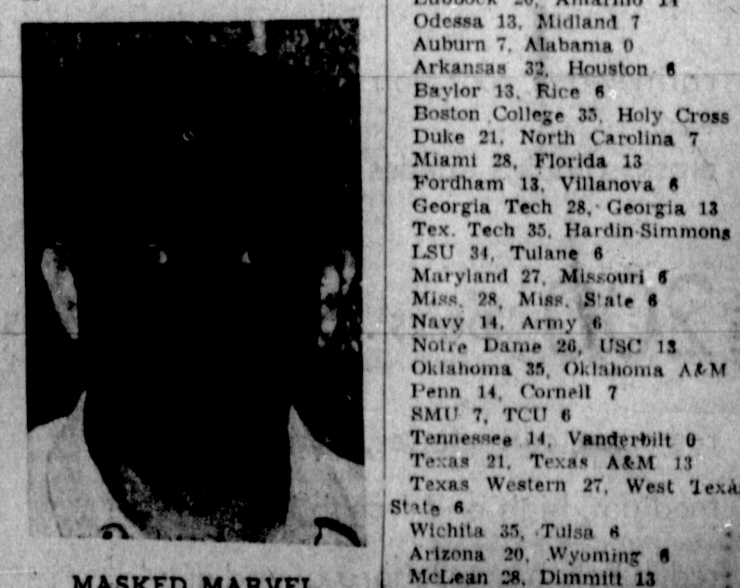

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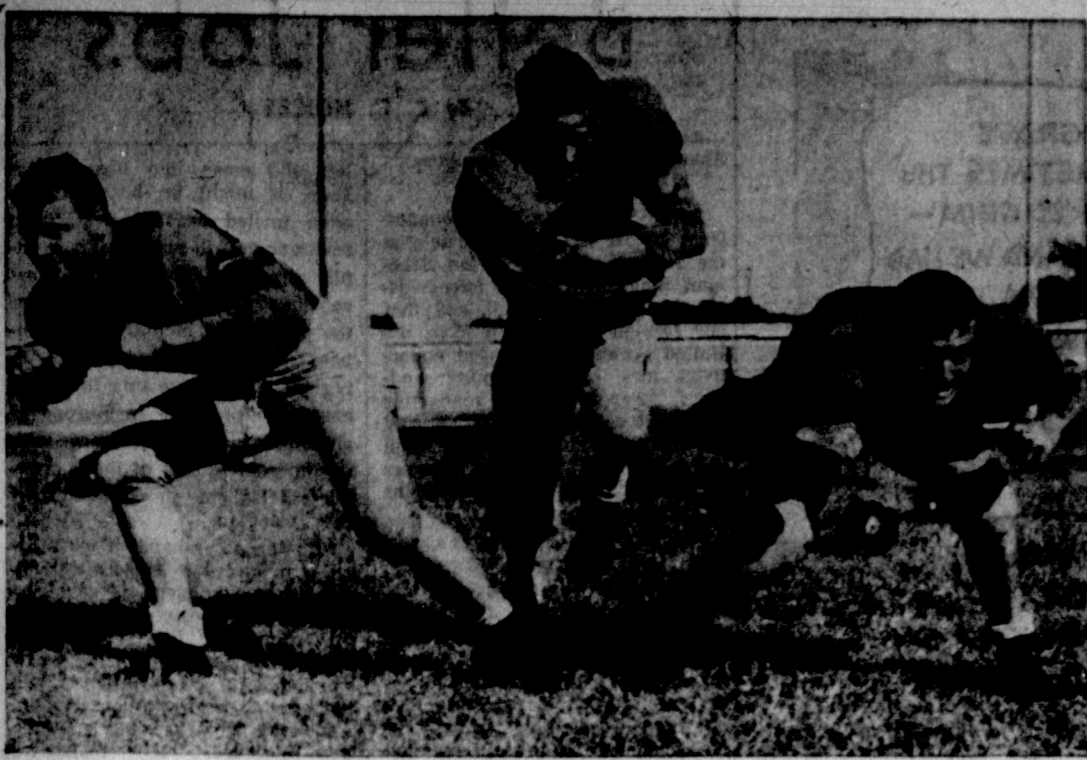

### Army Gets Nod Over Navy By Oddsmakers

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 24 — UP—The professional odds-makers have installed Army as a six point favorite over Navy in their annual griffron classic Saturday. Notre Dame was rated 14 points better than Southern California, the Pacific Coast's Rose Bowl entry, and Southern Methodist was picked to defeat Texas Christian by six points.

The Minneapolis rating house which sets the official line on college football point spreads picked Oklahoma to defeat Oklahoma A&M by 21 points, the largest margin given to any team.

In games scheduled for Thanksgiving day Thursday Utah was rated 13 over Utah State and Missouri 14 over Maryland, William & Mary was rated 17 over Colgate, Brown were rated 20 over Wake Forest, and West Virginia by six points.

Dayton was given a one point edge over Chattanooga and seven point favorites Thursday included Cincinnati over Miami of Ohio, Virginia Tech over VMI and Texas over Texas A&M.

Three other Thursday games were rated for 14-point spreads, Cornell over Pennsylvania, Wichita over Tulsa and Denver over Colorado A&M.

In other Saturday games, Miami of Florida was picked over Florida by seven points, Georgia Tech was favored by 13 over Georgia, Mississippi by 13 over Mississippi State, Arkansas by 14 over Houston, and West Virginia by 19 over Virginia.

Other favorites included Boston College seven over Holy Cross, Fordham seven over Villanova, South Carolina seven over Wake Forest, Louisiana State seven over Tulane, Tennessee seven over Vanderbilt, Baylor seven over Rice, Arizona 13 over Wyoming, Auburn 13 over Alabama, Duke 13 over North Carolina, and Texas Tech 21 over Hardin-Simmons.

### One-Handed Back Leads Mates To Win

DAVIDSON, N. C., Nov. 24 — UP — A one-handed halfback, whose handicap had been kept secret at his family's request, caught a pass and ran 45 yards for a touchdown, then blocked a key conversion attempt last week to give little Elon College a 14 to 6 victory over Davidson.

In addition to his offensive work, Richards stood out on pass defense Saturday, batting down several Davidson throws with his one hand. He catches passes with one-handed leaps and has made several touchdowns previously. He was an all-star player at Mahanoy City high school.

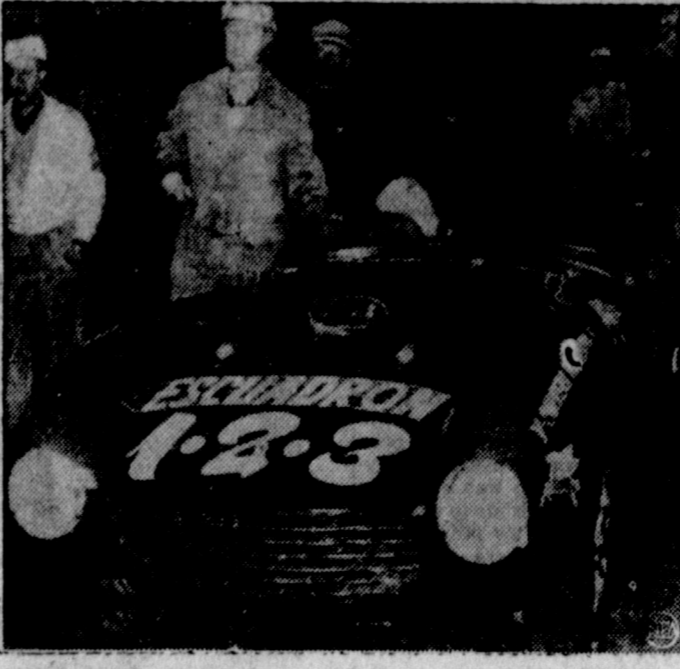
### Majors Grab Two Texas Leaguers

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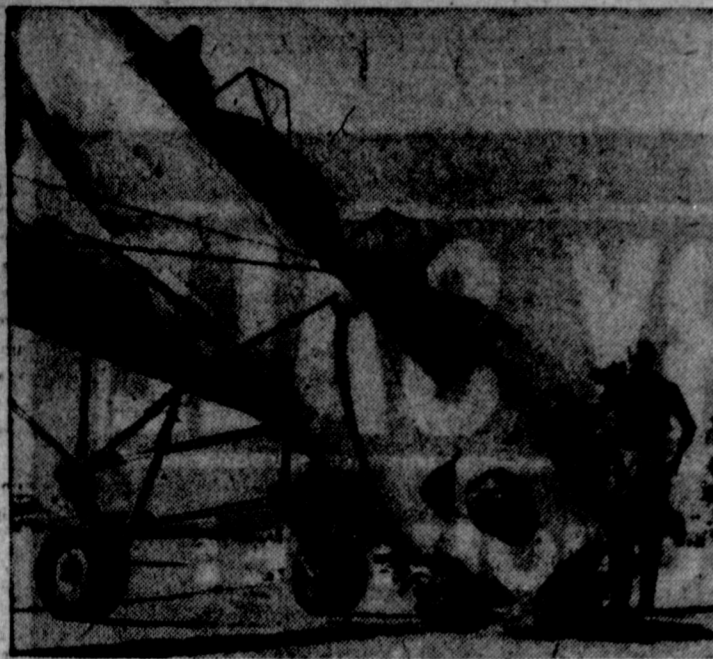

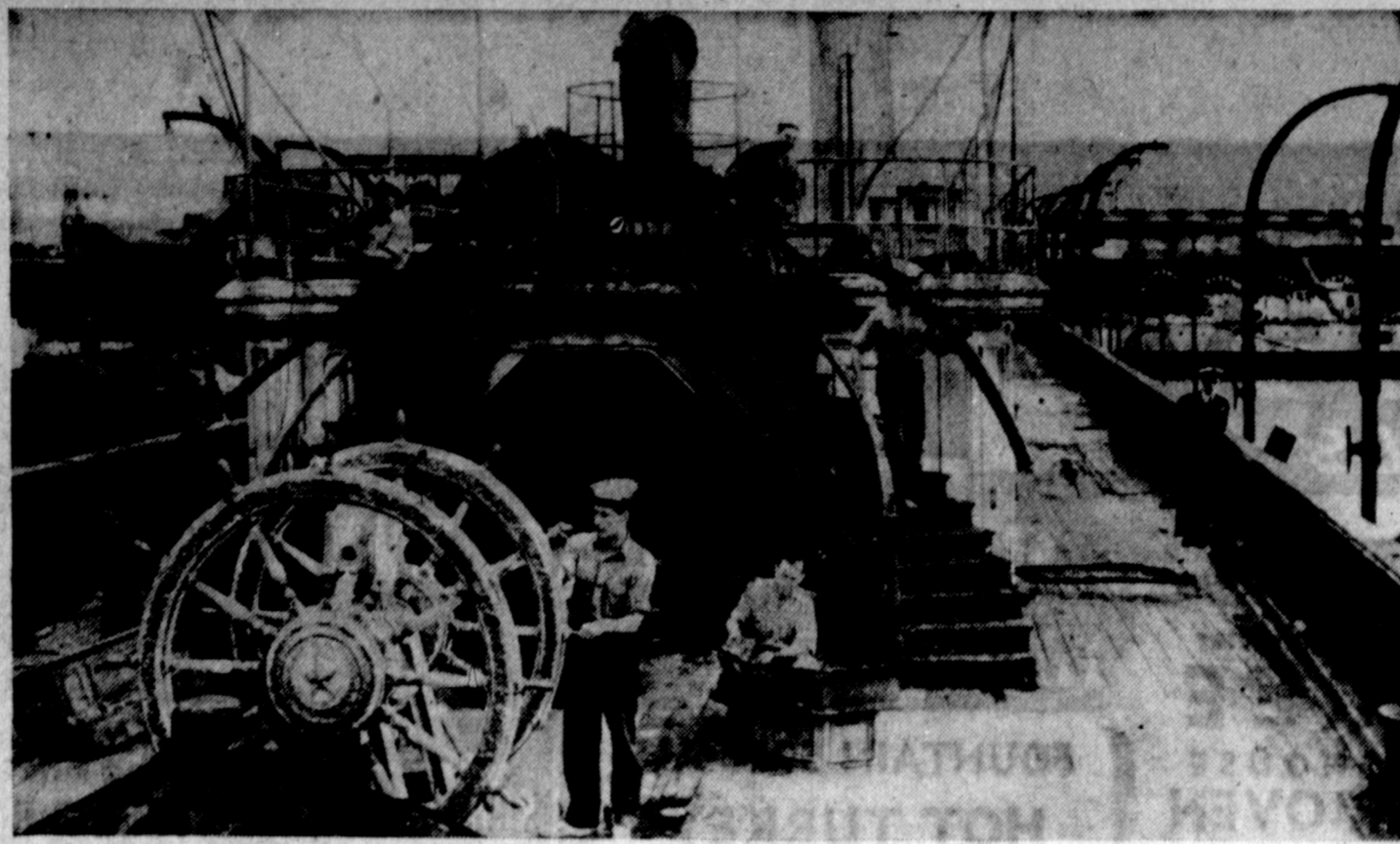

## Decorations Really Build Up The Spirit

That once-a-year feeling doesn't really set in until the boxes are out of the closet and all the home decorations are unpacked and going up. For decorating the home with traditional or original fancies makes the season as full of Christmas as a holly berry.

Safety considerations should rate high when picking your tree for according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters the tree is Christmas' greatest hazard.

They suggest: choose a small tree and keep it outdoors until a few days before setting it up; if you have land pick a live tree; cover the dirt with foil and plant it afterwards; saw the butt of a cut tree slantwise and stand it in a tub of water; locate it away from fireplace, exit or radiator; avoid untreated paper or cotton ornaments; use electric lights with the UL (Underwriters Laboratory) mark, never candles; don't run electric tinsel around the base; don't use outlet or plug under the tree.

When your tree is set up, wire the top to the molding or window frame, using something like Nichols light aluminum wire which is inconspicuous. Or, if you wish, the guy wire can be hung with decorations.

Strictly contemporary are two of science's contributions to the tree decorations. Styrofoam shapes — balls, stars, canes, snowmen and Santas — can be bought at the five-and-ten and decorated with sequin pins. The Tie's contribution is Satinons ribbon which sticks to itself when moistened. This means that the youngsters can make the traditional colorful paper chains with no paste and no mess.

For the family that wants to bypass the traditional tree, there are many ideas. The Wallpaper Information Service suggests cutting a tree from an appropri-

ately colored roll of wallpaper and pinning it above the mantel with common pins, which can hold light Christmas balls.

For those who sew, the Singer Sewing Center suggests a double mantel tree made of felt that can stand up over a bottle or glass. A small ready-made tree that folds away is made by Merripak.

Door decoration ideas, besides the usual wreath, include Fanny Farmer's "Magic Christmas Tree" — an evergreen branch or small artificial tree taped to the door and hung with candies of all sorts. Another idea makes the cards received into three gay triplicate fans. Gold cardboard fans with loops of Sashen ribbon are secured with Scotch cellophane tape to the door. Cards, as they arrive, can be inserted between layers of the fans.

For the mantel, angels in chorus are suggested by Dennison for a bright touch. They're made of Christmas balls covered with peach flameproof crepe paper for the heads, pleated duplex crepe paper for the skirts. Skirts are edged with gaily-printed Scotch tape. The lacy wings are paper dollies. A festoon for the mantel is coarsely-fringed crepe paper, wrapped loosely with silver ribbon, held to the mantel by cellophane tape.

Just before serving, warm 4 ounces of French cognac in a saucepan and pour it over the roast. Ignite the cognac with a match and serve while aflame. (This is from the French National Association of Cognac Producers.)

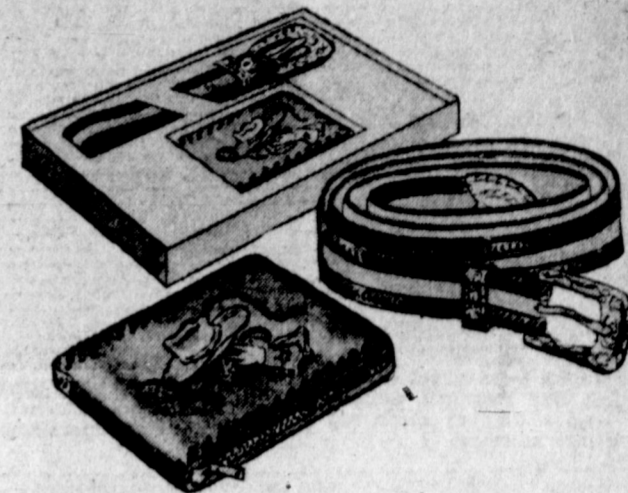

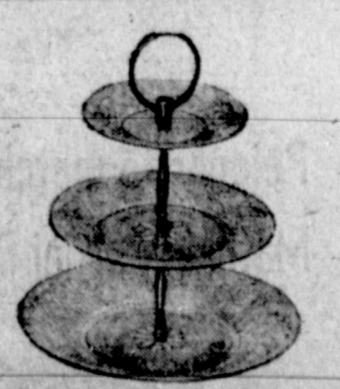

## Buffet Best System For Entertaining

What with worrying about the big day, the kids, the tree and her gift baking, it's generally a brave hostess who tackles a dinner party during the Christmas season.

But it is among the most wonderful times of year to have a dinner party — the home is warm and inviting and many old friends and relatives are in town. But the task need not be exhausting. Whatever you serve, do it buffet-style.

Here are ideas and recipes for a dinner party that's enticing and outside the run of ordinary holiday fare.

The menu a blaze of holiday colors: the hot macaroni-frankfurter casserole has tomato juice and sweet pickle relish in it, the slaw is garnished with green and red pepper, red pimiento enlivens the pickles and the fruitcake has a garnish of red and green maraschino cherries carved into poinsettia petals and leaves.

### Holiday Casserole

Add 1 tablespoon salt to 3 quarts rapidly boiling water. Gradually add 2 cups elbow macaroni so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender. Drain.

Melt 2 tablespoons margarine over low heat. Add ¼ cup chopped onion, ¼ cup chopped celery and saute until tender. Add cooked macaroni, 3 cups tomato juice, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon horseradish, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 pound frankfurters, cut in quarters crosswise, ½ cup chopped sweet mixed pickles. Mix well.

Cook over low heat 10 minutes. Turn into a greased 1½-quart casserole and sprinkle with grated cheese, if you like. Bake in 350 degrees oven 15 minutes. Serves 4 to 6.

### Cherry Fruitcake

Cream 1 cup margarine until light and fluffy. Add 1 cup sugar gradually and continue creaming until blended. Beat in 4 egg yolks, one at a time. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla, ½ teaspoon mace, 2 tablespoons brandy; mix well.

Gradually add 1½ cups sifted cake flour while beating. Combine ½ cup sifted cake flour with 1 cup chopped nuts and ¼ cup chopped candied orange peel, ¼ cup citron, ½ cup chopped candied pineapple, ½ cup shredded coconut, ½ cup white raisins, ½ cup quartered maraschino cherries, drained. Combine 4 egg whites and ½ teaspoon salt, beat until foamy.

Add ½ teaspoon cream of tartar and beat until stiff. Fold egg whites into batter. Pour into waxed-paper-lined, greased 9-inch tube pan. Bake in 325 degrees oven 1 hour. Top with confectioners' sugar glaze and green and red cherries cut into flowers.

## Decorated Cookie Pails Make Friendship Gift

There is a family you know, perhaps your neighbors. You have borrowed their lawn mower and baby carriage. You went swimming at their summer place. Christmas comes and you want to do something for them.

A marvelous solution is a cookie pail. Bake from a variety of recipes a collection of cookies. Make a set of gingerbread men, one for each member, with names on in icing.

Because father wants to show his appreciation, too, let him fix cardboard paint pails by painting them or stapling gay wraps and ribbons on them. The kids can pack and deliver on Christmas eve.

Out of the variety of Christmas cookie recipes, it's hard to pick.

### Mincemeat Cookies

Combine and mix well 1 package Nestle's cookie mix, 1-8 teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, ½ cup dry sherry or orange juice. Add 1 cup dry mincemeat, crumbled, 1 cup mixed candied fruit, coarsely chopped.

Drop by teaspoonfuls on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees F. for 15 minutes. Yield: approximately 4 dozen.

### Santa Claus Cookies

To 2 cups of sifted flour, add 1½ teaspoons double-acting baking powder, ½ teaspoon soda, ¼ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon cinnamon. Sift three times. Cream ½ cup butter, add 1 cup sugar gradually and cream until light and fluffy. Add 1 unbeat egg and 3 melted squares unsweetened chocolate. Beat well.

Add flour mixture a little at a time, mixing. Add 2 tablespoons milk. Chill. Roll ½-8 inch thick on floured board. Cut with floured Santa cutter and sprinkle with sugar. Bake on ungreased sheet in 350-degree oven 9 minutes. Makes 6 dozen.

### Molasses Cutouts

Stir together 1 cup shortening and 1 cup brown sugar. Add 3 eggs, 2 cups molasses and beat thoroughly. Then sift together 8 cups bread or all-purpose flour, 2 teaspoons soda, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons ginger and 2 tablespoons cinnamon.

Add to other mixture. Chill dough overnight, then roll out ¼ inch thick and cut. Bake in 375 degree F. oven for about 10 minutes.

### When he has completed his creations, line the pails with aluminum foil, and put the cookie bundles in them. You will find your culinary art decorating your friends' trees until the kids bite the heads off the gingerbread men.

## Wrap Mail Packs Well

The package that comes crushed and battered probably looked dandy when it started its journey. The principal fault in its wrapping? Enough cardboard and paper to keep the contents in line, but not enough for the package to withstand the crush of dozens of heavy bundles resting on top of it.

And this, say post office authorities, is the main problem in Christmas wrappings. Without exception, packages should be enclosed in corrugated board or corrugated boxes that will withstand 200 pounds of pressure per square inch. The bursting strength is marked by the maker on the carton.

The package must be firmly packed, but not overpacked. An outside wrap of heavy brown paper adds strength.

### If gummed tape is used to seal the ends, there should be a clear indication it's fourth-class matter and may be opened for inspection. But never should tape be used alone. There should be two strong cords going each way on the package.

### Postal authorities make a further suggestion: address the outside wrapper clearly, but also enclose a slip of paper containing both sender and receiver's name and address inside the package. This may save it from the dead letter office if the outside wrap gets lost or tears off.

There are many regulations governing the size and bulk of packages allowed to go parcel post. If you are unsure about your present, check at your local post office about the rules.

Don't forget that parcel post means no writing enclosed except for the usual greetings and signature.

## Fill Dad's Sock With Toiletries

It used to be that only the kids hung their stockings with care at the mantel. But you can brighten friend husband's Christmas morning with stocking gifts, too.

Except, of course, that you don't fill it with toys. Instead you fill it with the little accessories and notions that he needs but leaves to you to buy anyway.

It's easy to figure this gift out. Simply look at his toiletries shelf and you'll see that he needs toothpaste, razor blades, a new toothbrush, dental floss, styptic pencil or foot powder.

How about his shoe laces? You can buy them in huge quantities for little money and you can pick the shades yourself.

Check his pocket comb and his bathroom comb and brush. Check his eyeglass case — he's probably lost the original one. How's his supply of shoe polish? His clothes brush? Does he have a suitable nail file or emery board supply?

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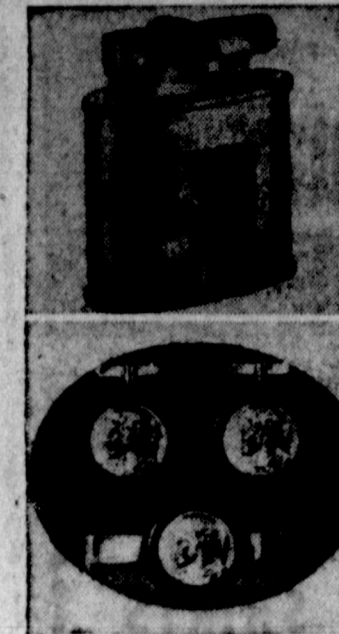

Even if the man has a watch already, a new expansion watch band will rate you a roaring thank you. So will the many new cuff link styles or a handsome cigar-cigarette lighter.

Another sure-fire bet is a practical cigarette case. One new model, by Presto-Pak, has a unique pop-up top and a gleaming jeweler's finish.

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**MAILED** gifts should be good travelers. If it's food, don't make it too rich. Keep it moist in cellophane.

### Wrapping Gifts Half The Fun

If Christmas means fun to you, you will wrap your gifts with love and care.

If it's a big headache from Thanksgiving to New Year's, you won't, and the spirit you pass on will be as gay as an unemptied ash tray.

When you approach the finish line on your shopping, plan several evenings for wrapping. Get all your equipment spread out on the dining room table or card tables. Let the children have their whack at it and do not let them be discouraged by their messy results.

Manufacturers this year have a whole raft of bright or sophisticated wraps and ribbons for you to pick from.

Tie-Tie has come out with a cutter box that eliminates dealing with little squares of paper that won't enclose big packages. They also have a make-it-yourself bow kit that really makes flat flowers — wonderful for packages to be mailed, since they won't crush.

Elaborate bows are fine if you can manage them, but a simple bow on bright paper, in contrasting ribbon creates a cherry effect with less agony for the five-thumbed.

Unusual papers are fun. Children who fingerprint will be proud to whip out a few creations that make fine wrapping paper. Hi-Silone is Sylvania's cellophane paper with a silver lining that makes a shiny gift wrap.

### Many Make Own Cards

Families who make their own Christmas cards derive tremendous satisfaction from sending cards that are individual and, generally speaking, they enjoy the work. But if you plan to embark on this project, be sure you have the time and the space and that it will be enjoyable rather than a harassment and a frustration.

Made cards can range from the relatively simple snapshot made into a card by the local photographic outfit to the silk screen beauties turned out by artistic families.

If you plan on a snapshot card, take your pictures a long time in advance to give yourself a chance to get just what you want. If there are kids in it shoot a lot of film in the hopes of getting a couple of natural-looking expressions.

Most towns have places that will take the snapshot or negative and deliver the specified number of cards with whatever greeting you pick. If you want something more fancy, consult them or the local printing or offset shop. They will tell you what variations are possible.

Individual head shots dictate what's new with you — a "mortgage" or a child's finger-painting or a dummy Army commission — can be made into a single negative by a photo engraving plant, for reproduction.

Most popular are simple lineoleum block prints that are printed in the home with inexpensive kits such as the Speedball kit. Instructions can be obtained in a booklet put out by the C. Howard Hunt Pen Co. It's available through your art dealer or Arthur Brown, 2 West 46th Street, New York City 36, for 50 cents.

An idea to cut expense on block-printed cards is to print them on the back of postcards rather than on folders to be enclosed in envelopes.

For those interested in block printing, Bassons Industries has put out a kit called Plasti-Cut, which doesn't require careful gouging out of areas, but rather uses a scratch tool which makes lines adequate for printing.

Subject matter on these cards is a matter of taste, but, while a copied drawing may be more artistic, even stick figures of the family carry a real touch of "how we are doing." Simple to do is a lineoleum cut of the front door, with a wreath on it.

Lovely cut-outs are fun for the family that has a small Christmas card list. Shiny green paper for a tree, with silver sprinkles or candy topping pressed into rubber cement will be fun for a child to do. Old wrappings or fabric scraps should be saved for these.

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**THE FREEZER'S** a good friend at Christmas. Personalized food gifts can be stored until ready. So can parts of the big dinner if you prepare them in advance.

### Christmas Kitchen Scents Vital To Yule Observance

Wonders come from the stocking. Wonders are found under the tree. But it is the rich smell of the kitchen, redolent of many Christmases — ever different yet still the same — that is the wonder that holds the marvelous bauble of Christmas together.

Childhood holidays are remembered not for the bicycle or cowboy suit, but for the smell of coffee cake going in the oven, the tart delight of pickles blending with the scent of celery, the taste of tiny cookies and good coffee, the bite of punch.

Wise families may pare the Christmas budget down to nothing, but they will save enough to spend on the delights of the kitchen. If you have never experienced the delight of exquisite Christmas food, try this year, making the holiday a time of good food, lovingly made.

A chicken will do for the main meal if you can't go a turkey, but make it splendid and festive.

Get a book like Virginia Pasley's "Christmas Cookie Book" and read until you are hungry. Then bake — cookies for gifts, for tea, for a jar in the kitchen, for the kids to decorate.

Plan Christmas breakfast as a calm time of joy.

Food is no foolish frippery. It lies close to the core of the family as a source of shared fun, good morale.

If the kids are full of the season spirit, lead them to the kitchen where they may bake cranberry pies in small aluminum tins for

their friends, put names on gingerbread men for the family.

It is true that the first thing we seek as a gift for those who have little, or those who do not live in America, is food. Without it, the brightest lights, the fanciest lawn decoration are as cold and uncomfortable as that forsighted soul who completes the Christmas shopping in October.

Prepare dough as directed on Pillsbury Hot Roll Mix package. Knead on floured board about 5 minutes. Place in greased bowl and cover. Let rise in warm place until double in bulk, about 30 to 60 minutes. Knead into dough 1/2 cup gumdrops, chopped, 1/2 cup walnuts, chopped. Shape dough into loaf. Place in greased 8x5x3-inch pan, cover. Let rise again of pan — 30 to 60 minutes. Bake until dough is rounded above top in 350 degree oven 40 to 50 minutes. Frost with confectioner's sugar icing, if desired.

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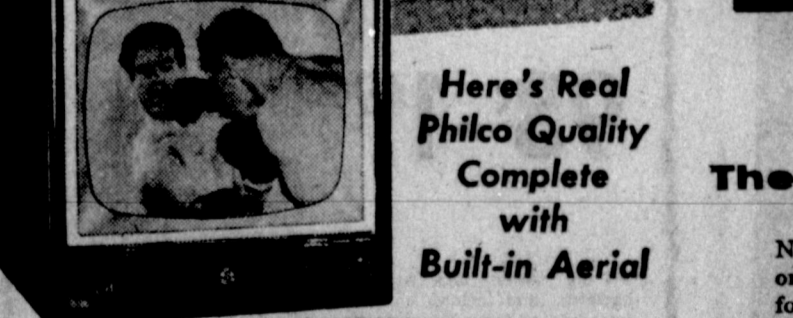
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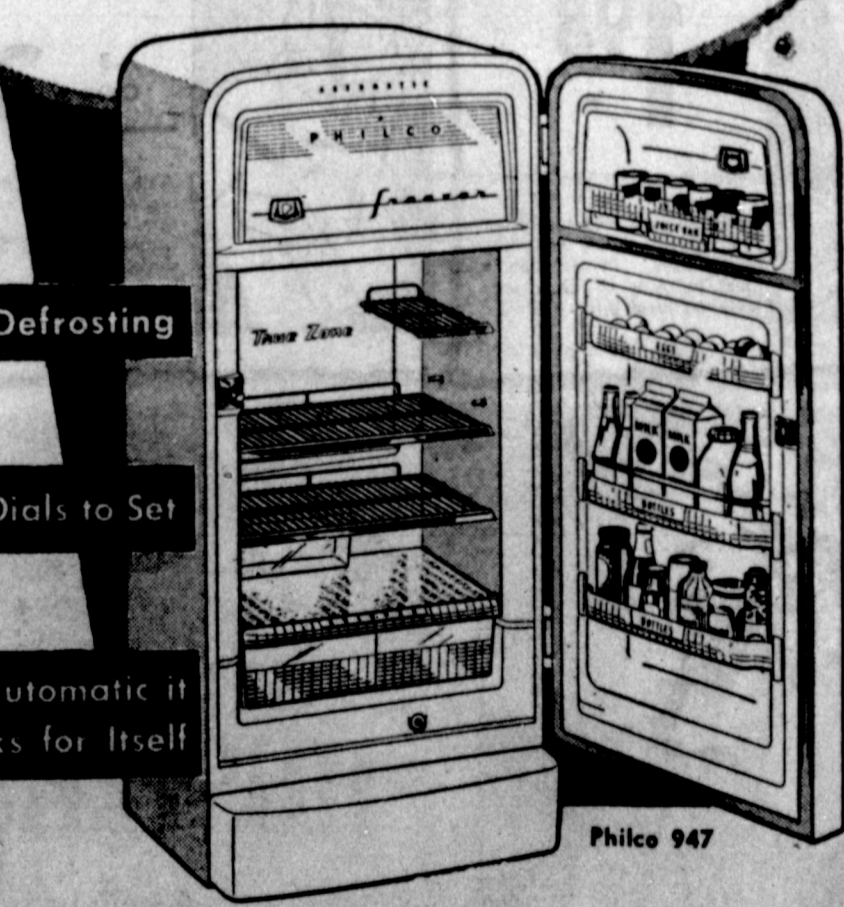

## Photos Are Lasting Gifts

A basic knack to the gift-giving business is to choose a present that's personal -- one that keeps you, the giver, in mind whenever it's used. And an item which does this always is a new portrait photograph.

Photos of loved ones are sure to be treasured, and, with care, special usage as Christmas gifts has dozens of variations.

Girl friends give them to beaux, for instance, or beaux give them to girl friends. Or servicemen give them to Mom and Dad.

But these are only the obvious gifts. For something a little different, why not have Mom and the kiddies have portraits taken in secret? Then present them to Dad -- being sure that a couple are wallet-sized prints. He'll be showing them off to his friends for countless weeks to come.

The idea works equally well when applied to Mom or the in-laws, and especially to Grandpa and Grandpa. But keep the posing a secret so your gift will be a surprise.

And for gifts that are novel, for the families of one or two friends? Family group photos are highly prized, but few families actually get around to having one taken.

However you decide to give them, have the portraits done by a "pro." Studio pictures are not every expensive and the expert will capture a better likeness.

You can add a touch of your own in the portrait's presentation. With modern picture mounting methods, you can turn out a score of decorative remembrances, from greeting cards to wall displays. A new type of fast-drying mounting cement enables you to mount your photos on almost any surface -- paper, matboard, fabric or glass.

For an interesting background, cover a piece of lightweight wall-board or a sheet of plywood with a textured fabric. Make an attractive composition of pictures planned to fit the shape of the board. Then mount right on the fabric with Rapid Mounting Cement.

When this adhesive is used for mounting pictures on paper, matboard or glass, make a thin line of adhesive about 1/16 of an inch away from the edge of the paper to allow for seepage. But when mounting on fabric, bring adhesive to the edge of the photo, because of the fabric's absorbency. Allow cement to become tacky, then use only fingertip pressure to apply photos.

Another excellent mounting material is Dry Mounting Tissue. Both products are available at photography stores, and come with full instructions, as well as many mounting ideas.

It might be wise to fireproof flimsy decorative materials. It can be done with a solution of nine ounces of borax, four ounces of boric acid and a gallon of water. Saturate fabric thoroughly, wring and hang up to dry.

# Age Is Big Factor In Choosing Toys

The toys that American children receive, use, lose, break and wear out in a year ring up \$600 million in the cash registers of toy stores and counters all over the country. That national debt-like figure is not a mistake, it's the word of Melvin Freud, president of the Toy Guidance Council, which helps parents buy play equipment just right for their youngsters.

Most of this business comes about because Christmas is a child's time and most people feel Christmas is just a bother unless they can shop for some kid — any kid.

But even the Toy Guidance Council has no idea how many of these dollars go for toys that are for youngsters the wrong age, the wrong interests and the wrong environment. It's something they don't like to think about, since they spend their time trying to get a toy and moppet together happily.

But hang around the toy department and you'll see it happen: the man with the three-month-old baby buys a dump truck or a stuffed animal with a shoe-button eye that will appeal to the child as a prospective edible; an auntie will buy a darling doll for a child who is squirming valiantly to get to the hammer-toys; granny will pick out an expensive movie projector for a child who craves a wagon.

But the right combination is a joy to see: Junior gravitates to the package most likely to be his holster set, opens it and the parry needs no thanks. He's off to the imaginary pampas of the kitchen to pick up his horse, stabled in the broom closet.

The manufacturers who stuff the Christmas pack with toys have brought out a top-notch selection of the do-it-yourself trend. Children are the original home builders of furniture mountains, houses under the desk, horjies out of brooms; so it is natural that toy makers are bringing out more and more toys that give kids a chance to do rather than look.

A toy tool set by Skill-Craft, a kitchen set by American Metals Specialties, a kit of scale model locomotives by Northwestern Products, the Dopekie Company's model sports car, Kenner Products' "Play a Story With Dolly," Plastic Block City's blocks with many building possibilities, Model-Craft's sculpture and paint set and Hasselted Brothers' Mr. and Mrs. Potato Head are samples of toys children will develop their imaginations and hand skills on.

Also in this category are Bachmann Brothers' Plasticville U. S. A., Gaston Manufacturing's Doodie Face, Revell's Navy Gift Set shipbuilding kit, Milton Bradley's Fat-O-Mats, Walco Bead's Pearl Jewelry Craft Set and Walter Herne's junior home decorator's set.

While children's imaginations provide them a rich world, with the help of a few adaptable toys, every youngster goes through a

stage of finding out how things work. He wants tugboats that go, trucks that dump, ladders that extend, trains that puff and cars he can ride. But owning several of these toys will bring a poverty providing additional fun. Give him the one he's crazy for — and it's probably the one everyone in the neighborhood has. If relatives send many more such toys, put them away against the day his favorite breaks or for the next child.

Among the mechanical toys you have to pick from are sound, well-constructed items, such as Product Miniature's scale model International Diesel called Turn-Trac, Vintage Product's Zimcom signal box and U-Drive-It, a toy that teaches safe driving.

Others that may be just what your child craves are Kamkay's Supermarket, Dopekie's fire engines, Structo Manufacturing's Road Grader, Aluminum Model Toy's Remote Control Pontiac, Bassons Industries bicycle drive sports car and the "Castell Motor Bike."

Games that invite the whole family's participation make good gifts. On the market this winter are two small-sized shuffleboard games: Carthage, Mills O'Shuff and Dimco-Gray's Indoor Shuffleboard. Board games available include Milton Bradley's Pathfinder and Swayze. Miniatures that are new are Northwestern Product's Poosh-M-Up ice hockey and Gotham Pressed Steel's table model pool table. A new card-word game, Bali, is good for a solitaire game or for families up to four persons.

Dolls and doll equipment satisfy the little girl's early motherly impulses. On your toy counters will be Horaman's "Love Me" doll, Playtime Product's Pink Pram, Holle's Diane the Dancing Doll, and Belle's Gingham Girl Doll.

With their popularity on television, puppets and marionettes are welcome toys. Among those available are Znav Toy's hand puppets and Hazelle's Teto the Clown.

For the very youngest's Christmas, there is Plastray's suction cup dinner plate, Mem's soap figures, Gaston's Walt Disney wood block story book and Holle's washable plastic animals.

Lead soldiers, a traditional Christmas trinket from years gone by, are still with us. Made by both British and American firms they appear fastened in rows in their boxes much as they did shortly after the turn of the century. There are many varieties to choose from.

**Open House Fruit Punch**  
Pour 2 quarts boiling water over 5 tablespoons tea. Brew five minutes. Strain. Add 1 cup sugar and stir until dissolved. Cool at room temperature. Combine 1 cup lemon juice, 2 cups orange juice, 1 cup pineapple juice, 2 cups cranberry juice. Add to tea. Chill. Just before serving, pour punch over large piece of ice in punch bowl. Add 1 quart ginger ale. Garnish with 1/2 lemon, sliced, 1 lime, sliced, and maraschino cherries.

If you like the gay and traditional champagne punch, here is a suggestion from the Champagne Producers of France.

**Champagne Punch**  
Combine 2 quarts imported champagne, 2 pines maraschino, 4 pines cognac, 2 pines curacao, 2 pines yellow chartreuse, juice of 4 lemons and 2 quarts soda water. Add sugar to taste. Decorate with fruit, pour into punch bowl, over ice. Makes about 30 servings.

**Tuna Holiday Dip**  
Combine one 6-ounce can tomato paste, 1 cup sour cream, 1 teaspoon grated onion, 1-8 teaspoon oregano, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley. Mix until blended. Break one 7 oz. can drained solid-pack tuna into large pieces with a fork, add to tomato mixture. Mix well. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Garnish with additional tuna, if desired.

### Simple Recipes For Toy Picking

The Toy Guidance Council offers a few simple recipes for selecting the right toy out of the appealing ads and arrays. Their authority is Emma Sheehy, who is associate professor of childhood education, Teachers' Advisory Committee.

Her general suggestions include: shop early; check Toy Guidance leaflets; don't pick toys that amuse you, but do consider the child's interests and needs. Specifically, Miss Sheehy suggests:

For infants — unbreakable rattles, bath toys, soft rubber squeeze toys, washable dolls and animals and sound-making push toys.

Guard against sharp edges, loose parts that might be eaten, un-washability and unchewability. Try for toys with interesting textures, bright colors and parts small enough to be held in stubby hands.

## China, Glass Show Taste

Housewares, because they're used almost every day by the whole family, should be selected carefully with an eye to practicality, looks and durability. For this reason, china, glass and linens are wonderful gifts to give within the family. They show superb taste.

Some families add to their china every year. But if you have never had china, quiz mother and see if it isn't something she's craved. A touch of the very best — Lenox's Plymouth cream and sugar, for instance — may satisfy her taste for the expensive.

But perhaps she'd rather start buying place settings of table china. Royal Worcester's "Montego" has a fern pattern that's informal but not too modern. Royal Jackson's "Pagoda" is in the traditional dark - and - gold pattern of classic English china.

A set of glasses just for entertaining is welcome in most homes. Libbey's "Golden Rose" has the ornate shape so popular today, but has a rose design in 22-karat gold. For a golfer, Libbey has a glassware pattern with a Scotsman that comes packed with golf balls. Pilsener glasses that are plastic have ducks on them.

Good-looking canisters for the kitchen may be more of an investment than you expect. Copper ones are pretty, but come high. In the fancy canister department are Braat's blue Delft ones that would grace any traditional kitchen. Moderately priced are plastic ones by Columbus. The clear ones have the popular Pennsylvania Dutch patterns painted on them.

Easy to care for are the lovely stainless steel flatwares. Ekco's Flint Deluxe never needs polishing. A nice pattern is "Patina." Ekco's Flint carving set is a sound buy if you've always lacked a good carving set.

You may use paper or plastic tablecloths, but at least one real cloth is still a necessity. Bates' pine green "Festival" is a warm-looking cloth for Christmas and winter.

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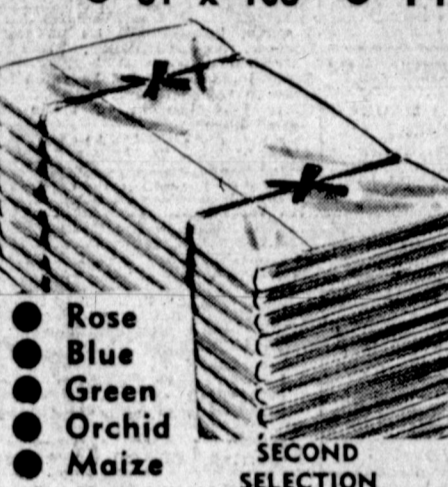
