The defense attorney, Arthur Cavanaugh of Lawton, said he also asked for transcripts of statements given by Nugent himself. Cavanaugh said authorities at Fort Sill, where Nugent is stationed, had forwarded the demands to the Pentagon.

Tell-Tale Tax Stripe To Remain

Vet Land Program Being Investigated

CUERO, Tex., Nov. 17 - De Witt County Attorney Wiley Cheatham charged Thursday some South Texas land dealers, utilizing the veterans' land program, have promoted themselves into the Cadillac class by preying on gullible Negro veterans.

As state and local authorities spurred an investigation, Cheatham hinted a litiged action by some operators may involve federal violations.

"This involves lots of money. Some of these operators were broke not too long ago. Now they're driving big Buicks and Cadillacs - if you get the idea," he said.

"This is of such magnitude that the people of Texas ought to know the story," he added. Won't Divulge Details. However, Cheatham was reluctant to divulge details pending conference with representatives of various co-operating state agencies.

3-City Meet May Be Held This Month

The tri-city meeting of Pampa, Borger and Amarillo with officials of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority will probably have to be held sometime this month.

It must be held by Dec. 15, date of the next scheduled meeting of the authority's board of directors in Plainview.

Lynn Boyd, one of Pampa's two members of the authority board, today said he thought the tri-city meeting would have to be held within the next two weeks in order to enable the other eight communities to hold their sessions with authority officials by the Dec. 15 deadline. It appears that this meeting will be the only group session, and will be the first.

Purpose of the tri-city meet will be to discuss the upcoming election on the proposed dam-and-reservoir project near Sanford northwest of Borger. Authority directors Nov. 8 voted to call a revenue bond election within 90 days, or rather, by Feb. 6. And the idea is to familiarize officials of the 11 authority communities with the details of the project and the election.

In the authority are Pampa, Borger, Amarillo, Lubbock, Levelland, Tahoka, O'Donnell, Slaton, Plainview, Brownfield and Lamesa.

Power Pact May Slow AEC Appointments

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 - The controversial Dixon-Yates power contract threatened Thursday to prevent quick Senate confirmation for two of President Eisenhower's nominees to the Atomic Energy Commission.

The nominations came before Senate members of the congressional atomic energy committee with the Democratic leadership pledged to fight confirmation of "controversial" nominees. Republican leaders have agreed that the Senate should pass any nominations which produce major fights at the current special Senate session.

Democratic critics of the power contract said they will ask both prospective commissioners what they think of the Dixon-Yates arrangement and how they would feel about similar deals. The critics were ready to question: 1. W. F. Libby, a Chicago University nuclear physicist credited with developing the "carbon-14 clock" for dating archeological finds. Currently serving on the AEC under a recess appointment. Libby indicated his approval of the final version of the Dixon-Yates contract.

2. John Von Neumann, a physicist and mathematician who helped develop electronic computers used in atomic research. Von Neumann, who has not yet been sworn in as an AEC member, has not expressed an opinion on the Dixon-Yates contract.

## Ward Store Site Sold

The title to the land which Montgomery Ward leases was transferred recently by two California parties to the Newhouse Foundation, San Francisco, a charitable organization, for an estimated price near \$70,000. The deed was filed Wednesday in the county clerk's office.

Actual financial transaction was not stipulated in the deed but revenue stamps worth \$75.35 were affixed, indicating a sale price near \$20,000.

The sale of the land on N. Cuyler will not affect the Montgomery Ward lease as it was made a part of the transfer.

The property was conveyed to the foundation subject to a deed of trust to the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co., Milwaukee, for \$90,000.

## Tornadoes Give Clues

MIAMI BEACH, Nov. 18.—UP—The nation's weathermen were told Thursday that such clues as lightning flashes and firehouse alarms may help solve the mystery of tornado direction.

The problems of forecasting, tracking and detecting the twisters topped the second-day program for the 133rd national meeting of the American Meteorological Society.

Herbert Jones of Stillwater, Okla., described a new direction finder he said will help pinpoint the compass direction of lightning flashes in local storms that produce tornadoes. He said the instrument will enable experts to see if there is any connection between lightning flashes per minute and tornadoes.

Jones, who is doing tornado and electronic research at Oklahoma A&M, said better knowledge of the relationship will make it possible to develop an improved warning system.

## Decision On Dope Case Due Monday

HOUSTON, Nov. 18.—UP—Final arguments were to be heard Thursday by Federal Judge Allan B. Hannay in the narcotics trial of Sidney Smith, a former Houston police detective.

Hannay, who is hearing the case without a jury, said Wednesday after both the government and defense rested. That he would give his decision Monday.

The government rested in its presentation of rebuttal testimony, although the prosecutors had not called five witnesses who were subpoenaed.

Smith was accused with mishandling confiscated narcotics. When he testified in his own defense earlier this week, he denied that he ever gave "good balls" to an ex-convict or traded narcotics to two women for their love.

## Scientists Set A Place For Women In Prehistoric World

AUSTIN, Nov. 17—UP—University of Texas scientists have decided that the woman's place in the prehistoric world should be recognized.

as near Midland, originally referred to as "Midland man," have been found through anthropological tests to be a woman, research scientist Alex Krieger said.

"Midland Minnie," as the scientists now refer to her, first was called a man because of the long-standing custom of designating ancient human remains that way.

But Krieger said measurements of the skull proportions, brow and mastoid formations, teeth and finger bones indicate the remains are those of an Indian woman who died at about the age of 30.

Scientists said "Midland Minnie" may be as much as 20,000 years old, though a final estimate must await tests by machines measuring the radiation disintegration of carbon in artifacts. Artifacts found nearby in a later deposit were estimated to be about 10,000 years old.

Krieger and Dr. Fred Wendorf of the New Mexico museum said that chemical tests supported other archeological evidence that "Midland woman" was one of the earliest known residents of the Southwest.

Tests of fluorine, nitrogen, carbonate and water contents in the remains of "Midland woman" matched similar tests of elephant, horse, camel and giant wolf and bison bones found in the same excavation.

"Midland woman" was discovered last summer near Midland by Keith Glasscock of Pampa. Dr. E. H. Sellards, director of the Texas memorial museum, is guiding further excavations, financed by the Wenner-Gren Foundation for Anthropological Museum of New York.

Remains of "Midland woman" will be on display at the University of Texas anthropology museum until Dec. 15, it was announced.

### Alger Sees Two Parties In Texas

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18—UP—Congressman-elect Bruce Alger of Dallas believes Texas Republicans have established a firm basis for a two-party system in the Lone Star State.

Alger, who met newsmen Tuesday in the office of Speaker Joseph W. Martin Jr., said the GOP's showing indicated many former Democrats were becoming Republicans in Texas.

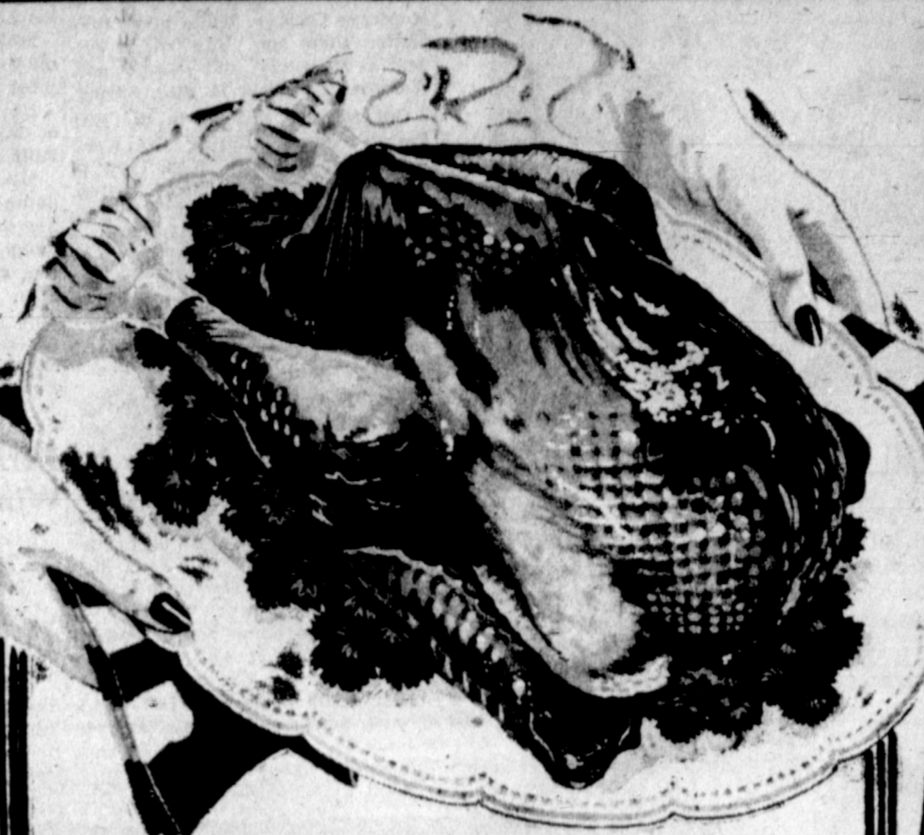
"It is our hope that we have established a solid basis for a two-party system in the state," he said.

H. J. (Jack) Porter, Republican national committeeman from Texas, was with Alger. Porter also said he thought the party was on the upswing, and predicted Texas would go Republican in the 1956 presidential election, as it did in 1952.

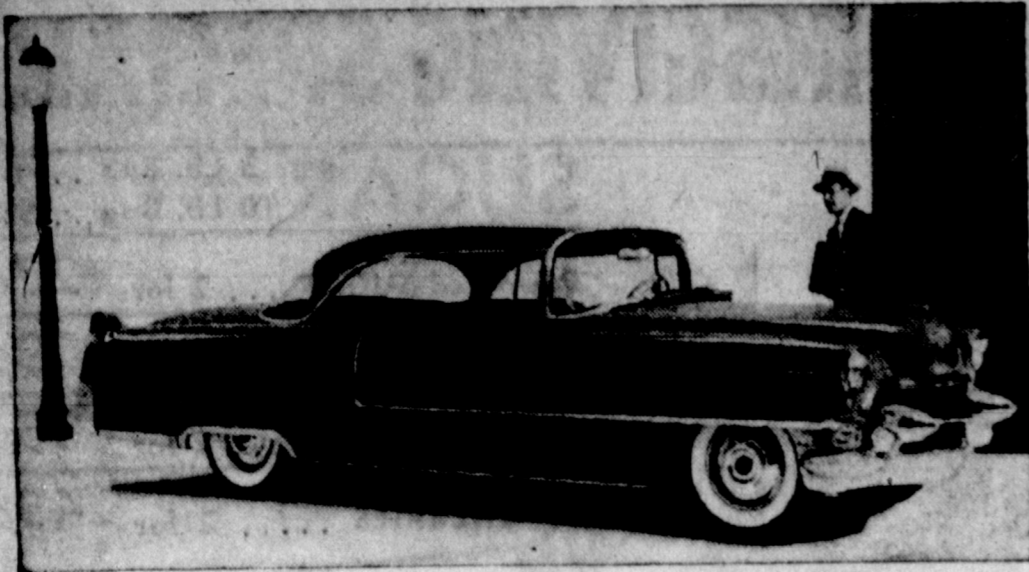

**Suicide Ruled In Death Of Old Murder Case Figure**

BAYTOWN, Tex., Nov. 18—UP—A coroner's verdict of suicide in the gun death of an 80-year-old recluse here wrote finis Tuesday to the drama and intrigue of a sensational murder case of 34 years ago.

Charles F. Jones, who in 1900 confessed that he chloroformed his employer, millionaire philanthropist William Marsh Rice, was found shot to death in his home Tuesday night.

Justice of the Peace Walter Queen returned a verdict of suicide Wednesday following paraffin tests of Jones' wrinkled hands to determine if he actually fired the shot.

The white-haired Jones, former valet to Rice, founder of Houston's Rice Institute, was found dressed in pajamas lying on a bed in the modest home in which he lived alone.

A .38-caliber revolver lay nearby, with a note, directing that his body

be sent to Earthman funeral home here. Queen declined to divulge the contents of an envelope also found.

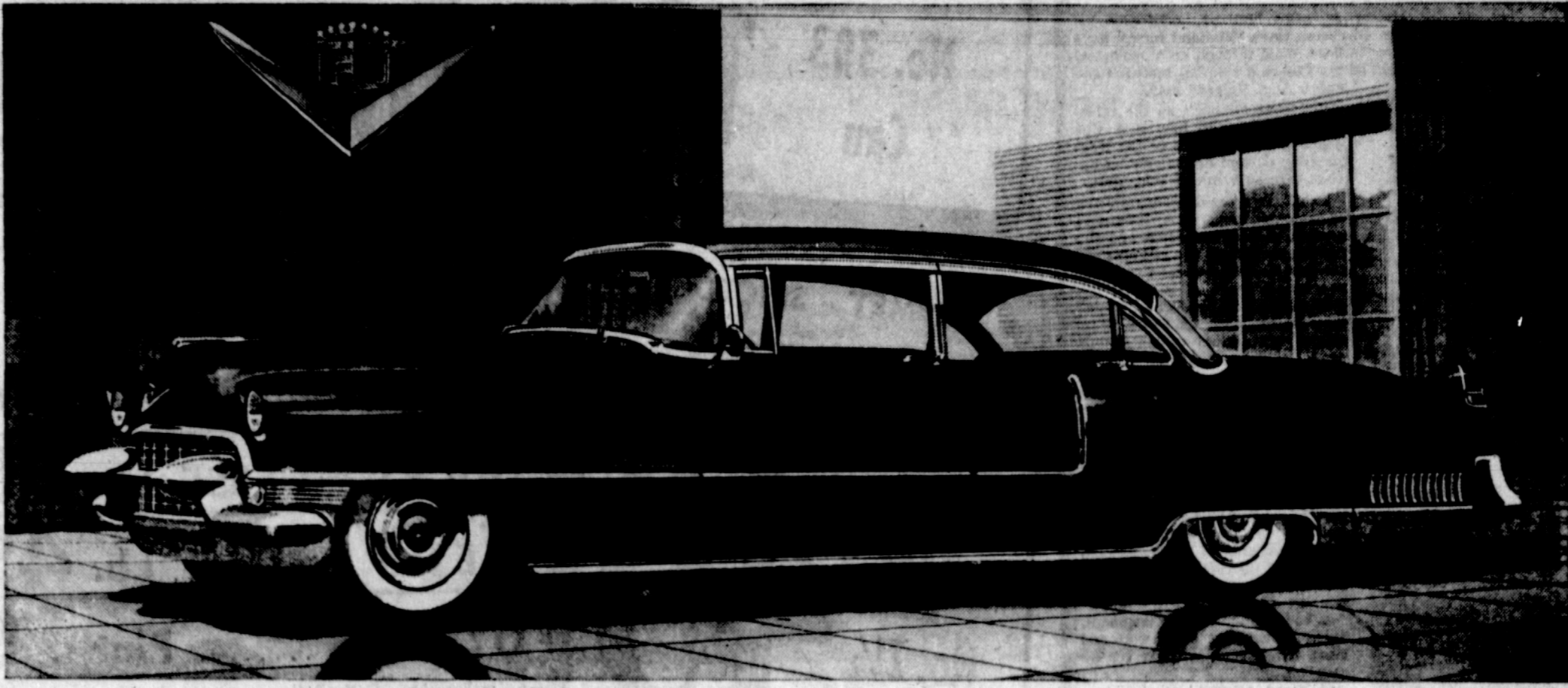
The body was found by Lester Knox, a neighbor who befriended the old man some years ago. Knox said Jones told him earlier Tuesday evening he was ill and was going to kill himself but, he said, he paid no attention to the threat.

Jones was reported to have large real estate and oil holdings.

Rice was murdered in his New York home in 1900 and Jones, his valet, was arrested. He confessed he gave his employer chloroform but said the plot was instigated by Albert Patrick, Rice's attorney, to gain control of the Rice estate.

Patrick was sentenced to life imprisonment but later paroled and died in Oklahoma in 1940. Jones was never prosecuted.

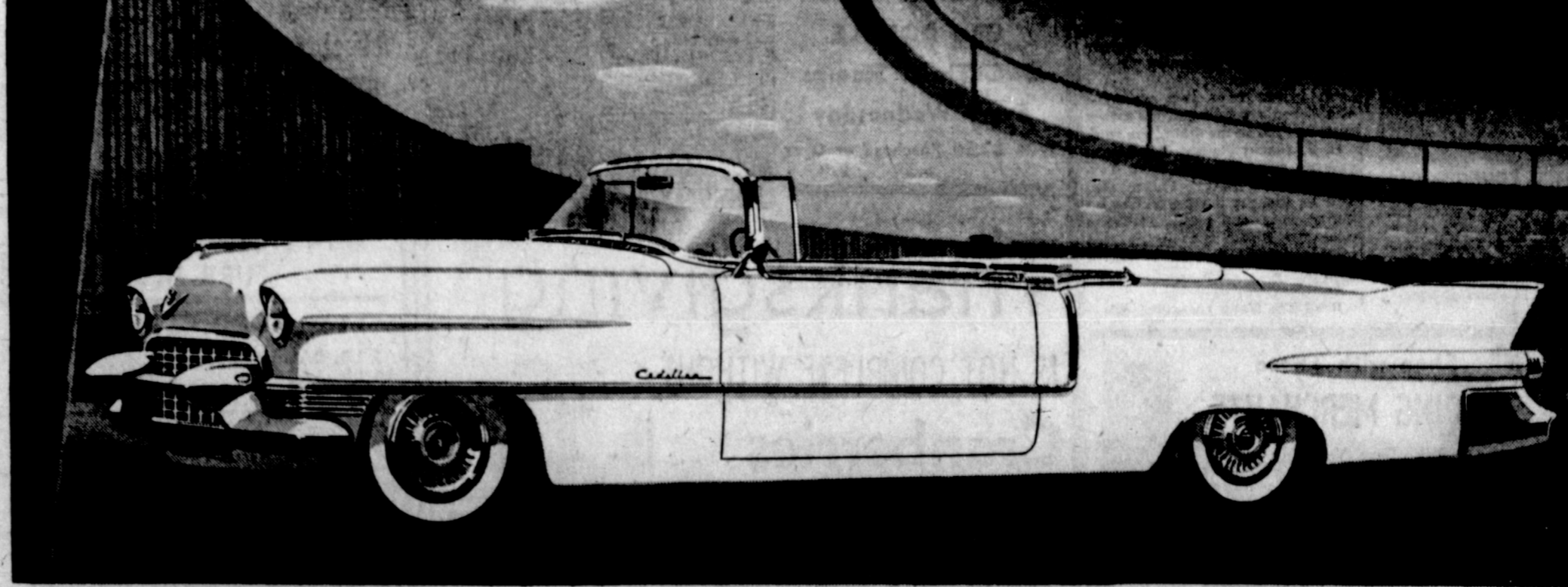

at Milwaukee, my good friends, Joe Cohan and Ollie Emrich, will surely be on hand to defend the men's pair title they won in this tournament last year.

I'm inclined to doubt, however, that they will enjoy any hand this year as they enjoyed one of the hands, shown today, in last year's tournament.

Emrich opened the deuce of spades from the West hand, and Cohan thought carefully before playing to the first trick. The "normal" play is the king of spades, but Cohan had a good reason for choosing a different play.

Before we discuss Cohan's play, let's see what happened at most of the other tables. The East player put up the king of spades at the first trick, losing to the ace. Declarer then took a trump finesse losing to the king of hearts. East naturally returned the jack of spades, hoping that his partner had the queen.

This normal sequence of plays allowed declarer to win with the queen of spades, draw the rest of the trumps, and knock out the king of diamonds. The defenders could take one spade trick to add to their two red kings, but then South was ready to discard his losing clubs on dummy's good diamonds. All of these declarers therefore made their game contract in hearts.

Cohan could see that he would be given the king of hearts at an early stage of the play and that he wouldn't then know whether to try for two spade tricks or for two club tricks. It all depended on which black queen West held, since obviously South held the ace of spades for his strong bidding.

Cohan solved his problem by playing the jack of spades at the first trick. South won with the queen of spades, and it was therefore clear that West couldn't have the queen of spades but might have the queen of clubs.

South now tried the trump finesse, losing to the king. Knowing that the spades wouldn't produce enough tricks, Cohan shifted to the ten of clubs. This set up two club tricks, so that the defenders beat the game contract with one heart, one diamond, and two clubs.

### 9 State Fair Made \$20,000 Per Day

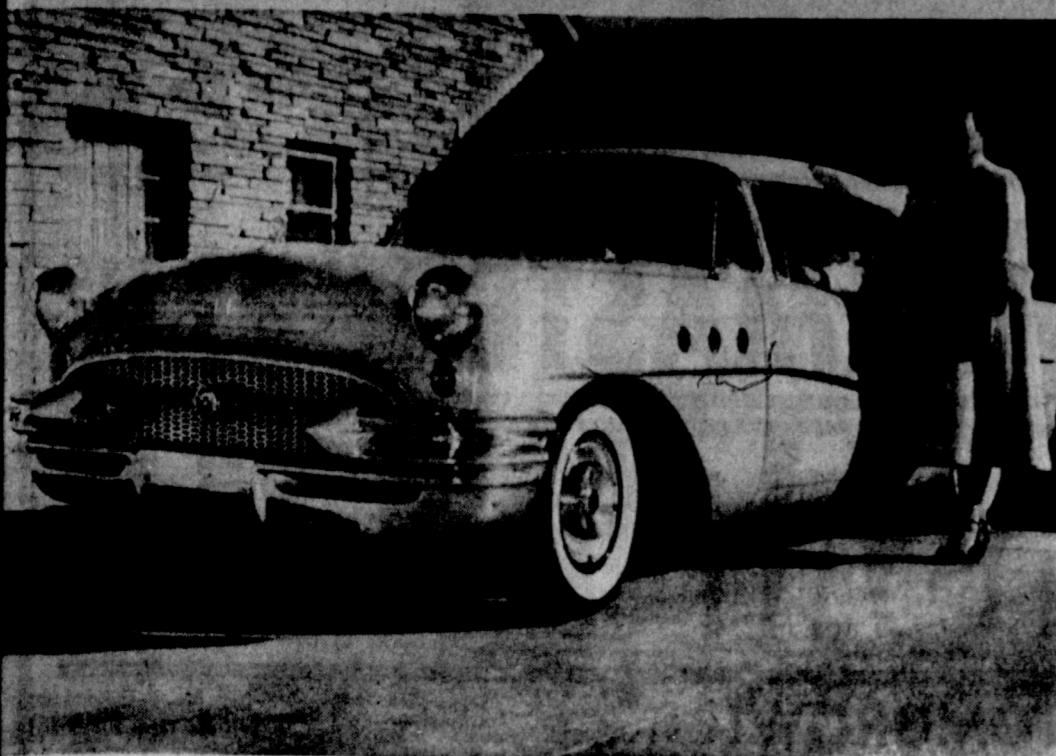

'Battle Of The Barrymores' Became Hollywood Legend

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a three-part series on the colorful life of Lionel Barrymore.

By ALINE MOBBY HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 18--UP--A legend happily nourished down the years was that the appearance of Lionel, John and Ethel Barrymore in a film turned into a scenery-chewing "battle of the Barrymores."

Lionel always insisted that any feuds were "feeble-brained nonsense," but still the making of their film, "Rasputin and the Empress," furnished colorful Barrymore stories.

The elder Barrymore had retired from the stage in the early '20's and began a film career, followed eventually by brother Jack. When in 1932 MGM lured Ethel to Hollywood from the stage for a three-Barrymore picture, Lionel growled, "What poor unlucky individual is to direct this opus?"

Camera Hugging Everyone on the set--expected fireworks, and the spirited Barrymores lived up to the challenge. One day Jack was trying to scene-steal from Lionel. Finally Lionel stomped from the set and telephoned back to the director to instruct John to stop hugging the camera.

The fight of "Rasputin" consisted of continual close-ups of Lionel and Jack, and the legend grew that the scene took so long because each profile was fighting for the limelight.

John and Lionel had such reputations for lens larceny that an actor said to Lionel, "You'd steal a scene from your grandmother."

Then, remembering she was the actress Mrs. John Drew, he added, "No, by God, I guess you wouldn't."

scene-stealing. When the brothers were co-starring in "Night Flight," Director Clarence Brown bet John 10 Lionel could not steal a scene in which John was to bowl out the speechless Lionel. John delivered his lines with superb skill. As Lionel turned to shuffle silently away, he reached around and rubbed his behind. John won 10. Before MGM was convinced Lionel could act in talkies, he turned director. While making "Madame X," he hung a microphone on a fishpole over Ruth Chatterton's head and claimed he invented the mike boom (an honor boasted by others). His second directorial milestone was making the first screen test of a bit player named Clark Gable who had acted in a Barrymore play.

Just Orchids, Blossom "I had him wear nothing but some orchids and a blossom behind his ear," Lionel recently recalled in his autobiography. Gable was hired.

To Barrymore the two most awesome actresses he met at MGM were Greta Garbo and Margaret O'Brien. Of Miss O'Brien, a natural scene-stealer, he once growled, "If she were born in Salem she would have been burned as a witch," but he meant it as a compliment. Later he took up eating lollipops she brought him, and he bestowed upon her his grandmother's pin, a sentimental heirloom.

Signs Point To Red Defense Alliance

MOSCOW, Nov. 18--UP--There were increasing signs Thursday the Soviet Union was preparing to set up a defense alliance of East European nations to counteract NATO.

Diplomatic sources said the Soviet was expected to call a conference of East European nations here Nov. 29 if the western nations reject the Kremlin's invitation to an all-Europe security conference as expected.

Communist broadcasts from Prague, Warsaw, Budapest and Bucharest said the satellite nations of Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary, and Romania, already had agreed to send delegates to the Soviet-proposed conference.

Diplomatic sources speculated the East European conference would result in some sort of East European collective security pact formalizing the already intimate political and military relations between Russia and the East European nations.

Trud, official organ of the Trade Union Central Council, made it clear Wednesday that a "defense alliance" was in the works when it published an article by S. Vasiliev, secretary of the Moscow regional peace committee, saying: "Creation of a narrow military grouping of several West European states, the chief military force of which would be a West German army having an aggressive aim, can cause creation of a defense alliance of peace-loving European peoples to ensure their security." An editorial in the official newspaper Pravda said: "It should now be clear to every subject the proposed conference for establishing a European collective security system and attempt to implement the Paris agreements, the peaceable nations of Europe will

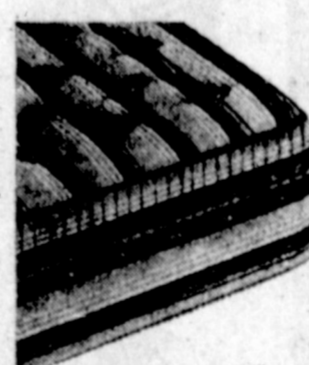

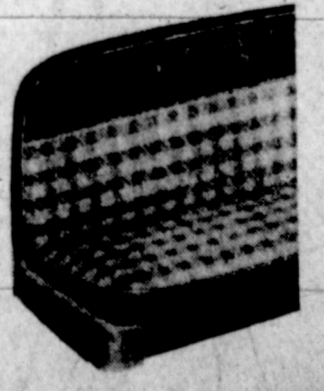

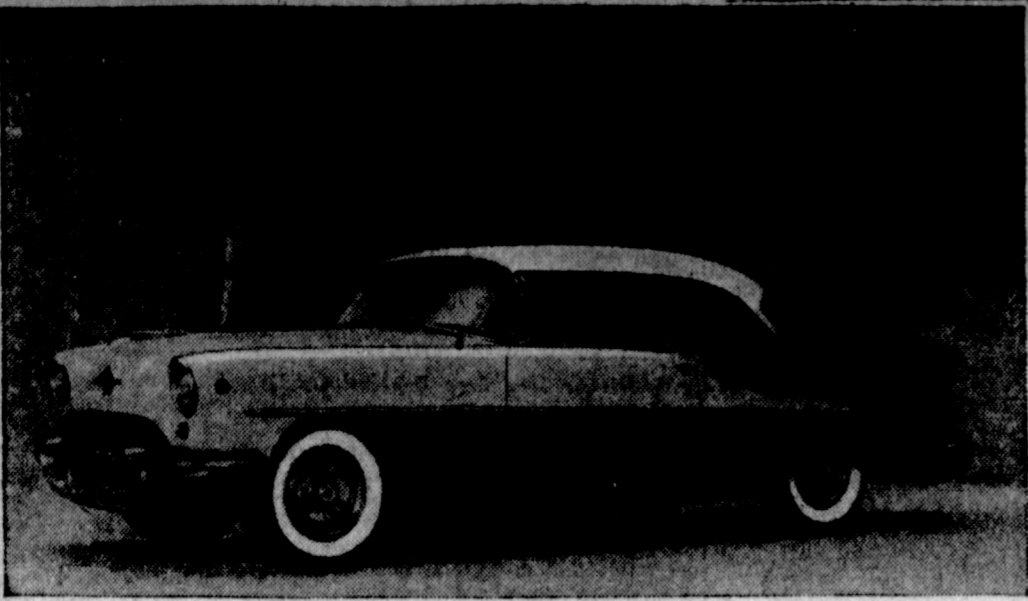

### New, Thin Drill Mud Is Shown

HOUSTON, Nov. 18—UP—A domestic and radically new mud "thinner" for oil well drilling was demonstrated here Wednesday before petroleum engineers and representatives of major oil and well drilling companies.  
 The new dispersant, a combination of chemicals found in trees after cellulose has been removed, is expected to end a long search for a domestic "thinner" to replace an imported extract.  
 The demonstration was given at a gathering in the Petroleum Club here by Dr. Edwin L. Lovell, research director of Rayonier, Inc., whose scientists first discovered the chemical combination and called it "silvichemical" for want of a better name.  
 Dr. Lovell said discovery of the "silvichemicals" holds a promise for many new and useful commercial products, the first being the oil well drilling mud dispersant.  
 Lovell told the engineers that the new "thinner" is particularly resistant to adverse effects of contaminants such as cement, salt or calcium sulfate and results in a mud more stable, economical and efficient.  
 He said the new dispersant has been field tested in drilling areas in California and Texas.

### GI Tells Court Of 'Brutality' In Officer Trial

AUGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 18—UP—An Army private testified Wednesday that Lt. Charles C. Anderson, defendant in a "brutality" court martial, forced him to exercise until he collapsed and then ordered him "buried" with a wooden cross in his mouth.  
 The enlisted man, Pvt. Rodney E. Steele of Lowndesboro, Ala., was one of several prosecution witnesses called in the second day of Anderson's general court martial at Camp Gordon, home of the military police and other major Army training enterprises.  
 The St. Louis, Mo., officer's defense counsel continued to hammer on cross examination at the angle that Anderson's apparent brutal treatment of the men under his command was for the purpose of "shaping up" his outfit.  
 Several witnesses admitted that Anderson's company "came out" after several incidents, including the strapping up of a soldier by his ankles for an infraction of discipline.  
 During a break in the trial Wednesday, Anderson chatted with newsmen and told them he was glad he joined the Army seven and one-half years ago "and I still like the Army."  
 Anderson, who won battle stars in Korea, said many American lives were lost there because soldiers had not been rigidly disciplined and trained before they went into battle.  
 He is charged with 17 counts of brutal treatment or conduct unbecoming an officer.  
 Steele testified that Anderson forced him to do pushups — an exercise wherein a person stretches out flat, stomach down, and pushes up and down with the arms — until he fell in exhaustion.  
 Steele said Anderson then remarked that "if this man is dead he should be buried" and ordered him to roll over and fold his arms over his stomach.  
 Anderson then instructed another trainee, Pvt. James Blout of New York to "bury" him, Steele said.  
 He said Blout covered him with dirt save for his mouth and then on Anderson's orders, fashioned "a little cross" from sticks and stuck it into the prone man's mouth.  
 Steele said he lay in that position for five or six minutes, after which he was freed.

## Kansas City Gels Boudreau For Manager

**KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 18** — UP— Lou Boudreau, newly-hired field manager of the Kansas City Athletics, Thursday held one of baseball's toughest jobs — that of making the former Philadelphia club a strong pennant contender. The work cut out for him is hard, but the pay is good. Arnold Johnson, owner of the A's did not disclose salary terms when Boudreau signed a two-year contract Wednesday. But he indicated the pay would be close to \$100,000.

He said Boudreau, 37, who managed the Cleveland Indians and Boston Red Sox, "has always been one of the highest paid managers in baseball, and he isn't taking any step down by coming here." At Boston, where he was replaced by Pinky Higgins, Boudreau was getting \$45,000 a year.

"The Athletics haven't been able to make much headway in the American League standings in recent seasons, and their lowly standing hurt them at the gate so much that they ran into financial difficulties in the two-team city. Last season, they won only 51 games.

Boudreau made it clear that he wasn't going to play members of the A's on their past reputations. "They've got to show me," he said.

Asked about the Philadelphia team's play last season, he said he thought the A's could do better.

"We want that extra effort," he told newsmen. "I want to win, but we all know what a tremendous job we have here."

He said he had high hopes for the club, but that it was too early to say what changes he might have in mind, what coaches he would hire, or what he would do to build up the farm system.

The situation in Kansas City, he said, can't be compared with that in Milwaukee, where the former Boston Braves proved a great success at the gate and on the field. He said Milwaukee inherited "a good ball club."

Boudreau broke into major league baseball with the Cleveland Indians and was an all-star shortstop. He compiled a lifetime batting average of .295. He took over as manager of the Indians in 1942, later moving to Boston.
