## Bufs' 7-6 Win Over Rebels Gives Them Series Lead

Houston was back home today and in front in the championship round of the Texas League playoff.

The Bufs took a three games to two lead in the best of seven series here last night the hard way, coming from behind for an 8-6 decision.

Dallas piled up a 6-0 lead before the Bufs staged one of their noted stretch drives and ended up with a 7-6 total after two big innings—the seventh and eighth. They added one more for good measure in the ninth.

Big Tom Paultig went to pieces in the seventh and eighth innings when Houston scored two and five runs respectively.

Before this outbreak he had held the Bufs in check, while his Rebel teammates fashioned two runs each in the second, third and fourth innings.

Houston batted around in the big eighth inning.

Floyd Giebel was due to take the mound for Dallas tonight in the sixth game of the playoff while Houston was expected to use Clarence Beers.

**NEW YORK**, Sept. 23—(AP)—A short-lived burst of liquidation in the stock market's final hour today dropped leading issues one to more than two points.

The sudden rush of selling orders flooded the ticker tape which fell one minute behind floor transactions during a brief period for the first time since late July. Prime targets were some of the oils, steels and motors. Earlier, shares had drifted up, with out any special to the movement, but the late flurry lifted total transactions to the neighborhood of 300,000 shares. Many leaders closed near the day's low.

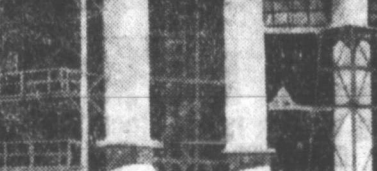

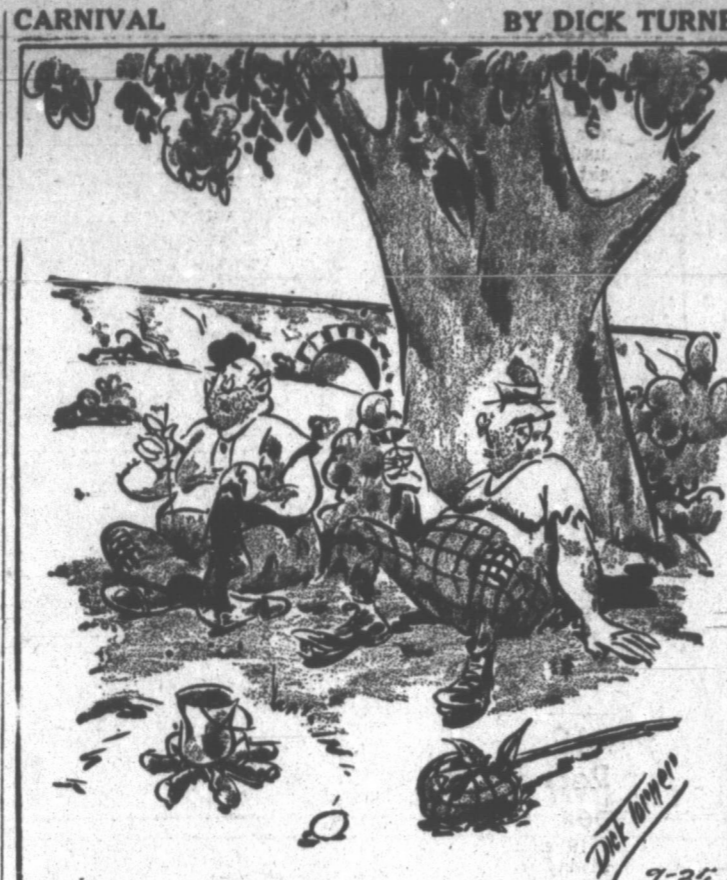

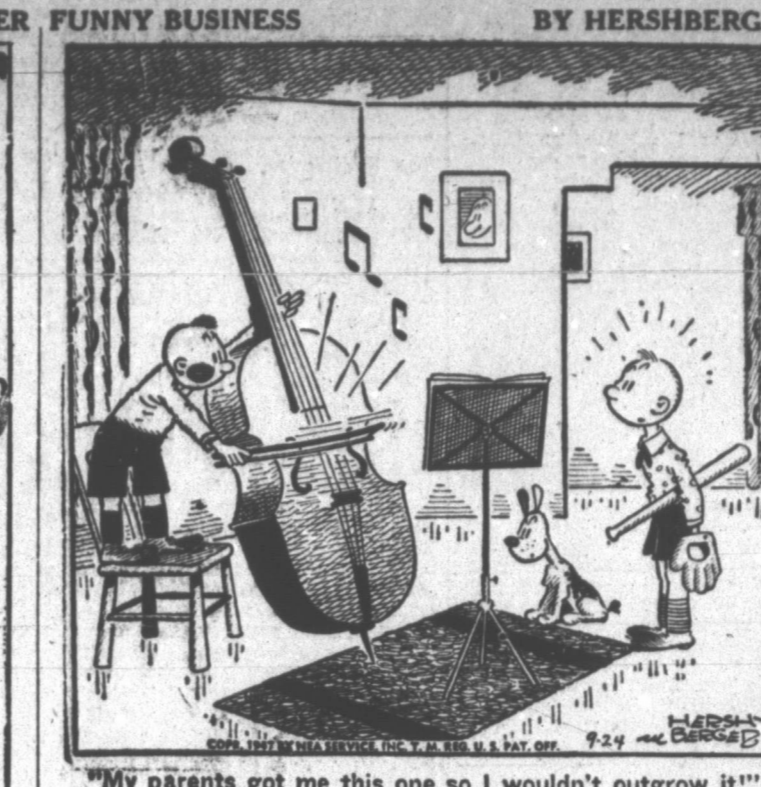

for overall coordination and organization. Garrison said he was strongly inclined to favor an adaptation of the local control center that was developed for civilian defense during the war, "but with the major modification that no person would be in absolute authority."

He believed the top ranking officials of agencies participating in handling of a disaster should have a central place at which to confer and thrash out any problems of overlapping jurisdiction or duplication of effort.

Citing the need for telephones, teletypes, radiotelephone and telegraph transmission, Garrison said: "With newspaper and radio representatives sitting on the sidelines getting the official, authentic information, such a setup would automatically eliminate one of the biggest headaches—that of assisting the press. It would save much time for the officials and would eliminate wild rumors."

## MACKENZIE'S Column

Where will the Red lightning strike next?

That's a natural question in view of Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vishinsky's United Nations speech which by implication made it clear that Russia intends—come hell or high water—to pursue its scheme of world revolution for the establishment of communism. We may have our answer in Italy's critical situation.

That war-shattered country is treading close to a Left-Wing political upheaval. The life of the government under Premier Alcide de Gasperi, leader of the slightly right-of-center Christian Democrat Party, is in grave danger from a powerful and concerted attack by the Communists and Socialists, whose representatives were ousted from the cabinet some time ago.

But this is no ordinary fluctuation of political fortunes involving merely tenure of office under the same form of government. The extreme Left is reaching for power. The situation is complicated by economic chaos which has provided fertile ground for illage by the Communists and Pinks and they haven't neglected their opportunities. Among recent activities they have been cooperating in planning a huge, country-wide demonstration for today against the government—against the speculation and egoism of privileged capitalistic groups.

In this stormy atmosphere Italy has moved toward a climax which the extreme Leftists intend shall involve the downfall of the Gasperi government in one way or another. The Communist-Socialist combination hope to achieve the overthrow of the government next week on a vote of no-confidence in the constituent assembly. If that fails, what? Are we witnessing a "prelude to revolution?"

**GLACIER YIELDS DEER 4,000 YEARS OLD**  
OSLO—(P)—A 4,000-year-old reindeer extremely well preserved in a Norwegian glacier was found recently after the glacier broke up under this summer's record heat, the newspaper Verdens Gang reported.

A stone arrow pointed out from the breast of the animal. Archaeologists dated the arrow was four thousand years old.

Such finds are very rare in Norway. Similar preservation of prehistoric animals are mostly known from Siberian tundras.

## Broadcast Will Call Attention to Handicap Week

Employers who hire persons with physical handicaps and handicapped workers will join in a special discussion program over KPDM at 7 o'clock Thursday evening, according to an announcement by L. P. Fort, local member of the Texas Employment Commission.

The program will also serve to call attention to National Handicap Week, October 5-11, Fort said. Handicapped workers are not handicapped when placed on the right job, Fort declared. "Pampa now has only six handicapped people who are registered for work at the local office. But for these six people their problem is a 100 percent problem, although their handicaps are not 100 percent by any means," Fort said.

He noted that some of the largest firms in the Pampa area employ handicapped people and the experience of these firms has been a credit to such workers. Fort also stated 51 percent of handicapped workers have better accident records than non-handicapped workers. 49 percent have better than average absence records, 53 percent stay on the job longer, and 73 percent produce at a rate as good or better than unimpaired workers on the same job.
